Robinson had given him a Dood of it Thave been informed they accused me of being in a state of intoxication when I wrote my petitions which I reclare to be an absolute polshood as I have never had stimulas near me but once of then had purchased a place to move my family to and Inquested a vellement from Capt Diew his behaviour initated me so much that I was not able to write without stimilation but not at Government's expense or their neither I have to work hard for my Jamily I have had near den tores cleared and full into Mining beck and has had very tittle timilus while They are living in luxury and ease on their pense at the expence of the poor in Great Buttern as I have been informed that your Excellency obles this a very fine Country out who has made it so fine, of guallers, who made these charings on the funtion of Blanford, Aquates who made the avads, & quatters, where would your contemplated willage have been if it had not been for I quatters clearing the land And making the reads for when I carne to this Country first I was almost

Hill an old Man with a white head and went Jown with old age which had been induced to come into this Country Through the means of his Wife who is a native of valand and has seven sons respectable inhabitants all able to bear arms in defence of the Country he hearing your Language to me was afraid to speak for himself which is fine encouragement for settlers when it presented my first petition to you in york you told me that it should have the privilege of purchasing men you appear to have done all you can to prevent me of that privilege as you let me to understand that I need not expect mercy from you I shall now lay my case before the publish in a small book titled fuch the begger lad the bastard orgunter it shall contain all my humble petitions with the editorial remarks of Daniel Defor on the subject I shall resnit a few cohies to England and a copy of my U, E, right along with a petition to the Colonial Office I shall also wenit a few educes to M.
