Message from the Mayor - Margaret Lupton



In preparation for writing this article I review previous blogs, meeting minutes etc. trying to decide what to include. Each time I am amazed at the number of events, meetings and decisions that have occurred since the last Zorra Now Edition. I can really only skim over the highlights. For a more representative coverage of local events you might consider reading my blog found on the Zorra Township website. This site has

been newly developed by employees Karen Graĥam and Lisa Teeple. It is very professionally presented and contains much information very useful to residents.

Over the summer many major events occurred for your enjoyment including the Calithumpian Weekend, Weinerfest, Highland Games, Embro/West Zorra Fair, etc. We are becoming well known in municipal circles for our ability, in spite of our relatively small population, to put on events that yearly bring thousands of people together. If you have not attended these special days mark your calendar for next year.

Broadband service has been completed in Zorra with the exception of a few "dead zones". Execulink, as part of their contract, will be dealing with these areas as soon as possible so that high speed internet will be the norm all over Oxford County.

An interesting zone change process involved a fairly large business operating in a home in a rural area in Zorra. High speed internet service has made this sort of operation possible without impacting the surrounding farms. The Official Plan seems to indicate this type of business is better suited to the urban areas but I think it is very obvious that these businesses no longer need to locate in urban areas in order to use the services offered there. They can access the services they need via Internet. I believe planning at the Provincial and County levels will have to change many of their policies in order to keep up with newer practices that function well in both urban and rural areas.

Strategic Plans are being produced at the County—both for the Administration and for the Council itself. Zorra Township needs to

begin a similar process very soon. The new Council of last year is now ready to tackle some of the many projects being proposed. While we cannot possibly manage to do all of them we have to prioritize those suggested and lay out a viable plan of action so that we do not get overwhelmed and end up accomplishing little or accomplishing much without any guiding plans.

Solar panels are a big source of interest for many Zorra residents. It is time for Council to investigate the potential for using the very large surfaces we have on many buildings and some of the marginal parkland as potential sites for panels. It not only has the potential for financial gain for the Township but also is the environmentally responsible thing for us to be considering.

Zorra welcomes Trevor Sanderson as our new Recreation and Facilities Manager. He is very experienced in this line of work and I expect him to be a very valuable addition to our Staff.

The Heroes of Zorra project has completed their application for funding from Trillium. If they are successful you will soon be able to access much valuable information regarding service men and women from Zorra since the earliest beginnings of the original townships.

I hope everyone was able to come out on November 29 in Thamesford to be a part of history in the making during the Rick Hansen cross country fundraiser. Mike Heath, Zorra's Special Gold Medal Olympian, was our representative for the Zorra leg of this event.

One little request: I try to faithfully reply to all emails, phone calls, etc. but I know I have at times lost messages. If you contact me and do not receive a reply please give me the benefit of the doubt and try again. I will be very grateful for your understanding.

It seems premature as I write but likely will be appropriate by the time you receive this. On behalf of all of us who work for you in the many different Township departments that make up Zorra, I want to extend to you and your family the very best wishes of the Season. Remember how blessed we are and then do whatever you can to help someone less fortunate. As always we look forward to serving you in 2012.

Snowmobiling has become a very popular winter sport for Canadians. There are currently over 700,000 registered snowmobiles in Canada and over 125,000 kilometers of snowmobile trails.

Every year people are injured and killed while participating in a pastime that should be remembered with only fond memories. Injuries and deaths that are related to snowmobiling can be prevented. Frequently reported contributing factors in collisions include excessive speed, drowning, unsafe operation, inattention, and operating under the influence of alcohol.

One of the safest snowmobiling rules is never to cross lakes or rivers. Besides the danger of plunging



through the ice, you have less traction for

> starting, turning and stopping on ice than on snow. Collisions on lakes account for a significant number of accidents. Don't

hold the attitude that lakes are flat, wide-open areas, free of obstructions. Remember, if you can ride and turn in any direction, without boundaries, so can other riders. The threat of a collision, then, can come from any direction.

