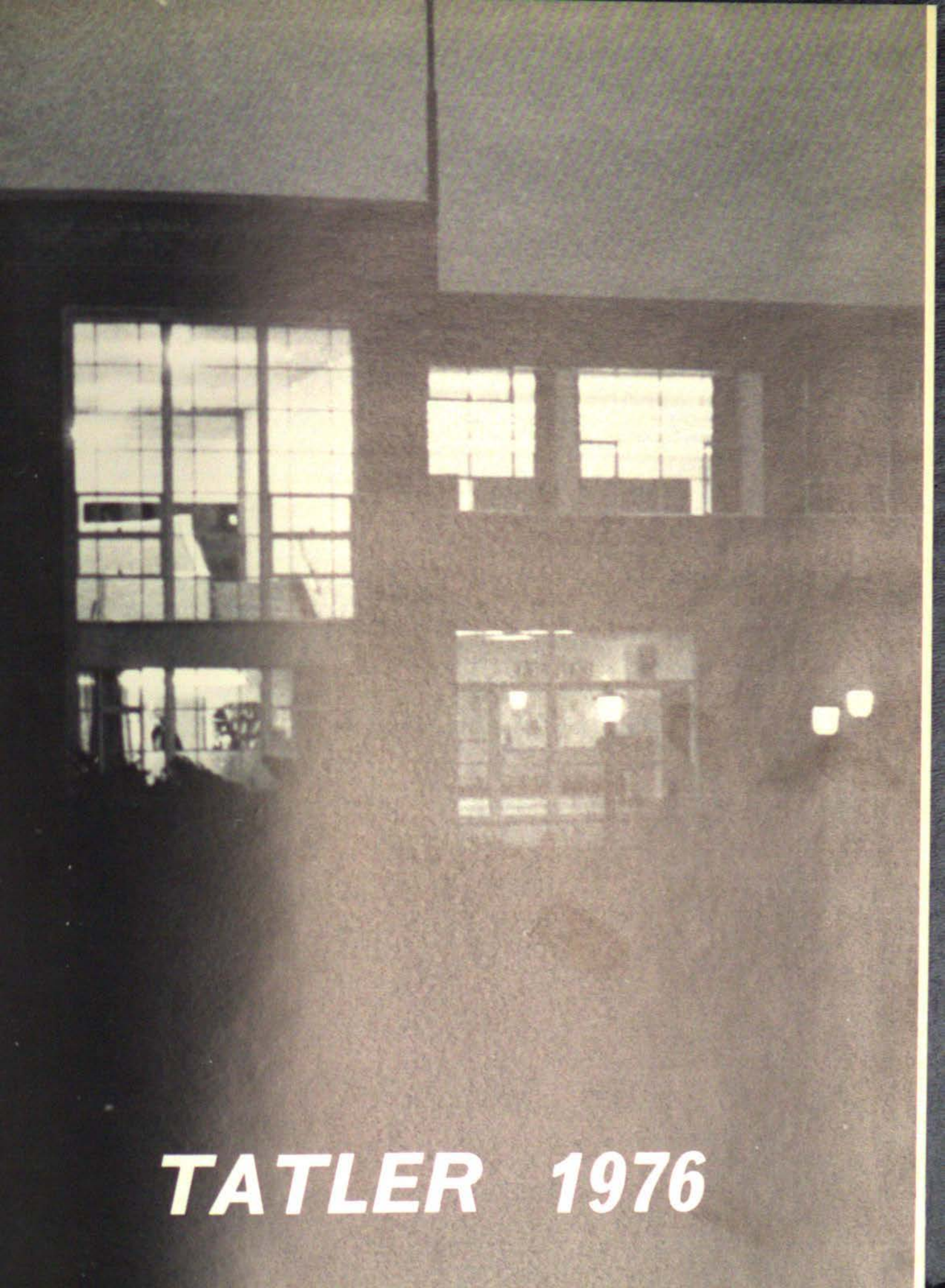

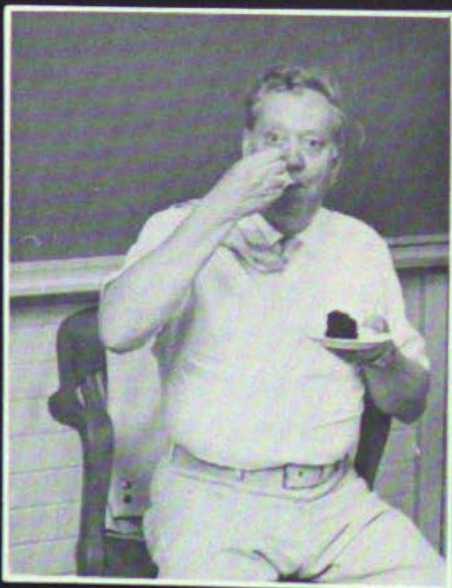
DEDICATION

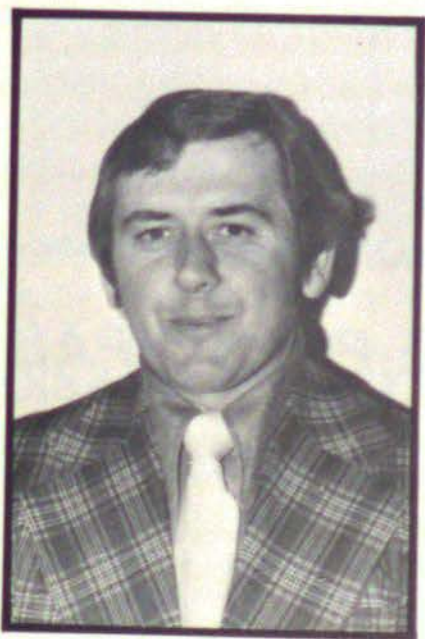

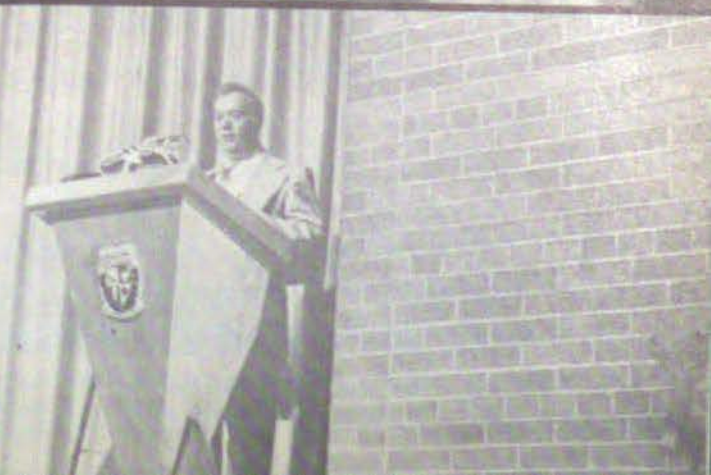

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION

Modern society is like a fragile fabric woven with threads which are delicately different but yet dependent, one upon the other for strength and durability. When one thread weakens or breaks, the whole fabric is threatened. Society is no more durable than its weakest segment.

Today, too few of us are inclined to give much thought to this kind of analogy. Rather, "Mine first" and "Me-too-ism" represents the threat of the individual or the individual group to the whole of society. Maybe it is fitting to ponder that only nineteen per cent of the world's people still live in a free society and that over fifty per cent of the others have lost their freedom over the last-half century. When society is fragmented by the pressures of the few, too often the great majority suffer.

In education the development of the individual is stressed. However the individual is being emphasized in this context as a contributor and strengthener of our society. The opposite is too frequently seen to be the case and the whole fabric of society is attacked by the rapacious few who give little thought to any but themselves. Maybe it is time to look at ourselves and our relationship toward society in general and the future of Canada in particular. Maybe it is time to study history with the purpose of gaining appreciation for the struggles and self sacrifices of those who carved out for us our freedoms even from the far distant days of King John. It could well give direction and purpose to the lives of so many uncommitted but capable young students who are in our schools.

