A WELL-KNOWN MINISTER REV. CHARLES D. DANIEL PASSES IN HIS 73RD YEAR

A wide circle of friends in Ingersoll and district learned with regret of the death of Rev. Charles D. Daniel of 124 Duke Street at Alexandra Hospital on Sunday, October 8th in his 73rd year. He had been in failing health for the past year and seriously ill for the past several weeks. A son of the late Mr. & Mrs. John H. Daniel, he was born in California, coming with his family to Canada when a small child. He then attended Victoria College, Toronto and was ordained in 1921 into the ministry of the former Methodist Church and spent 17 years in Ingersoll as pastor of Trinity United Church and from there he retired in 1959, returning to Ingersoll where he has since resided. He had served in the First World War as a member of the Medical Corps and in the Second World War with the Canadian Chaplain Service for some five years in England and in the Sicilian campaign with the rank of Major, after which he returned to his church in Ingersoll. He was a member of King Hiram Lodge No. 37 A.F. & A.M. Ingersoll. For many years he was an active member of the Ingersoll Kiwanis Club where his untiring energy was fully appreciated, as was also the case in his devoted church work and in general in all worthy efforts and undertakings in Ingersoll and district. He is survived by his wife, the former Ethelwyn Switzer; two daughters Mrs. (Rev. George Speers) (Ethelwyn), Brantford and Mrs. Maurice Kelly (Ruth) Ottawa; six grandchildren and a number of nieces and nephews. He was predeceased in 1950 by a daughter Cozette and also by two brothers Joseph and Clement Daniel, California. Interment was in the Harris Cemetery.
