Preface

INGERSOLL, NORTH and WEST OXFORD AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY 1847 - 1947

The one-hundredth anniversary of the founding of the Ingersoll, North and West Oxford Agricultural Society is being celebrated this year simultaneously with the holding of the annual exhibition.


The first Agricultural Society of this district was organized in the summer of 1847 and the first fair was held on Oct. 20th. The society at that time was known as "The Ingersoll Agricultural Society", but as time passed and more settlers took up land near Ingersoll, the area served by the society was extended to include the adjoining townships of North Oxford and West Oxford. Evidently, in the formative years of the society, good co-operation existed between urban and rural residents. The first president in 1847 was a banker and the first secretary-treasurer was a farmer. In 1852 the society was put on a more definite and permanent basis as required by a new Agricultural Act, the officers of that year being President, John Mathews, a merchant; Vice-President, C. E. Chadwick, a banker; Secretary, John M. Chapman, a druggist; Treasurer, Daniel Phelan, a merchant; directors, Adolphus Milne and James Henderson, business men, representing the town and the following farmers representing the rural sections: Jacob Choate, W. B. Mabee, Copeland Stinson, Geo. Walker, James Bodwell and Robert Cameron. This co-operation has existed to the present time.

In a young country, like Canada, one hundred years is a long time for one institution to be in existence. During this period of time many changes must of necessity take place. For many years after the founding of the Ingersoll Agricultural Society, the fairs were held on the north side of the Thames river at the westerly side of the town, but for the last seventy years they have been held in Victoria Park, a park possessing natural beauty. Exhibits and prize lists have changed in keeping with agricultural development and specialization. Our pioneers exhibited the good products of their farms for the benefit of the community. The prize list no longer contains a classification for the "Best Yoke of Oxen", but in its stead we find the tractor, the combine, the pick-up hay and

straw baler, the corn harvester and other machines that have brought about mechanization of the farm in modern agriculture.

The exhibits at a fair are principally the products of the community adjacent to the fair. The various breeds of live stock have usually been well represented at Ingersoll Fair, but the predominant exhibit has been the representatives of the three major breeds of dairy cattle, Holstein, Jersey and Ayrshire. This has been a natural development. Dairy farming was established very early in the Ingersoll district. It is recorded that cheese was made in 1852 and in 1865 the first co-operative cheese factory was built, this factory being within a mile of the present fair grounds. It was in this factory in 1866 that the famous big cheese, weighing 7300 lbs. was made, that was shipped to Europe and became the forerunner of the great cheese exporting industry. In 1867 the first Canadian Dairyman's Association was formed in Ingersoll. It is therefore quite natural that the area surrounding Ingersoll developed into a specialized dairy section and that the dairy cattle exhibit at the fair should be important. The fair is the show window of the community.

It has now, after one hundred years of activity, been made possible through a substantial grant by the Provincial Department of Agriculture, that the centenary of the establishment of the Ingersoll, North and West Oxford Agricultural Society will be commemorated by the erection of a pylon in Victoria Park.

Rules and Regulations

1. **MEMBERSHIP**—The Membership Fee is \$1.00. A firm may become a member of this Society by payment of the regular fee, but the name of one person only shall be entered as the agent or representative of such firm, and that person only shall exercise the privilege of membership.

2. **EXHIBITORS**—Only members can be exhibitors. No entry ticket made out until all fees are paid. Each member is entitled to Fifty Cents' worth of entries free in addition to Membership Ticket and One Coupon, except as otherwise noted.

3. **ENTRIES**—Entries must be made on the form provided for that purpose. The class and section number only are to be given with each entry. Every entry must be made subject to the Rules and Regulations of the Society. Exhibitors whose tickets have not been delivered will find entry cards and membership tickets ready for them at the office of the Secretary-Treasurer, on the Fair Grounds, on the morning of the Show.

