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Message from the Mayor

Snow is on the ground and I hope everyone is driving safe.

The Province's Regional Government Review is complete and the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing has announced

that there will be "no forced amalgamations" and "no top down approach" to changes in municipal boundaries, structure, or Council structures. This is good news as it is exactly what both Zorra and Oxford County Councils have advocated for. You may remember that all of the area municipalities (including Zorra and Oxford) have undertaken a service delivery review to examine how services are delivered now and by who, and if there are more effective, efficient ways to deliver them in the future. We mean to #doourpart to find the most effective and efficient ways to deliver services with the tax dollars we collect and so this review will be completed, even though the review no longer requires it, and I look forward to the opportunities it presents.

The long awaited Thamesford redevelopment is now a "done deal". This \$5,960,000 purchase of 121 acres for redevelopment will add approximately 178 single family dwellings, 203 townhomes, 75 condominium townhomes, 350 medium density apartment units, and 9 000 sq.m. of commercial space. As a result of this redevelopment there will be an increase in Zorra's population of approximately 1,750 people over the next 20 years, and an estimated increase in property taxes of \$700 000 per year when complete. Final numbers after land transfer tax and legal fees are not known yet, but the Township will have a net profit on the deal that Council will have to decide how to handle, but this is a good problem to have. Staff executed this deal within very tight restrictions put on them by Council to minimize the Township's risk and Staff delivered a deal better than we ever hoped for. We look forward to working with Kingwood and Hogg Construction to make this development all it can be for Zorra.

This redevelopment will allow us to address some immediate housing supply and variety issues. This development is "brownfield" redevelopment keeping agricultural land in production, it is infill and densification to make the efficient use of our expensive municipal infrastructure like water and waste water, roads, etc. These new homes will be walkable to businesses, school, and recreation. There are people of all ages in Zorra looking for smaller, more affordable housing, so they can move out on their own or downsize and the lack of that housing forces some to leave our community. One of the largest constraints on our economy, our local businesses, right now is labour availability and this is made worse by a lack of housing supply, variety, and rentals in particular. We are hopeful that as this development progresses it will help unleash our economic potential.

As the development proceeds, and the benefits are realized, it will hopefully allow us to address some other needs like allowing us to offer more recreation programming and attract new businesses and services to Zorra.

The Thamesford redevelopment addresses all of our strategic goals: Zorra is vibrant, prosperous, engaged and environmentally conscious.

Council will be beginning the 2020 Budget in November and hoping to complete it in February. This is an earlier start and accelerated work plan resulting in an earlier finish date. Council has targeted an earlier finish date so that we can reduce "pre-budget approval" for capital items and get capital projects out for quotes earlier in the year to get better pricing and earlier start dates of construction projects.

We strive to make Zorra better by doing our part. Zorra is progressive, environmentally conscious, economically strong, and prosperous.



Building and Drainage Department

DRAINAGE

Legal Outlets:

With the pressure of too much work and not enough time, there may be a temptation to take shortcuts. We have been hearing about some tile drainage systems being directed to questionable outlets. This is a reminder that the following are NOT legal outlets:

- *Roadside Ditches:* You can only use roadside ditches as an outlet if permission is granted by the road authority. If permission is granted, we recommend that you secure the permission in WRITING.
- Private Ditches: Private ditches are private infrastructure and unless permission is given, another property owner has no right to connect a newly installed tile drainage system to a private ditch that flows across a neighbouring property. Similar to using a roadside ditch as an outlet, if permission is given, make sure it is in WRITING. If work needs to be done on the neighbouring property, make sure all parties are clear on cost-sharing and also that all parties are clear on the extent of work and the potential disruption of land.
- Municipal Drains: Municipal drains have a defined watershed; the lands within that watershed have paid for the construction and management of that drain and only these lands have the right to connect to the municipal drain. If you are installing tile drainage on a property, it is possible that only a portion of that property has the legal right to connect into that drain. If you are not sure, check with the local drainage superintendent before undertaking the work. If there is a section of land that is outside the limits of the watershed, you must ask for permission to connect those lands to the drain.
- Wetland or low area: Sometimes it's tempting to outlet a tile drainage system into a wetland area, particularly if the wetland is located on your client's property. However, before doing so, you should examine the area to determine if the out letting of the tile drainage system could be any impact on other property owners. If there could be, don't do it without first acquiring permission.

