



John Swayze Photography (picture not available) Few people fully realize the steps involved in putting together the Tatler. There are two distinct areas of approach in obtaining the finished book. The first area is that of business concerning mainly the element of finance which necessitates keeping a close record of bills, money obtained from circulation and advertising and making sine that cheques are in the mail to reach the yearbook (in this case inter-Collegiate Press) in time to meet the appropriate deadlines. Advertising is a very important factor and certainly a hard chore. It involves students walking the streets, knocking on every businessman's door selling an ad in the book. Some have to be visited three or four times, but if enough hard work and persistence is displayed by all the students involved, as was the case this year, it can prove very successful. This year we sold approximately \$2,400 in advertising, making up a considerable chunk of the \$3,500 cost of producing the book. I would personally like to thank all those students of the advertising staff for their great contribution, and I feel it necessary to single out a few people such as Bryon Long, Howard Teall, Mukesh Gelda, Peter Gibson and Tom Rolfe who brought in a major part of the sponsorships with over-all guidance from Mr. Grose and Mr. Pellizarri making the campaign a complete success.

Of course, for every product there must be a market and for the Tatler you, the students of Annandale are our buyers. You may remember the Circulation Campaign launched in January headed by Jim Hevenor. We'd like to say, Jim, that we appreciate the time and energy you put into the campaign. Of the 500 books that we've ordered, over 400 are reserved.

The remainder will go on sale again in the fall, but at the higher price of \$4.00.

The other area of which I spoke is the editorial section. The work done by this staff is what you see. In short, we create the book from the initial planning stages and ideas to the actual putting together of the text. The planning of the book and the overseeing of the development and work on it has been my job.

To begin in the fall the staff chose the cover for the Tatler. Also Geoff and I chose the texture of the paper and the

kind of type for titles.

Without pictures there would be no book, so thank you John and Tom. Although we had to wait for pictures we always made our deadlines. Doing the layouts consists of allocating places for pictures and copy. It may take a whole

night to achieve an effective layout.

At this point I'd like to thank Mary DeBruyn, Dawn Chilton, Mary Wolter and Rosemary Zei who spent endless hours of work on the material. After this Mr. Stover proofreads everything for mistakes. It is quite involved but all of us will have enjoyed the book more for having worked on it. Why don't you get involved next year.


















MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Valedictory Address 1971

Ladies and gentlemen, honoured faculty, fellow graduates...., there must be an easier way to start but I couldn't find any. I think that some of you feel that your stay at Annandale was too long and you're glad to be out; but it wasn't long enough, one more year and you would have had a new gym floor that was safe to walk on.

I must, in all fairness, compliment the staff of Annandale since, whether we want to admit it or not, a lot of our lives are molded by what we have learned from them. Much of the material they taught us seems to be quite irrelevant, and we will never use most of what we were supposed to learn, but we have spent a considerable amount of time at least in close proximity to them.

I know that I have not suffered by going to this school and I hope that none of you feel that you have suffered too greatly. --I have a little story about a reunion one of the Professors went to that would fit in at this moment.---They were all gathered together for dinner when a large, black automobile drove up to the doorway. A chauffeur got out, opened the door, and the stu-

dent voted most likely to fail stepped out dressed in the best clothes. Now this fellow never seemed to do any good in school; in fact it was a wonder that he even graduated, so the Professor was rather interested in his success. He asked him how he became so wealthy. "Well", he said, "I'm in the manufacturing business and I make these things for a dollar, and then I sell them for five dollars—and boy does that 5 percent add up!"

I'll stray slightly, with the knowledge that there were and are faults at this school; more faults for some than others; but also with the knowledge that we do have some of the best teachers anywhere, (Miss Grieve must be one of the best, for I feel a Valedictorian Address just isn't complete without some mention of her, even though I only took Latin for one year), and that some day some of you may be in the position to change the education system, but do try to imagine what your children will think of your "antique" ideas.

Someone has said, "You can do almost anything to a man." A powerful statement of vanity, but I feel that in many ways this sentence is quite valid. --- I imagine some graduates will swear by this already. -- We've had it fairly easy so far. You are already graduates of Annandale High School and three quarters of your life is still ahead of you. If you thought life was unbearable at Annandale then you may never survive.