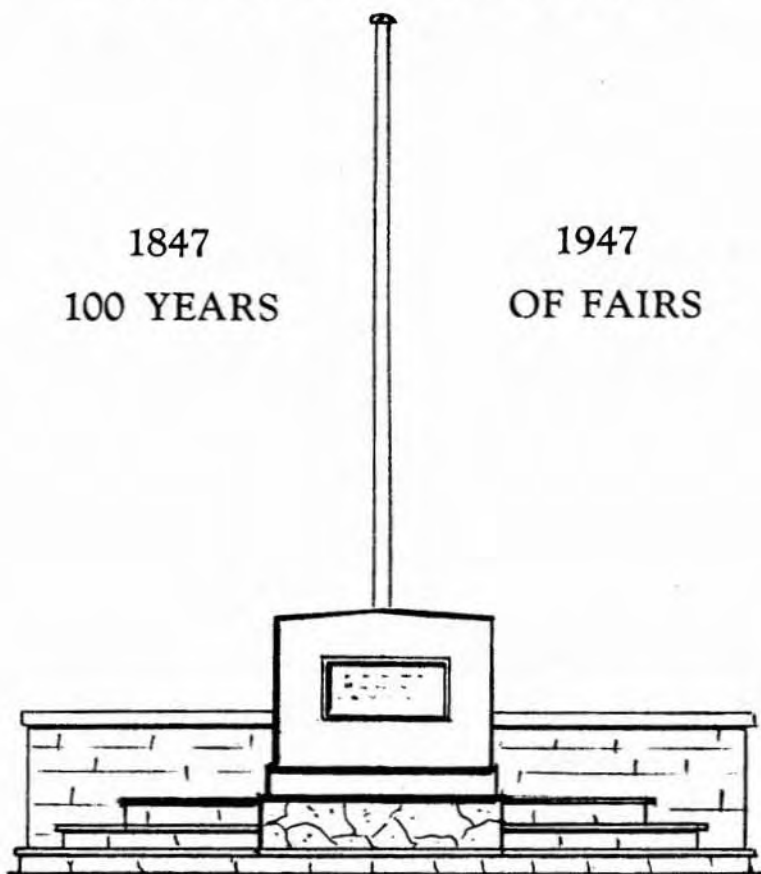
4. **ENTRY FEES**—Single horse, 25c; Team, 50c; Cattle, 15c per head; Herds, 50c; Hogs, 10c per head; Pens, 25c; all other classes 5c per entry. Entry fee will be charged on all specials.

5. **HELPERS' PASSES**—Exhibitors of live stock requiring extra help will be entitled to helpers' passes on the following basis: Exhibitor entering 3 or 4 horses, one pass; 5 or 6 horses, two passes; Cattle, 5 to 8 animals, one pass; 9 to 12 animals, two passes. Swine, 7 to 12 animals, one pass; over 12, two passes. Passes are not transferable and will be forfeited if presented by any other person. These passes may be secured by members when making their entries. Any person jumping the fence will be charged double-fee, one-half to go to the constable and the balance to the Society, which will not exclude the offender from the law pertaining thereto.

6. All stock or articles exhibited must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor. In fine arts, Ladies' work and other departments, work must positively be that of exhibitor. Any member exhibiting or permitting any person to exhibit in his name any stock or articles which is not his bona fide property shall forfeit all prizes that may have been awarded to him.

7. Grain, Seeds, Roots and Vegetables, Horticultural Products, Mechanical Works and Ladies' Work must be on the grounds on or before 2.30 o'clock of the first day and remain until

5 o'clock the third day: and Horses in Harness, Brood Mares, Foals, Colts, Cattle, Pigs, are required to be on exhibition from one p.m. to five p.m., of the day on which their respective classes are judged.

8. A brood mare must have her foal of 1947 by her side.

9. Team, Carriage, and Buggy Horses to be shown in the harness attached to some vehicle. Colts and Fillies, except foals, must be shown with a halter or bridle only. No horse will be allowed in more than one class or section of class. Horses shown as single carriage horses or roadsters, spans of heavy draught, general purpose, carriage horses or saddle horses, must not be stallions. Heavy draught horses must be shown attached to a democrat or lumber wagon, general purpose to a democrat wagon, carriage teams to a carriage, and single horses to a buggy or carriage. This rule is to be strictly adhered to.

10. All horses, except foals, allowed to run loose in the show grounds will be removed from the grounds and not allowed to compete for any of the prizes.

11. All cattle exhibited for prizes must be secured by ropes or other fastenings.

12. Horses shown in harness may be shown on halter or in single harness, on payment of \$1.00 extra.

13. All fat animals shown as such must have been in the possession of the owner at least one month previous to the exhibition.

