Message from the Mayor

I hope everyone is having a pleasant summer. Both Zorra and County councils are not quite as busy but there are some interesting issues for you to think about.

Last year we began a project in Zorra of identifying some of the historical crossroad communities that no longer exist. With the

help of several donors we were able to sign four areas: Browns Corners, Pasedina, Holiday and New Eden. We are hoping to do more this year. We have about a dozen on our list and we are willing to have residents express their desire as to the ones we choose each year. I am working on some information about each centre and in the future a link will exist between the signs and the information on our Township website. Your help with this is also needed. If you have pictures and/or information please send it to me so people interested can learn more about our past. When we have this part of the project completed I hope we can add links to signs already in place at local churches, school sites, historical buildings etc. We will be working with Tourism Oxford so that visitors interested can learn more as they visit Zorra.

Some concern has been raised about plugged drain grates in both Embro and Thamesford. Investigation reveals that most of the material causing the problem is grass clippings. Public Works employees can be sent to remove the debris but I know many of the residents do this little job simply to make sure the drains are able to provide the drainage they were installed for. Please take a minute to clean any in front of your property—or your neighbour's. Most residents mow grass on boulevards and other properties not technically owned by them but do so as a community service. I hope some will add the "grate cleaning" to their "todo" list. Many thanks.

I was contacted regarding a request for pictures of the farmhouse where George Leslie Mackay was raised. I realize the property was is in East Zorra and the building is gone but there is hope someone may have a picture. I would be glad to pick it up and have a copy made for the people making the request.

Congratulations to the North Oxford History Book committee. Their book is finished so we have three excellent sets of books recording Zorra history. I believe books are still available and you can contact the Township Office for more information.

Several years ago Zorra was given the Harvey Waud collection of tools and other artifacts from early Zorra. These items have been in storage but I hope soon to be able to announce they will be displayed for you to see. The Beachville Museum is working on a suitable display area and I know family and friends of the Wauds are pleased that finally people will be able to view this very interesting collection.

The landfill proposal in Zorra continues to be a huge concern. At this point we are still waiting for a response from the Provincial Government. I am aware that there are many in Zorra working quietly using whatever contacts and information they have to try to inform those making the decision of the concerns we have and the dangers we believe this proposal contains. I urge you not to be discouraged and to continue working in ways you feel are most appropriate. There are many ways to fight this and every effort matters.

You are probably aware of some changes coming to Garbage and Recycling pickup starting in mid-September. Please look for the information being sent to you and read it carefully. Information will be there to register by phone or email for automated reminders weekly regarding pickup. Under the new system all of Zorra Township will have pick-up on Monday. Also a few new items will be collected—certain types of styrofoam (trays, plates etc.) spray cans and plastic film. I was not too impressed until I remembered that I have often commented that the majority of my garbage is plastic bags and wrap. There will be a complete list included in the information sent but I have already started collecting the material for inclusion next month—vegetable and fruit bags, shopping bags, bubble wrap, newspaper and magazine wrap, "saran", film coverings on so many packages, etc. This potentially could make a real difference to your garbage volume. Garbage and recycling will both be picked up weekly and recycling does not have to be sorted although I think many of us will continue to do this. One truck will pick up all materials but it has two sections—one for garbage and one for recycling.

Again I want to thank so many for their care over the past few months. I look forward, as always, to continue serving you. Please contact me as needed.

Aletheia is the descendent of Mackay's 1882 Oxford College. The Museum is looking for a picture of the old farmhouse in East Zorra Township where Mackay grew up. The farm was inherited by his brother Alex Mackay. The farm is no longer in the Mackay family and the old farmhouse long gone. 

GARBAGE AND RECYCLING PICK-UP DATES ARE CHANGING



Starting September 14, a new curbside collection program for garbage and recycling starts in Blandford-Blenheim, East Zorra-Tavistock, Ingersoll, Norwich, South-West Oxford, Tillsonburg and Zorra. Households in these communities have a new garbage and recycling pick-up day.

RECYCLING MADE EASIER

- Weekly recycling pick-up. Put your blue box materials out to the curb with your garbage every week. In South-West Oxford, garbage and recycling will be picked up on a six-business-day cycle.
- No more sorting! Oxford County is moving to single stream recycling, meaning you no longer have to separate papers from containers. Recycling and garbage will be picked up at the same time by the same collection vehicle.
- More items accepted for recycling. New items being accepted include plastic bags (gathered and tied in one bag), empty aerosol containers, spiral wound containers (frozen juice and chip containers), thermofoam and polystyrene styrofoam (meat trays, takeout containers) and disposable coffee cups.