Good luck, Annandale. May your efforts continue to shape the character and purpose of the thousands who will pass through your halls.

VALEDICTORY ADDRESS - 1975

Valedictorian - 1975

I am honoured and very happy to represent the graduating students of Annandale this year. The fact that I was elected as valedictorian makes this experience much more meaningful for me. After writing final exams last year, I remember wondering who the valedictorian would be. There was a note with my final marks reading, "Commencement is on November first and your Valedictorian is Tom Anderson." My concern had ended. They had made a good choice.

Being a valedictorian is a difficult task. Being a group representative, a person has to express the feelings of that group. We all have graduated from this high school with the desire to extend ourselves into various fields whether it be further education or entering the work force.

In any case the value of a good background and basic training in the ways of life is essential. I personally have chosen to enter university. The change in the work load one is required to do by himself is immense. One thing I have noticed is that the study material covered at this school is superior to that of the majority of schools. This is definitely shown to me when a professor gives a lecture and Annandale has already taught its students this material while students from other schools who have never seen it before are totally baffled. It makes you appreciate the high level of education you receive at Annandale.

Besides the people who have gone on to further education, a good portion of the graduating class has already entered the work force. Annandale has given all of us and especially these people much more than we probably realize. The demanding study habits required here will result in conscientious working habits.

