Private William Augustu's Barrow was born in Swansee, Glamorgan, Waleş and was a son to Fred A. and Annie M. Barrow, of Ingersoll, Ontario Ingersoll. William attended the Central School and after which he began work as a labourer with the John Morrow Screw Company.

In January of 1916, he made the brave decision to join the war effort by enlisting at the Ingersoll recruiting office. On enlistment, he joined the 168th Battalion, Oxford Rilles. Private William Barrow was wounded in France and later died on September 27, 1918. He rests in the TERLINCTHUN BRITISH CEMETERY.
