Today we are educating every man's child. In the early 1900s literacy was defined as being able to write your own name. We are now defining literacy as the ability to read new material and extract new information from that material.

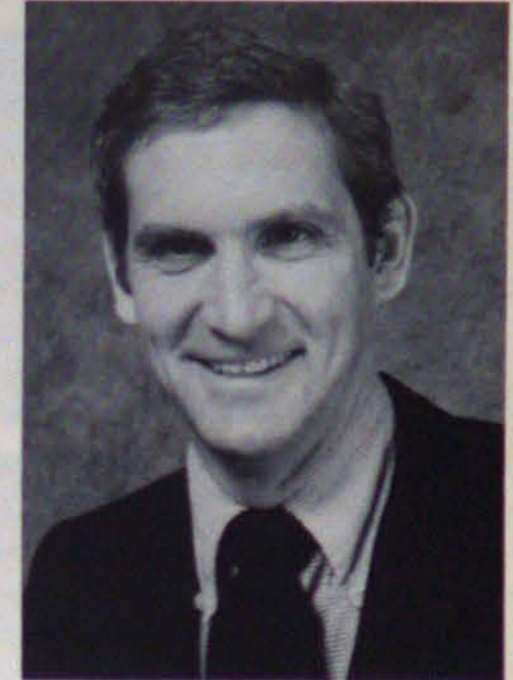
As we look back on 200 years of education in Ontario we have raised our expectations. Now almost all parents expect their children to graduate from high school.


Thanks go to the coaches, Mr. Stover and Mr. Coyle. They were friends and teachers, not just coaches.