However, if you do snowmobile on the ice, make absolutely sure the ice is safely frozen. Don't trust the judgment of other snowmobilers. You are responsible for your own safe snowmobiling. Drowning is a leading cause of snowmobile fatalities. Consider buying a buoyant snowmobile suit. If you go through the ice, remember that your snowmobile suit (even a non-buoyant one) and helmet may keep you afloat for several minutes. Slide back onto the ice, using anything sharp to dig in for better pull. Kick your feet to propel you onto the ice, like a seal. If the ice keeps breaking, continue moving toward shore or the direction from which you came. Don't remove your gloves or mitts. Once on the ice, roll away from the hole. Don't stand until well away from the hole.

WINTER PARKING

Please be advised that the winter parking restrictions will be enforced starting November 15th and remain in place until March 31, 2012 in accordance with Bylaw 7-95. For snow removal purposes, parking is not permitted on any road or street from 1:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. 7 days a week during this period. Any vehicle owner found in violation of this by-law could be fined or have their vehicle removed/towed at owners expense. The set fine for this violation is set at \$50.

SNOW REMOVAL ONTO ROADWAYS

This is a reminder to all residents that depositing snow from private property onto a public roadway is dangerous and in contravention of the Road Protection By-law 6-95. Pushing or placing any snow or ice or any other obstruction of a roadway is an offence that carries a Provincial Offences Fine of \$105.00.

PROHIBIT SMOKING NEAR MUNICIPAL ENTRANCES AND LANDS BY-LAW

A reminder for residents that Township Council enacted By-law 23-11 on March 8th, 2011, to prohibit smoking near municipal entrances and lands. A portion of the by-law reads as follows:

No person shall smoke outdoors on any Township owned sports field including but not limited to soccer fields, baseball diamonds, or basketball courts whether or not a "No Smoking" sign is posted.

No person shall smoke outdoors on any walkway set out on or through Township owned and occupied property whether or not a "No Smoking" sign is posted.

No person shall smoke outdoors within 9 meters of any Township facility entrance or exit including but not limited to the Thamesford District Recreation Centre, Thamesford Area Swimming Pool, Embro West Zorra Community Centre, Thamesford Library & Resource Centre, Embro Town Hall & Library, Harrington Community Hall, North Park & Scout Hall, Embro Fire Hall, Thamesford Fire Hall, Uniondale Fire Hall, Public Works Department and Public Washrooms. No person shall smoke within 9 meters of the following designated Township facilities for the purpose of this by-law:

- a) Playground Equipment
- b) Spectator Seating Area/Outdoor Bleacher Area
- c) Baseball Diamonds and Concession Booths
- d) Soccer Fields
- e) Basketball Courts
- f) Outdoor pavilions
- g) Numerous Parks including, but not limited to:
 - Grace Patterson Park
 - Harrington Community Park
 - Lion's South Park
 - Matheson Park

NOTICE TO RESIDENTS

WINTER ROADWAY MAINTENANCE ON TOWNSHIP OF ZORRA ROADS

The Council of the Township of Zorra has defined the period when Township of Zorra employees will be performing winter roadway maintenance (salting, sanding, ploughing, and related activities) on the Township roadways. The level of service to be delivered is prescribed in the Minimum Maintenance Standards – Ontario Regulation 239/02 regarding snow and ice control. The Minimum Maintenance Standards are a regulation of the Municipal Act, 2001.

The period of Winter Roadway Maintenance is defined from: **November 14, 2011 to April 13, 2012.** Service will be delivered during the following hours: Monday to Friday -7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. with additional hours as determined by weather conditions. Saturday, Sunday and holidays - as determined by weather conditions.

Sign up now for the 10 or 12 month Pre-Authorized Payment Plan for 2012.

If you are interested in enrolling in this payment plan for 2012, you can find an authorization form on our website at www.zorra.on.ca or call Kelly Hall at 519-485-2490 ext 222. Applications need to be submitted as soon as possible to ensure enrolment for 2012.

If you are currently enrolled in the pre-authorized payment plan, you do not have to re-apply each year, only if there is a change with the account.

VACANCY REBATE PROGRAM

If your commercial or industrial property was vacant for a period of up to three months for 2011 you are eligible for a vacancy rebate. Applications can be found on our website or picked up at the Township Office.

JUST A REMINDER, if you remove a structure from your property, it is your responsibility to contact our office to have the structure written off.



