"Thank You"...



This is the last page to be completed for the final June deadline. Patti and Lorraine have gone home, grumbling, "It's not fair! You shouldn't read OUR editorial unless we can read your comments."

Much of this page is devoted to "Thank You" statements; some of it to facts that the student or teacher uninvolved with the Tatler would not know.

The Tatler has become a terribly expensive and, therefore, a terribly worrisome business venture. Publishing costs have soared by ten to 18 percent annually so that the actual cost of the book you are now reading is almost \$14.00. Only a record advertising blitz has allowed us to keep on publishing. I want to thank all those merchants who supported our programme. I really believe that the 1977 Tatler is a worthwhile medium for your advertisements, but I most appreciate your involvement in what the students of Annandale are doing.

The Tatler is probably the purest "student" activity in our school. Expenses, editorial policy, the work-shop format, the layout pattern, even the individual layouts themselves, are all decided by the student editors and their department heads. Mr. Pellizzari and I have at-

tempted to be "advisors" and "co-workers" rather than "deciders" of policy. The Tatler is a chance for students to experience all of the demands and tensions and frustrations of adult responsibility; however, it is also a chance to enjoy the sense of creative accomplishment that comes from a challenge - the challenge of capturing one year of Annandale life.

It is difficult in a small school to establish a clear focus of priorities and to budget one's time and energy so that a long-term responsibility like the Tatler does not grind to a halt through fatigue.

This year there were 192 pages to plan and edit; there were five deadlines to meet. We met them all!

Some of the students who started off the year with us found other duties and interests too demanding to maintain the focus necessary. However, the small group of people who REALLY worked in Room 30 on June 13th and 14th while the rest of the school adopted a rather carnival atmosphere, and the even smaller group who returned on June 15th, 16th and 17th, to accomplish the earliest completion deadline ever, did maintain that focus and they have my deepest respect and thanks.

Specific thanks to the following. To Gus Pellizzari for becoming so involved with Tatler '77 and for enjoying the experience so much; to Joanne Armstrong who found time to serve as one of our co-editors despite a demanding schedule of sports and extra-curricular activities.

To Doug Hevenor and Larry Luciani for their early help until other responsibilities overwhelmed them, and for coming back for spot duties without complaint whenever we needed them. To Karen Pal, Doug Simmons, Dianne Horvath, Cathy Turner, Dave Simmons, Stephen Toth, and Steve Molnar, for meeting their responsibilities to the 1977 Tatler fully and cheerfully. To Joanne Watts and David Patterson, for going far beyond what anyone except an editor should be expected to give in both time and care. To Jean Marie Oatman who saved at least three deadlines with her unselfish attitude and her consummate skill as a typist.

To Bill Pratt and the TILLSONBURG NEWS for their kindness, help and understanding; to Jeff Bennett, who has never recovered from being part of the Tatler organization and who saves us whenever we need a photo.

To the teachers and administrators of Annandale who put up with the inconveniences and intrusions of the Tatler with tolerance if not always with good humour.

The four people to whom I owe the most. To Stan Grabstas, who returned to Annandale while awaiting entry to RMC and did such a comprehensive and unobtrusive job as Advertising Director - our most successful year ever. To Patti Rose and Lorraine Cadman who fought ferociously between themselves regarding policy, who doubted my artistic ability at times, who gave so much of their care and concern and time to this book. I hope that their effort and their tiredness are compensated by a sense of satisfaction when they see the finished book for they gave as much as or more than any previous editors. And, finally, to Tricia Ross, for maintaining a centre of calm and control amidst the hysteria of meeting deadlines; for always knowing where we were and what needed to be done even when the rest of us had forgotten.

There was much love and respect for Annandale (and what it means in terms of people) on this staff. I believe that this will be obvious to anyone who looks through its pages.

