F.O. RONALD GORDON ELLIS, 27, co-pilot and bomb-aimer with the Bison squadron, who was reported missing over Caen July 18, is now presumed dead, his wife, the former Marie Ellen Lloyd,

Greer Rd., whom he married in September, 1942, has been advised. F.O. Ellis enlisted in 1941, went overseas in July, 1943, and had almost completed his first tour. Born in Ingersoll, the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Ellis, Deloraine Ave., he attended North Toronto collegiate. Surviving also is a brother, Robert, with the R.C.A.F.

Flying Officer Ronald Gordon Ellis was a son of Gordon Cecil Ellis and Jessie Chapman Ellis of Ingersoll, Ontario. Husband of Marie Ellen Ellis, of Dieppe, New Brunswick.

Gordon was a bookkeeper at the Ellis Furniture Company of Ingersoll, a family business. Gordon enlisted in 1941 with the Royal Canadian Air Force and was a bomb-aimer. His plane went down over France, July 18 1944 during the Battle of Normandy.
