## Crusaders Muster Hope From Grid Doubleheader

College Avenue Secondary School Knights probably won't win many games in this their first Tri-County Football Conference eastern division senior season but at least they have hope for the future.

Knights struck for first blood yesterday afternoon at CASS, then fell apart as Ingersoll Blue Bombers scored 27 unanswered points for a 27-7 verdict in the Tri-County opener for both clubs.

The College Avenue junior Crusaders gave indication that Knights might not be such an easy mark in a few years, however, when they smothered the junior Blue Bombers, 44-0, in the second half of the doubleheader.

### PICKS UP FUMBLE

Gail Corbett recovered a Blue Bomber fumble on the Ingersoll 20-yard line early in the first quarter and four plays later Knights had the first touchdown of the 1967 season.

Halfback Adam Hornostaj set up the major with a 15-yard gallop around left end. Quarterback Ted Carter sneaked over from the one and Dave Kerr converted.

From that moment the CASS attack bogged down and a powerful Bomber running game took over. Speedy half Paul Hominick started the momentum with a 33-yard romp to Knights' 47 and Bombers continued their march to the 20 as the quarter ended.

Knights repelled two running plays early in the second quarter but Ingersoll's third down gamble provided the turning point. George Lindsay's pass to end Don Knox fell incomplete but a pass interference call gave the winners the ball on the three. Al Lockhart bucked for the major.

Bombers quickly regained the ball after the kickoff and another long gainer by Hominick set up Lindsay's quarterback sneak for a touchdown. The missed convert left the score 12-7 at half time.

It was Hominick again who struck quickly as the second

half opened. He rambled 64 yards for a score on Bombers' first play from scrimmage.

Hornostaj conceded a safety touch when he couldn't handle the snap in Knights' end zone as he attempted to punt on the final play of the third quarter.

Lockhart's second touchdown came late in the final stanza when he scored from the three-yard-line after two consecutive roughing penalties helped Ingersoll move close. Steve Craig's convert completed scoring.

### RICHARDS BEST

Gord Richard spearheaded an explosive ground attack for Crusaders with a whopping 206 yards in only eight carries. He set the pattern for the romp with an 80-yard touchdown burst up the middle on the game's first play from scrimmage. Quarterback Henry Kowalski booted the convert.

Richards added a third-quarter major on an electrifying 91-yard dash. David Smyth also contributed a pair of touchdowns. Kowalski, Jim Rucknor and Dominic Raso scored the remaining TDs.

Raso stunned the Ingersoll squad when he gathered in a punt on his own five-yard line, cut for the left sidelines and streaked to paydirt. Smyth's fourth-quarter touchdown was the lone one through the air. He and Kowalski combined for a 33-yard pass-and run strike.

Kowalski was second to Richards along the ground with 69 yards in five carries while Rucknor finished with 59 for six tries. The halftime score was 19-0.

# Senior Blue Bombers Win Out, But Juniors Lose Their Opener

INGERSOLL — Ingersoll District Collegiate Institute and Huron Park Secondary School, split a Tri County High School Football Conference, double-header at Ingersoll yesterday.

The Ingersoll Blue Bomber Seniors won a thrilling 6-2 victory over the Huron Park Huskies but the HPSS Pups avenged the loss by scoring a one sided 38-1 win over the Junior Bombers.

Paul Hominick, fleet Ingersoll full back scored the only touchdown in the senior battle on a 60 yard run, mid way in the fourth quarter. He took a pitch out from quarterback George Lindsay and after evading a couple of tackles, skirted the rest of the way down the side-

line. Steve Craig failed to convert.

The Huskies scored their 2 points with about five minutes remaining when Bill Caldwell conceded a safety as Ingersoll had the ball on their one yard line.

The last five minutes produced a lot of action as Huron Park were stopped on the Bomber four. Ingersoll took over but couldn't move the ball and Caldwell was forced to kick. The Huskies took possession on the Bomber 37.

The Bombers were called for pass interference on a ball headed for Eugene Jaworski at the 14.

The Huskies on runs by Dave Beatty carried the ball to the Ingersoll four and on the last play of the game Beatty was stopped on the Ingersoll one.

Penalties were costly to all the way in the junior game Huron Park especially a Pettit to Jaworski pass for 44 yards late in the first half which would have put the ball on the Bomber 15. It was called for illegal procedure. Huron Park made 13 first downs to Ingersoll's 6.

Hominick and Allan Lockhart, were outstanding for the winners. Lockhart ran the opening kick off in the second half 85 yards. Bill Hawkins and Don Knox were great on defence. It was tackles by this pair who saved the game in the last five minutes.