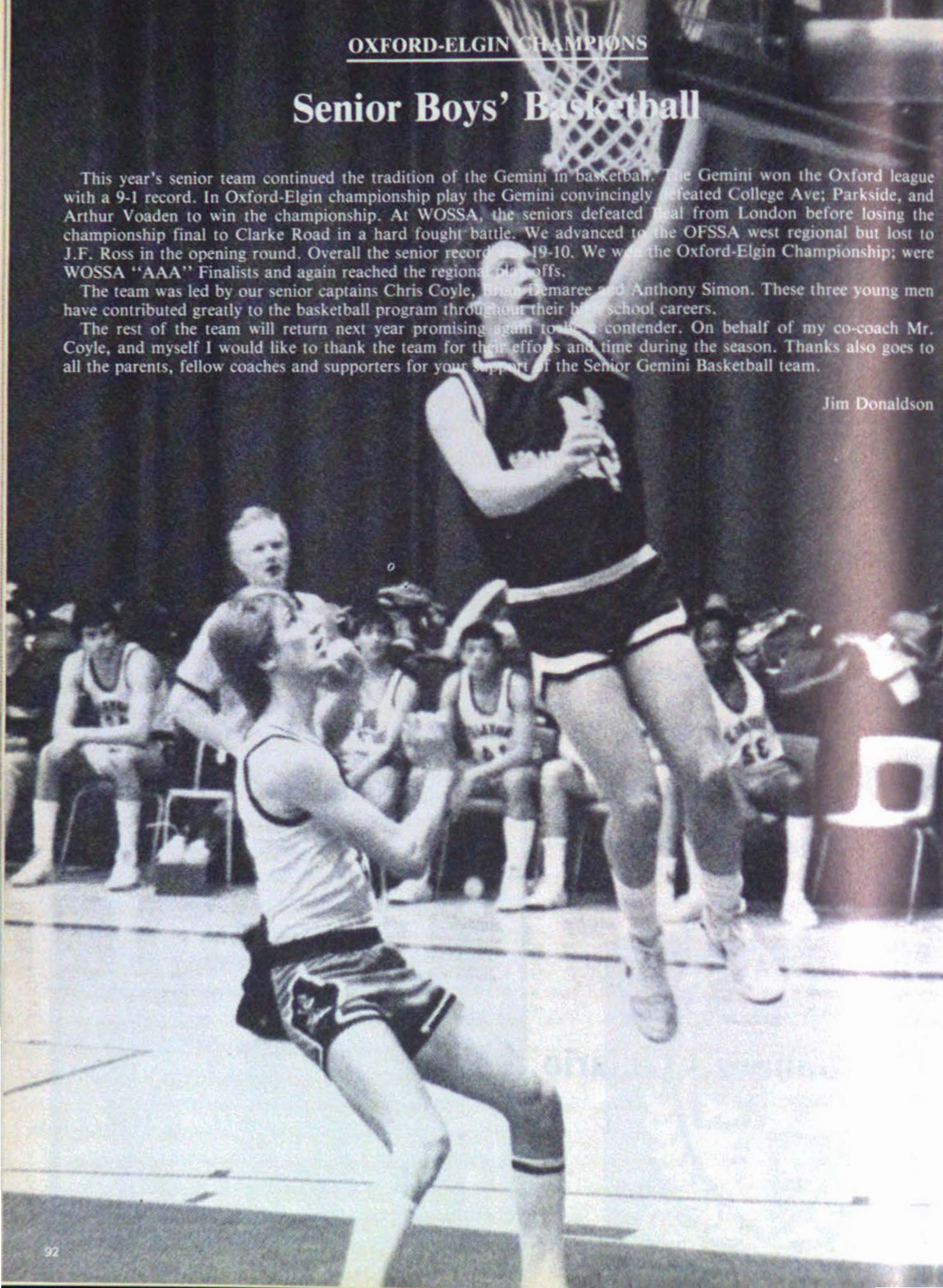
## Senior Boys' Basketball



Many of the players had to juggle jobs and practices and Mr. Wirth was very pleased at the way the team held together and played such a tough brand of competitive soccer.