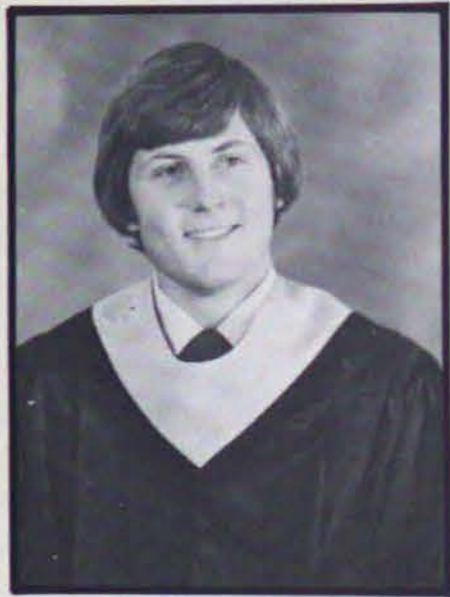

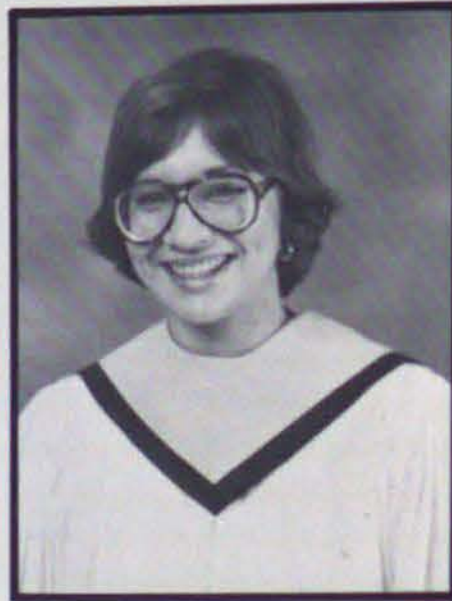

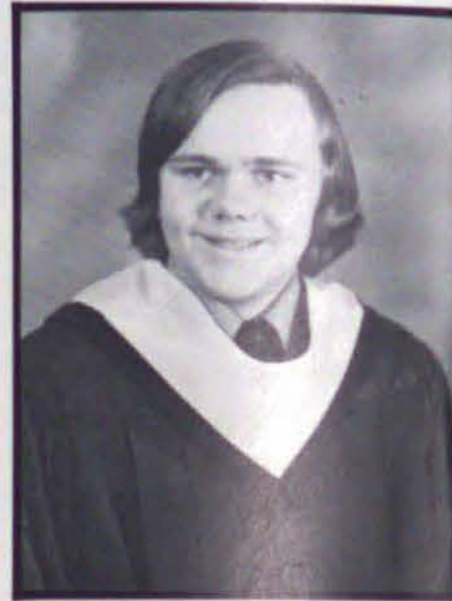

SENIOR GIRLS' BASKETBALL

This year was another successful one for the Annandale Senior Girls' Basketball Team. Last year's successes of a 26-3 record, three tournament wins, a WOSSA "A" championship and reaching the All-Ontario Final at Niagara Falls were hard acts to follow.

Annandale compiled a 23-7-1 record against some of the best teams in the province. Two of the losses were to 1976 All-Ontario winners, Ancaster, while another was to Burlington Lord Elgin. Last year's losses to CASS were later avenged when Annandale defeated them by 9 points to win WOSSA "AA". The Panthers also won the Petrolia and Dorchester Tournaments. Annandale reached the quarter finals of this year's All-Ontario in Ottawa only to lose to Ancaster, the eventual winners.

What is amazing is that we competed with schools two to five times bigger than ourselves and did very well. On offense the team averaged over 50 points while giving up 25 for a difference of 25 points.

This season marks the end of the high school careers of Marty Demaree and Sue Riach. Over the last five years they have been the sparkplugs in teams with a total record of 83-21-1. Marty has been the league's leading scorer the last two years, averaging over 25 points a game. In her career she has scored approximately 2,000 points and collected nearly as many rebounds. She was an All-Star and M.V.P. at last year's All-Ontario and this year was picked to represent Southwestern Ontario in the Winter games, helping the team to a gold medal. Sue Riach has been the playmaker for the team, handling the ball, passing and playing excellent defense. She and Marty have complemented each other in their outstanding careers. They will be missed.

Annandale loses only two starters this year and will be contenders next year. A special thanks to our supporters, especially Mr. Wharram, who cheered us to victory and consoled us in loss.

Ms. McKenzie's Junior Girls played very competitively throughout the season and they will certainly be heard from in 1976-77.

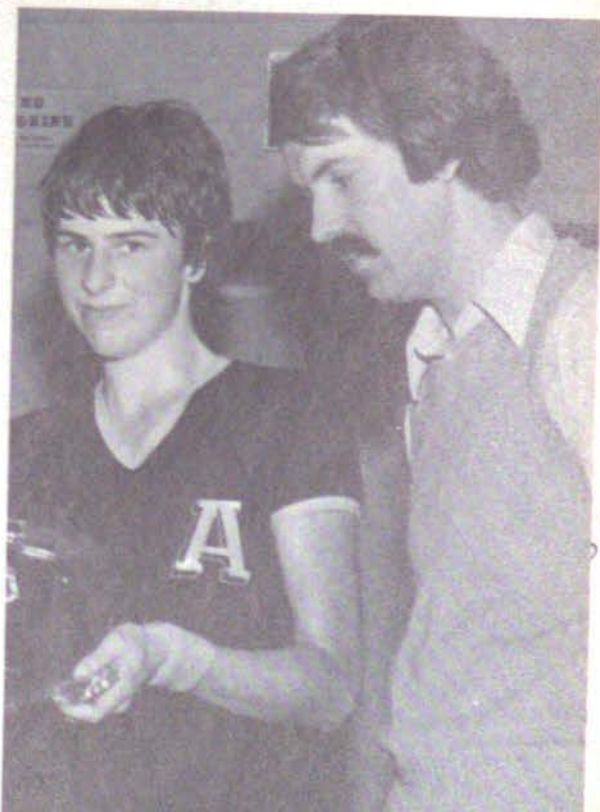

The core subjects which I chose were swimming, folk dance and basketball officiating. My two options for one week each were tennis and archery.