14. No person will be allowed to enter for exhibition more than one article in any section or class unless the additional article be a distinct named variety or pattern from the first, to be named to the Secretary when the entries are made; this rule to apply to all kinds of grain, vegetable products, manufactured articles, etc. No animal shall be allowed to be exhibited in more than one class or section of a class except for Specials. Any exhibitor breaking the conditions of Section 10 shall forfeit all prizes awarded to him.

15. All grain, roots, butter, cheese, etc., must be certified to be the property of the exhibitor, and must be produced from his own farm or holding during the present year; manner of cultivation or curing to be given to the Judges if required.

16. All articles of manufacture shall be manufactured by the exhibitor during the year.

17. In the absence of competition in any section, or if the stock or article exhibited be of inferior quality, the Judges are instructed to award only such premiums as they think the article deserving of. They will exercise their discretion as to whether they will award the first, second, third, or any premium.

RULES AND REGULATIONS—(Continued)

18. All animals, etc., to which prizes may be awarded will be distinguished by the Judges attaching prize tickets or ribbons to them. The first prize ticket will be Red, the second Blue, and the third Yellow.

All persons attending and being in or upon the grounds of the Ingersoll, N. & W. Oxford Agricultural Society during the days of the exhibition, are hereby notified and warned that the above Society will not be responsible for any accidents that may occur during the said days of exhibition on the said grounds and premises, to persons, animals, or personal property. All persons attending the Fair and Speeding Contests do so at their individual risk.

ADMISSION

Members will be entitled to admission to the exhibition; each member is also entitled to one coupon of admission and free parking, to be given up at the gate and not transferable. Members' tickets cannot be used by any other person than the member.

Non-members will be charged 35 cents; children under 10 years of age, free.

A fee of 25 cents will be charged for each horse or car taken on the grounds by non-members; drivers extra.

Any person jumping the fence will be charged double fee, one-half to go to the constable and the balance to the Society, which will not exclude the offender from the law appertaining thereto.

PREMIUMS

The Treasurer will commence paying premiums November 15th, Exhibitors leaving their P.O. address with the Secretary, also statement of prizes claimed, will receive their prizes as above stated. Premiums not called for before Dec. 10th, 1947, will become the property of the Society. Prize winners of \$5.00 and over will be obliged to leave \$1.00 which will be retained by the treasurer for next year's membership.

CARETAKER

Caretakers will use every endeavour to secure proper care of articles on exhibition and will require exhibitors to produce checks before removing any article, which may be done after 5 p.m., on the third day.

MEMBERS AND JUDGES

The members of the Committees will be on the grounds at nine o'clock, a.m., each day. Judges on live stock are expected to report themselves at the Secretary's office on the grounds at 11 o'clock a.m., on the second and third days. Livestock judging will commence at 1.30 p.m. on the second and third day.

RULES AND REGULATIONS—(Continued)**PROTESTS AND PENALTIES**

All protests or appeals must be in writing, must state plainly the cause of complaint, and shall be delivered to the President or Secretary within one hour before the close of the exhibition and after the Judges have given their decision upon the exhibit in question. Much annoyance and unpleasantness have been occasioned in the past by protests of an imaginary or frivolous nature; it is therefore earnestly hoped that no appeals will be made unless there exists the strongest grounds for doing so.

An exhibitor has the right to protest or appeal, as provided for in the pre-mentioned clause, but no one is allowed therefore to interfere with the Judges while in discharge of their duties. Exhibitors so interfering, who shall use any abusive or contemptuous language to any Judge because of any award which he may have given, shall forfeit his right to any premium to which he may have been entitled, and should there have been no premium due to him, he shall be debarred from exhibiting for two years thereafter.

The sum of two dollars shall be deposited with the Secretary in each case of protest or appeal, the same to be forfeited if the appeal be not sustained.

