


Black History Month: Ingersoll

Robert Leeper Moore 1817-1899 Frederick Moore 1871-1937

Frederick James Walter Moore was born in 1871 in Ingersoll, a son of pastor Robert Leeper Moore and his wife Mary Ann Bush.

Fred married Effie Cornwell in 1901 and they raised 10 children - 3 boys & 7 girls: Fred "Dinty" Moore, Myrtlean, Mildred Beatrice, Bessie, Lillian, Lloyd, Ellwood, Marjorie, Violet and York. In 1916, Fred volunteered for the war effort and joined the 168th Oxford's Own Battalion. Once the 168th shipped out and arrived in England, Fred was transferred to the 2nd Canadian Labour Battalion (aka the all Black Battalion) and later Canadian Railway Troops - simply because of his colour. Fred survived the Great War and returned home to resume his career with the John Morrow Screw Company in Ingersoll and his position with the Salvation Army Brass Band. Fred Moore died in August of 1937 and tragically his daughter Violet (a local star on the all-girl baseball team) died some two weeks later.