If a property owner is unable to secure an outlet, that owner has the right to petition their municipality under the Drainage Act for an outlet. Although it takes longer to get the outlet using the Drainage Act, when it is done, you can have confidence that the tile drainage work you perform will not result in legal action. If you still decide to take shortcuts on legal outlets, remember that the courts consider the tile drainage contractor to be an expert. You may want to check out the liability risk of you and your business.

CONSTRUCTION DRAINS

- Construction drains are initiated by a petition that is filed by the landowner, county or even the roads of a municipality.
- Council will either accept the petition or it can be rejected.
- If Council accepts the petition then Council will appoint an Engineer to do a study and a report.
- Drainage meetings will be arranged and notifications will be mailed to the landowners within the watershed.
- It is very important that ANY notifications that a landowner receives from the Township is FULLY understood by the landowner. It is essential for all landowners to understand all of the deadlines, appeal dates and all the financial implications of the drainage work.

BUILDING

Obtaining a Building Permit in Zorra:

Fill out a Building Permit Application, either in person at the Township Office or online www.zorra.ca In addition to the completed application form, applicants must also submit building drawings, plans and other documents to the Township of Zorra for processing. A detailed description of the planned work and intended occupancy, identification of the building lot or site, a valuation of the proposed work including materials and labour costs are required.

Building Permit Fees:

- Residential: (including new homes, additions, renovations, decks) – \$100.00 + 0.40/sq. ft.
- Agricultural: (including coveralls, barns, storage sheds, workshops)
 \$100.00 + 0.20/sq. ft.
- Sheds \$50.00 flat rate
- Swimming Pools \$100.00
- Demolition Permit \$50.00

A Building Permit is NOT required for a fence. A full list of Building Permit Fees are located on our website, www.zorra.ca

SANITARY SEWAGE SYSTEMS

The Township Building Department now oversees the private sanitary sewage system (Septic systems) approvals for Zorra. Historically, Southwestern Public Health managed this function, however it has been passed on to the Township to manage. By-Law Enforcement Department

WINTER PARKING

Please be advised that the winter parking restrictions will be enforced starting November 15 and remain in place until March 31, 2020. Parking is not permitted on any road or street from 1:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. seven days a week during this period. Any vehicle owner found in violation of this could be fined or have their vehicle removed/towed at the owners expense. The fine for this violation is set at \$50.

RECREATION VEHICLES

Notice to all RV/boat owners. The Zoning by-law allows front yard driveway storage of RVs and boats from May 1- October 31. After October 31, these vehicles shall be removed and stored elsewhere. The vehicles may be stored on your side lot or rear lot provided that they meet the 5 foot setback.

LEAVES AND SNOW:

Did you know that it is a by-law infraction to push your leaves and snow onto the roadway or neighboring properties? Depositing your leaves on the road or private property is considered dumping and may result in a significant fine of \$700. Also, depositing snow or ice onto public or private property carries a \$200 fine! If you wish to review the Clean and Clear by-law it can be found on our website at www.zorra.ca.

ZORRA HUNTING REGULATIONS

Sunday Gun Hunting in the Township of Zorra is prohibited. For further information visit the Ministry of Natural Resources website: www.mnr. gov.on.ca In accordance with Township By-law #43-09, Municipal licenses are not required for hunting rabbit and pheasant in the Township of Zorra.

REDUCED LOAD SEASON - February 15 - April 30

An early reminder to all drivers of heavy trucks and equipment that the reduced load season takes effect for the period of February 15 to April 30 inclusive each year. In accordance with by-law 21-03, signs will be posted on applicable Township roadways.

