THE HISTORY OF BANNER SCHOOLS FROM 1833 TO 1966

"The time has come", the walrus said,

"To talk of many things,

"Of School, Teachers and Trustee Boards, of Cabbages and Kings,

"And why the Teacher's boiling mad,

And whether kids have wings."

The early settlers in the Banner district came around the year 1833. At that time there were no schools and what little education the children received was taught by their mothers in the homes. About the year 1840, a log school was built on the south west corner of lot 21, concession 4, North Oxford. The farm on which the school was built belonged to Joseph Spearman, and the site for the school was donated by him as long as it was needed for school purposes.

In 1851 this log school was replaced by a frame building on the same site. For several years these schools were used for church

services also, until the church was built in the year 1857.

In 1873 a crisis arose in the life of the community. An act had been passed in the Legislature that all schools must have a play-ground. Unable to buy any land adjoining the school, the Board decided to purchase one half acre from William Loughlin for the sum of \$75.00. and move the school to lot 20, in front of where the present one now stands.

So the work began. A. Evans moved the school building for \$60.00. A separate contract was let to H. E. Irwin to move the woodshed and privy for \$6.90. Instructions as to how the famous board fence, on three sides of the school ground, was to be built, was set out in great detail. The contract even stipulated that six, three inch nails be used in each and every board. The final sentence was, "The said fence to be built in the best workman-like manner, and the material of

the best quality." All this was to cost \$89.56.

This school was typical of its day, "a little red school house", but at times it had to accommodate up to 60 pupils. There was a porch at the front, and along the sides were shelves for the dinner pails. Rows of hooks for coats and hats were down the sides of the school room. A box stove at the back, with pipes the whole length of the room was the source of heat. There were three rows of double desks, with seats like two separate stools. When the school was over-crowded a board was put over the stools, and three small children used one desk.

One cannot help but admire the teachers of those days. They often taught 50 pupils, sometimes more, all eight grades and even the first year of high school. One teacher got \$15.00 a year extra for teaching grade nine. The penmanship, precise statements and complete reports of the secretaries even from 1871, show the high calibre of the education of the people of the community.

Interest ran high when it was decided that a new school was necessary, and would be built on the same grounds as the frame school, but behind it. A committee of eight was set up to make enquiries regarding plans, materials, prices, etc. The list of expenses are interest-

ing to read, and to compare the prices with today's prices.

September 1900 was a thrilling time for pupils Each child carried his or her own books over to the big new school, truly a neverto-be-forgotten moment.

With the old building empty, it was then sold for \$65.00 and the woodshed sold for \$12.50. Chris. Bartindale had the job of moving the old school to its final resting place on the farm of Henry McDermott.

There has been a steady progress and a steady improvement through the years in Banner school.

In the 1920's when the School Fairs began to get more popular, our teacher and pupils began taking more interest in them, some years winning several prizes with their exhibits. Some of the pupils also won prizes for their public speaking performances.

By 1930 the school attendance had increased and the size of the playground was entirely inadequate for the pupils, so one acre of land was bought for \$200.00 from Mr. Ed. Clark, who owned the adjoining farm. The school board bought a football and goal net, etc., and the boys had something more interesting to do during recess than teasing the girls and spoiling their games.

It was in 1932 that a school garden was started under the direction of the teacher, Miss Dorothy Chambers. The garden plot had been plowed and made ready the previous fall.

With skillful guidance and lots of hard work on the part of teacher and pupils, a very successful garden with quantities of vegetables and flowers of high quality was their pride and joy. They were amply rewarded as it was really a garden of which to be proud.

When Miss Anne MacIntosh came to Banner in 1937, to teach, she suggested having a "hot dish" at lunch every day during winter months. Milk was bought from Elmer Knox, who kept an accredited herd, and Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Bruce were engaged to prepare the various dishes day by day. Necessary china was provided, and the girls took turns helping with the "chores" of setting table or washing dishes. This was a wonderful experiment, the hot lunch being so beneficial for their health, the household chores being taught in such a practical way, were certainly a good lesson learned.

1939 saw another change to the school, when inside toilets were installed at the cost of \$350.00.

