MR. TIM ROWLAND

Valedictorian Tim Rowland presented an emotionally forceful address to his fellow graduates, reminding them of all of the adventures that they had experienced together at Annandale. Mr. Rowland commented especially upon the impact of the Gemini program upon his class's athletic experience, noting moments of triumph and anguish.

The graduating class was unanimous in its praise of Mr. Rowland's address, one graduate commenting, "No one could have spoken for us better!"

The evening ceremonies featured several other important members of the Annandale family as well. Former Principal, R.R. MacKenzie, returned from his new posting at Glendale to deliver the key address of the evening in which he challenged the students to meet the new challenges that await them with courage and determination.

Superintendent Irv Holton in his opening remarks commented upon Annandale's long tradition of academic excellence, citing the influence of former principal W.P. Kirkwood and the manner in which so many teachers have dedicated their entire teaching careers to the school since it was first opened in 1950 as key factors in this development.

Mr. Irv Horton, Superintendent of schools for Oxford County and a graduate of Annandale High School, gave the following address at the first annual Academic Awards Assembly to honour academic excellence at Annandale. We print here the text of that speech.

"It is indeed a pleasure for me to be here today and to participate in this, the awards program. What makes it particularly meaningful for me is my long association and involvement with Annandale High School.

"In September of 1950, I was one of about 450 students who entered Tillsonburg District High School as it was called back then, for the first time. The cafeteria was not finished, this gymnasium still did not have a floor and there was just a few blades of grass growing on the football field. (In that first year, it was called the Dust Bowl). Kirkwood had this to say in the 1949-1950 *Tatler* as we left the old high school at the corner of Concession Street and Lisgar Avenue and moved into this new and very modern school, 'We will be moving to our fine new building but we earnestly hope that it will be the same old school with its high academic

standing, its same old spirit and with the same old colours flying'.

"Well Mr. Kirkwood, here we are 36 years later and having been in attendance at many commencement ceremonies and scores of football and basketball games, track meets, tennis matches, etc., I can with honesty say that Annandale High School still maintains its highest academic standing, its same old spirit and the same old colours are still flying (we have just added one). May the students of Annandale High School in the future carry on the same fine traditions that have been carried in the past.

Congratulations to the award winners and may all of you have another successful year at Annandale High School!"

From the Tillsonburg News: Shutterbug Shuts Out Other Contestants

There is more to being a professional photographer than telling kids to keep their eye on the birdie.

One Tillsonburg photographer knows that very well. So well, in fact, his shutter prowess has earned several awards.

Fred Meulemeester, of Fred's Photography, won nine awards at the Professional Photographers of Michigan convention April 11 to 14. And, he recently earned licensing status from the Professional Photographers of Ontario (PPO).

The PPO has more than 400 members across the province. It provides professional performance and business standards for the industry and offers educational activities for professional photographers.

Mr. Meulemeester has been a PPO member since 1976, serving on the board of directors for the Western Ontario branch for five years. He is now treasurer.

Fred's Photography this month won two awards of merit at the PPO's 103rd

annual convention at Fanshawe College in London. Ten qualified Masters and Craftsmen of Photographic Arts judged more than 200 prints at that competition, finding only half the entries good enough to hang in the show.

Participation in conventions and seminars is one of the best ways photographers can learn and improve, Mr. Meulemeester said. That involvement helped him gain licensee status and he is the only Tillsonburg-area photographer to earn

that right.

The Michigan exhibition judges selected two of Mr. Meulemeester's photographs as best in their category. One, titled *Watching Time Fly*, was a commercial photograph for Munro's Jewellers. A striking shot of a Quebec church, titled *Reflections of Old Quebec*, won a second award of excellence.

Other Fred's Photography prints won five awards of merit, one award of honour and one first in commercial photography.

In addition to the retirement of MR. PARKER, June 1987 saw "farewells" to several other teachers, administrators and staff who are either retiring or moving to other schools.

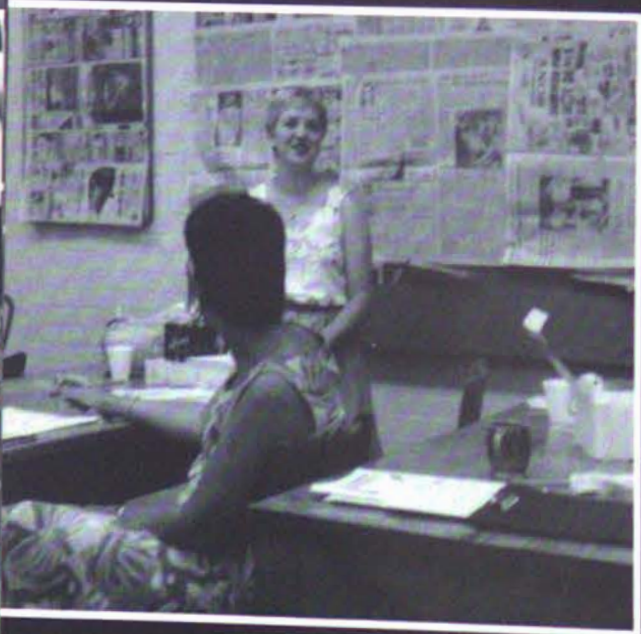

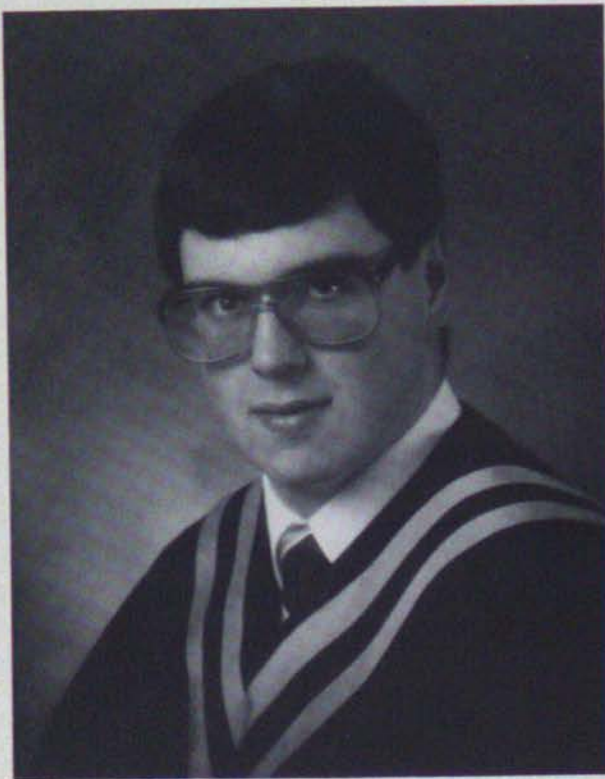
MR. JOHN YOUNG

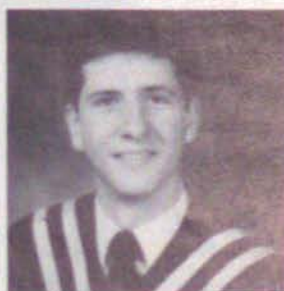
