## Good Evening, Ladies and Gentlemen.

It is my great honour this evening to bid farewell on behalf of the graduating class,
Almost six months ago we all had a decision to make which would determine the path of our future. For some it meant furthering our knowledge in higher institutions of learning; others chose to enter the labour force, while several are still here. Nonetheless, we have all assembled here this evening for perhaps the last time, to bid farewell.