HALF LOAD SEASON RATIONALE

- Minimize long term damage to infrastructure
- Problems caused when roads are soft often require major repairs
- Prevent additional damage to culverts and bridges
- Heavy loads do damage to road sub-base that is difficult to detect
- Changes in the size of agricultural equipment (i.e. large liquid manure trailers)
- Multiple aggregate producers in Township
- Infrastructure repair costs borne directly or indirectly by residents

All of the above lead to safety issues during half load season.

WINTER ROADWAY MAINTENANCE ON TOWNSHIP OF ZORRA ROADS

The winter level or service to be delivered is prescribed in the Minimum Maintenance Standards—Ontario Regulation 239/02 regarding snow and ice control. The Minimum Maintenance Standards are a regulation of the Municipal Act, 2001. Service will be delivered during the following hours:

Monday to Friday-7:00 a.m.-3:30 p.m.

There will also be additional maintenance hours as determined by weather conditions. Saturdays, Sundays and holidays will also be determined by weather conditions.

BURN PERMITS

Zorra Township has a Permanent Fire Permit process for open air burning. This process involves a one-time application which will reduce the effort required to set up permission for an open air burn. All applications will be reviewed by the Fire Chief and upon approval, the applicant will be able to proceed with open air burns by calling into dispatch directly to report the burn details. Visit our website at www.zorra.ca to review the application form and conditions for the new permit, then complete your application!

Please note: small recreation burns within a ring or fire pit in backyard don't require a permit.

FIREWORKS

Please keep in mind that the Township has a Fireworks By-law, #36-2014. The bylaw regulates selling fireworks, displaying fireworks and special events.

All retail sales of consumer fireworks requires and application permit, fees, and approval from the Fire Chief or his designate.

All fines related to fireworks are set at \$200.00 plus surcharge.

If you plan on celebrating a national holiday (Canada Day, Victoria Day, Labour Day), with the use of fireworks, please review the By-law which can be found at www. zorra.ca or contact the Municipal Law Enforcement Officer or Fire Chief for further details.

WHAT'S THE RISK?

Smoking and cooking are the **top 2 causes of fatal fires** during the holidays (Nov, Dec, Jan).

Injuries caused by smoking account for 1 in 10 home fire injuries during the holidays.

Smoking accounts for 30% of all home fire deaths during the holidays.

Cooking fires account for **19%** of all home fires during the holidays.

27% of all home fire injuries occur in cooking fires during the holidays.

Alcohol is a factor in many fatal fires involving smoking and cooking.

How do I protect my family during the holidays?

WHY NOT PAY YOUR TAXES MONTHLY?

Sign up now for the 10 or 12 month Pre-Authorized Payment Plan for 2020.

If you are interested in enrolling in this payment plan for 2020, you can find an authorization form on our website at www.zorra.ca or call Kelly Hall at 519-485-2490 ext 7222. Applications need to be submitted as soon as possible to ensure enrolment for 2020.

If you are currently enrolled in the pre-authorized payment plan, you DO NOT have to re-apply each year, only if there is a change with the account.



WHY NOT PAY YOUR TAXES ONLINE?

Online or telephone banking is available for making monthly, arrears, or regular instalments. All banks accept Zorra as a client and the account number required is your ROLL NUMBER from your tax bill, starting after 3227. For example, 012-010-13100-0000, you would enter this as 01201013100, if an error occurs, please add the extra four zeros at the end and try again.

WHEN WILL MY 2020 TAX BILL BE MAILED?

Bills will be mailed the 1st week of February, with due dates of Feb 28 and May 31, 2020. Unfortunately, legislation states that the municipality is only allowed to bill half of the previous year's taxes, therefore an increase/decrease in taxes for ratepayers will not be until the Final 2020 Tax Bill which are processed in July 2020.

Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC)

MPAC is a not-for-profit corporation funded by all Ontario municipalities. MPAC's roll is to accurately value and classify all properties in Ontario in compliance with the Assessment Act and related regulations set by the Government of Ontario.

