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


Staff Advisors' Message

Principal's Message



The time suddenly clamoured for her attention once more. It was now fifteen minutes after the hour.




The soft ticking of her watch brought Kate back to reality. She glanced to find that time had slipped away and now she could phone John.


Assemblies






THE NEW YORK TRIP

With eleven players back from the year before, coaches Coyle and Quarrie had an experienced nucleus around which they built one of the best senior squads in Glendale's history.




It was a near victory for GMS safety team that placed second in Southern Ontario only to be defeated by Lambton Central by one question.


This is the second time that GHS got this far, the first being 1971.


Pep Club
