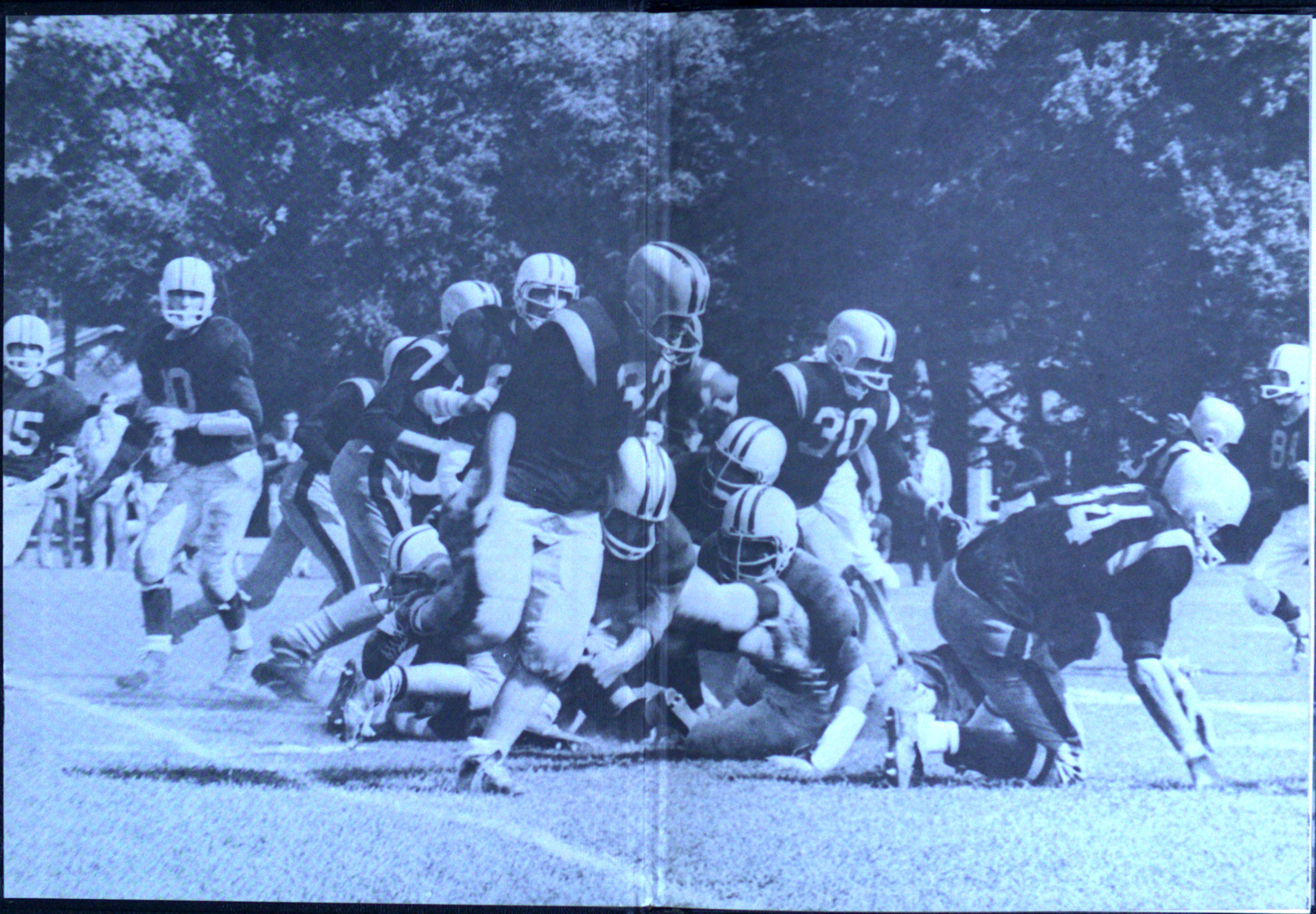

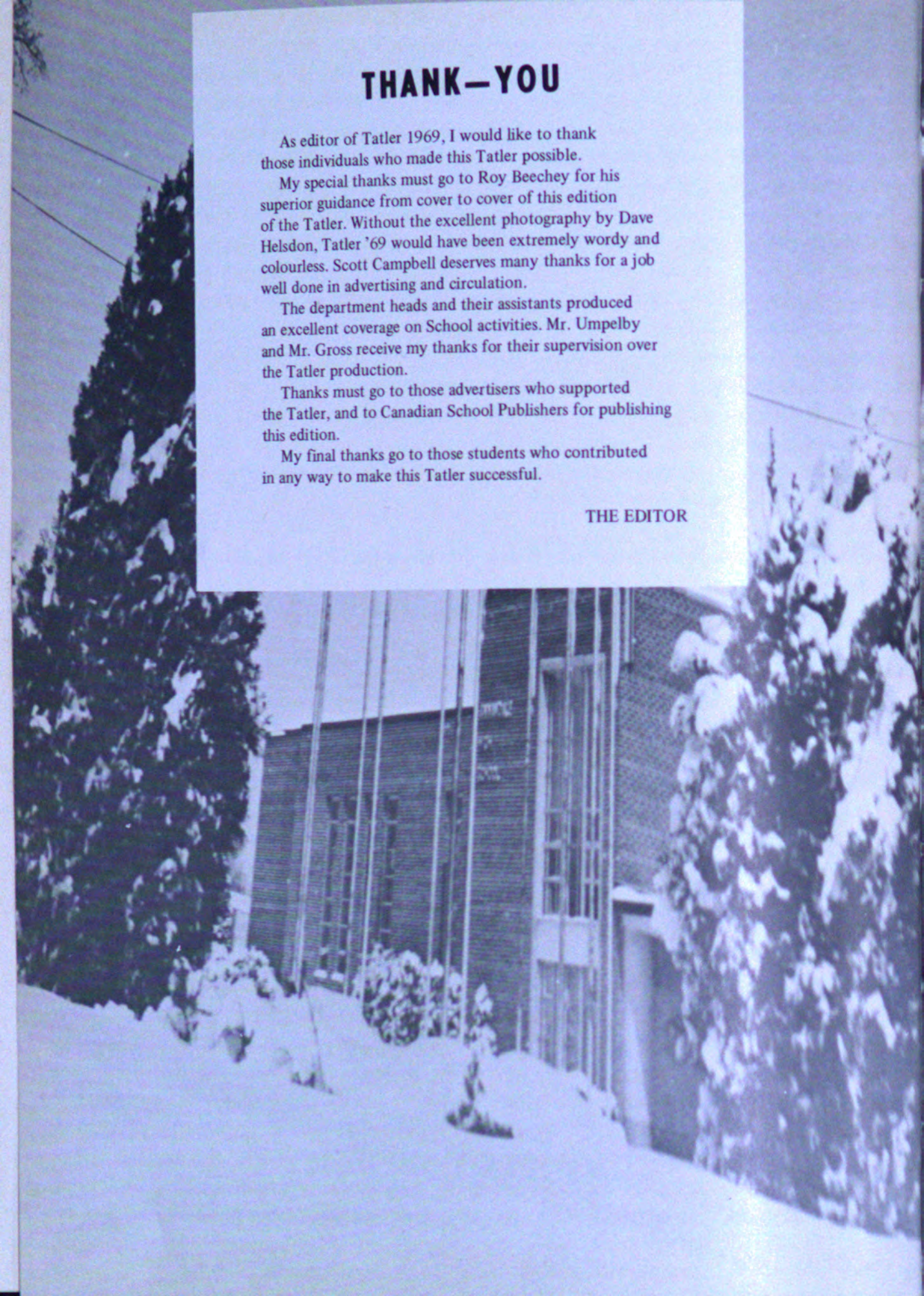

THE EDITOR



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VALEDICTORY



Proudly and a little sadly I stand here before you tonight as valedictorian, representing those people in the front rows with whom I have shared five years of life and who now are leaving to reach out for new perspectives and experiences.

