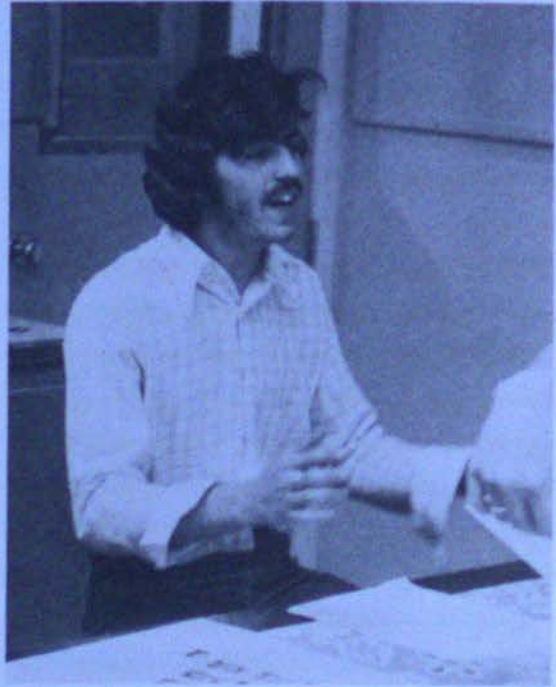

The Last Deadline...

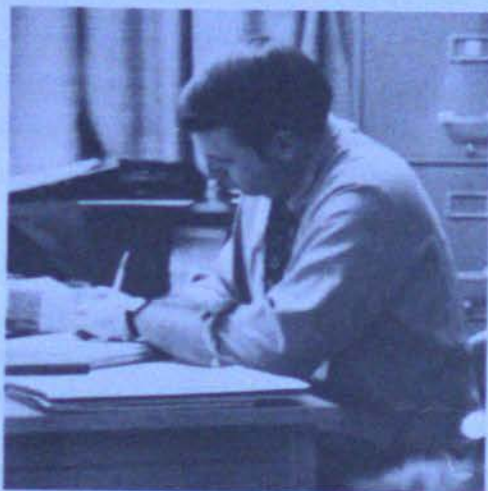

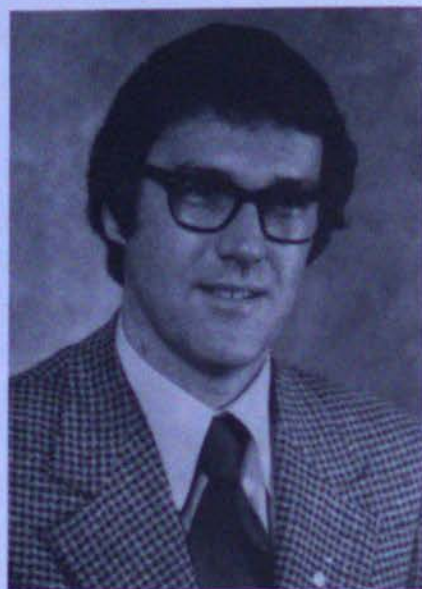
From the Vice-Principal

Valedictory Address-1973



J. Bryon Long,
University of Western Ontario

Mr. Rolfe, teachers, parents, friends. This evening marks the Completion of another chapter, one of many chapters, which compose that short and intricate book, the Book of Life. This newly completed chapter is one of the most important of them all. We now find ourselves thrust into a very real and complex world full of newer and greater responsibilities. We are closer now to being totally independent than ever before, from our parents, teachers, and the many other close people who have helped and shared with us our failures and successes as we progressed towards this moment and as we reached upward and outward to gain the knowledge and understanding of the universe revolving around us. But our progress is nowhere close to being complete.

From here on in, our increase in knowledge will enable us to function as productive and beneficial mechanisms in society. Hopefully, in working together, we can better our society and instill peace and harmony back into a world soon to become ours to command. An understanding of ourselves will greatly help us in trying to understand the people that have, do, and will make up our own little worlds and give an understanding of those further removed.

Responsibilities are upon us more than ever before, no matter where we go or what we do from here. But without responsibilities and a definite chance to exercise them, as in high school, are we really able to know ourselves and others? Trust in ourselves must come before we are able to trust in others. Our years here at Annandale have been part of learning to trust and co-operate with ourselves and with those people younger, the same age, and older than ourselves and have them trust in us.

Tonight we graduate but not as a whole. No class ever has. But our situation is different than those graduating classes of past years. A new secondary school in Norfolk County took from our original ranks a substantial number of students at the end of the 1970-1971 school year. At that time to many of us, it was a departure of close friends from our school environment. The only times most of us met was at school or through school functions. Some of the students accepted the change, others did not want to go because many of their friends were still at Annandale. The apparent crisis and fears were, of course, overcome and now some two years later we find it was not all that terrible and everyone seems to have survived.