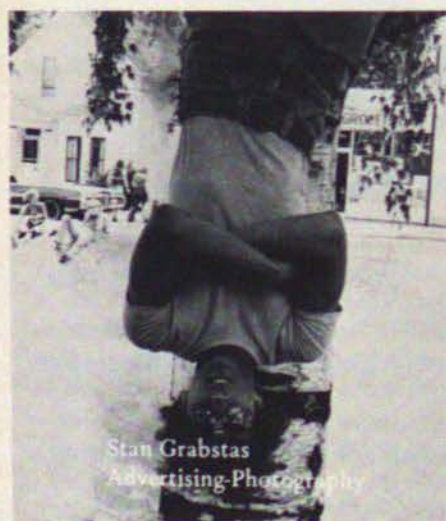

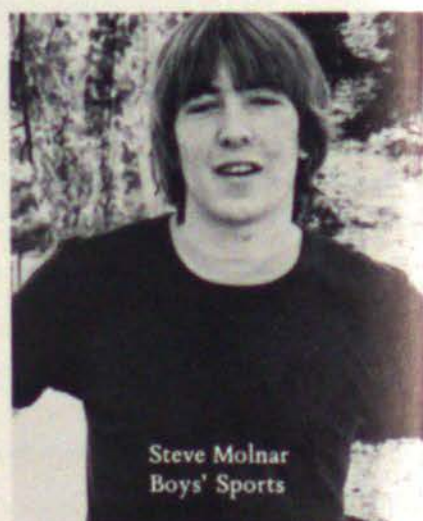

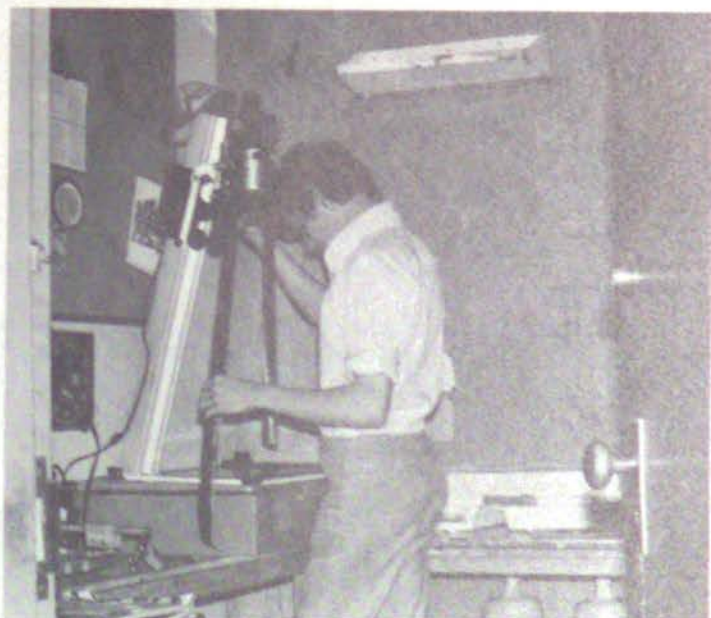

A message from the Director of Education



MR. JOHN YOUNG -
Our new Director of Education 1976-77

As the future in the "real world" looms on the horizon for the young people of Annandale High School, they must surely have some doubts, some secret fears and some sense of frustration as they view the society about them. The news media scream daily of unemployment, of labour unrest and of moral decline. The fragmentation of our country becomes more and more possible as each day passes. The affluence to which we have all been exposed in the past decade appears to be creating a paralysis of incentive for many of our citizens. Ecological disasters rank high on the list of news item introduced at breakfast time - just early enough to give us an enthusiastic beginning to the day!

It would be quite easy for a young person in to-day's world to become disillusioned to the point where a negative attitude develops to life and to its problems, an attitude that is both ill-founded and inappropriate.


Generations before this one have overcome serious problems in Canada. Our parents have lived through horrible wars which we can only read about. The economic disaster of the 1930's left a mark on many families. Epidemics which science controls easily to-day swept through many a town and village, leaving a trail of maimed or dead loved ones.