For Huron Park Dave Beatty, John Hanna and Jaworski played a great game on offence. Nick Konietzko and Dave Simm played strong defensively.

The Pups were in command

and the inexperienced Bombers were no match for them.

They led 12-1 at half time and in the second half completely dominated the play.

Led by quarterback John Luckman who was the outstanding player on the field. His long accurate passes showed Ingersoll fans the best passing they have seen in years. He also made a 65 yard run for a TD and handled his team well.

Warren Smith scored the first of the Pups 6 TD's early in the first quarter on a six yard run. Dick Foster made the score 12-0 on a 15 yarder late in the quarter. Ingersoll scored their only point on a single by kicker Harold Noad. The Pups scored late in the third quarter on a two yard plunge by Harry Kozub. Luckman passed to Larry Ernewein for a two point conversion and the Pups led 20-0.

In the last quarter they really ran wild. Early in the quarter Luckman made his great 65 yard run. Warren Smith plunged over from two yards to make it 26-0 and Kozub completed the scoring on a one yard plunge.

Ingersoll while outclassed

fought to the end and three times in the last quarter the defensive unit stopped the Pups on goaline stands to take over the ball.

Huron Park made 14 first downs to Bombers five. The Bombers showed some promising talent in quarter Steve Elah, Bill Phillips, Bill Page and Dave Beynon.

Besides Luckman, Kozub, Smith and Ernewein were best offensively. The entire defensive unit looked good.

The seniors lost by a score of 26-12 and the juniors 15-6.

The Blue Bomber: fumbled themselves to defeat in the senior game as they gave up the ball four times with three of them leading to touchdowns.

Bombers were also handicapped in the second half as their star running back Paul Hominick was out of action with an ankle injury.

INGERSOLL — College Avenue Secondary School and Ingersoll District Collegiate Institute Blue Bombers split their Tri-County High School Football Conference doubleheader here yesterday.

Blue Bombers blanked CASS Knights in the senior game, 27-0, but CASS Crusaders came back for revenge by swamping Bomber juniors, 45-1.

The feature of the twin bill was the sensational running of Gord Richards — fleet halfback for CASS juniors — who scored three touchdowns on runs of 85, 70 and 65 yards.

The first quarter of the senior game was scoreless but in the second stanza Allan Lockhart put Ingersoll on the scoreboard on a one-yard plunge. Steve Craig converted to put Bombers up 7-0. Dave Peden made it 13-0 on a two-yard plunge and that was the score at half time.

In the third quarter Lockhart scored his second touchdown on a two yarder. Scott Walker passed to Lockhart for a two-point conversion to make it 21-0.

Brian Stephenson picked off a pass from quarterback Dave Garrett to complete scoring.

The running of Lockhart, the passing of Garrett and the defensive play of George Lindsay featured the play of the Blue Bombers.

Lockhart made runs of 35, 25, 23, 15 and 14 yards while Garrett completed long passes to Stephenson for 37 and 27 yards.

Lindsay was outstanding and intercepted four CASS passes.

Peden made a number of good gains as the Bombers picked up 14 first downs to seven by the visitors.

# Pups Snap Back Strong Clinch Junior Pennant

Huron Park Secondary School Pups realize today that sometimes it pays to suffer defeat.

Pups learned a good lesson from Tuesday's loss at the hands of Woodstock Collegiate Institute junior Red Devils and bounced back yesterday to whitewash Ingersoll District Collegiate Institute Blue Bombers, 36-0, in the second half of a doubleheader at Huron Park.

Blue Bomber seniors stunned HPSS Huskies, 7-6, with an ex-

iting touchdown by Al Lockhart in the final minute of the muddy opening contest.

### HOST PLAYOFF

The Pup victory pushed them to the head of the Tri-County Football Conference eastern division junior race. It also gave them the right to entertain the runner-up College Avenue Secondary School Crusaders next Thursday afternoon at two p.m. in a playoff to decide a representative for the Tri-County Bowl on Saturday, November 11.

Lockhart grabbed a flare pass from quarterback Dave Garratt and slipped 85 yards up the right sidelines as Ingersoll recovered with 22 seconds showing on the clock to take third place in the senior loop.

Scott Walker kicked a single late in the second quarter to account for the visitors' remaining point. Dave Beatty slanted off tackle from the two-yard line to give the hosts a shortlived lead less than four minutes before Walker's 34-yard punt rolled out of bounds.

Huskies' defensive unit contained Bombers well throughout until Lockhart broke loose. The losers were held to short yardage on their ground attack and passing was almost nonexistent because of weather conditions.