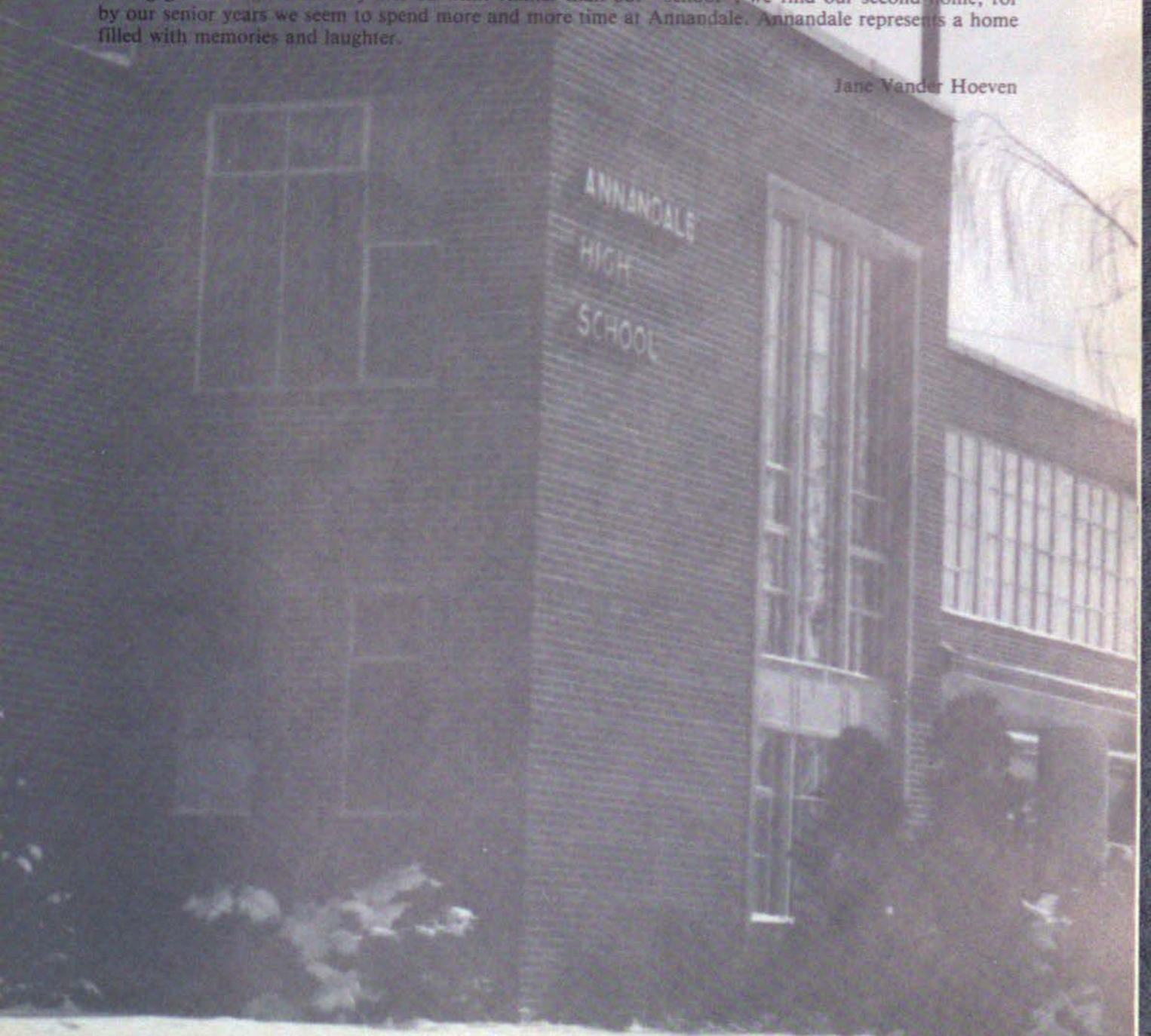


## **“A Toast to the School”**

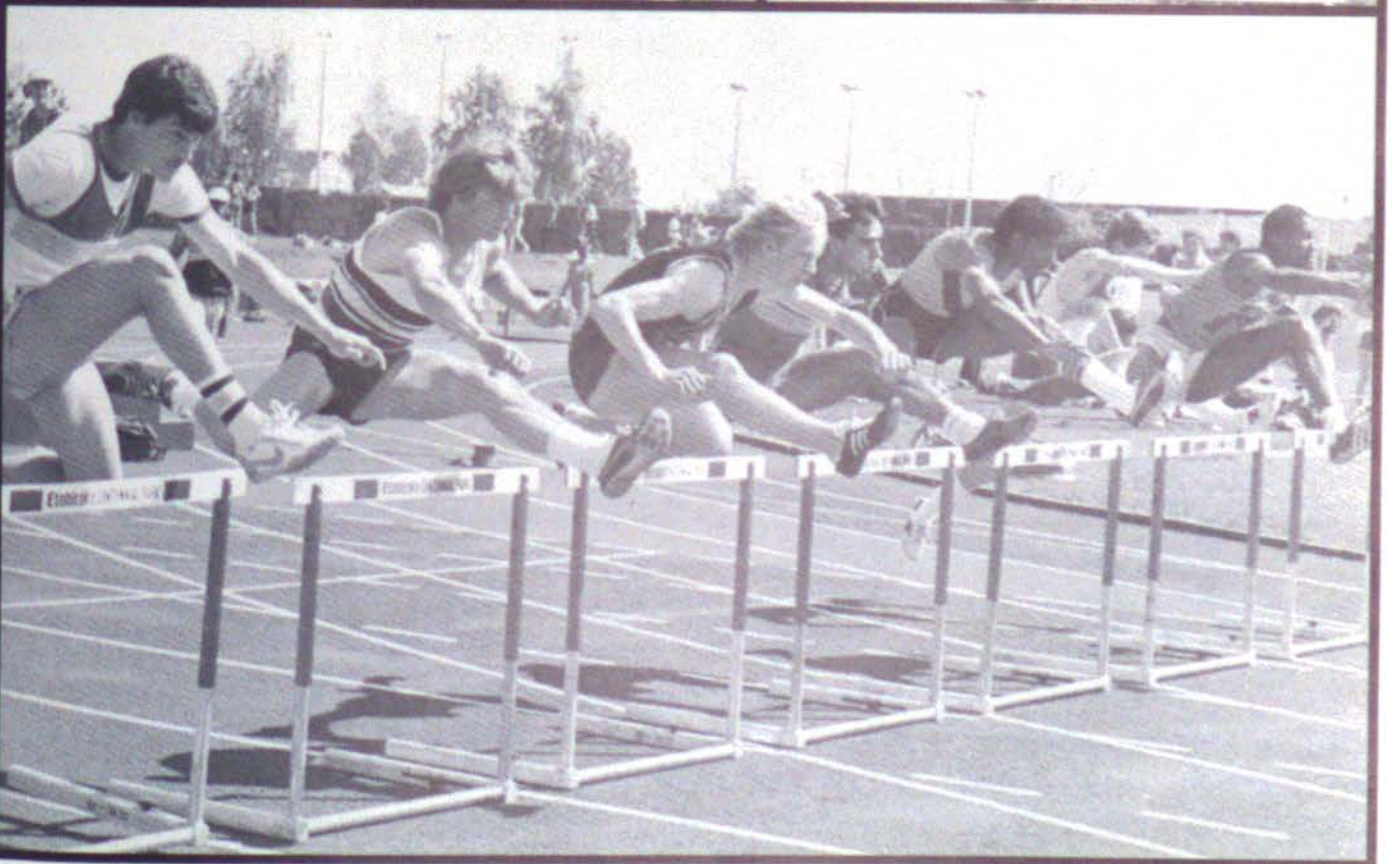














## A Great "Team" Effort!!

## Three Months Later

It is now three months since a Soviet fighter jet opened fire upon a Korean Air Lines Boeing 747 flying above the South China Sea on its way to Seoul, South Korea; it is now three months since Korean Air Lines Flight 007 spiralled downward into the ocean, carrying its 269 passengers and crew members into oblivion.

Three months since all of that happened, and the world has, in those three months, those 90 days, gone on. The frantic news reports of the early hours of the crisis are fading memories now; the search ships have been recalled from the crash site; the faces of the victims' families have vanished from our TV sets and newspapers.

The world has gone on and since then, there have been other crises other places -- in Lebanon, in Grenada. And, as always, our attention shifts to these new problems, these new disasters, and the victims of Flight 007 and their families have been left to rest in whatever peace they can find.

There is nothing unusual in all of this; it is the way of the world, or at least the way of the world as our newspapers and TV newscasts choose to portray it.

Perhaps people in Tillsonburg have forgotten the incident a bit more slowly than others; after all, we had a personal stake in it. A native of the town, Marilou Covey, was aboard Flight 007 when it met its destiny in the form of a Russian jet high over the ocean on the way to Korea; and so, in a sense, because many people in town knew her, or her family, or at least shared the experience of growing up in town, or living in town -- in that sense, we were brought a great deal closer to this crisis than to other, similar situations. In a sense, it was almost as if all of us were aboard KAL 007 on that August afternoon when the unthinkable occurred.

And so there was the question of how to remember the incident, what to make of it -- what to make of a world in which 269 innocent persons can be flung from the sky in a moment and destroyed ...

County council sent, I believe, a letter to the Russian embassy in Ottawa, expressing outrage at the incident and demanding an explanation. The Russian embassy, as I recall, sent back a letter advising council that their protests might better be sent to Washington, for (said the Russians) it was all the fault of the United States. And that is what they have continued to maintain ever since.

Newspaper editors and TV commentators delivered angry editorials, pointing out this was merely the latest in a long, long series of bloody-minded Soviet actions, dating back right to the 1917 revolution itself.

National governments prevented Soviet

flights from landing at their airports; pilots' associations refused to fly to Moscow.

And all of these actions were justified; and they succeeded in venting our anger, if nothing else; and perhaps these actions even managed to communicate a bit of that anger to the Soviets, though whether that made any difference or will make any difference in future relations with the USSR is hard to say. (I rather doubt it, myself.)

And yet, perhaps one of the most significant responses to the incident came right here in town. It didn't receive national press attention; it didn't arouse the excitement of the TV people or the big-city papers.