Embro Sewer Debentures

Property owners in Embro will be billed for their Sanitary Sewer Bill in the spring of 2012. This bill will be issued by the County of Oxford for approximately \$16 000.00 per lot. There will be only two options for payments – either payment in full or a debenture for 10 years. The debenture will be based on the fixed annual interest rate determined at the time of the debenture issue. The debenture will be added to your annual property taxes and split over all of the tax installments. Please find listed below a few pros and cons enclosed for your consideration of using a debenture or paying the sewer in full with a line of credit or bank loan or cash.

Building Department



The main role of the Building and Drainage Department is to ensure that the building environment in which we live and work is safe and healthy. This is accomplished through the issuance of building and demolition permits, approval of nutrient management plans and by conducting inspections.

A Building Permit is the written authorization which grants legal permission to begin construction of any new structure, addition or renovation. It is issued only when the plans for construction comply with the Ontario Building Code, the Township of Zorra Zoning By-law and other applicable laws and regulations.

A Building Permit Application can be obtained on the Township Website (www.zorra.on.ca) or at the Municipal Office from the Chief Building Official. This application must be completed for the issuance of the building permit. In addition to the completed application form, applicants must also submit building drawings, plans and other documents to the municipality for processing. A detailed description of the planned work and intended occupancy, identification of the building lot or site, a valuation of the proposed work including materials and labour costs are required.

For exterior work, a floor plan, a cross section, a site plan and elevations will be required. For interior work, a floor plan and a cross section drawing will be required. Buildings that are over 3 stories or greater than 600 square metres will require an architect or an engineer to design and prepare plans for the building. Each application shall be accompanied by 2 complete sets of building plans and specifications unless otherwise specified.

The Building Permit fees are determined by the cost per square foot, dollar value, and flat rate for some buildings. The permit fee is payable at the time the Building Permit is issued. Applicable fees are available on the township website.

- New construction and additions (including new homes, additions, renovations, decks, porches)
- New windows and doors that are wider than the existing ones
- Heating, ventilation and air-conditioning systems
- Farm buildings
- Plumbing (including septic systems and repairs)

- Accessory buildings greater than 10 square metres (108 square feet), e.g. sheds, garages
- Swimming Pools
- Wood-burning stoves or fireplaces
- Permanent sign structures
- Change of use
- Solar Panels
- Demolition of
- buildings and removal of walls or columns
- Mobile Homes

Projects that do not require a building permit:

- Painting and decorating
- Fences (other than pool enclosures)
- Sheds under 10 square metres (108 square feet) in area
- Asphalt roof shingling
- Minor masonry repairs
- Damp proofing of basements
- Kitchen/bathroom

cupboards

- Eaves troughs
- Free standing satellite dishes
- Siding replacement
- Window replacement (same size as existing ones)
 - Replacement of plumbing fixtures
- Pool heaters
- Other cosmetic work

Rural Oxford Economic Development

Beginning this month, community businesses will be given the opportunity to voice their opinions about the local economy.

In early November trained volunteers and staff started meeting with local businesses to identify their needs and concerns, ask their opinions about government, and determine in what ways the local business climate can be improved.

The project is known as the Rural Oxford Economic Development Business Retention and Expansion Project. The business visits have four purposes. First, we want to show our local businesses that we really appreciate the contributions they are making to our local community. Second, we want to see if they have any concerns, and, if so, if there are ways we can help. Third, we will be offering to help our local businesses take better advantage of business resources. Finally, we want the businesses to help us set priorities on future directions of local economic efforts. Businesses should have received an information package containing an introduction letter, discussing the purpose of the project, as well as a copy of the survey. All information collected from the surveys will remain confidential. The data will be entered into an online tool, which will provide reports on the information that was collected.




From Ice Breaker to Call Maker Kintore's Sylena Mutsaers-Gignac

When Janet Mutsaers rushed her six year old daughter Sylena to St. Joseph's Hospital Emergency Department on October 31, 1984, she had little idea it would be the beginning of an incredible life journey she and her daughter would share for years to come.

Sylena's breathing was laboured and difficult; the diagnosis, a tumour in her airway; a capillary haemangioma, commonly known as a strawberry birthmark. Throughout the next few years, Sylena would endure numerous surgeries, treatments and extensive speech therapy, five days a week. Her mother Janet was by her side throughout.

When it was all over, Sylena was left with a quiet, but deep and raspy voice, which was not unnoticed by others. Sylena remembers, "I endured a lot of teasing from children and adults, for that matter; so did my mom, but she didn't let that hinder my involvement in the community or in sport."

