Capt. Russell Smith, M.C. Died of Wounds at Christie Street Hospital

The death occurred on Wednesday of last week of Captain Lloyd Russell Smith, M.C., at Christie Street Hospital, Toronto, where he had been a patient for some months.

Born in Ingersoll, (Rusty), as he was affectionately called by his countless friends, was in his 31st year, and received his Public School and Collegiate education here. Prior to enlisting for active service he had been a member of "D" Company Oxford Rifles. He enlisted in the Essex Scottish Regiment at the outbreak of hostilities.

Left to mourn the passing of a dearly loved husband and father are his widow, the former Betty Swift of Windsor, and little two-year-old daughter Linda; also his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd F. Smith, Bell street, Ingersoll; one sister, Mrs. Bruce Holdsworth, (Doris), Ingersoll, and two brothers, Beverley in Dnudas, and George, with the R.C.A.F., now stationed in Toronto, to all of whom the sympathy of their scores of friends is extended in their irreparable loss.

Lieutenant Lloyd Russell Smith was a son Lloyd F. Smith and Mabel Smith, of Ingersoll, Ontario. Husband of Bessie Smith, of Windsor, Ontario.

Lloyd 'Rusty' Smith attended school in Ingersoll and went on to work as a machinist in the Windsor area. He enlisted in the Essex Scottish Regiment in May 1941.

Lieutenant Lloyd Russell Smith was seriously wounded in battle in Italy and was sent back to Canada. He later died of his injuries. He rests at INGERSOLL RURAL CEMETERY, Ontario, Canada.