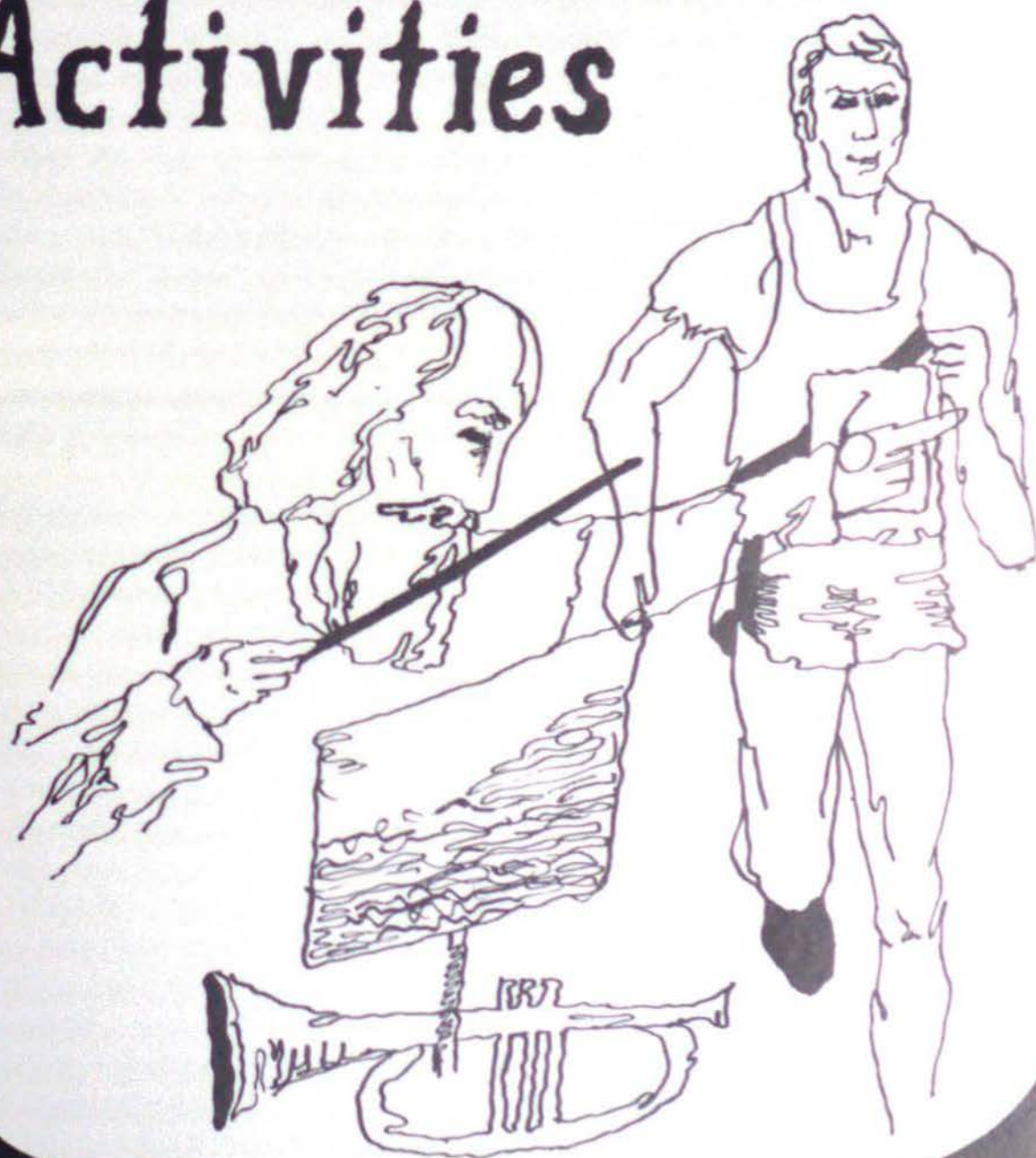