Sylena and her sister Sonya were figure skaters in Embro. Sylena excelled at the sport and, at the age of eight years old, was skating with the eleven year old skaters. With this higher level of competition came the additional costs of ice and equipment; costs the Mutsaers were unable to afford due to Sylena's extensive speech therapy, Sylena reflects, "From the day I could no longer figure skate I wanted to play hockey like my younger brother (Brian), who started out figure skating in Embro and then moved on to play travel hockey in Thamesford, then AA in Woodstock and eventually playing Junior C in Norwich. Unfortunately my mom would not let me play



with the boys and I had to wait until a girls program started in the area."

That program was soon to come and Sylena commenced her hockey career with the Embro Ice Breakers in the team's inaugural season, 1997-1998. The team was coached by Ron Piett who, at the time, said about the team, "The girls were very committed to the game and are a very enthusiastic group of kids." Commitment to and enthusiasm for the game are something Sylena certainly had; she wanted to be the best she could be. Prior to her first hockey season she enrolled in a power skating clinic run by Bob Hogg and Pat Crossman at the arena in Thamesford, "Skating in hockey skates became natural."

Janet and Henry Mutsaers were both active members in the Kintore Optimist Club. Henry is still active today. During the same time that Sylena started playing hockey; Janet encouraged twelve year old Sylena to take a soccer refereeing clinic. It became Sylena's first summer job; a

job she fondly remembers, "I loved being outside in the summer and it turns out I was a pretty decent official."

Others also felt she was a good official and let Janet know. With much positive feedback about Sylena's officiating and with her passion for the game of hockey, Janet decided to enrol her then sixteen year old daughter in the Ontario Minor Hockey Association's (O.M.H.A.) Ice Hockey Referee Clinic in Guelph. This was a surprise to Sylena, who remembers crying when her mom told her she was going to become a hockey referee. Later that year Sylena stopped refereeing soccer so she could concentrate on hockey.

After graduating from A.J. Baker Public Elementary School in Kintore, Sylena chose to attend St. Mary's Catholic High School in Woodstock because the school had a girls' hockey program. Sylena was an all-round student; she was on the volleyball, basketball, soccer and triathlon teams; while at the same time maintaining a high average. Her efforts and achievements did not go unnoticed as she was the recipient of the London Free Press Athlete of the Year award two consecutive years, 2002 and 2003.

In 2007, Sylena earned her Bachelor of Science of Nursing (BSCN) from the University of Western Ontario and has just started working in the Paediatric Emergency Department at McMaster Children's Hospital in Hamilton. "I became a nurse, again with encouragement from my mother (because mothers always know best) but also because I wanted to give back to those who gave to save my life. I love emergency medicine and I have always wanted to work with the paediatric population so I am excited for this new challenge."

Throughout her high school and university years, Sylena refereed at many levels of hockey; she continues to this date. Janet thought refereeing would be a perfect student job for her daughter; she was right, but she could not have seen the successes and achievements Sylena would have by doing so.

Sylena is now a Registered LEVEL IV Official; her extensive resume includes: the Canada Winter Games, Women's Four Nation Cup, University CIS Nationals; the International Championship in Stockholm, Sweden for Under 18 World Championships. Sylena shared with ice with hockey greats Marie Philip Poulin, Haley Wickenheiser and Kim St. Pierre when she refereed the first Canada-U.S.A. match up following the gold medal game of Vancouver 2010.

Sochi 2014 is well within this young woman's sights, "My goal is to continue to work hard, skate fast and represent Hockey Canada at both the International and

National levels, while pursuing the ultimate dream and officiate at the highest level, the Olympic Winter Games." An ironic statement given she played her first hockey season the same year that Women's Hockey became an official Olympic event at the 1998 Winter Olympics in Nagano.

On October 17, 2009, Sylena married her best friend Mark Gignac. Mark too has a passion for the great game of hockey and works for Bauer Canada. It was he that wrote the phrase, "H.C.F" in a letter to Sylena

during an international event. When she asked what it meant he replied, "Hockey Comes First". This phrase now represents this couple's commitment to support each other, not only in hockey, but in life; they truly support each other's dreams, ambitions and commitment. Sylena says it best, "Whether it is officiating at 2014 Olympics, Mark pursuing a career at Bauer, having wedding photos on the ice, or waking up at 6:00 AM when we have children to take them to the rink, we will always stand by each other along the way in reaching our goals." The couple reside in Smithville with their faithful and beloved dog, Tuuk.