Tonight it is this same pride that fills the auditorium — pride in ourselves as we have finally completed one goal, anxious to go on to the next, pride our parents are showing — pride mingled with a special love — and the pride of our teachers who have given us the knowledge of books and of life. Yet there is that faint touch of sadness that is always present at a final gathering even though it opens the way for the new. Together we have done too many things — good and bad — and have made too many friendships not to feel at least a little nostalgic as one era of our lives draws to a close.

We are now in the midst of changes occurring in our own worlds — our growing up and maturing as we leave the warm, protective arms of familiarity to plunge into the cold challenge of the unknown.

We have seen the surface changes — the continual building up and tearing down of structures, the construction of super-highways over what was once fertile land, the tremendous and unbelievable expansion of cities, teeming with people.

We have felt those deeper, more significant changes — the differing views of morality, the destroying of old beliefs with substitutes given that are not quite enough.

We have seen old standards scoffed at and changed — sometimes for the better, sometimes not. Old, established institutions have been attacked as people are daring to question those things in which they cannot quite believe, searching for the elusive Truth. We are living in a land supporting surpluses of food, often left to rot rather than be sold at a loss or given to those millions starving in India or China.

We have seen people publicly rebelling against policies with which they disagree, burning their draft cards, marching in peace demonstrations, fighting to gain equality in a land where colour of skin can make all the difference.

We have watched on the mass media of communication people butchering

each other, engaged in the bloody destruction of war, fighting for a lonely cause thousands of miles from home.

We have heard rebellious students crying out for power — power which can so easily be misused when placed in the hands of the inexperienced.

And we have also seen people devoting their lives to helping those of under-developed countries, to teaching the crippled to live useful lives, to aiding the poor and destitute of their own country.

This is the environment in which we have lived — scientific advances astounding us, disease, poverty and suffering shocking us, rebelliousness an accepted and expected concept, but man's good will and humanity always reassuring us.

Through the years spent in high school, we have been forced to become aware of these issues. Our teachers have asked the initial questions, opening the doors to inquiry and we have listened and discussed and wondered and sought. In English class we debated the probability of man's survival in a world becoming too quickly industrialized for his own mental adjustment. We moved from Western man's duty in the Eastern world to an evaluation of Pierre Elliott Trudeau and on. In Math class, besides dealing with those deadly and unruly figures, we discussed the newest concepts in education and even had chances to sound off about those injustices we felt we had suffered.

And so it went in all our classes. Besides learning the essentials of reading, writing and arithmetic, our thought processes were put into motion and we began to realize that perhaps the future could be ours; that perhaps our opinions might have some effect someday in making our world a better place in which to live. In fact, we became aware of ourselves, of our abilities and of our failures as human beings and this, possibly, is one of the most important functions of any educational system.

Tonight it is so easy to become overly sentimental and this, in a way, is good. Graduation is reserved as the time to make our last good-byes to the place in which we have spent five years — five sometimes exciting, sometimes boring but never passive years — and such ties are not easily severed. In fact, we never really will lose the feeling that a part of us still remains. And we, ourselves, will always take a part of the school with us wherever we go — remembering those good times when the enthusiasm of youth overcame all difficulties.

But, time passes and we must follow the tide of change. The outside world beckons and we have facing us a lifetime of challenges to confront as best as we can — perhaps better prepared because our teachers cared enough to try to develop our potentialities and to discover what type of people we really were and for this we thank them.