Although hydro for the school had been discussed several times since 1932, it was not until 1945 that it was finally installed, adding much to the convenience of both teacher and pupils. It was not long before they were wondering how they ever got along without it, especially during the dull winter days. The school was wired by Mr. Percy Elgie of Thamesford at the cost of \$275.00.

1947 saw another step for progress. The children passing grade 8, going into high school at Ingersoll, didn't have to worry about how to get there and get home again, as did all the former pupils. It was arranged with James Ranger, who owned a school bus, that he pick up all the Banner children along with the Dickson's Corners children and others going to Ingersoll Collegiate.

It is said "comparisons are odious", but they can be very interesting too. For instance, in the year 1873 the Muncipal grant

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The years 1958 and 1959 were really "banner" years for the Banner pupils, music wise. Their music teacher, Mr. Verveel and in between lessons, their teacher, Miss Mildred Dundas, worked hard with them, then entered "Banner School" at the Rotary Festival of Music, which was held at Avondale United Church, Tillsonburg, each autumn. In 1958 the whole Banner choir The results were most satisfying. won first place with 81 points. There were many first places amongst In 1959 the school choir was divided into Junthe soloists too. ior and Senior choirs and this time they both won first places, and again there were several first place soloists.. Both the pupils and the teachers were to be congratulated on their success. Congratulations to the Banner school pupils who have brought great credit to Banner when they competed, in May, 1966, at the Rotary Festival of Music, Woodstock, and placed third, amongst nine entries, and this with the smallest choir.

Progress is inevitable, so the "Little Red School Houses" are being closed, a few at a time and the "Centralized Schools" coming rapidly into use, whether for better or worse is for the future to tell. Anyway, no one can deny the fact that the little country school served its purpose long and well. Note how many of our great parliamentarians of the past, and United States Presidents were raised in log cabins and received their early education in these same "Little Red School" Houses", and Banner school is no exception when one remembers that one former pupil, Joseph Hennessy, entered the Roman Catholic Priesthood many years ago; another, Arthur Waring, has for many years been a successful dentist, and still another, Charles Leslie, is a university professor. Many have entered the teaching, nursing, executive and secretarial professions. Two former teachers left the teaching profession to enter the church ministry, Dallas Cameron, who taught at Banner school in the year 1890, and Morley Hammond, who taught as recently as 1950-55 and who is now serving as a United Church missionary in Korea.

These little schools are now being closed everywhere as being insufficient for our children's needs. So here at Banner, S. S. No. 2, North Oxford, 1966, one hundred and thirty-three years, three schools, (a log, a frame, and a brick one), later, we are having a re-union, so former teachers and pupils may spend a happy day together on the old and familiar play-grounds and share fond memories of SCHOOL DAYS.

This marks the end of the era of the "Little Red School House."





DID YOU KNOWS

No. 2 School Section first opened in 1837

Frame school was built in 1851

Number of inhabitants in 1863 - - 300 souls

Total amount of assessed property in the section in 1872, \$67.589 - 1874, \$65,307 - 1875, \$114,923 - 1876, \$126,376 - 1880, \$183,794.

In 1876 the parents of non-resident children were assessed 20 cents per month for each child attending the school. In 1884 this was raised to 25 cents, and in 1885 it was reduced to 15 cents. One non-resident found it more convenient to deliver two cords of wood in lieu of a cash payment.

DID YOU KNOWS

We thought "Buy now, pay later" was a modern day slogan, but on June 19, 1880, the trustees gave the teacher a note for \$100.00 for six months at 8 per cent. Occasionally \$100.00 was borrowed to help out with the salary, from some farmer who was willing to lend, at interest of course.

In 1892, value of school ground and house, \$600.00. Contents, \$150.

Once a week during the fall and winter months in the last half of the 1800's, it was singing school night for the young people and adults. A teacher came from Ingersoll. With the aid of a tuning fork he taught his class to sing by note, and part singing. The fee for the season was one dollar per person.

Mr. Eckhardt, who taught from 1894-98, decided to change his profession and organized the Eckhardt Bell Ringers. The bells had handles and ranged in size from large heavy bells, six inches n idiameter, to tiny dinner bells. Using these bells the Eckhardts played delightful music. They also used saws and glasses partially filled with water. The better the glass, the better the tone. These musical evenings entertained audiences at home and abroad.
