In a world of rapid changes, it seems that the educational programme of Ontario's secondary schools has rendered itself obsolete. Thus, beginning next September, the Grade Niners will embark on a newly prepared scheme — the "Robarts Plan." The establishment of this plan is an effort to counteract high school drop-outs, complaints from universities of ill-prepared students, and the multitude of unskilled labourers.

How will this system accomplish this?

Since people, by nature, inherit distinct interests and capabilities, the plan offers different courses from which each student will choose a type of course with which he will be able to cope and which will enable him to discover a satisfaction and a challenge in the course suited to his abilities.

The courses to be offered fall into three major categories—Arts and Science; Business and Commerce; Science, Technology and Trades. Each of these is divided into a five-year course leading to university and a four-year course ending at Grade Twelve. The five-year course will be more difficult than the present system. However, fewer drop-outs are expected because the work will challenge the gifted students to a greater degree than previously and their studies will necessitate self-discipline and perseverance. In this way, the students should become well qualified for university

now, Tillsonburg will always be my hometown, and T.D.H.S. my alma mater.

We have seen our cadet corps win the Strathcona Shield almost every year we were here. We can remember our football and basketball games, the Hops we attended or just the Friday night dances we had, artistically named the Spring Fling, or the Broomstick Bounce or the Fall Ball. Then there was the noon hour dancing to a wide selection of 2 or 3 records. You remember the ones, just the minute you got half way across the floor to ask your favourite girl, they hit a groove or scratch.

But most of all I think we'll remember most of the people who guided us through our five bewildering years, who put up with our talking, gum chewing, laziness and when that wonderful season of spring rolled around our constant loitering about girl's lockers. To them we owe a great vote of thanks. You would have to go a long way to find better teachers than we have had right here in Tillsonburg. Our teachers were not just the people at the front of the class. In some cases they were our neighbours. They trounced our basketball and volleyball teams in grand fashion every year. We curled with them; went on cadet manoeuvres with them; sang under their direction in operettas and of course attended most of their classes too. Plato once said of teachers "those having torches will pass them on to others."

As we accepted our diplomas tonight, in a way we were accepting the torch passed on to us by our teachers. But keep in mind our learning is not over. The aim of an education is to enable man to continue his learning. As they tell us; you can lead a high school graduate to college but you can't make him think.

It is a very specialized world that we are living in today. The jack of all trades is almost extinct and our education is a must. To illustrate the state of specialization things are getting into, I'd like to cite the example of the man applying to an advertising agency for a job. The conversation goes something like this.

"Are you familiar with cigarette advertising?"

"Yes."

"Filter cigarettes?"

"Yes."

"Filter cigarettes in a flip top box?"

"Yes."

"Mentholated filter tip cigarettes in

flip top boxes."

"Yes."

"Mentholated filter tip, flip top cigarettes with porous paper."

"No, not porous paper."

"I'm sorry we can't use you."

Maybe things aren't that bad but the importance of an education cannot be stressed too much.

Our success or failure from here on in will depend entirely on ourselves. Opportunity might knock but we can't expect it to break the door down. Success has always operated on a serve-yourself basis. We must use our abilities to the fullest for the best means. In our endeavour we must try to profit from the mistakes of others. For one thing we will never live long enough to make them all ourselves. Mistakes and failures are part of life. If people didn't make mistakes there wouldn't be erasers on lead pencils. The human body has three pounds of brain and 64 pounds of muscle, maybe this explains a lot of our trouble.

At this point I would like to talk a little about our future, but first of all we must assume there is a future for us. With the threat of all-out nuclear war hanging over our head like a mushroom cloud, things look rather grim. (I'm pessimistic, I'm taking Russian at McMaster University). Well maybe things aren't all that grim. Khrushchev told our parents that we would be raised under Communist rule. See we've saved one generation already. And we will continue to save generation upon generation if our main weapon is an educated population. Education is the greatest enemy of Communism and war will only come about through the failure of human wisdom.

This is where we come in. In a way, as citizens of the future, ours is the responsibility of preserving the human race for what it's worth. We must have a code to live by in the years to come. As far as I can see if we stick to the ten commandments we will be alright.