### FUMBLE HURTS

Huron Park advanced to the Ingersoll two-yard line early in the first period but a fumble cost a chance to score. Tom Ariss intercepted a Garratt toss at the Bomber 39 but the losers failed to score on another early opportunity.

Lockhart came up with a big defensive effort to stop HPSS again moments before Beatty's major. He knocked down a Jeff Pettit pass at his own seven as Huskies tried a third-down gamble.

The hosts' defence took over in the third quarter to put down an Ingersoll threat after two big gains by Lockhart. Lockhart romped 43 yards in two carries and Bombers had possession on the HPSS 23. But the losers put up a solid wall, claimed the ball on downs and marched downfield to the IDC 20 before Ingersoll's Chris Reade came up with a key interception.

### LEAD JUNIORS

Mark Payne and Warren Smith managed two touchdowns each as Pups returned to the form they exhibited in their first four starts. Dick Foster and second-stringer Paul Howley added the other majors.

Payne, Foster and Smith reached paydirt in the first half as Huron Park jumped in front, 18-0. Payne and Smith scored in

the third quarter before head coach Lorne Jenkins inserted his reserves in the final period.

Ron Routly set up the final scoring play with three and one-half minutes left. He pounced on a Bomber fumble at the four-yard line and Howley went over two plays later from the two.

Pups completed their regular schedule with 202 points scored — an excellent average of 33.7 per start — and allowed only 17. Crusaders were second offensively but permitted 70.

# Ontario prep track format changed to two days

The format of the Ontario high school track and field championships has been changed for the first time in the long history of the meet.

The championships next year will go to a two-day meet and will be held for the second straight time at Toronto's Canadian National Exhibition stadium. The site was picked unanimously by coaches attending recent meetings of the Ontario Federation of School Athletic Associations.

Pete Beach, secretary of OFSAA and director for the track and field championships, announced the dates as Friday May 30 and Saturday May 31 for the 1969 meet.

Events on May 30 will start at 6:30 p.m. and will be conducted in daylight ending at approximately 9 p.m. The Saturday program will be both in the morning and afternoon.

Semi-finals will be added in the 100, 220, 440 and hurdles. This will allow at least two people to move forward from each heat into the semi-finals. There will be preliminaries in field events with three attempts in the first round and three more for the athletes who qualify for the final.

"We are going to operate by the IAAF (International Amateur Athletics Federation) rule book," Beach stated.

He said too that chances are "good" that the 440 hurdles and medley relay will be added to the program. Discussion

also took place on adding the hammer throw and steeplechase but because of the danger in the hammer and the lack of facilities at most tracks for steeplechase, the chances of putting these two on the program was "almost nil."

Beach added that since the championships have now gone to a two-day meet that a proposal for the meet to be divided into four zone meets followed by the championships has been discarded.

A suggestion that the meet be held later in June was also talked down since the high school group has an agreement with various track clubs that the high school meet will be held in May and then the high school athletes are free

to join the track clubs for meets in June.

"Our people (high school) were of the opinion that they didn't want to tread on anyone's toes. But they wanted to do the best for their kids even if it meant treading on somebody's toes," Beach said of the proposed June date.

The OFSAA secretary said that while plans were set for next year's track championships that the way was still open for a date in late June in future years if coaches agreed.

OFSAA has set dates for major sports during the 1968-69 term. Cross-country championships will be at the Boyd Conservation area in the Toronto area the first Saturday in November. The 16-team

basketball tournament has been awarded to the University of Waterloo and the hockey tournament to Newmarket both during the Easter vacation period. The swimming championships will be at the University of Waterloo March 1 with the wrestling scheduled for North Bay either Feb. 28 and March 1 or March 7-8. If the wrestling championships are held on the latter date they will be staged in the North Bay Arena.

Catholic Central has won the London and District Conference junior tennis team title and Central the senior crown.

The Crusaders swept three singles matches with Central to take the junior title. Louis Desmarieux beat Paul

Thompson 7-5, 6-4; Bill Byrick downed Steve Firth 6-3, 6-0 and Murray Morgan defeated Dave Taylor 3-6, 6-2, 6-0.

Central edged Lucas 3-2 to take the senior championship.

Central won two of the three singles matches with Tom Morkin beating John Gilpin 10-8, 6-4 and Joe Burnett downing Bill Markvoort 6-1, 6-3. Bill Fenwick of Lucas won the other singles match 6-0, 7-5 over Gord Anderson.

In doubles, Fenwick and Gilpin beat Anderson and Morkin 6-8, 6-3, 6-0. Central took the other with Burnett and Don Robinson beating Markvoort and Watson 6-4, 6-2.

