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EDITORIAL

Unfortunately it is also far from perfect, for in the frantic days before the mid-March deadline, it is necessary to learn the painful art of compromise. As such, we on the Volt staff, and me in particular, apologize for all errors and omissions. We have tried to cover the entire spectrum of life at IDCI, from grade nine to thirteen, from football to chess, from poetry to wrestling, and I think that the '79 Volt does this quite well.

Perhaps best of all we provide some blank pages at the back of the book for autographing, IDCI's national sport each June!

IDCI is a great school. Don't ever think differently. This is a record of that great school: IDCI, 1978-79, and of the 1400 people that make it the vital dynamic community it is. I hope you enjoy it.

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A YEAR IN REVIEW: Outside IDCI in '78-'79

Some day when you're about 80, and you dig out and dust off the 'ol '79 Volt, you might wonder what happened in the world in 1978-79 BESIDES Snowfest, the Real Inspector Hound, and that magnificent student victory in the Staff-Student Hockey Game. To that end here is a brief rundown of the events that made '78-'79 a year to remember (and forget) in Canada and around the world.

WORLD NEWS:

On the world scene, school opening in September coincided with the Camp David peace summit in the U.S., where Egypt and Israel reached unexpected accord on many key issues. For their parts in the summit Begin and Sadat received Nobel Peace Prizes, which proved rather a jinx, because subsequent peace treaty negotiations broke down and peace remains an unrealized ideal in the Middle East. Through September and October the Catholic world was in turmoil over the election and death of Pope John Paul I, and the stunning selection of Cardinal Wojtyla of Poland as Pope John Paul II, the first ever Polish pope, and the first non-Italian one in 440 years.

Meanwhile religious turmoil of another sort was brewing in Iran, where supporters of the Muslim leader the Ayotollah Khomeini began violent demonstrations against the Shah. And in December the most tragic of all the many religion oriented new stories broke from Guyana where it was discovered that over 900 members of fanatical cult leader Jim Jones' "People's Temple" had committed suicide and/or been murdered.

From the Far East came Vietnamese refugees by the thousands to the West, including over 8000 who found new homes in Canada. Tragically, thousands more died in a series of capsizings of overloaded refugee ships in Thai harbours. In December, Vice-Premier Teng of China announced a westernization plan for the giant nation, a move that led to diplomatic relations with the U.S., and the Americans' subsequent brushing aside of their long time allies, the Tiawanese. In December Vietnam invaded unfortunate Cambodia, and replaced the barbaric Khmer Rouge regime with an only slightly less brutal communist one.

As the year closed so did a long proud era in Israel with the death of a stateswoman and matriarch Golda Meir.

The new year saw renewed violence in Iran which precipitated the Shah's departure from his country, the downfall of the shortlived Bakhtiar government, and the establishment of a fragile Muslim republic under the Ayotollah. Continued disruption of Iranian oil exports threatened many western nations with energy shortages.

In England massive strikes by seemingly innumerable militant unions brought the British economy to its knees, giving a warning to all countries who would listen of the dangers of excessively powerful labour organizations. More news was made in the Far East as China invaded Vietnam to "punish" the Vietnamese for their earlier invasion of Cambodia. The border war was still raging as of March 2nd.

THE CANADIAN SCENE

In Canada it was a year of off-again on-again elections, the rise and fall of Conservative leader Joe Clark's popularity, a continually battered Canadian dollar, and, near the end of '78, some encouraging signs of a Canadian economic recovery. In October the militant postal union struck and was immediately legislated back to work by the Canadian Parliament. The posties defied the new law however, until the union executive was personally threatened, at which time they ordered their workers back to the job.

Rather fruitless constitutional talks were held in October and February, with the self-centred provinces making agreement impossible on practically anything. The Federal Government threatened to repatriate the constitution without the provinces, and surprisingly received support from Ontario Premier William Davis.

In December Edward Schreyer of Manitoba was named Governor-General by Prime Minister Trudeau, a surprising move in that it placed an active politician in the position for the first time.

Later in the month The Bay succeeded in a takeover bid of Simpsons to become the largest department store chain in the country. Ironically, the new conglomerate was itself the object of a takeover bid only a few months later.

In January Joe Clark stumbled through a world tour, an event which, in combination with the Conservatives self-contradicting statements on fiscal policy, and the notion of an increased deficit under a Conservative government, led to a plunge in party fortunes in the Gallop polls. By March it seemed like a majority Conservative government in the '79 election was extremely unlikely, and that perhaps Pierre Trudeau would use yet another of his "nine-lives" to return to power for another term.

In February the Task Force on Canadian Unity, headed by John Roberts and Jean-Luc Pepin, presented its long awaited report. Although generally well received, the report unfortunately recommended a further balkanization of our already overly-decentralized nation.