We find ourselves again at almost a similar crossroad as that of the past, only this time it is our turn to depart, going to many different and varied settings. This may be the last time we all sit together for many years and as we do sit here, think of the person beside you, to your left and to your right, in front of you and behind you. How well do you know him or her as a person and a friend?

I believe we know each other almost as well as we know our own selves. Through classroom work we furthered our education not only learning about distant people, places, and others. Through discussion, the exchanging of attitudes and values, or acting, we learned about abilities within us that were unknown to us and may have gone untouched.

Because of sports activities, we have shared in the joys of victory and the agonies of defeat. We have worked together on the playing field, the ball courts, and on the track learning what we can do when we care for each other and in what we do. We discovered what we can do and learned about the capabilities of others.

Clubs, councils, and various other activities have taught us about ourselves and others with respect to responsibility to ourselves and other people and what happens when we fail in our responsibilities.

Therefore, I believe that we know each other as people and as friends. Of course, degrees of friendship do exist but when next we all meet in some future years, after we find out what each of us is doing, I think we may find ourselves journeying back briefly to those moments of the past and sharing deeply in moments of the present.

In closing I would like to end with this little anecdote:

A king riding through a forest one day saw a target painted on every tree and in the middle of every target an arrow. He sent his body guards to find the talented archer. They returned with a small child. The king asked the child to explain his remarkable feat.

"Simple," said the child. "First you shoot the arrow, then you paint the target."

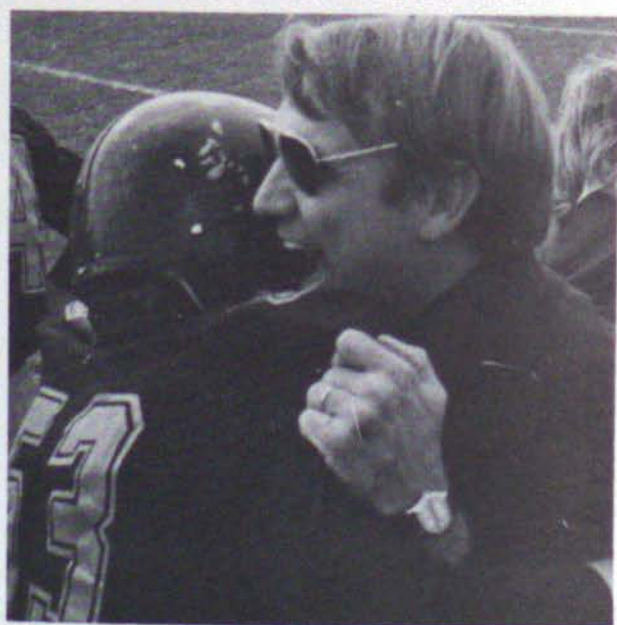
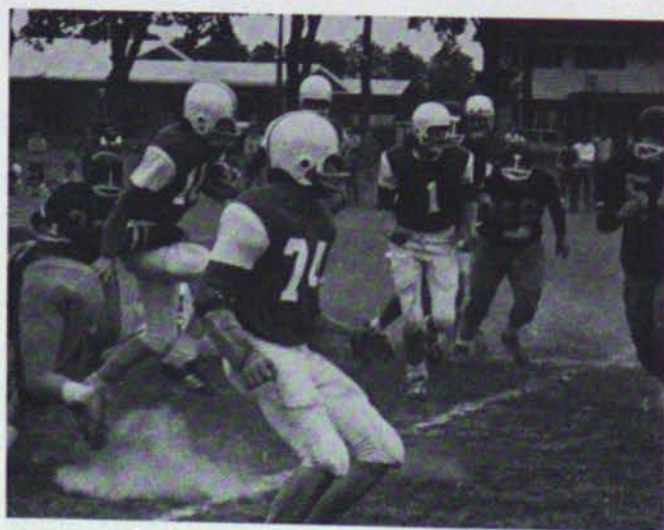
Athletic Banquet

Our season, this year will be remembered for things other than its football abilities as all the team members can well appreciate.