Well as they say we've reached the crossroads of our life and at this point, a word of advice is usually welcome. So in conclusion tonight, I'd like to read to you a word of advice of Sydney Smith who gave it to the students of Toronto University: "If you choose to work, you will succeed; if you don't you will fail. If you neglect your work, you will dislike it; if you do it well, you will enjoy it. If you like little cliques, you will be

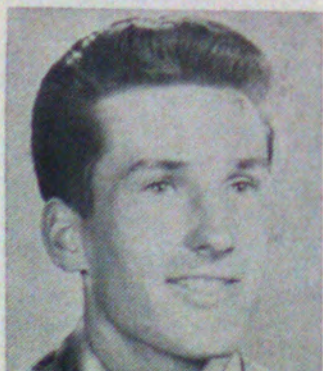

There are twelve cabins housing twelve girls each with a counsellor assigned to each cabin and a Camp Leader. The counsellors are high school Physical Education teachers.

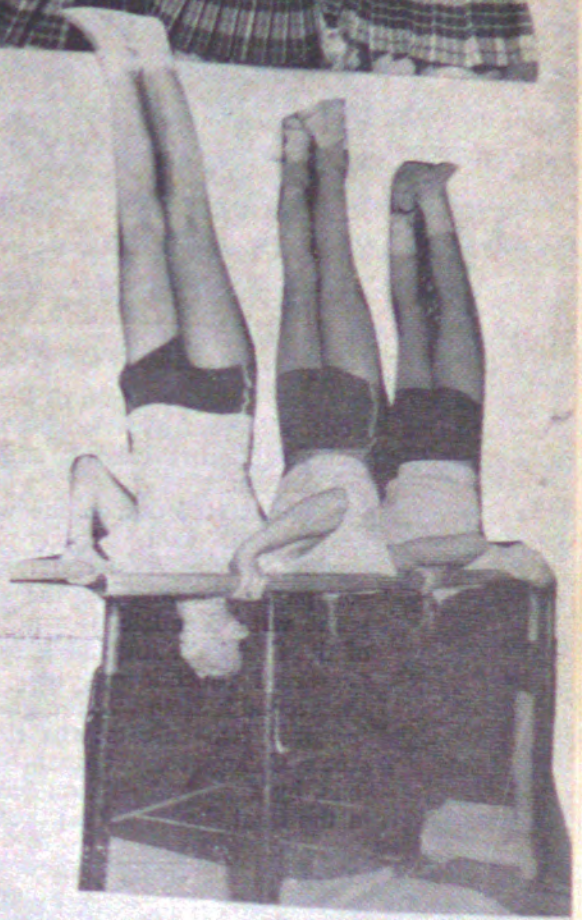
Our first day was set aside to acquaint us with all the different activities and from them we could choose our options. The

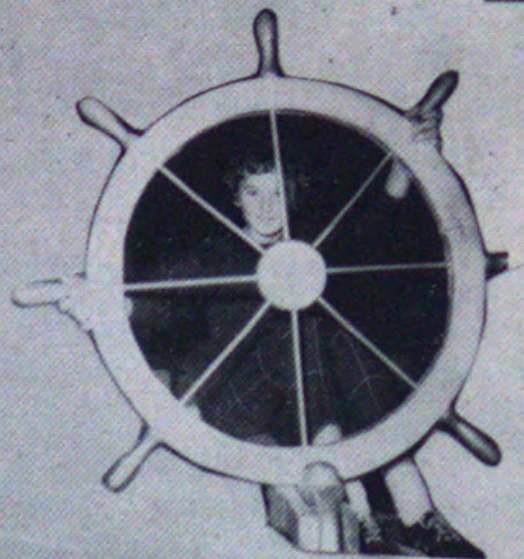

With many of the girls returning next year, we hope to have an even more successful season.