Twenty-seven years have passed since Janet Mutsaers rushed her young daughter to the hospital. Safety Tips for Winter Walking

When the winter air is crisp and the ground is covered with snow, there's nothing like taking a walk to enjoy the beauty of the season — and walking is one of the best ways to keep fit.

On the other hand, winter can be a challenging time of year to get out and about. Freezing rain, icy surfaces and piles of hard-packed snow pose a hazard for the innocent pedestrian.

A few simple measures can make it safer to walk outdoors in the winter. Removing snow and ice, putting sand or salt on areas where people walk, and wearing the right footwear all make a big difference.

Basic Precautions

The Canada Safety Council offers seniors some practical suggestions to stay active in winter.

As winter approaches, outfit yourself for safe walking:

Choose a good pair of winter boots. For warmth and stability look for these features:

- well insulated and waterproof;
- thick, non-slip tread sole;
- wide, low heels; and
- light in weight.

Ice grippers on footwear can help you walk on hard packed snow and ice. But be careful! Grippers become dangerously slippery and must be removed before walking on smooth surfaces such as stone, tile and ceramic. Before buying the grippers, be sure that you are able to attach and remove them from your boots, this is best done sitting down.



Use a cane to help with balance. Have it fitted to the right height for you. When your cane is held upside down, the end should be at wrist level. Speak to your doctor, pharmacist or local public health department about how to use your cane properly. Attach an ice pick at the end of your cane. Cane picks will be slippery on hard surfaces so be sure to flip it back as you get indoors. Picks are available at most drug stores.

Wear a hip protector (a lightweight belt or pant with shields to guard the hips). It can help protect the hips against fractures and give added confidence.

Help other road users see you by wearing bright colors or adding reflective material to clothing.

Prevent heat loss by wearing a warm hat, scarf, and mittens or gloves. Dressing in layers may also keep you warmer.

Pride in the 60-year-old Thamesford Fire Department

When it comes to firefighting for past Thamesford Fire Department Chief Joe Wallace, it's clearly in the blood.

"I joined the department when I was 23 or a little before, about 51 years ago," he says. Of that time, I was the Chief for 40 years. My father Jack was on the committee to start the department. We had some fires, in fact where the hall is now, the church burnt down and the London fire department had to come out and that took them more than half-an-hour to get there.

"My dad was the owner of Wallace Brothers Lumber and was on the committee to get the department going here in Thamesford. Then my older brother Ted joined the department and he was there for about 50 years or so. I've got two sons Gary and Tim that were on the department and a grandson Jeremy now there."

Joe makes it abundantly clear he is proud of both the current firefighters and the department he was an integral part of for half a century.

"They have an excellent department, always have," he says. "It's first class. I really can't single out any particular events that come to mind as the most memorable but I know we saved a lot of lives and a lot of buildings over the years. You may be up and down at times but I am so proud of the boys because they are really good firemen.

"We always got along well and never had any trouble with anybody. They are all well trained and right now Bill is doing a really nice job of being the Chief. I've bought quite a few of the trucks that are there and helped with the rebuilding of the old one-storey hall we had up by the United Church.

"I helped the people who built the Uniondale department and was also on the committee when it started the addition on the Embro department. We got things in pretty good shape and I'm pretty proud."

The current Chief's love of firefighting made a transatlantic journey more than four decades ago.

"Prior to my emigrating from Scotland to Canada in October, 1966 I worked as a full time firefighter with the Central Scotland Fire Brigade stationed in Stirling for five years," says Bill.

"I joined the Thamesford Fire Department as a volunteer firefighter January 1, 1967 under Chief Joe Wallace. In 1979 I was promoted to Deputy Chief and then in 2001, when Chief Wallace retired, I was promoted to Chief."

While he admits it is difficult picking out occasions that stand out in his mind over the past 44 years with the Thamesford department, he says the most memorable event was when Cold Springs Farm Limited's soybean plant caught fire on February 9, 2005.



"With 350,000 bushels of soybeans and 500,000 bushels of corn it took five days and 938 man hours to extinguish the smoldering grain," he recalls. "We also had the Embro Fire Department, the Uniondale Fire Department and the Ingersoll Fire Department with their aerial truck assisting us at the early stages of the fire.