Zorra completes agreement to purchase Maple Leaf Foods Inc. Thamesford site

The Council of the Township of Zorra is pleased to announce it has finalized an agreement of purchase and sale with Maple Leaf Foods Inc. for the Township to acquire a 121-acre parcel of land in Thamesford. The parcel of land includes two existing industrial processing plants, office buildings and an industrial/residential draft plan of subdivision. Purchase price for the property is \$5,960,000.

Maple Leaf Foods announced in November 2016 the Thamesford facility would cease production in early 2018 impacting 400 workers. The Township and Rural Oxford Economic Development Corporation (ROEDC) immediately began strategizing how to mitigate the impact on the municipality and the specter of large vacant industrial buildings in Thamesford's core.

The Township and ROEDC explored many options over the past 18 months and through its due diligence determined there was potential for the municipality to purchase the property and sell off distinct parcels to interested parties. The municipality sought development proposals for eight separate parcels and in response the Township has received signed offers of purchase and sale for six of the parcels.

Kingwood Land Inc., a Mississauga based development company, has agreed to purchase 112 acres for a mixed-use development and agreed to pay \$6,350,000 for the land. Kingwood Homes has gained a reputation for building award-winning master-planned communities throughout southwestern Ontario. They have over 30 years of

home building experience and have developed mixed-use communities building single-detached dwellings, townhomes, condominiums and low and mid-rise apartment buildings. With respect to the Thamesford property, they are proposing to construct 178 single-detached dwellings, 203 townhome units, 75 bungalow condominium townhomes and 350 medium density units. In addition, Kingwood is also proposing to construct 9,000 square metres of commercial space. The necessary planning approvals will still be required for a portion of the lands and Kingwood hopes to begin construction in late fall or early winter of 2019.

Hogg Construction Ltd. has agreed to purchase two vacant parcels and one existing single detached dwelling for a total price of \$539,500. The Thamesford based development company is proposing to construct a senior-oriented apartment building and is contemplating constructing a licensed child care facility. In addition, a single detached building lot is to be subdivided into two semi-detached lots.

Mayor Marcus Ryan was pleased to make this announcement, and remarked "When the plant closure was announced, Council and the public were very concerned this land would sit vacant and become detriment to our community. Now we have a transformative development that will allow us to provide a much-needed housing mix, additional commercial space and park development along the Thames River. This brownfield redevelopment is an example of what can happen when a municipality thinks outside



the box and takes an innovative approach to community building. This development checks off all the boxes in our Strategic Plan: we are vibrant, we are prosperous, we are engaged, and we are environmentally conscious."

Ward 2 (Thamesford) Councillor Katie Davies noted that "Our community needs to provide alternatives for first time home buyers and those wishing to downsize but continue living in Thamesford and this development will meet the community's need for years to come." Chief Administrative Officer Don MacLeod said, "the Township will carry out full consultation and public engagement starting in late November or early December. I am pleased to see this deal come to fruition and we look forward to working with Kingwood to provide a sustainable, environmentally conscious development that maintains and enhances the uniqueness of Thamesford."

MEDINA RESIDENT ACHIEVING GREAT RESULTS IN UNIVERSITY AND CLUB ROWING

If it's 10 minutes after four in the morning on a university in Ontario, the stereotype is of students just getting home from a lively night on the town. But first-year University of Guelph student Grace Hutton, a Medina resident and daughter of Bryan Hutton and Joyce Edye, turns that stereotype on its head every day except Sunday.

And she has a successful few years in the sport of rowing to thank.

As she completed her secondary school studies at St. Marys DCVI in 2018-19, thanks to strong results as a member of the London-based Western Rowing Club, Hutton received inquiries from a number of universities in Ontario, as well as outside the province, expressing interest in having her attend the school and join the varsity rowing team. She settled on U of G, where she's now studying towards a Bachelor of Science in Agriculture.

"It's hard, sometimes, to wake up from my naps to get to some of my morning classes," she smiled during a recent interview. Why is she napping? Because she started her day several hours earlier, waking just after 4 a.m. in order to arrive at a conservation area north of the city in time for the team's daily 5 a.m. workout.