Our stay here is over —

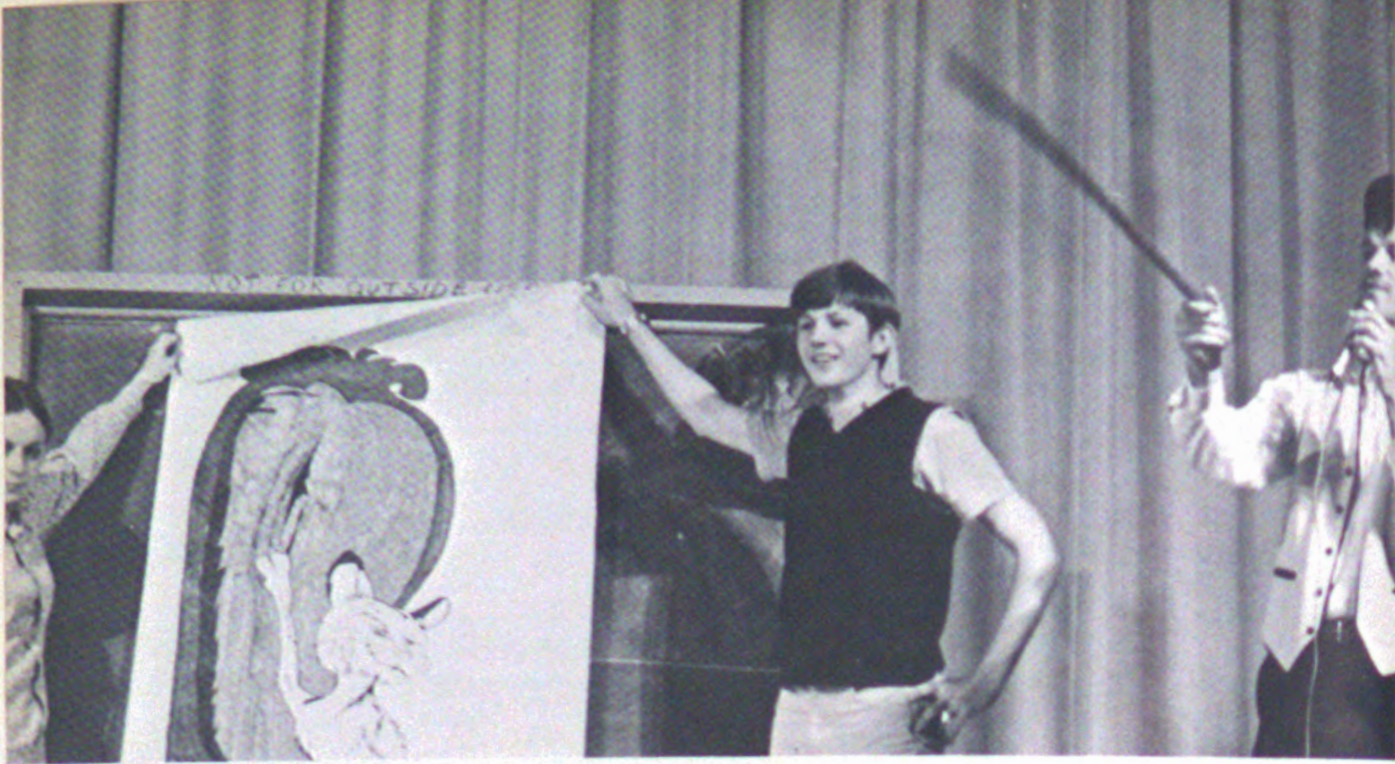

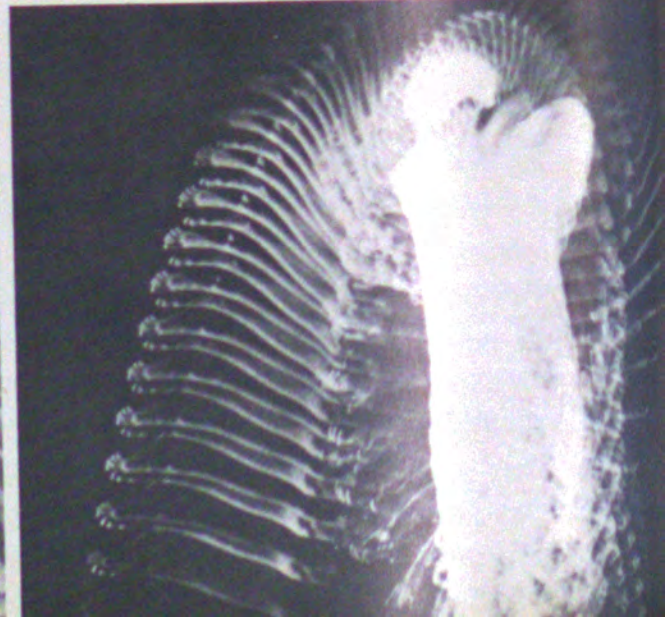


TRAMPOLINE