The Zorra Community Policing Committee would like to share the following information in cooperation with the Ontario Provincial Police.



Phishing is typically an email scam which tries to deceive people into thinking a legitimate organization is requesting private information. Also called "brand spoofing," phishing is the creation of email messages and web pages that are replicas of existing, legitimate sites and businesses. These websites and emails are used to trick users into submitting personal, financial, or password data.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- ▶ A phishing message is intended to get a quick reaction from you, using upsetting or exciting information demanding an urgent response, or employ a false pretense or statement. Phishing messages are normally not personalized.
- ➤ Typically, phishing messages will ask you to **update**, **validate**, or **confirm** your account information, etc., to avoid negative consequences. They might even ask you to make a phone call.
- ➤ The information being sought can include: Social Insurance Numbers, full name, date of birth, full address, mother's maiden name, username and password of online services, driver's license number, personal identification numbers (PIN), credit card information (numbers, expiry dates and the last three digits printed on the signature panel) and bank account numbers.
- ▶ Often, the message or associated website includes official-looking logos and other identifying information taken directly from legitimate websites. Government, financial institutions and online payment services are common targets of brand spoofing. In some cases, the offending site can modify your browser address bar to make it look legitimate, including the web address of the real site and a secure https:// prefix.

Township of Zorra 2016-2018 Dog Tag Campaign

It's easy and it's the law!

Save Time, Apply Online! www.zorra.on.ca

*** NEW *** Representatives from the Township will no longer be going door-to-door to sell dog tags. The onus is on the dog owner to have their dog registered by December 31, 2015. We hope that you will find this new initiative more convenient. The price for a dog tag remains unchanged at \$15.00 per dog per year and we have raised the maximum number of dogs from 2 to 3 on all Zorra properties. Online forms are available www.zorra.on.ca or you can contact the office by email admin@zorra.on.ca or by phone 519-485-2490 Ext 221 for your new tag. Payment methods include cash, cheque, debit, or charge to taxes.

Failure to obtain a dog tag may result in a fine of \$125.00.

Attend the Township office or mail the completed application form (next page) with your payment to Township of Zorra 274620 27th Line, PO Box 306, Ingersoll, ON N5C 3K5.

*** New Animal Care and Control By-law 43-15 ***

- Requires all dogs over 3 months of age to be licensed with the Township.
- Dog owners are required to obtain a dog tag by December 31, 2015.
- Failure to register your dog may result in a fine of \$125.
- A valid tag will assist animal control staff in returning your dog should it ever become separated from you.
- A maximum of 3 dogs are permitted in each dwelling.
- Prohibits or regulates the running at large of dogs within the Township of Zorra. All dogs in Zorra must be kept on a leash when not on the owner's property. If a dog strays it can be impounded and its owners can be fined for "permitting a dog to run at large." The dog that is impounded is not being punished but rather protected.
- To protect individuals and other pets from disease, Zorra requires that any person who owns, harbours
 or possesses a dog shall immediately remove and sanitarily dispose of any feces (droppings) of the
 dog. Failure to do so may result in the owner being fined.
- Canine Service Animals, Livestock Guardian Dogs, Police Working Dogs, and Dangerous Dogs shall only be licensed at the Township Administration Office.
- Kennel licenses can be issued to Canadian Kennel Club (CKC) members only and proof of valid CKC
 membership is required. Kennel licenses will now also require an approved Site Plan, must adhere to
 minimum standards, and will be subject to an annual inspection. Kennel licenses are issued at the
 Township office only.
- PROVINCIAL LEGISLATION REQUIRES THAT ALL DOGS HAVE ANNUAL RABIES VACCINATIONS.
- All animal bites should be immediately reported to The Oxford County Board of Health at 519-539-9800.
- By-Law 69-12 Noise By-law: Barking dogs are an annoyance and a nuisance. Barking falls under the Noise By-Law which is enforced by the Zorra By-Law Enforcement Officer.

By-Law Enforcement

**NEW – Animal Care & Control By-Law

The Township of Zorra has consolidated all Animal Control By-laws into one comprehensive By-law (By-law 2015-43), that includes increasing the maximum dogs per dwelling, dog kennel regulations, minimum general health and wellbeing standards, stoop and scoop, dangerous and aggressive dogs, restrictions on exotic pets, and finally increased fees and fines.

Some changes to note:

- Any person in a dwelling unit can have no more than 3 dogs.
- There is a more extensive list of non-permissible exotic pets; For the full list please refer to the By-law.
- Dog Kennels will now require an approved site plan, CKC registration with application, adhere to minimum standards, and receive an annual site inspection.
- Most fines have increased including dogs running at large: \$200.
- All dog owners must adhere to the minimum health and general well-being standards as set out in Part 4 of the By-law.

