Know all Men by these PRESENTS, that we Francis Samuel Bott of the Township of East Ferris in the County of Oxford Province one of the next of kin of the said deceased John Iniquard of the Township of East Ferris in the County of Oxford Surgeon and Donald Macdonald of the Township of East Ferris in the County of Oxford are held and firmly bound to His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir William Cayre K. G. B. Administrator of the Government of Canada

and to his Successor and Successors in Office, in the sum of fifty Pounds of lawful money of the said Province, to be paid to our Sovereign Lady the Queen Victoria her successor or

Successors; for which payment, to be well and truly made, we bind ourselves severally, our Heirs, and each of our Heirs, Executors, and Administrators, firmly by these Presents. Sealed with our Seals, and dated at Windsor in the County of Oxford this fourth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty seven

THE CONDITION of this obligation is such, that if the within bounden

Administrator of all and singular the goods, chattels, and credits of David Bott deceased, do make, or cause to be made, a true and perfect inventory of all and singular the goods, chattels, and credits, of the said deceased, which have or shall come into the hands, possession, or knowledge of him the said David Bott or into the hands and possession of any other person or persons for him and the same so made, do exhibit or cause to be exhibited into the Registry of the County of Oxford or before the fourth Monday in January next ensuing, and the same goods, chattels, and credits, and all other the goods, chattels, and credits of the said deceased, at the time of his death, which at any time after shall come into the hands or possession of the said Francis Samuel Bott or into the hands and possession of any other person or persons for him do well and truly administer according to law, and further do make or cause to be made a true and just account of his said administration, at or before the fourth day of July A.D. 1857 and all the rest and residue of the said goods, chattels, and credits, which shall be found remaining upon the said Administration account, the same being first examined and allowed by the Judge of the Court for the time being, shall deliver and pay unto such person or persons, respectively, as the said Judge by his decree or sentence, conformably to the provisions in a certain Act of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for the better settling Intestate Estates," and passed in the twenty-second and twenty-third year of the reign of Charles II, and also in a certain Act passed in the first year of King James II, contained, shall limit and appoint; and if it shall hereafter appear that any last Will or Testament was made by the deceased, and the Executor or Executors therein named do exhibit the same into the said Court, making request to have it allowed and approved accordingly, if the said Francis Samuel Bott within bounden, being thereunto required, do render and deliver the said Letters of Administration (approbation of such Testament being first had and made) in the said Court, then this obligation to be void and of none effect, or else to remain in full force and virtue.
