TRPR. F. A. FUNNELL REPORTED MISSING IN ACTION OVERSEAS

A telegram received on Monday morning by Mrs. F. A. Funnell conveyed the news that her husband Trpr. F. A. Funnell is missing in action overseas. Mrs. Funnell resides with her husband's parents at 40 Canterbury street. They have a son, Freddie John.

Trooper Funnell was born in England and came to Canada with his parents, when he was three years old. He attended Ingersoll Public School and the Collegiate Institute. Before enlisting he had been employed at the Borden Company and Ingersoll Machine and Tool Co.

He enlisted about two years ago and received his training at Listowel and Camp Borden. He has been overseas about a year. A brother, Sgt. John Funnell is serving in Italy. He is a member of St. James' Anglican Church. His father Fred Funnell, Sr., was with the Imperial Army in the war of 1914-18.