# East Elgin takes Tri-County track title

Cy Wilkinson had an idea his East Elgin District High track team might win the Tri-County Conference boys' championships yesterday at Western's J. W. Little Memorial Stadium. But just for luck, he kept his fingers crossed.

And it worked out just fine as the Aylmer high school came through with its first team championship since the Conference expanded to 12 schools and split into east and west divisions.

"I thought we might win the junior and stay close enough in midget and senior to win. I kept my fingers crossed," the East Elgin coach said.

It didn't work out quite that way but Wilkinson was too elated to worry about it. His juniors didn't win their division but his midgets did. And this coupled with a second place finish in the junior division and a fourth place spot in the senior group were plenty points enough to give East Elgin the over-all title.

East Elgin scored 215½ points to defending champion Simcoe which was runner-up with 187½ points.

"We didn't bring our boys just to run. We wanted to place in every event. Those fifth and six places count for a lot of points," Wilkinson added.

And to show that he and his team meant business they went out and scored points in 31 of the 42 events on the program.

Seven records were chalked up in a day of close finishes. And East Elgin had a hand and foot in the record-setting with a new mark in the open mile relay when Jim Parlow, Dave Shackleton, Bob Martindale and Gerald Catt sped to the finish line in 3:39.5, under the old record of 3:40.3.

Woodstock Huron Park's Martin Shapiro had a big day with two records in the junior (formerly intermediate) division. The 17-year-old Shapiro ran 52.7 in his heat of the 440 to establish a new record, well under the former mark of 53.3.

He ran the final also under the old record with a time of 53.2.

"I've never run on anything like this before. It's just like heaven," young Shapiro said of Western's all-weather surface which was unaffected by early morning rains.

He also did 42'6½" in the triple jump far ahead of the old record of 40'8½".

Woodstock Collegiate Insti-

tute chalked up two of the new records both in field events. Henry Janssen tossed the senior 12-pound shot 46'4¼", beating the old mark by nearly a foot while Kim Willoughby erased the old midget (formerly junior) discus record with a toss of 142'3". The old record was 131'.

Other records went to Wray Rutherford of Simcoe in the senior triple jump with a leap

# London faces tough WOSSA competition

If performances in preliminary meets hold up, you can look for London high schools to make a strong showing in the midget class. Sarnia schools, particularly Central, to dominate the junior division with a close battle between Sarnia, London and Tri-County Conference schools in the senior group during the WOSSA boys track and field championships Saturday at Western's J. W. Little Memorial Stadium.

A comparison made of marks established during championship meets in the London and District Conference, the Tri-County Conference, the Sarnia Secondary Schools Athletic Association and the Huron-Perth Conference showed the following results.

In the midget class, London had the best marks in nine of the 14 events. Sarnia was next with four while Tri-County Conference led in one.

Sarnia was far in front in the junior (formerly intermediate) division with seven best marks and tied with London in one other event.

London schools led in three and tied with Sarnia in one. The Tri-County Conference was tops in two and the Huron-Perth Conference in one.

Results in the senior division were much closer. Sarnia was tops in four and tied for the lead in another. The Tri-County Conference had the same record. London led in three and was tied with Sarnia for top spot in another. Huron-Perth led in one event, the long jump.

In the two open events, the mile relay and two miles which will be on Saturday's program, London had the best time in one—the two miles by Central's John Hiscock with Tri-County leading in the other with 3:39.5 by East Elgin.

Hiscock's time is one of the best in the province so far for two miles.

Another excellent time is the 15.7 turned in by Brian Rice of South in the midget hurdles.

The Sarnia meet produced a flock of records including a 10.1 100 yards and a 22.5 for the 220 in the senior division by Joel Thomas of Northern. A few other notable Sarnia

performers were Glen Close of Central in the hurdles, Mike Withers of Northern in the javelin, Vince Evers of Central in the junior 880, Paul Wormith of Northern in the junior sprints and Ray Betteto of St. Patrick's in the midget mile.

Pete Snow of Wingham of the Huron-Perth Conference had the best senior long jump mark in the preliminary meets with 21'4". He will have lots of competition from Lucas' Jerry Vermeulen.

The Tri-County Conference and London and District Conference competitors had one advantage in their meets. They both ran over Western's all-weather track. Given good weather Saturday times in running events should be better while high jumpers will have improved facilities with an all-weather takeoff area.

Past performances will mean a lot Saturday. But just as in past WOSSA track championships, there are bound to be surprises too.

