The Tatler 1971 has mirrored well the pulse of life at Annandale with all its many facets.



An era of junior football has come to an end in 1970 at Annandale High School. This era was a decade of many victories and few defeats for two of the most successful coaches in Tri-County history.

Junior football is taking its last breath at Annandale for several reasons; the first being the split of the dynamic coaching team of Stover and DeVriendt. Mr. DeVriendt is leaving Annandale to teach at the new school in Langton so the coaching team will have to split. Even though it would be possible for both men to continue coaching, they both feel that they were a team, and when one member of the team is lost the other cannot function efficiently. The second reason football is ending is the number of boys eligible for junior football in 1971.

Annandale approximately has 800 students, 250 of them boys. Next year the school population will dwindle to roughly 650 students so the number of boys in the school will be few and far between.

Both Mr. DeVriendt and Mr. Stover have a great ability to take boys who have never been exposed to high school football and come through with a winning, or successful team. This fact is evident by their season records of the past decade. Through this decade their football teams have won six league championships, and from this four bowl championships which is more than any other school in the Tri-County Conference. This record is more than just impressive, but it shows their success as a coaching team.

Behind their coaching record is their philosophy of football which is given to each and every player of their football teams. In their philosophy is self-discipline which each player must have; discipline which each offense and defense must have and, lastly but most important is pride in oneself, whether the team wins or loses, it's good to know that you played hard and clean and came out with your head up.

It is unfortunate that junior boys coming into the school in the future will be unable to be exposed to these two men as the proud and successful coaches they truly are.

In closing we would like to dedicate this Tatler, on behalf of all the junior Marauders since 1961, to MR. A. STOVER and MR. P. DEVRIENDT, two fine men and inspiring coaches.

The department heads and their assistants must be thanked for the fine job they did in covering the events so thoroughly.



VALEDICTORY ADDRESS 1970

"I may speak in tengues of men or of angels, but if I am without love, I am a sounding gong, or a clanging cymbal. I may have the gift of prophecy and know every hidden truth: I may have faith strong enough to move mountains, but if I have no love, I am nothing..."

These simple words were written nearly two thousand years ago... yet we can still marvel at the deep tout which they reveal for a modern audience to-day. Although man may claim at times to have advanced past his solicalled "weaker" emotional needs of 'love', 'warmth', 'sincerity', and 'understanding', our better judgment still judgmen

For the past several years, the graduating classes have heard speakers from this platform issue similar challeness of our modern day: ...that "we as adolescents must be ready to face the dynamic outside world of continuous at large" ... that "we can no longer apply the lessons of yesterday to the problems of to-morrow." We have been told to not just ... to continually ready ourselves for the fast-moving world of the future, that waits for no one. The contribute has been heard clearly time and time again... "be prepared... or be lost..."

May I suggest, friends, that a world which is so advanced and so efficient that it waits for no one, can hardly be a world worth preparing ourselves for? What strange fate would our 'humanity' suffer, if we were to abandon ourselves to a life of mindless conformity to an impersonally technical and mechanised system? What claim could we make to the title "human beings", if we tolerated this rapid eclipse of the 'humane' element in our life-styles an eclipse which our highly mechanical and dehumanised society threatens to impose?

I hesitate, this evening, to urge any of you to passively accept the new roles which modern technology is surwilling to thrust upon you. Granted, technical progesss may take certain individuals to the surface of the moon, and far beyond. Perhaps computers will even calculate the complex genetic code which will allow babies to be synthesise in a test-tube. I do not minimise for one moment, the tremendous potential of man's technology... but I seriously question the value of all these advances, if they force mankind to become a mere component of a callous concrete glass, and steel environment. Can we be willing to sacrifice our human sentiments as the price of 'progress'.

Man, no doubt, is capable of building yet taller skyscrapers, of covering more and more meadows with asplication of driving more and more species to the brink of extinction. His weapons of war will become deadlier. He will pass more and more miles of expressways and superhighways. Man may even construct machines so advanced and so complicated, that they will be able to rationalise, and to think... But man will never build a machine that can love

We as adolescents instead face a much greater challenge: to mould friendship and understanding where there have been but disagreements... to replenish a nearly barren planet with the myriad of living creatures that once flourished here in harmony... to reverse the current trend towards losing our individual identity. We must bear in mind that mankind may someday perform outstanding feats which will carry him to the stars... who knows? - we may even undergo a total computerisation of our daily routines. But let us never forget that if mankind ever loses his appreciation of affection, of tenderness ... of 'love' ... man's mighty words will be but hollow echoes, and man will become an empty shell... a nothing ... and no technology, no matter how advanced or complex, will ever save him...