SPORTS

In sports during the summer of '78, Canada won the Commonwealth Games for the first time. The eleventh games were held in Edmonton in the beautiful and (more importantly perhaps,) paid for, Commonwealth Games Stadium. Individual standouts were Graham Smith with a record six gold medals in the pool, and Diane Jones-Konohowski with a victory in the Pentathlon.

In September Mohammed Ali regained his world Heavyweight Championship for the third time with a victory over Leon Spinks in New Orleans. Later in the month the New York Yankees capped a year of comebacks with their second consecutive World Series victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers.

In November hockey lost two of its greatest stars with the retirement of Bobby Orr and Bobby Hull. Meanwhile, Gordie Howe was still going strong at the incredible age of 50. Late in the month Edmonton won the Grey Cup Game, and in January, the Pittsburgh Steelers defeated the Dallas Cowboys to win their third Superbowl in six years.

BOOKS AND MOVIES

1978-79 was a year of tremendous growth in the Canadian movie industry. Good Canadian feature films became commonplace at last, with Movies such as Skip Tracer, Murder by Decree, The Silent Partner, Who is Killing the Great Chefs of Europe, and In Praise of Older Women gaining critical and financial success. More of the year's top films included an excellent version of Tolkien's Lord of the Rings, Heaven Can Wait, Midnight Express, Foul Play, Superman, The Deer Hunter, and Coming Home.

Books that spent long stints on the best-seller lists included James Michener's "Chesapeake," Jim Fixx's "Complete Book of Running," Wouk's "War and Remembrance," and Canadian bestsellers "The Bronfmans" and Pierre Berton's "The Wild Country."

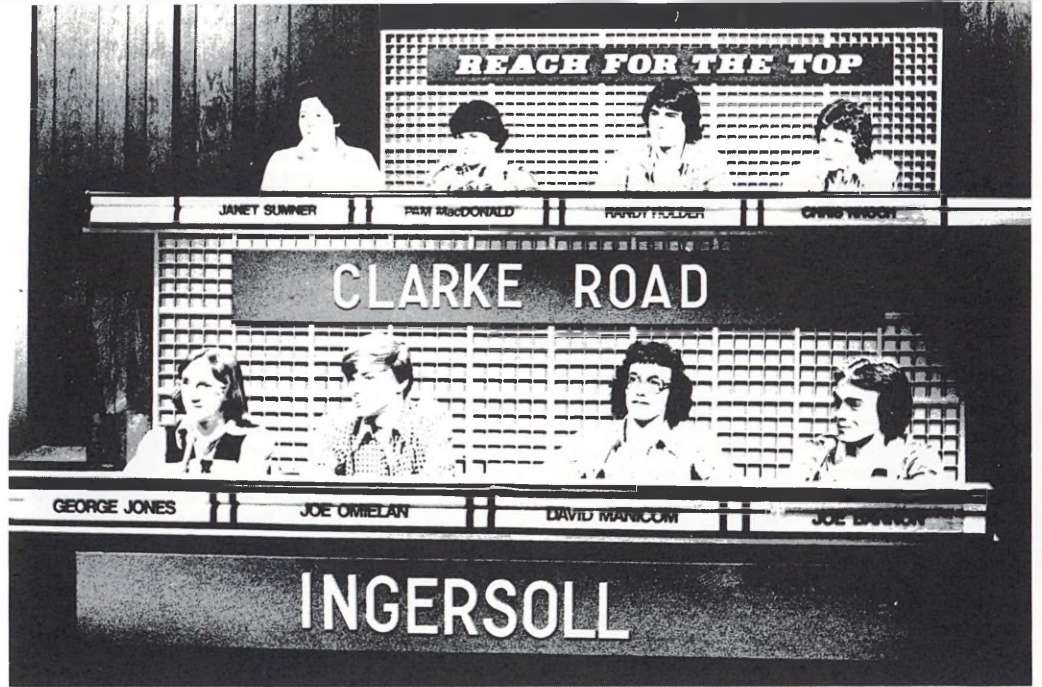
TRIVIA

To conclude, here are a few things that you might wonder about in around 50 years. Remember, at the present inflation rate, a pair of jeans will cost about \$2,000.00 in 2030!!

In 1979: A chocolate bar cost 30c, a record \$7.00, jeans about \$25.00, a loaf of bread 60c, an average car around \$6,000.00, a gallon of gas 95c (or 22c per litre), and a suburban three bedroom house around \$55,000.00.

In '79 Canada had 23,000,000 people, Ingersoll 8,000 and the world about 4.2 billion.

And that's the way it was in 1978-79!