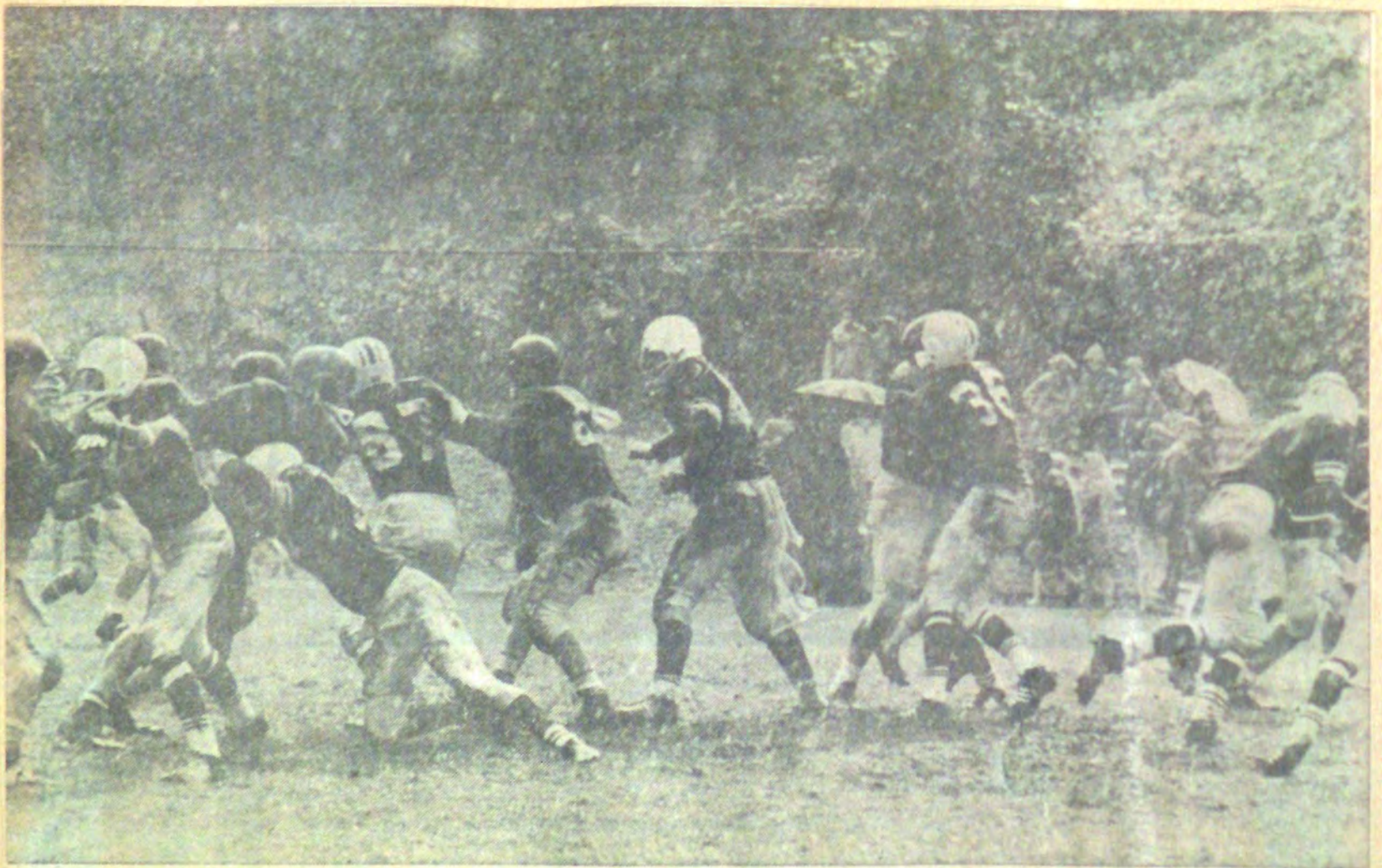

# Bombers New T-C Powerhouse

This could be the year of the Blue Bomber.

Ingersoll District Collegiate Blue Bombers have shown the finest offence in the Tri-County Conference eastern division high school football group since the 1965 Huron Park Secondary School Huskies and

could rate as favorites when they challenge for a berth in the annual Tri-County Bowl.

Bombers scored big in each of the first three quarters yesterday afternoon at College Avenue Secondary School to rip CASS Knights, 45-7, in their final game on the regular schedule. IDCI juniors made it a clean sweep for

their school by overcoming a narrow deficit to stop the winless College Avenue Crusaders, 19-7.

Bill Caldwell romped for three touchdowns and Al Lockhart and Paul Hominick each added a pair as Bomber seniors humiliated Knights. Steve Craig kicked two converts and a single to round

out the scoring and enabled his mates to surpass Simcoe Composite School Sabres' offensive mark in 1966 to place just slightly behind the '65 Huskies.

