Jingle Bells

One of the best-known and commonly sung American Christmas songs, Jingle Bells was written in 1857 by James Lord Pierpont and published under the title "One Horse Open Sleigh". Folklore claims it was written to be sung as either a drinking song or performed by a Sunday school choir. Either way, it originally had no connection to Christmas and it wasn't until the 1870s-1880s that the song became associated with the holiday season.