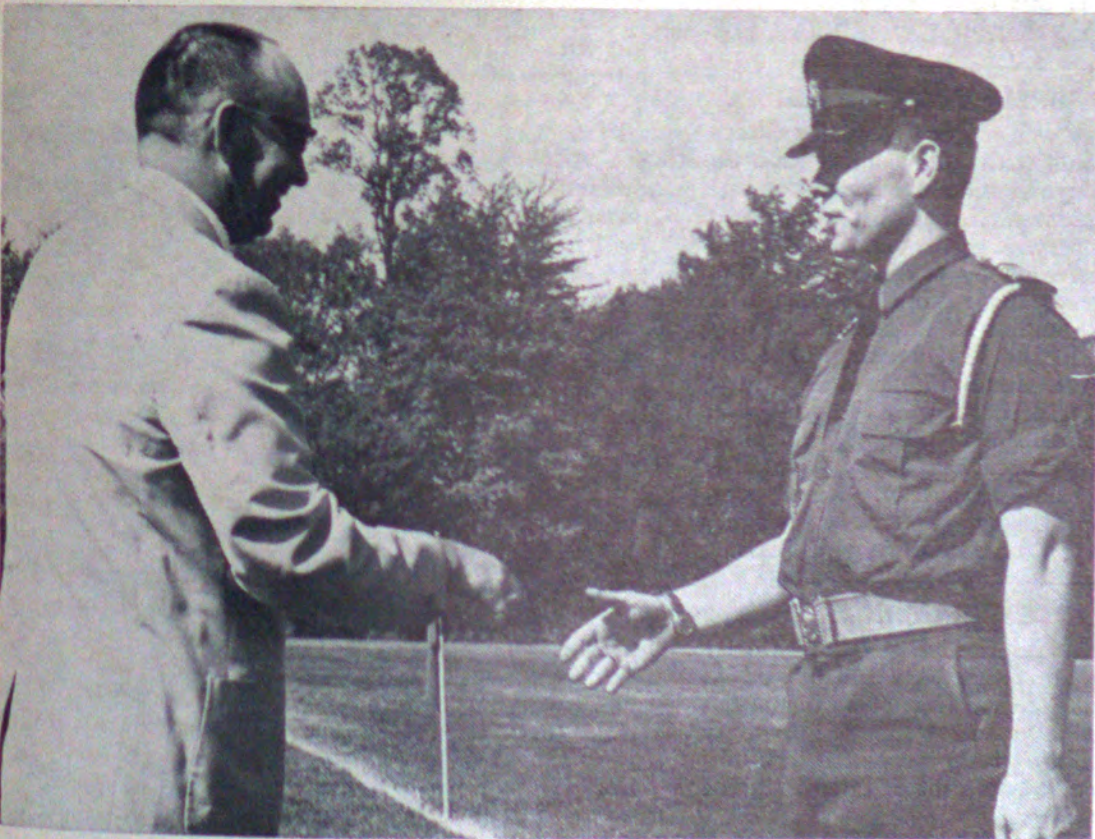

Slaughter Still Prevails on the Highway

It was a still, clear night and the traffic was flowing smoothly along a well-known four-lane highway of Canada. The driving conditions were good. Suddenly one of the cars skidded wildly, careened off another auto, rolled into the median and burst into flames. The result—a family of four killed in a highway accident. This is a description of a typical traffic accident which takes the lives of so many Canadians each year.

Why must the family automobile be the most dangerous means of transportation in Canada today? Statistics show that more people are killed in traffic accidents each year than by any other means. For example, during this Christmas holiday alone, more than four hundred and fifty-five people were killed as a result of traffic accidents in the United States.

There are several causes of accidents today. The main reason is that of the excessive rates of speed used on the highways. With the bigger and more powerful cars that are being manufactured in this day and age, some drivers find it very hard to resist the temptation of letting the "horses" under the hood break into a gallop. However it seems that more and more of these "gallops" are proving to be fatal. Then there is impaired driving. This accounts for several of the accidents on the highways. And unfortunately, it seems as though the intoxicated driver always ends up injuring or killing others while he escapes with minor injuries or even, incredibly enough, without a scratch. Then too, just plain reckless driving has much to do

with fatalities on the roads today. Teenagers seem to fit into this category. They like to get out on the open road and see whose car can go the fastest or sometimes even to play "chicken." The latter seems to be absolutely stupid, in my opinion, for it proves nothing except the complete lack of regard for others on the highway.

How can the causes of some of these accidents be remedied? There are several answers to this question. First and foremost is careful driving. Then a sense of responsibility is also vitally important to the driver. Every person behind the wheel of an auto has his own life and the lives of others in his own hands. As a result he should do his utmost to drive safely and carefully. The careful patrolling of highways by law enforcement officers would also help. In line with this is the strict enforcement of traffic laws. This would show the constant law-breakers that flagrant violation of the traffic laws is to be avoided. People should realize that traffic laws are there for their own benefit and thus they ought to be obeyed. Several towns and cities in the United States have introduced "hot rod" clubs and "drag strips" to try to keep the teenagers to do their racing under safe conditions.

The rate of fatalities on the highways of Canada and the United States is far too high and each person driving on the highways has a responsibility to himself and those around him to drive safely and stay alive.