Lockhart slanted 75 yards off tackle for a major on the second play and rushed for 154 yards in only nine carries as Bombers ran their of-

fensive total to 188 points in six starts. The Ingersoll entry lost only once — 1-0 to Woodstock Collegiate Institute Red Devils, one of the clubs it could face in a sudden-death Tri-County Bowl semi-final next Friday.

Huskies scored 201 times three years ago and still have an opportunity to claim the eastern crown this season. They clash with Devils tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock at the Southside Sportsfield enclosure and the winner earns the right to advance against Bombers while the loser faces the less enjoyable prospect of finishing the schedule in third place.

Craig added the extra point following Lockhart's quick score and Bombers were off and running. Hominick closed out a rush of 57 yards in just six plays when he shook off a few tacklers to gallop 21 yards up the middle for the second touchdown. The same ball carrier scored again before the first quarter ended.

Hominick charged around the end for 19 yards to reach paydirt and bring an early 19-0 edge. He was used just five times as a ball carrier but gained 50 yards and added 26 yards on one throw from quarterback George Lindsay.

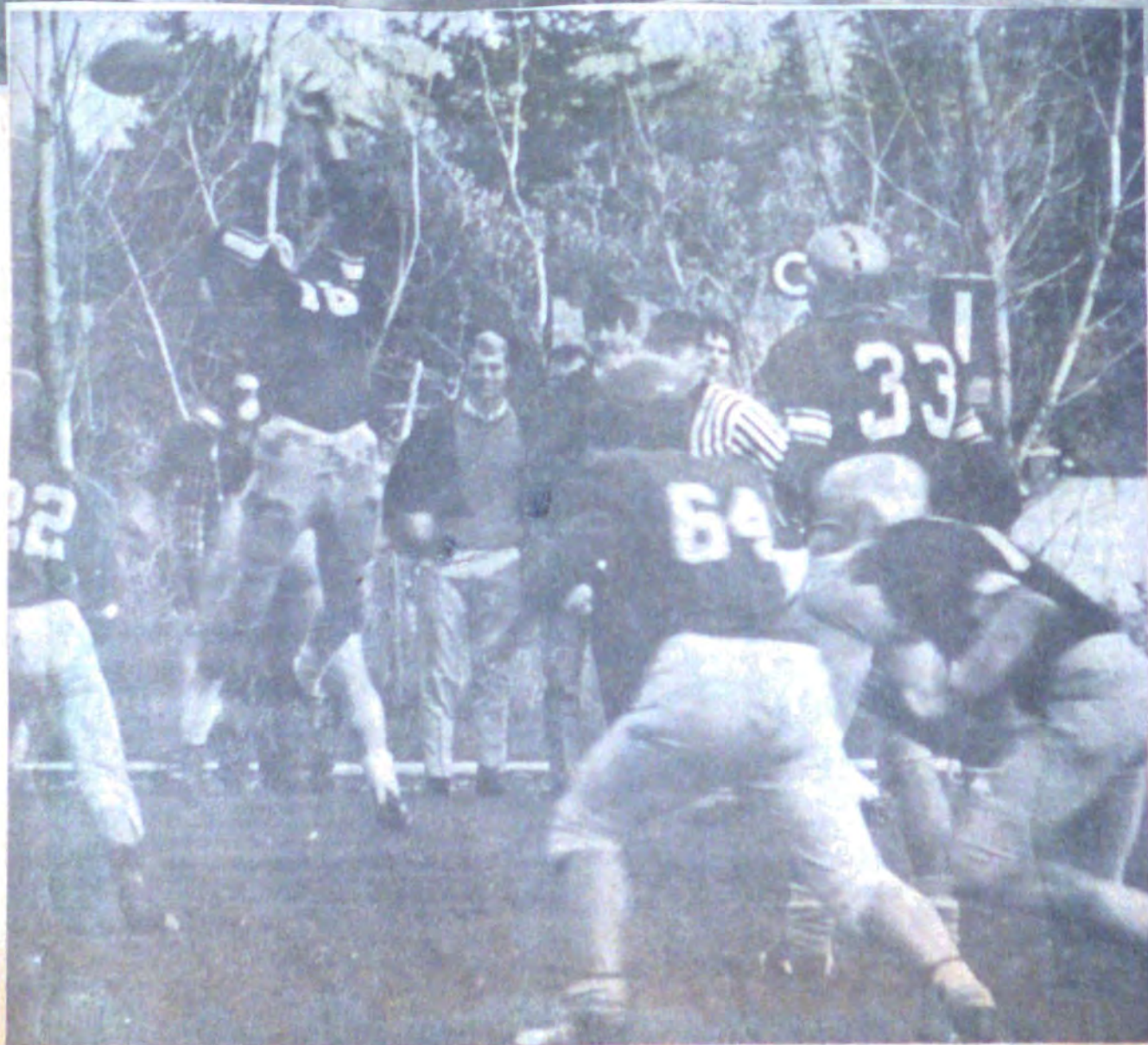
Caldwell raced 34 yards around the end for another major early in the second period and Hominick supplied a key block on the final Knight pursuer. Reserve pivot Dave Garratt hit Caldwell with a short five-yard scoring pass to raise Bombers' margin to 31-0 at half-time and the winners continued their merciless attack in the third period.

