A dedicated professional.


An honest teacher.

Mr. Teall, a member of our Science and Math Depts., leaves after one year. He will resume life on the fram.


Our music instructor, Miss Taylor, departs for Norwich to continue teaching full-time. Our band will be losing a valuable leader as our school will be losing a valuable asset.

Notes from Dorene

September

Tests are different here because the teacher has to dictate all the questions, as there isn't money for paper to hand out. We sit in two's like Science classes (but in wooden desks with tops that lift up). The teacher has to, therefore, give two tests to avoid cheating.

Letters are pouring in from home and they make me very happy. I love to hear from you. The mail system is strange and I have my suspicions that it is messed up at the Canadian end. Some letters take a month and others take 10 days.

November

All the girls tease me and say I have to write the final in English. The English teacher isn't too hot. She has some errors in pronunciation and teaches right out of a manual all the time.

Do you know what happened yesterday morning? I woke up at 6:30 to find my bed rocking back and forth and my sliding doors banging together. For some strange reason (probably because I has half asleep), I got out of bed and started looking for the dog. The noises stopped and I crawled back into bed. It turned out that there was an earthquake in San Juan that left people dead and homeless.

December

We celebrated Christmas on the 24th at night. We had some friends and family over and ate roast pork and veal outside in the moonlight. Papa Noel (me in a unique costume complete with beard) delivered the gifts in a big sack to the table and handed them out to the family. Christmas day was hot and humid-about 36 degrees so we did nothing but lie around all day!

The language is fantastic and I'm understood well. The inflation rate is unreal here. The value of the American dollar is rising daily which is fine for me but not for the country.

January

School starts March 13 but it's possible I'll be in Uruguay at the time. Since my year won't count at home anyway, when I return to Parana I may start Grade 13 again because I came in the middle of it before.

Tune

I write to you from my house in Paysanda, Republica Oriental au Uruguay. It's cold and humid so I'm snuggled up in front of the fireplace to prevent freezing. Houses here aren't heated because winter is so short, so winter is really winter! Pve missed you a lot and A.H.S. will seem so different without my Grade 12 girls and guys. Thanks to all those who have written; the letters have kept me going many times.

Richard Brent Peacock 1956-1978

In Memoriam

Time goes by with many changes,
Joys and sorrows, smiles and tears.
But your memory never leaves us,
With the passing of the years,

On February 18, 1978, the members of Annandale's community were shocked by the news of the sudden death of Richard Brent Peacock.

The following letter from Mr. Bob Burleigh on behalf of the teaching staff and student body was published shortly after his tragic passing.

"Annandale High School was deeply saddened recently by the death of Brent Peacock.

Brent was very active in athletics during his years at Annandale. His growth as a person and athlete was demonstrated by the rare occurrence of his being one of the very few athletes who ever captained both a Senior Marauder football and basketball team during the same year (1975-1976).

Under his captainship the football Marauders narrowly missed (one point) the Oxford-Elgin playoffs and went on to win the Oxford-Elgin "A" football championship.

That same year Brent led the Marauders to the WOSSA "A" championship and OFSAA consolation championship. Brent played on the Junior WOSSA basketball finalist team in 1971-1972 and was on the WOSSA championship team in 1972-1973. He was a member of the 1973-1974 team and the WOSSA championship team and OFSAA semi-finalists 1974-1975.


Brent played football for Junior Marauders in 1971-1972-1973 and Senior Marauders in 1973-74-75-76.

His tough hard hitting two way play at both offensive and defensive position (end) was instrumental in many of the Marauder successes. Brent also played soccer for Annandale 1974-75-76.

In 1975-76 he earned his athletic letter for excellence in athletics. During the same year he was honoured by the coaching staff as he was awarded the coaches award for leadership, determination and courage.

Upon graduation he attended the University of Waterloo. Brent's team mates and school mates will miss him, but will remember with much fondness their association with him.

The entire school community extends its deepest sympathy to the Peacock family."


GRADE NINE OATH



Valedictory Speech

RICHARD EPPEL

The Valedictorian for the class of 1977 was Richard Eppel. Mr. Eppel began his address by reminding his fellow graduates that "this is our night and it is a very special one indeed." He also commented on "how proud and honoured" he was that the class of '77 had chosen him as its representative.

Mr. Eppel chose as the topic of his address, participation, noting that the graduates present had cared about the five years that

they spent at Annandale High School as a worthwhile experience.

He continued:

"In essence then, participation and involvement in local, regional, national and perhaps even world events is what I am promoting tonight.

"Let us take the example of the graduates during their five years of high school and see how they stack up.
"You can examine how much you became involved with A.H.S. life by asking yourself the question, 'How much did I get out of A.H.S.?' If the answer is, 'Well, I learned my courses there so that I could go on to further education, a job or even just to say

that I got my diploma', then you have, sadly, not participated to the fullest and have missed a lot of life.

"Before I go any further, let me make one thing perfectly clear about my attitude towards education. I believe classroom education is essential and a necessary function for the student. However, I believe that participation outside of a classroom is also a prerequisite for being fully educated. In my opinion, you cannot be educated without having both. Participation and education are almost synonymous."

Mr. Eppel commented upon the effect of Annandale's size.

"As you all know, A.H.S. has a relatively small student population of between 500 and 600 students. We were fortunate to have this because it gave us greater opportunities for involvement as well as greater student-student and student-teacher interac-

tion. The involvement was taken advantage of in many ways.

"In sports, our past year has been one of our best and was appropriately titled 'The Year of the Black'. The championship teams did not come from a few players alone. They came from a general student involvement, pride and, of course, top-notch coaching. The interschool clubs, including the Tatler, could not function without students and, believe me, after reading this year's Tatler, involvement was at its peak. From personal experience, I know the Student Council could not function without student support at its various social activities and events.

"I think you get the point and my one wish is that this tradition of excellence will be carried on by the new students of

"The new members of the staff, I am sure, will quickly see this tradition and the feeling generated by it.

"Those who left last year, Mr. Reid, Mrs. Wilson, Mrs. Balpataky, and Mr. Wharram, probably feel something missing from their lives. I know I do.'

Mr. Eppel challenged the graduates and the entire audience to remain involved. He stressed that "there is always a group present which is small enough for you to partake in and to be recognized."

He then applied this credo of participation to both national and international affairs, noting that it is always better to comment actively, "I must do something", than to sit back passively complaining that "Something must be done

Mr. Eppel concluded his address as follows:

"Looking back, I cherish these five years because I participated and got involved. I thank you for making it that way for me and leave you with the challenge of becoming involved and speaking out. Remember, you get out of life what you put into it minus taxes."


COACH'S COMMENT

COACH'S COMMENTS



Junior Girls' Basketball






The Annandale Senior Marauders had a successful season. The team finished the regular season in second place with a 5-1 win-loss record. The only defeat was a loss to Huron Park.


It really bothered us, playing away from home all the time, and we are looking forward to coming home to Annandale next year.
