Joseph enlisted in the Royal Canadian Navy in 1941. He was posted to the HMCS St. Croix and began escorting convoys of ships to Iceland, in effort to protect them from German U-boat wolf packs.

On September 20, 1943, Engline Room Artificer Joseph Francis MacMillan was killed as the St. Croix was torpeded by a U-boat. He is remembered by HALIFAX MEMORIAL in Nova Scotia's capital, erected in Point Pleasant Park, is one of the lew tanglible reminders of the men who died at sea.