The losers discovered in the fourth there is only one way to stop Bombers — don't give them the ball. Glen Shipp recovered an Ingersoll fumble at his own five-yard line to start the hosts' big rush up the field.

# Showdown For Senior Crown

Defence is the most important part of football and Woodstock Collegiate Institute senior Red Devils are lucky they have at least the second best defence in the Tri-County

Conference eastern division. Devils' biggest problem is that their opponents in tomorrow afternoon's eastern final—Ingersoll District Collegiate Institute Blue Bombers — pos-

sess the least scored upon defence and also own the most awesome attack.

Bombers are the highest-scoring entry in their group in at least three years and entertain Devils at 2:30 p.m. tomorrow with hopes of finding a berth in the annual Tri-County Bowl. Devils are probably better than Bombers on defence despite giving up five more points. But offensively they need more as can be seen by their low total of 85 points scored.

#### NEED HELP

Tom Downing directs an inconsistent attack that came through with just nine touchdowns. The defenders managed one-third that output and Hominick alone outdid Devils in the touchdown department with 10.

Big Byron Nader and Brian Shelton and smaller but more agile Gord Yates are the keys for Devils if they expect to repeat their earlier victory and enter their third Bowl in a row. Jim Whitelaw will also have to direct an almost perfect defence to contain Hominick and company.

It could be one of the most outstanding games in recent history. Both clubs will be giving all to come out best and earn the right to represent their loop against either St. Thomas Parkside Stampeders or Central Elgin one week from Saturday.

## Blue Bombers, Red Devils Clash Head-On Tomorrow

INGERSOLL — The liveliest place in Oxford County tomorrow afternoon will be the Ingersoll District Collegiate Institute Sportsfield where the Woodstock Collegiate Institute Red Devils and Ingersoll Blue Bombers clash in a sudden death game for the Eastern Division Senior Championship of the Tri-County High School Conference.

Ingersoll is expecting the biggest crowd in its football history as WCI will be up in full

force to root their charges on. The Woodstock School is steeped in tradition dating back to 1929 when L. A. Wendling took over as coach. Under "Wendy" the Red Dev-

Devils and Bombers battled on almost even terms throughout the season and went into the final contest with identical records — at least in the won-lost department. Bombers' scoring power was shown by their average of 31 and one-third points per game, however, and they continued to exhibit their explosive attack and a tough defence as they secured some revenge for an earlier 1-0 defeat inflicted by WCI.

The winners were superior in every department and the defence contained Devils with ease. The backfielders did the rest by making large gains — especially with end sweeps — when the offence took over.

Bombers represented their group in the junior Bowl test two years ago. The poise they have acquired with their rise to senior should be enough to carry them past Parkside next weekend.

# Parkside passing faces Ingersoll running in Bowl

ST. THOMAS — A strong passing game will meet an equally strong running game here Saturday when St. Thomas Parkside Stampeders face Ingersoll Blue Bombers in the Tri-County Bowl at Pinafore Park.

Parkside, winner of the Tri-County Conference Western Division senior football championship, finished the season with a 5-1 mark and whipped Central Elgin 26-0 to gain the final.

"Over the year we have passed on about 50 per cent of our plays," said Dave Donahue, who along with Howard Ross and Dave Oswald, form a three-man coaching staff at Parkside.

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## Something New

For the first time in history there will be no Woodstock team in the Tri-County Bowl.

St. Thomas Parkside Stampeders entertain Ingersoll District Collegiate Institute Blue Bombers and Tillsonburg Annandale Marauders meet Simcoe Composite School Sabres Saturday in the senior and junior struggles for the Bickle-Seagrave Trophy and Ferguson Rugby Trophy respectively.