In addition, if you are a dog owner, please keep your pet leashed at all times when on public property. If you wish to allow your pet to run, please visit the Thamesford Off-leash Dog Park.

**NEW - Smoking By-Law

The new Smoking By-law (By-law 2015-42) now prohibits smoking on all Township facilities, including but not limited to municipal parkland, playground equipment, sports fields and spectator seating, at all times, whether or not a "No Smoking" sign is posted.

"Smoking" includes the carrying of a lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, waterpipe or any other equipment used to inhale, exhale, burn or heat any Smoking Product. This includes e-cigarettes.

"Smoking Product" means any tobacco or tobacco-like product whose primary purpose is to be burned or heated to produce vapours, gases or smoke, which are inhaled, and shall include but is not limited to non-tobacco herbal shisha, and other plant material or oils intended for inhalation.

Any person who observes another person acting in contrary to this bylaw may submit a Smoke Free Ontario Witness Statement (available on the Township website) to the Township Office or the County of Oxford Administration Office.

Smoking on any Township facility property may result in a fine of up to \$5000.00.

Off-Road Vehicles

Recently, changes occurred regarding off-road vehicles (ORVs) in that rules for "single-rider" all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) are extended to additional ORV types and allow two-up ATVs, side-by-side ATVs and utility terrain vehicles (UTVs) on permitted provincial highways and municipal roads WHERE MUNICIPAL BY-LAWS PERMIT THEIR USE. There were NO CHANGES to the ORV municipal by-law authority provided in the Highway Traffic Act. Therefore, ORVs and ATVs remain NOT PERMITTED on Zorra Township and Oxford County Roads.

Winter Parking

Please be advised that the winter parking restrictions will be enforced starting November 15th and remain in place until March 31, 2015 in accordance with By-law 7-95. For snow removal purposes, parking is not permitted on any road or street from 1:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. 7 days a week during this period. Any vehicle owner found in violation of this by-law could be fined or have their vehicle removed/towed at owners expense. The set fine for this violation is set at \$50.



Thamesford Public School Parking

As a reminder, new signs were erected on the north side of McCarty Street by Thamesford Public School. The North side of McCarty Street in now designated as No Standing at any time. This means no stopping, no parking, no standing at any time on the north side of McCarty Street from Allen Street to George Street. To clarify what "No Standing" is: No Standing means that a motorized vehicle is prohibited from halting, whether occupied or not, except for the purpose of and while actually engaged in receiving or discharging passengers.

Parking restrictions remain in effect on the south side of McCarty Street during the school year only as follows: no parking/no stopping on the south side of McCarty Street from Allen Street to George Street from September 1 to June 30 of each year between the hours of 8:30 am and 9:00 am and between the hours of 3:00 pm and 4:00 pm. Fine is \$50.

Leaves/Snow Removal on to Roadways

The autumn season is quickly approaching and therefore the leaves will begin to fall. As a reminder to all residents, depositing your leaves onto the roadway and sidewalk is dangerous and is a contravention of the Road Protection Bylaw and the Yard and Lot Maintenance By-law. If you wish to drop off your yard waste, visit the County of Oxford website to view all brush, leaf and yard waste depot locations. Pushing or placing any leaves, snow or ice or any other obstruction of a roadway is an offence that carries a Provincial Offences Fine of \$105.00.



Demolition Permit - \$50.00

Failure to obtain a Building Permit will result in a penalty of double the permit fee, as per the Township of Zorra's Building By-law.

UPPER THAMES RIVER

CONSERVATION AUTHORITY

The Upper Thames River Conservation Authority (UTRCA) initiated Class Environmental Assessments for Harrington and Embro Pond Dams under the Conservation Ontario Class Environmental Assessment process in June 2015. The assessments are reviewing future options for the dams and are to date primarily funded through the Township of Zorra which is levied for maintenance and operation of Conservation Authority dams. Some funding to date has been received from the Province through the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry and it is hoped that additional funding is forthcoming in 2015 to defray Township costs.

The first of three Public Information Centres (PIC) with the first introducing the Assessments were held June 23 and June 25 for Harrington Dam and Embro Dam respectively. The PIC were well attended. The second PIC describing the possible

options and evaluations for the dams are currently planned to be held in late September 2015. A final PIC will describe the preferred option. The public has the opportunity to provide input at each PIC.

Letter to the Editor regarding the Class Environmental Assessment on the Harrington Pond, June 28, 2015.