During what she calls "on-water season," the team works out on Guelph Lake six days a week, unless they're away at a competition. That season recently wrapped up, with the varsity rookie Hutton – a specialist in Single Sculls – following up on a second-place finish in the Ontario University Athletics (OUA) championships in late October with a very respectable fifth-place ranking in the Canadian University championships on Nov. 3.

Hutton barely squeaked into the A Final at the meet, held in Victoria, BC, by recording the sixth fastest time during preliminary time trials on Saturday, Nov. 2. But she was, overall, pleased with the result because it put her in the position, as a university rowing rookie, to compete on Sunday largely against athletes with more experience. "They've pretty much all been racing at this meet for a lot longer than I have."

Plus, she improved her ranking by one from Saturday's time trials, moving up from sixth to fifth overall.

But wrapping up the outdoor racing schedule doesn't mean the early wake-ups have ended for the U of G squad. Although early-morning treks to Guelph Lake won't resume until next spring, there are still a few indoor competitions to look forward to as part of the "off water" season. These are held on specially-equipped rowing machines – called "ergometers" – and the team, in preparation, still gathers six mornings per week.

"But it's right on campus, and it's at 6 a.m. So I get to sleep in nice and late," Hutton laughed.

Grace took up rowing in 2016 after being recruited at DCVI through the "Row to Podium" program, which sees Rowing Canada representatives visit high schools looking for student-athletes who might have the potential to succeed in the sport. She recalls that characteristics such as physical stature and endurance were some of the things the Row to Podium program looked for.

From there, she joined the Western Rowing Club and began a hectic schedule of workouts at Fanshawe Lake and competitions at such venues as the historically-significant Henley course in St. Catharines.

"If anyone knows anything about rowing in Canada, they probably know that one," she said of the Martindale Pond course in the heart of St. Catharines – host of the annual Royal Canadian Henley Regatta. It's here that Hutton has, perhaps, celebrated her best results as a club rower, including victories in Under-23 Women's Singles and, this year, in Women's Doubles with her partner (and OUA competitor) Hayley Chase of Fergus. Chase is currently studying at Laurentian University in Sudbury, and outpaced Grace in Singles Sculls to capture first place during the OUA championships on the Henley course on Oct. 25.

Hutton's future goal, though, is to move beyond the Royal Canadian Henley sphere into the upper echelons of rowing in Canada. She explains that, despite the St. Catharines event's historic significance, very few of the country's national team members compete at the annual meet.

"If you plan on staying a club rower, it's still the biggest thing," she said of the Henley. But starting

in 2019, Hutton began setting her sights higher by attending what are known as the "Speed Orders" which serve as tryouts for the national Senior and Under-23 teams. In June of this year, they were held on the very same Elk Lake course in Victoria that later hosted the Canadian University championships, and Grace recalls being somewhat disappointed with her results.

She was much happier, she added, with a subsequent participation in another top-level rowing meet – the National Rowing Championships, held in September in Burnaby, BC. In that event, she placed fourth in the C-final.

In both cases, though, the Medina native took pride in being able to glide up to the start line against rowers who are in training for the Olympics. It served as significant motivation to take her rowing to a higher level, and she's looking forward in 2020 to getting a second chance at the Speed Orders and, hopefully, a spot on the national Under-23 squad.

In rowing, the difference between victory and failure to qualify can be agonizingly small. In the preliminary qualifiers for the OUAs in October, Hutton placed second in her heat by finishing nine seconds back of a Western University athlete. But in the A-final – for which they both qualified – Hutton had saved enough energy to narrowly edge out her Western competitor for the silver medal. Her margin of victory, over 2,000 metres, was a measly 1.13 seconds.

It's understanding what it takes to succeed in such tight races that keeps Grace motivated in rowing . . . motivated to keep setting the alarm for extremely early wake-ups; motivated to keep putting her body through extreme workouts aiming for peak physical conditioning at just the right days in the racing schedule; and motivated to sacrifice much of what an average university student might enjoy so she can remain dedicated to the sport she loves.

