## ANOTHER SON WAS KILLED IN ACTION

**SAD NEWS RECEIVED BY MR. J. C. NORSWORTHY—LIEUT. A. J. (FRED) NORSWORTHY KILLED BY EXPLOSIVE SHELL.**

The sad news that another son had been killed in action was received by Mr. J. C. Norsworthy on Tuesday afternoon. He was informed by a cablegram that his son, Lieut. A. J. (Fred) Norsworthy, adjutant of a Montreal Highland Battalion, had been instantly killed.

The particulars given were that an explosive shell pierced the orderly room and he was killed instantly. The deceased was a brother of the late Major Edward Cuthbert, Norsworthy of Montreal, who was killed when the Canadians made such a gallant stand at Langemarck. He gave up a lucrative position in Costa Rica that he might return to Canada and enlist with the Battalion in Montreal. He had been at the front since July last.

Lieutenant Alfred James Norsworthy was a son of James C. and Mary Norsworthy, of Ingersoll, Ontario.

Brother of Major Edward Cuthbert Norsworthy, who died while serving with the Canadian Infantry (Quebec Regiment). Cousin of Gunner Robert Godfrey Hunter and Bombardier Harold Gray Hunter, both died while serving with the Canadian Field Artillery.

Alfred attended schools in Ingersoll and enlisted in the Royal Highlanders of Canada.

Lieutenant Alfred James Norsworthy was killed in action, March 29, 1917. He rests at BARLIN COMMUNAL CEMETERY, Pas de Calais, France.
