

To Mrs. Carmichael and her typing classes our appreciation for helping us through a difficult time.






Mr. Casey







For childhood to youth's but a span, And the years of our life are soon sped; But the youth is no longer a youth, but a man, When the first of his dreams is dead.


'Tis a cup of wormwood and gall, When the doom of a great dream is said And the best of a man is under the pall, When the best of his dreams is dead.














The Final Game: "A Victorious End"