"Looking back over the years I have a real sense of pride about belonging to this department and working alongside the 25 who volunteer their time and community effort."



THAMESFORD FIRE DEPT.



On March 19, 1950 the Orange Hall, which was the former Methodist Church, on thenorthwest corner of Delatre and George Streets, burned to the ground despite the efforts of the local "Bucket Brigade". At this time it was decided to form a fire department and buya fire truck. The organizational meeting was held in the Public Library on August 7, 1950.Fire Chief Donald McKay had been elected at a previous meeting. Alan Noad was nomi-nated assistant fire chief with Jack Wallace and Percy Elgie as captains. Other firefight-er were Ken Hogg, Merrit Hogg, Bill Thom, Bob McFarlan, Nelson Oliver, Albert Darlinson, Jim McKay, Bill Stevens, Howard Clark, Wes Nairn, Don Hutchinson, Lawrence Dawson, Bill Payne, Bert Vandeburgh, Cal Hogg and Bruce McGregor. A siren in an alarm box was to beinstalled at the corner of Dundas & George Streets, in front of the post office building which was standing there at the time. A small garage was built at 133 George Street to accommodate a fire truckand hoses. The bell from Gordon Hogg's garage was put on the roof to act as a reserve alert signal. An alarm, activated by a push button on the outside of the building was also installed. The vehi-cle purchased in 1951 was a triple combination fire with an ability to pump 625 gallons per minute and with a capacity of 450 gallons of water, built by Bickle-Seagrave of Woodstock. The first trip for the new truck was major fire at Riverside Poultry, just north of the village.In the 1950's and early 1960's, when someone phoned for assistance at a fire, the telephone operator accepted the call and alerted the volunteer firefighter by setting off the siren, located in the fire-hall tower. When Thamesford lost its operator to technology in 1963, fire alarms came into the home of six designated firemen, and the alarm wa set off by whoever received the call. By 1985 acounty-wide system went into effect whereby all calls were received by a Woodstock dispatcher who alerted the volunteer firemen by pager.

WINTER GARBAGE AND RECYCLING COLLECTION NOTICE

Winter Garbage and Recycling Collection

Inclement weather in the winter months often leads to many problems for garbage and recycling collection. In some cases of sever weather, collection may be suspended or delayed. Check the Oxford County Website for details as it will be posted there immediately or call your local municipal office.

Tips for successful winter garbage and recycling collection:

- Place your garbage and recycling where it can be clearly seen and safely collected.
- Ensure material is free of snow and ice and is visible to the collection crew. Do not place material on top of snow banks.
- White garbage bags are difficult to see in the winter. Black or green garbage bags are best to use in winter weather.
- Keep a path from the road to your collectibles clear of snow and ice.
- Collection staff cannot climb over snow banks to pick up material. Safe placement of collectibles helps avoid worker injury.
- Keep material out of the path of snowplows and sidewalks. This may mean placing bags curbside (before 7:00 am) on collection day. Broken bags may not be collected, and clean up is your responsibility.
- Should you have acceptable on-site storage, you may wish to not set out materials during times of extreme weather conditions (heavy snowfall).
- Place bag tag around the neck of the garbage bag so that the ends of the tag are stuck to one another. This will prevent lost tags as some tags may not stick to a cold plastic bag.

Need some socializing? Volunteer Visiting meets a variety of needs of isolated seniors and adults with disabilities throughout Oxford County. Volunteers provide companionship through weekly visits and are matched with clients based on their personalities, mutual interests and availability. Adult Day Programs provide supervised activities in a group setting and are located in Ingersoll, Tillsonburg and Woodstock

Need some support? Volunteer Hospice trained volunteers provide emotional and practical support to people experiencing a life threatening or terminal illness. Their knowledge and experience help the client and families through diagnosis, treatment and outcome of their illness, including bereavement support in home or hospital. Caregiver Support programs are for caregivers to help provide specific care and emotional support.

Want to help? Volunteers are integral to VON's Mission, working in partnership with staff to develop, implement and deliver a wide array of services that meet community needs. 

Memorial trees are planted in various public locations throughout the Township. Planting takes place annually in the Spring at a pre-selected and approved site made in consultation with the U.T.R.C.A. 