Yet our problems and those of preceding generations have been of secondary significance when one looks at the poverty, the illiteracy, the barbarianism, the pollution, the overpopulation, the depletion of resources and the lack of freedom in so many other parts of the world to-day. Those who are fortunate enough to live in Canada should realize that the many privileges they enjoy are the envy of most of the world's population. The potential for energetic citizens in Canada far surpasses that in most other parts of the world.

When I think of this particular generation of secondary school students integrating with society, I cannot help but draw an analogy with the effort and expense devoted to planning a "soft landing" for spacecraft on other planets. The design of every component of the craft is carefully developed by specialists who consider every aspect of the problems to be faced. Billions of dollars of public money are poured into each new venture. Despite all the scientific and financial support, the whole project could still be a disaster if the crew of the spacecraft were to approach their task in a careless or stupid manner.

And so it is with your education. The planning to help you meet social, intellectual and physical challenges has been done by a team of specialists at your school. The public funding has been successfully arranged. As you hurtle towards your destiny in the "real world", the only thing which could bring about disaster would be human error on your part. Although the mission may not be an easy one, I have every confidence that the vast majority of you will succeed in achieving a "soft landing."

Mrs. Balpatak will be leaving after eight years as an English teacher and librarian here at Annandale. Her hard work and efforts have been greatly appreciated by all.

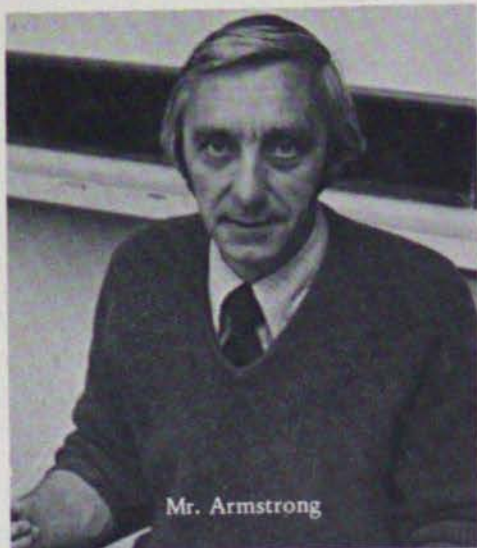
Best of Luck in the future.

With the help of many devoted members, our Drama Club had another successful year. We would like to thank Mr. Wharram for his time and efforts throughout the year.

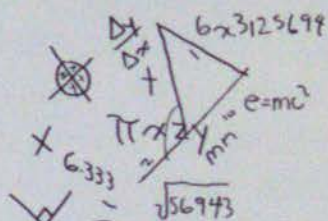

Valedictorian. Just what does it mean? Valedictory, "a parting address, as by a member of a graduating class."

"A parting address". Looking at this phrase I assume that I am in the process of leaving. Well physically I have already left. This is my first return since June.

Mentally, though, I haven't left Annandale and Annandale hasn't left me. I think that this is an advantage of a small school. I am still a part of the school, I haven't been forgotten yet. As the years move on, Annandale will become less and less of my life, but I spent too many years here to forget either the high or the low points. So the definition is right, I am in the process of leaving.

The problem arises at the next point because the dictionary definition doesn't have a next part. If I am to deliver a speech, the speech must be received.

After thinking for a few minutes I determined that there are four groups to whom I can address this speech. To Annandale High School, to the staff and administration, to the parents and friends of the graduating class and to my graduating class.

First on my list was Annandale High School. You and I have spent a lot of time together, in this auditorium, in the classes and on the playing field. It is the confidence that has been generated within us by the school, by our friends, by our family, by each other and by ourselves that allows us to tackle the problems which we are sure to encounter in the environment. In helping each other gain, and thereby as a group gain, the confidence we have gained, have we all become an intimate group. This is the feature that will make our 'Annandale High School years' some of the more enjoyable memories of the future.
