formerly resided at 289 Hall St., Ingersoll, Ont. He was born at Pembroke, on June 27th, 1916, and was educated at the Victoria Memorial Public School and also the Radio College of Canada, where he took a special course in radio work. He joined the service of the R.C. A.F. in July, 1940, and on June 27th, 1942, approximately two years later he was reported "presumed dead, previously reported missing." Plt.-Off. Chamberlain was unmarried and is survived by his mother, Mrs. S. H. Chamberlain of Ingersoll, Ont.

Son Reported Missing.

Ingersoll, Dec. 19 (CP).—Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Chamberlain of Ingersoll were notified today that their son, Pilot Officer Gordon Chamberlain, 25, was reported missing in action after operations Dec. 16. Pilot Officer Chamberlain, who joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in July, 1940, and went overseas last April, received his commission only a week ago. Three brothers are serving in the Canadian Army.

Pilot Officer Gordon Arthur Chamberlain was a son of Steven H. and Minnie M. Chamberlain, of Ingersoll, Ontario. He was killed in action 16 December 1941. He has no known grave, his service is memorialized by the Runnymede Memorial, Surrey, United Kingdom.
