



An excellent Library Resource Centre, a new gymnasium, commercial section, special geography rooms, science laboratories, and greenhouse have added greatly to facilities at the collegiate.


Academic achievement was high during the year as sixty-four students received the Secondary School Honour Graduation Diploma at Commencement Exercises. Our hundred and ninety-nine students obtained the Secondary School Graduation Diploma (grade XII) and twenty-four qualified for Certificates of Training (Two year occupational programme). One hundred and fifty students throughout the school won the coveted silver pin (First Class Honours Award) while eighty-seven qualified for Perfect Attendance Crests.

Extracurricular activities again played an important role at I.D.C.I. Athletic teams achieved good standings in their various leagues, while music and drama also had excellent programmes. An ambitious project in this field was the production of "Oliver" which was presented during the month of February.

In closing I should like to commend students for their active participation in these extracurricular activities. In particular I would like to congratulate Mr. Cliff Martin, the Volt editors, Barry Marles and Phyllis Noonan, and all members of the Volt Staff on an excellent "Volt 1971-172."



GRAHAM HENDERSON - Graham will spend the rest of his life working on an agriculture project in algebra class. Also the probability of passing the same subject. Good Luck.








BILL JELLOUS - Bill is our hope to replace George Blanda, if he can get out of doing velocity questions in math. Lotsa luck Bill.

DOUG PETTIT - The Pee Wee hockey coach spends his time away from Architectural Art on curling, Belltones, and T.V. football. And with Harold.



ED RODENBURG - Our Student Council President wants to be Prime Minister of Antarctic someday. Fish likes cucumber farming.






JOHN ROWSOM - John is bound to become the local Louis Armstrong. Active in several groups he still finds time to pass. Good luck John.






HEATH STONE - Heath's only ambition seems to be to ride the Merikish Express. He says he doesn't like school spirit and spends his time skiing and rebelling.