A few of you have heard me say, "Don't worry about it", but the usual reply to this was, "Don't worry about it! But, ya George, we DO worry about it." I seemed to be always coming up with that statement at the worst possible times. The castle walls of "Camelot" could be falling down and that would be the best I could come up with. The only reason these walls didn't fall down was that someone DID worry. Impossible things are accomplished when there is a deadline. The result can often be in a crude form, but it is still there.

I think Margaret Mead is correct in saying that a little anxiety is good for us. It makes us get things done. I only hope that we don't end up destroying ideas that are essential to life. Improve! Remember our own anxieties can also destroy us, inside and out. -- At the moment I can't think of anything worse than a world filled with people suffering from ulcers.



Opening of the Gym



Yes, it was time for a celebration! A wish come true, and it was about time.






Presentations to Mr. Stover and Mr. DeVriendt


For ten years of our lives, we had the privilege of coaching the best game in the world at the best school anywhere. We will never forget those ten years, nor the boys who played football for us, nor the students and staff members who were part of what happened to all of us,

Because of the small number of boys in the school, we learned that, to win, we had to work harder. We also learned that to survive, we had to care more about one another than most teams and most schools do. In a less violent game, what we learned to feel for one another might be called "love" -- man's concern for and involvement with his fellowman.

Neither of us will ever forget this presentation in the gym at Annandale, the last of so many times that our teams stood on the stage. We accept the awards with humility because they are not ours but instead belong to the teams and to the school.

To Student Council President Jim Hevenor and the members of his 1970-'71 Council, and to Geoff Parker and Sandra Drotos, Editors of the 1971 Tatler, our thanks for recognizing what football meant in Annandale during the last ten years. It meant a great deal to us to know that so many others did remember ... and did care.







On July 8, 1971, 32 Annandale students and teachers boarded a much despised Donaldson International Boeing 707 bound for Europe and Russia.


After eight hours of flying time across the Atlantic, we set foot on British soil at Gatwick Airport; thence we were driven to our residence at University College, London. During our eight day stay in the city, daily excursions took us to Windsor Castle, Hampton Court, Picadilly Circus, Petticoat Lane, Hyde Park, Westminster Abbey and Big Ben, Tower of London, Trafalgar Square and Buckingham Palace where we witnessed the classical changing of the guard.

The continent awaited us so we boarded a cross channel steamer headed for Ostende, Belgium. Brussels has numerous cathedrals and museums to offer. Ghent and the lace capital, Bruge, were also inspected.

Next by train, we headed for the "city of love"...
gay Paris. One sensed the French atmosphere to be enlivening. The many sights of Paris were beheld, with a
cruise along the Seine River, the Palace of Versailles and
the Louvre as highlights.

From Paris, we travelled past Cologne Germany, then on to West Berlin, transferring to the airport in East Berlin and finally arriving in Leningrad July 22.

In many respects, the Russian part of our trip was the most memorable. Snide thoughts of "bugged" rooms, hidden microphones, and anti-photo bus windows never became reality. Military Jeeps carrying soldiers, shabby vehicles and plain dress were common. Faces in the streets were stolid and expressionless. The Russian people seemed curious towards tourists when fears and suspicions unite.

Some of us, being more courageous, wore shorts and hot pants astounding the pointing, staring and laughing Russian women.

Moscow was the same in many respects. Lasting memories of Russia are the Palaces of the Tzars, the brilliant spectacle of the Moscow Summer Circus, being sprayed by trick jester fountains, Red Square, Lenin's tomb, the Kremlin, a boat trip along the Moscow River, but personally the most lasting: parachute jumping.

We left Russia after a week.

Flying to East Berlin, then boarding buses, we passed into West Berlin and "freedomsville." It had been some time now that a Coke could be indulged in.

Great contrasts between the two parts of Berlin, separated by the Berlin Wall, were witnessed. After passing into East Berlin we were thoroughly inspected at "Checkpoint Charlie."

Back in West Berlin, home seemed a lot closer with "Groovy-cool" people on the sidewalks singing, selling their creations.

During our days in the Netherlands, dykes, reclaimed land, windmills, canals, the largest scaport in the world (Rotterdam), a delft-blue pottery factory and a cheese farm were all inspected. We travelled through most of the country viewing rich, fertile polders containing lush-green pastures for dairy and market garden farms.

Then, from the Hook of Holland, we departed in the direction of Harwich, England, seven hours away.

On August 6, we left Gatwick Airport and for once we were glad to set foot on a Donaldson plane. Our summer saga was over. May we again express our thanks to our two special chaperons, Mr. Rabb and Mr. Ainslie.