If you use the Harrington Pond recreation area, or if you have in the past, your stories and comments are needed.

The Harrington pond: fishing hole, bird sanctuary, tranquil picnic spot. For generations the pond has been loved as a get-away, a tiny oasis providing recreational activities for visitors from near and far.

Now, the future of the Harrington Pond has a question mark hanging over it. Like many small ponds in Ontario, the Harrington Pond is a constructed water feature created to power a saw-mill which in turn created jobs and a thriving community where none had previously existed. The concrete dam holds back the water that streams through the area from nearby springs, building pressure to channel a constant flow for the sawmill, and resulting in the pond. The dam was originally built in 1846 and re-constructed in 1952. That's a long time ago, and although the people who built the dam may not have been thinking as far ahead as today, they certainly built something sturdy.

However, structures don't last forever, and two recent studies commissioned by the UTRCA have raised concerns that the dam may be unstable. At several public meetings, the UTRCA has discussed the implications involved in rebuilding or removing the dam. Now, a Class Environmental Assessment will be undertaken to learn more about the dam, the pond, and its surrounding lands. The Assessment will look at four groups of factors that could impact a decision, economic, environmental, technical, and social, to make recommendations for the future of the dam and the pond.

This is where your help is needed. The Environmental Assessment team will take the social history of the pond into consideration when making their recommendations. To fully understand the pond and its relationship to the surrounding communities, the Environmental Assessment team is asking the public for stories and comments about the social history of the Harrington pond. These stories can include activities at the pond both in the past and present.

These researchers can't be expected to know what role the pond has played in our area without us telling them. I grew up in Harrington puryer in our area wintout is reuring them. I grew up in Harrington and community and to us the pond was a daily source of recreation and community activities. The pond has a history of years of bringing community members together for swimming, picnics, skating, fishing, and boating. I intend to submit my comments for this study. Will doing so save the pond? I don't know, but I feel that it is up to the members of this community and surrounding communities to do what we can, while we can, to show that the pond is used and is important to many. The history of the pond needs to be recorded and acknowledged. Stories received will be included in the final report which the study will generate.

Keeping our kids active

Access to active outdoor play in nature - with its risks - is essential for healthy child development

Have we lost the appropriate balance between keeping children healthy and active and protecting them from serious harm?

ParticipACTION recently released the Report Card on Physical Activity for Children and Youth, citing a **D- grade** for overall physical activity levels, as only nine per cent of 5-17 year-old Canadian youth get 60 minutes of heart pumping activity each day.

According to the ParticipACTION report, it is important to recognize the difference between danger and risk, and the importanceofincreasing children's opportunities for self-directed play outdoors in all settings - at home, at school, in child care, the community and nature.

Research and evidence tell us that when children are outside, they move more, sit less and play longer.

ParticipACTION's tips to keep kids moving*:

- Host a "street-proofing course" with kids to teach them basic safety precautions while they play outdoors, including how to be safe pedestrians and cyclists.
- · Encourage kids to play with a buddy.
- Recognize that kids are competent and capable let them test boundaries appropriate to their age group and encourage them to go out and explore.
- Understand that risk doesn't mean courting danger, but rather giving kids the freedom to assess and manage risk, allowing them to build confidence and learn limits.
- Give kids the opportunity to play freely and spontaneously after school and on the weekends by letting them decide what outdoor activities they like to do - this will keep them more engaged in the activity and outside longer.
- Encourage children to engage more with their outdoor environments in a variety of weather conditions. With the right gear, even playing in the snow or rain is fun!
- Encourage school boards and municipalities to revisit play-specific rules and regulations, such as "no ball playing" or "no tobogganing," that inhibit fun, free play outdoors.
- Choose natural elements over pre-fabricated playgrounds and paved areas for children to play freely after all, children are more curious about, and interested in, natural spaces.

Reduce the screen time

- Turn screen time into active time by encouraging outdoor play, rather than turning on the TV.
- Remove TVs and computers from kids' bedrooms.
- · Make sure kids know decreased screen time is not a punishment.

Be a good role model

- Make sure you live an active life. It's important for kids to see adults being active and spending time outdoors, doing things such as running, walking, gardening or lawn work.
- Put away your cellphone or tablet and enjoy the outdoors.
- Display a positive attitude that being active outdoors in all weather conditions is fun and feels good.

What can we do to improve our grade?

Parents, educators, health professionals, schools, media, and all levels of government have an important role to play in the development of a healthy sustainable community where active play(with risks), recreation and sport, and fueling healthy bodies are priorities for children youthand families.