It was a bond of love that has made these past few years of learning at Annandale so significant. The tedious assortment of facts and figures which were presented in our classes bears minor importance when compared to the devotion and concern which our teachers so freely showed for us. If we are to remember our high school days for anything... let it be for the lessons of 'love' which we learned here.

And I want each and every one of you to gather all that accumulated love and affection of our years at Annandale, and to multiply it many times over during your adult lives. I want you to cherish forever the countless happy memories of the fellowship we've shared together here, and to go out and encourage an even greater fellowship in your future. For this world will continue to grow colder and more unfeeling, unless we strive to cultivate the values that we acquired during our high school days. We shall face even worse disillusion in life, if we fail to convey to others, just a little of the warmth, a little of the enthusiasm and the spirit of Annandale.

And now that difficult moment has finally arrived... 'difficult' - because it may well mark our last opportunity to savour the delight of being together. Each of us has already embarked upon an uncertain voyage... one which may be fraught with failures and downfall... but more likely one which will yield to us a treasure of success and rewards.

It is never easy to say farewell to someone who has grown to be a part of you... It is no less difficult to say 'good-bye' to Annandale High School.

Just before closing, I'd like to express appreciation on behalf of the graduating class of 1970 to all those who made our stay here so memorable and so meaningful...

To our new friend from Australia, Keith Bradley, who helped to make our last year of high school truly unforgettable: We wish you a bright and beautiful future back in your native land. May you receive in return, a portion of the happiness and novelty you radiated here...

To the staff of Annandale, who remained a guiding light in times of uncertainty: you may never know how profoundly you have influenced our lives for the better, and we may never realise the tremendous debt of thanks which we owe in return. We have all grown stronger because of the values you strove to instill within us.

My last words this evening are addressed to everyone:

While we witness the advent of plasticity and frigidity in our everyday lives. when it seems that with each day, we as individuals grow less and less significant... let us always remember, that the greatest measure of man's strength... is man's love...

JAPAN TRIP

On July 19, 1970, the excitement of over a year and a half of waiting was at a peak, as about 40 Annandale students and teachers assembled at Toronto International Airport bound for Expo '70 and Japan.

After an overnight delay in Toronto, about 14 hours flying time, and a refueling stop at Anchorage, Alaska, we stepped from the plane onto Japanese soil and into the intense summer heat.

We boarded our bus for the Tokyo Memorial Youth Centre, and it was during this ride that we first experienced the maniac driving of the Japanese. While at the Youth Centre which had been built for the Olympic athletes in 1964, daily excursions took us to such attractions as the Imperial Palace, the Toshika Science Centre, numerous shrines and the Ginza. A delicious Mongolian barbecue at the Chinzanso Garden Restaurant proved to be the best meal, as each small table was served delicacies grilled in the centre of the table by its own Kimono-clad waitress.

At the Centre itself, we could further experience Japanese culture by the Japanese bath. Cleansing first on tiny stools, and then immersing completely in the warm water of the communal bathtub, we learned something of relaxation. This small pleasure was welcomed after the sweltering heat and humidity, and the busy Tokyo environment, which though quiet after 10 P.M. - woke at dawn.



This included eating with chopsticks on crouched knees at tiny tables, a speech by a Buddhist monk in his own tongue, sliding paper-thin doors, sleeping on mats and rice-husk pillows, and, because we were in the mountains, under a huge, suspended mosquite net.

Our final day was spent in Tokyo for last minute shopping for remembrances, farewells to Japanese friends and, of course, re-packing.

On the morning of August 4, on our way to the airport, farewell songs in both English and Japanese were sung to our guides. The aura of sadness hung over all as we said our final "SAYONARA", to Japan. Our once-in-a-lifetime experience in the "land of the rising sun" was over.

Under the coaching of Mr. Donaldson the team played as a unit and came from behind in many of the games to win.






With all those narrow victories it did make the season exciting but I am sure the coaches would not want another such "exciting" season.











