This photo collage features images of the aftermath of the raid on Dieppe, also known as Operation Jubilee, which took place on the 19th of August in 1942. The photos feature German soldiers after the raid with Allied prisoners of war, many of whom were Canadian soldiers, and the Germans burying their dead after the battle. The port of Dieppe had been occupied by German soldiers. The raid was a failure and many lives were lost.

Ed Bennett was one such P.O.W. and can be seen, here with a bandage over his face, being led by a soldier; his eye was wounded during the raid.

#### Telegram to Mrs. Leota Bennett, 31 October 1942

Edwin Bennett, of Woodstock, was known for his role in commanding three tanks with the 14th Calgary Army Tank Corp in the raid on Dieppe in 1942. After the raid failed, many Canadian soldiers were taken as prisoners of war by the Germans, including Ed Bennett. His wife Leota received this telegram informing her that Ed had been taken as a prisoner of war and was being kept in Camp Stalag 9 C in Germany.