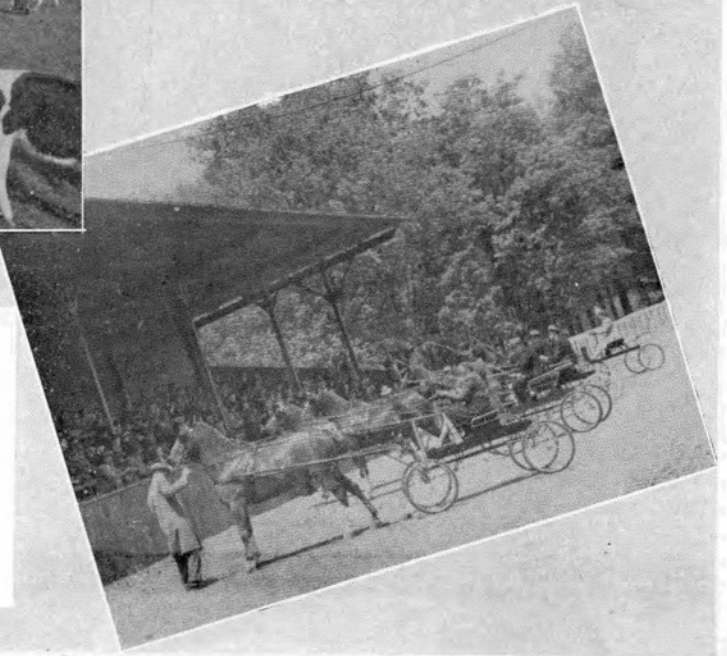
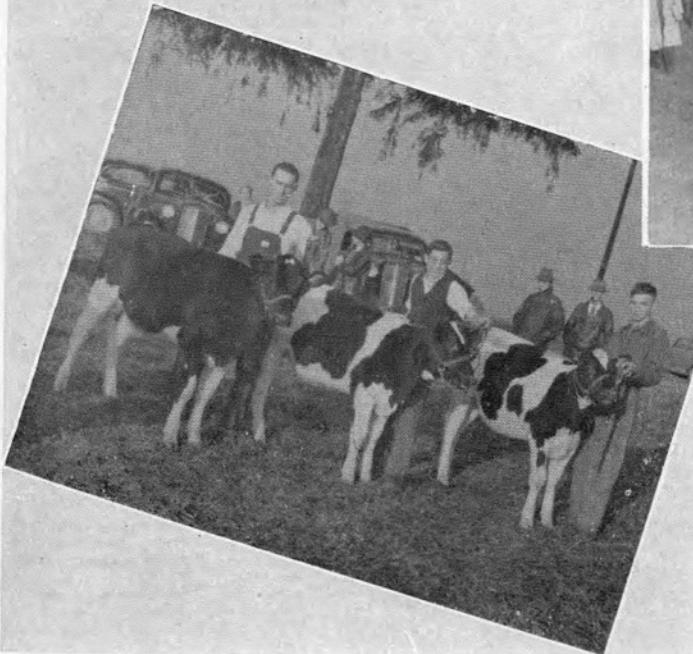
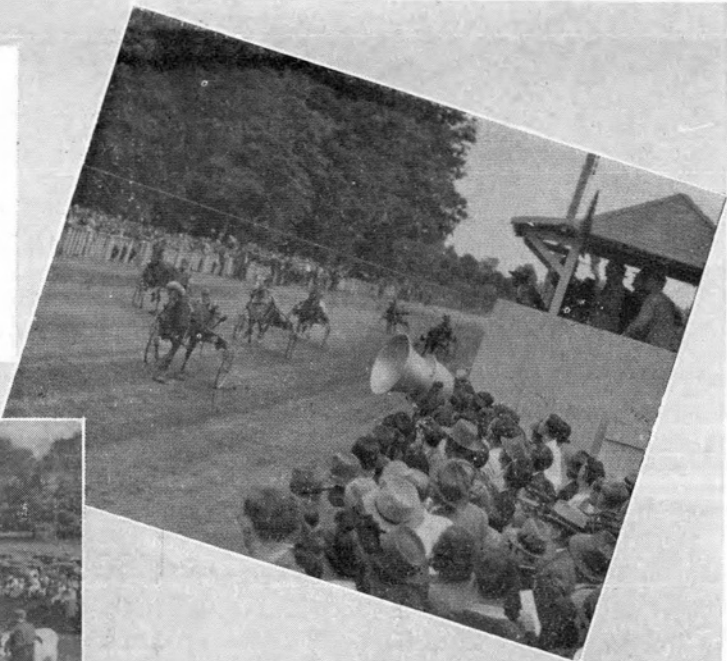