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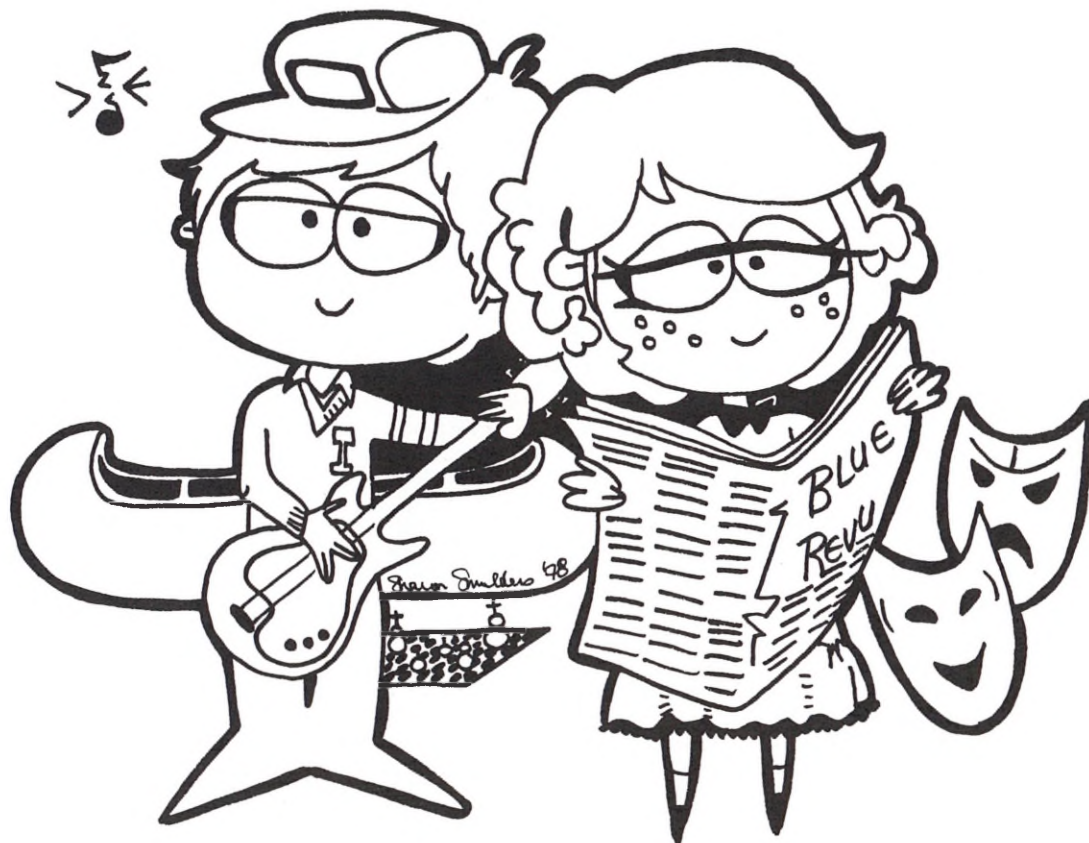

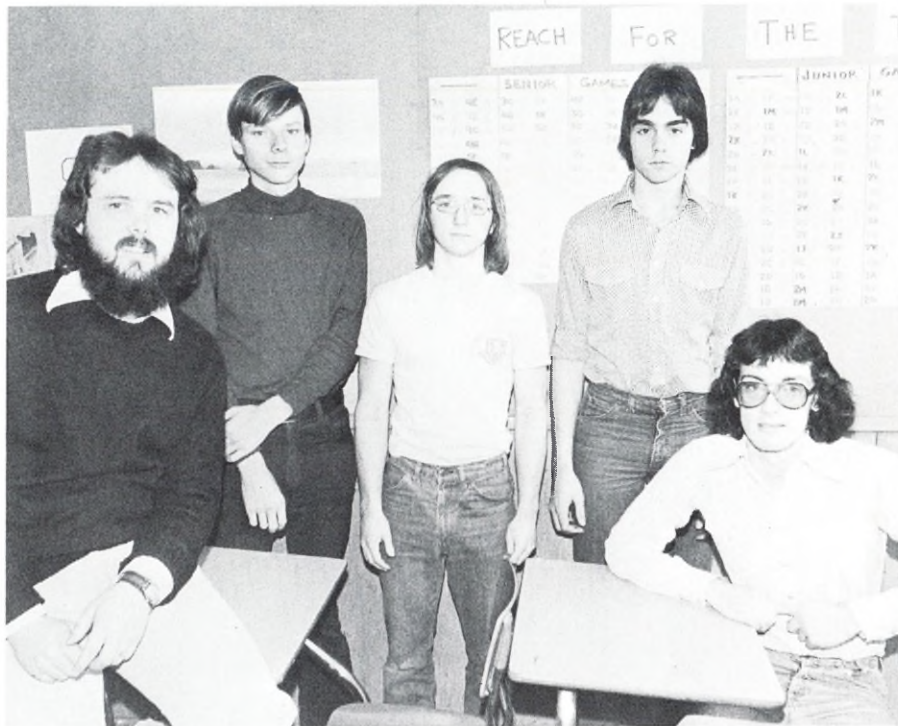


Reach for the Top