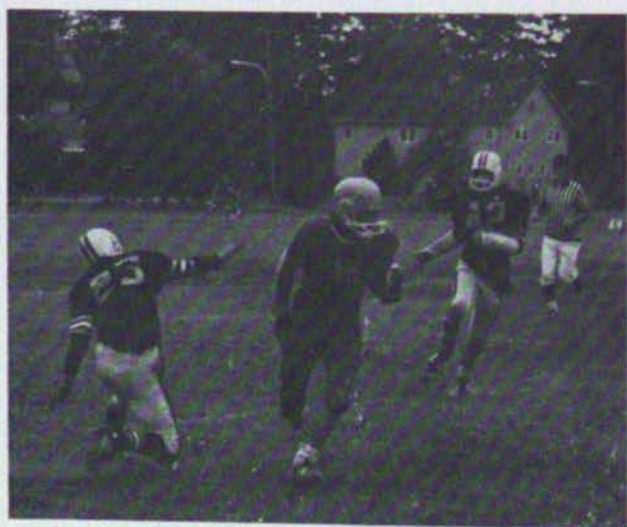

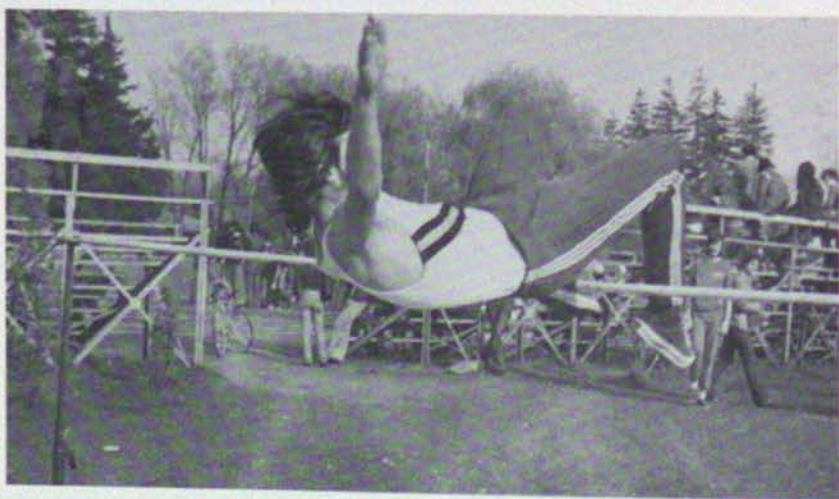

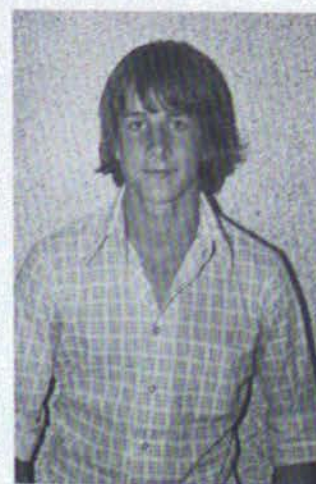

Tatler

PAST AND PRESENT

Although Tillsonburg's first high school was built in 1886, it was not until October 1907 that the first Tattler was published. The double "t" spelling, which was used in the earlier publications, was discontinued over the years. During the period between 1907 and 1922 there were no records of any yearbooks produced, but in 1923, apparently a typewritten book with a hand-painted cover was created.

In 1924, a handwritten Tattler was produced but in the next two years no Tattlers appear on record as being published. During the years preceding 1927 all the yearbooks were not on a public sale basis but were instead read aloud at the various meetings held by the Literary Society!

In the year of 1927 the yearbook was sold for the first time in its twenty-year existence. An artistically designed cover was supplied for the 1928 edition of the Tatler, but there appears to be no record of a 1929 yearbook.

Apparently during the years 1925 through 1930 there were editors' conventions held at the University of Toronto. These conventions were sponsored by a fraternity known as the "Sigma Delta Chi Fraternity" and records show that T.H.S. was represented at these meetings.

The issues of the 1931 through 1935 yearbooks were all soft-covered and were all very small in size, being approximately 7" x 10" and containing a small number of articles and pictures.

The yearbook of 1936 was greatly reduced in size also and it too contained a few articles and pictures bound in an ordinary white paper cover. No records appear for the 1937 or 1939 Tatlers but a small paper covered dittoed Tatler was published in 1938.

The year of 1940 saw the return of a sturdier covered yearbook, but this contained no actual photographs but many sketches and blacked in drawings along with the usual number of advertisements.

In the years 1941 through 1945 the Tatler was greatly diminished in size and volume and also in the number of photos and articles. A larger issue was produced in 1946 but the following year saw no yearbook whatsoever!

In the years between and including 1948 and 1957, an issue was published every year. The Tatlers' Golden Jubilee occurred in the year of 1957 and this edition contained many photographs of members of the school board as well as from the advertisers.

Regular publications followed this special fiftieth edition, except for the year 1963, when a lack of student interest prevented a publication.

As one looks back through the various volumes of our yearbook, it is possible to see that as the years wore on, a larger, more sophisticated yearbook was created. For the last six years we have had hard covered editions with high quality paper, excellent articles and interesting photographs.

At the present, you are reading our 1973-74 effort at a yearbook. Hopefully you'll agree that it is worthy of its predecessors.