"I really enjoy it," she says of rowing. "I do love the sport. It's reallyabout having that inner motivation."

"In a race, you have to keep pushing yourself. And you get to a point in every race when it's really hard to keep pushing yourself, and to not let the pressure off, and to keep going for it."

All the best in the 2020 season, Grace! Zorra Township will be pulling for you.

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

Allies are volunteers from all walks of life that are willing to create a real, supportive and meaningful friendship built on mutual respect with a Leader (and their family). An Ally works directly with a Leader and their family to help them in accomplishing their action plan.

The Circles Ally has three main goals:

- 1. Make meaningful, friendship with the individual or family in poverty and join them in their quest for financial independence, meaning and friendship
- 2. Increase awareness of one's own stereotypes and class rules
- Use experience of friendship to advocate within the community for changes to barriers that keep poverty in place

All applicants will be required to have a criminal reference check completed and will need to sign an Oath of Confidentiality.

What is the commitment?

- Allies will be asked to make a two-year (24 month) commitment to the Circles program which involves attending weekly meetings (including supper), for a total of 6-10 hours a month.
- An Ally should call/email/text the Circle Leader at least once a week.
- Allies are expected to meet with a Circles Leader at least once a month. When planning an outing with a Circle Leader, it should be low or no cost.

Do I receieve support or training as an Ally?

An Ally will attend a Bridges out of Poverty or Ally Training session to start. There is lots of collaboration within Circles to promote a supportive environment so the Allies and Leaders always have someone there for them.

If you visited the museum earlier this year, you may have stumbled across Harvard aircraft fragments and pilots' logbooks, or vivid images of Formosa and the life of George Leslie Mackay. Through the month of October, though, our rotating exhibit space was transformed into a contemporary art gallery. Oxford Creative Connections, and its member artists, developed a show called "Art in Oxford" that featured works on canvas, sculptures and photographs. A reception was held at the museum on October 4th and art remained on display until October 31st.

There were a few projects we had to undertake at the museum before the winter weather arrived and the ground froze. With expert advice from Backyard By Design, a collection of shovels, and hot chocolate and cookies on hand, members of the Beachville District Historical Society and volunteers planted over 250 bulbs in our front yard. While this project will show few results in the next few months, we're excited to look for the blooms (and reap the rewards of this fall project) in the spring.

Crews from South-West Oxford Township and Peter's Paving laid a sleek new driveway at the museum just as the village of Beachville saw its first snowfall. Crumbling curbs and old asphalt was torn up, fresh layers of gravel were spread and new storm grates were installed. The west portion of the driveway was also extended to make it snowplow ready. Bring on the white stuff!

During the month of remembrance, it was fitting that the Beachville District Historical Society's speaker series featured special guest, Bruce Julian. His presentation provided an opportunity to reflect on the history and relevance of the Royal Canadian Legion. We thank, our partner, the Beachville Legion for all the work they do in our community to document and share veterans' stories.

With students well into their school terms, we welcomed a new Educational Coordinator to our staff. Jessica Matthys joined our team as a Young Canada Works intern. She has extensive experience in museum programming and interpretive design, and will be working to develop creative, curriculum-specific, educational kits that highlight local histories and artifacts. If you're a teacher thinking about class activities for next semester, keep an eye out for our new educational programs in 2020.

Looking ahead to 2020, we encourage those who have an interest in local history and community service to stop into the museum. Tell us about the projects you are interested in, brainstorm with us about a new initiative, sign up to be a volunteer or ask us about joining a committee. How would you like to get involved?

The Beachville District Museum has in stock a number of books of local historical interest, some written by Historical Society members. The latest are two by Society member and retired history professor Dr. George Emery. The first book is an expanded version of his prior work on millponds, millstreams and people in Ingersoll. The second describes financial and other incentives given to entice industry to Ingersoll from 1873 to 1927, typical of many municipalities. These publications are available exclusively through the Beachville District Museum and the Ingersoll Cheese and Agricultural Museum. Dr. Emery is donating the full sale amount to the respective museum.