It was a scholarship fund named in honor of Marilou Covey, and my Kindly Editor informs me it will meet its objective of over \$5,000 in capital -- enough to fund a good-sized award to local high school students every year.

In itself, it is nothing different from any of the other scholarships and awards sponsored by various organizations and bequests. That alone makes it important, for such things are both incentives for and recognitions of excellence, and are well worth having.

But this one is special in another way, too, for every time it is awarded it will, however briefly, remind people of what happened on that August day in 1983. It will remind us of the preciousness and the fragility of human life; it will remind us -- as Charlie Tatham, who initiated the project, said -- of the difference between freedom and totalitarianism. For the lesson of Flight 007, if there is any lesson at all, is not that the Russian people are intrinsically evil-minded. The lesson is that what the Russian people are like doesn't really matter, since they live under a governmental system that prevents them from expressing their hopes, their dreams, their feelings. They live under a governmental system which shows (and has always shown) an utter disregard for the sanctity and the meaning of human life -- a disregard made evident by the fate of Flight 007.

And so, in establishing the scholarship fund, something worthy has been made of an ugly and evil event; something positive has come of a profoundly barbaric and uncivilized act. The existence of such a fund means that Marilou Covey and Flight 007 and the meaning of it all will be remembered long after the media's attention has moved on to other things, other places; long after the expressions of outrage and the angry editorials have been forgotten. And surely it is important that it be remembered; for only in the remembering can we find any meaning in the awful fate of Korean Air Lines Flight 007.

## POLICY

The general reader of the TATLER never reads this page ... or the editorials ... or any of the other “messages” that accompany the yearbook. The general reader looks at the hundreds of pictures and remembers the thousands of experiences that those pictures trigger within his/her mind.

However, the 50 students and teachers who actively scramble and scratch and literally fight to maintain a yearbook of this size and scope within a very small high school do have a right and perhaps a necessity to speak to one another in a few of the 192 pages that we have worked so hard to maintain.

The first thing that we want to remind those people about is the sense of commitment and effort which has been given by members of the TATLER staff, both student and teacher, over the years. With approximately 500 students in our school, our book should have shrunk to 112 pages by 1984. The dedication and effort of those people have kept the 192 pages despite the ever-more-difficult drive for the advertising dollar and the fact that the students who “do” activities become more and more stretched in a small school trying to organize everything.

Those of you who “went out advertising”, those of you who worked on the editorial aspect of the yearbook (long after everyone else had gone on summer holidays!), those of you who tried to persuade your friends to “buy a book” despite complaints about the cost (The books at others schools were either much, much shorter or much, much more expensive!), those of you who tried to arrange pictures or who tried to get write-ups from clubs and teams which seemed to consider you a nuisance: this section is for you.

You can be very proud of what you have accomplished over the past few years. There is a thin line between courage and foolhardiness; the line is called “success”. If we had stumbled, if we had failed, all of our efforts over the past few years would have been “foolhardy”. However, the TATLER still functions ... reasonably well! Your courage in venturing for a book beyond the expectations or hopes of most small schools is praiseworthy to the nth degree.

But our numbers are small ... and the financial climate in the Tillsonburg region is bleak, to put the best possible interpretation upon what has happened in the past year. We may have to re-group and re-align in 1984-85. Unless we find more people to work on the book and unless the advertising climate improves dramatically, the TATLER will be forced to re-evaluate its priorities and potentialities. This action will not be “failure” or “defeat”; it will be common sense. And we want all of you prepared to consider these possible changes.

Kathy and Susan: we will miss you greatly. There has been much love and care among the members of this yearbook staff. Every success in your careers ... every hope for the future.

Kim, Chris, Sheri, Jon - every night ... so much work ... so little recognition compared to what a performer or a star athlete receives. This small “Thank you” won’t make up for that omission but at least you will be aware that someone recognizes your efforts and notes them.


Ed - for taking over when we needed you so much; Paul - for doing such a good job for as long as you could. Our thanks.
