Pte. Herrick Adair Killed in France

Word was received Monday morning by Mrs. Janet Adair, 166 Carroll street, from the Director of Records, Ottawa, that her son, Pte. Herrick Adair, had been killed in action in France, August 11. No other details were given.

Pte. Adair was serving with the supply company of the Lincoln and Welland regiment. He had been overseas about a year. He enlisted two years ago and received training at Ipperwash, Woodstock and Listowel. He was in his 22nd year and had attended Public School and the Collegiate Institute here.

A brother, Sgt. F. S. Adair, is serving with the R.C.O.C. in France.

Private Herrick Robins Adair was a son of Janet Adair of Ingersoll and son of the late William J. Adair.

A machine operator by trade, he enlisted in the Canadian Army on 3 Nov 1942 in London, Ontario.

Unit: Lincoln and Welland Regiment, R.C.I.C.
Honours/Awards: 1939-1945 Star, France & Germany Star, Defence Medal, War Medal, The Canadian Volunteer Service Medal (CVSM) & Clasp.

Private Herrick Robin Adair was killed in action 11 August 1944 and is commemorated on Page 234 of Canada's Second World War Book of Remembrance and he rests in Bretteville-Sur-Laize Canadian War Cemetery, Calvados, France.