Thamesford Handbell Choir

The Thamesford Handbell Choir is a group of eleven people from communities around Thamesford. We meet once a week to ring handbells and share our love of music. Susan Carscadden-Mifsud of Ingersoll is the director of the ensemble.

Four octaves of Schulmerich bronze handbells were purchased after a federal Horizons Grant was approved in 1993 resulting from the foresight of thirteen senior Thamesford residents who initiated this project.

Initially, Charlotte McIntosh capably directed the performers and by 1995, Lorna Ferguson was directing the "Ringing Stars". They practiced for concerts at church services, senior centers and holiday events. Upon Lorna's retirement, Susan Carscadden-Mifsud became the group's director.

The group has performed at many community church services, at seniors' homes and in 2012 performed at Santa's Village in Ingersoll. They have appeared at the Thamesford Lion's Carol Sing several times and were guests at the Ingersoll Senior's Centre Christmas Dinner. The ringers have also attended several Ontario Biennial Handbell Festivals.

On Sunday, April 21, 2013, the Thamesford Handbell Choir presented "*Bells, Bids 'n' Bites*" a concert and silent auction recognizing their 20th anniversary and honoring past choir members.

The ringers have also collaborated with Susan's other handbell ensembles, Bells Ablaze and Bellissima Ringers to present concerts at ITOPA

Theatre in Ingersoll. Our next performance at ITOPA will be on Sunday December 15, 2019 at 2:00 p.m. - a varied program of seasonal music featuring bells and other instruments including violin, flute, keyboard, percussion and singers.



Environmental needs are becoming increasingly important across our globe and every tree helps!!

Throughout the Township of Zorra there are various tree planting programs available for residents. Available programs are as follows:



New Memorial Forest Sign!! Located on the 43rd Line, North of Road 68.

Township of Zorra Memorial

Tree Program

Memorial Trees can be purchased, in memory of loved ones, at the Township Office for \$40.00 through the Upper Thames River Conservation Authority (UTRCA). Individuals may also have their loved ones name added to a memorial tree sign when they purchase a tree for an additional fee. Signs are located at Grace Patterson Park in Thamesford, Embro Conservation Area and Harrington Conservation Area. The trees are planted in various locations throughout Zorra on Township or UTRCA property at a pre-determined location. Approximately 148 trees, usually 6'-8' sugar maples, have been planted throughout the Township since the start of this program in 1995. Fill out the Memorial Tree Request Form on the Zorra website www.zorra.ca or contact the Township Office.

Township of Zorra Replacement Tree Program

Currently when the Township of Zorra Public Works staff take down a tree along a road side or near private property, they offer the land owner two trees to replace the one that was removed. The two trees are for planting on their private property. In 2019, 150 6'-8' sugar maple trees were planted through this program. Fill out the Tree Replacement Form on the Zorra website www.zorra.ca or contact the Township Office.

Township of Zorra Memorial Tree Forest

In 2015, Zorra Township partnered with Brock and Visser Funeral Home Thamesford Chapel and UTRCA to have trees planted in memory of those individuals whose funeral arrangements have been conducted through Brock and Visser Funeral Home. The Memorial Tree Forest is located on the 43rd Line, North of Road 68 on land owned by UTRCA. The trees are purchased by Brock and Visser Funeral Home. The trees that are being planted are native species, 6'-8' in size. Since 2015, 256 trees have been planted in the forest. Contact Brock and Visser for more details at 519-285-2427.





The Upper Thames River Conservation Authority has trees & grants available. Landowners who reside in the Upper Thames River watershed and own a minimum of 1 hectare (2.5 acres) are eligible to participate in the UTRCA's Tree Planting on Private Lands program.

The program offers:

- Large stock trees (coniferous and deciduous)
- **Seedlings** (coniferous and deciduous species, as well as wildlife shrubs)

Trees purchased through this program may be planted by the landowner or through the UTRCA's full planting service.

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


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




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