Pinafore Park in St. Thomas will be the site of the 10th annual Bowl. The Tri-County Conference eastern and western division junior champions will be battling for Aymer East Elgin Secondary School Purple Flashes' 1967 title and the seniors will be hoping to take over wearing Woodstock Collegiate Institute Red Devils' crown.

Never before has a city entry missed the senior final — Devils have claimed four of the previous seven eastern championships and Huron Park Secondary School Huskies have won three. Flashes grabbed the initial game in 1959 and Marauders snapped Huskies' three-season reign in 1966.

Bombers are making their first appearance ever in the senior final. They will depend largely on a fast backfield and competent defensive alignment with expectations of handing Stamps their second loss of the season.

Coaches Neil Desborough and Bill Martin have formed their Ingersoll crew from the nucleus of the 1966 junior runners-up. They have put together the most impressive offence in the east since Huskies were the powers for three straight terms until 1965.

Quick Paul Hominick and Bill Caldwell plus hard-charging Al Lockhart are the major threats for Bombers. They enabled their team to count 213 points in only seven starts and will present many problems for Stamps.

Senior powers usually remain at or near the top for a number of years and Devils and Huskies display this point best. WCI clubs under coach Dick Killinger stopped Huskies twice and Stamps once on the way to three consecutive crowns between 1960 and 1962 and rebounded four years later to advance to the finals for two successive seasons.

Huskies repeated Devils' performance of three straight titles — with Eric McIlveen at the helm — beginning in 1963. They were also runners-up twice in a row earlier but have slipped slightly since WCI rose to the top in recent terms.

Seven senior crowns have stayed in the east — all at WCI and Huron Park — and Bombers should continue the trend and become the first non-Woodstock eastern winner.

On their return home, the new champions were met at the outskirts of town by Mayor G. B. Henry and a large crowd of well wishers. A parade was formed and the Bombers took Ingersoll's traditional fire truck ride behind the IDCI band through the heart of town to the school, followed by the stu-

dent body and a long line of cars. It was a noisy but happy procession.

At the school auditorium, Mayor Henry congratulated the Blue Bombers before a large crowd. The Bombers proved that a good running attack will beat a good passing attack.

Ingersoll's touchdowns were scored by hard charging Alan Lockhart and fleet Paul Hominick. Both came in the third quarter when the Bombers broke the game wide open. Lockhart plunged over from the

## Bread and butter play brings Bombers a title

ST. THOMAS — Ingersoll Blue Bombers earned champagne Saturday with their bread and butter play.

A 60-yard punt return started the Bombers to a 15-6 victory over St. Thomas Parkside and gave them their first Tri-County Conference senior football championship in their first time to the final. The victory also enabled Ingersoll to become the first team outside Woodstock to win the championship in the last eight years.

"They were pretty happy," said Neil Desborough who along with Bill Martin coaches the team. "The town gave them a big reception. There was a parade with the team riding on the fire truck. The mayor (G. B. Henry) spoke to the kids and the merchants carried the score of the game in their windows," Desborough said.

The victory was the seventh in eight games for the Bombers whose only loss was a 1-0

setback by Woodstock Collegiate in the first game of the regular schedule.

Since then, however, they rolled to an amazing record of 188 points for and only 24 against. The momentum carried into Saturday's final.

Ingersoll's "bread and butter" play has been long returns on kickoff and punts with trackmen Paul Hominick and Bill Caldwell posing a double threat. It was this threat that led to the Bombers first single and first touchdown.

Parkside punter, Ken Lucas, attempting to delay his punt in order to allow his teammates more time to get downfield, had the kick blocked by Jim Edwards at the Parkside 10-yard line. The touchdown was the first of three in the third quarter.

Parkside's outstanding quarterback Wayne Tobey hit Chuck Moon on a 36-yard pass and run play to the Ingersoll 24-yard line. Several plays later Tobey connected with Jim Sullivan in the end zone from five yards out. A two-point convert pass to Lucas went incomplete.

Desborough felt the wet field was more a disadvantage to his ball club than to Parkside's pass orientated offence.

"They were throwing a dry ball on a wet field," Desborough said. "Once our defenders committed themselves it was hard to recover on the wet field."

With Lockhart grinding up the middle and Hominick slanting outside tackle, the Bombers moved into scoring position with the aid of two Parkside penalties.

Hominick, who runs the 100 in 10.1, sprinted around end from three yards out to score.

Parkside stopped an Ingersoll drive at their three-yard line in the fourth quarter but fell behind 15-6 when Lucas' following third-down punt went into the line at the 30-yard line. Ron Armstrong kicked the single from 11 yards out.

A second quarter touchdown on a 7-yard run by Roger Thornton and a 2-point convert pass

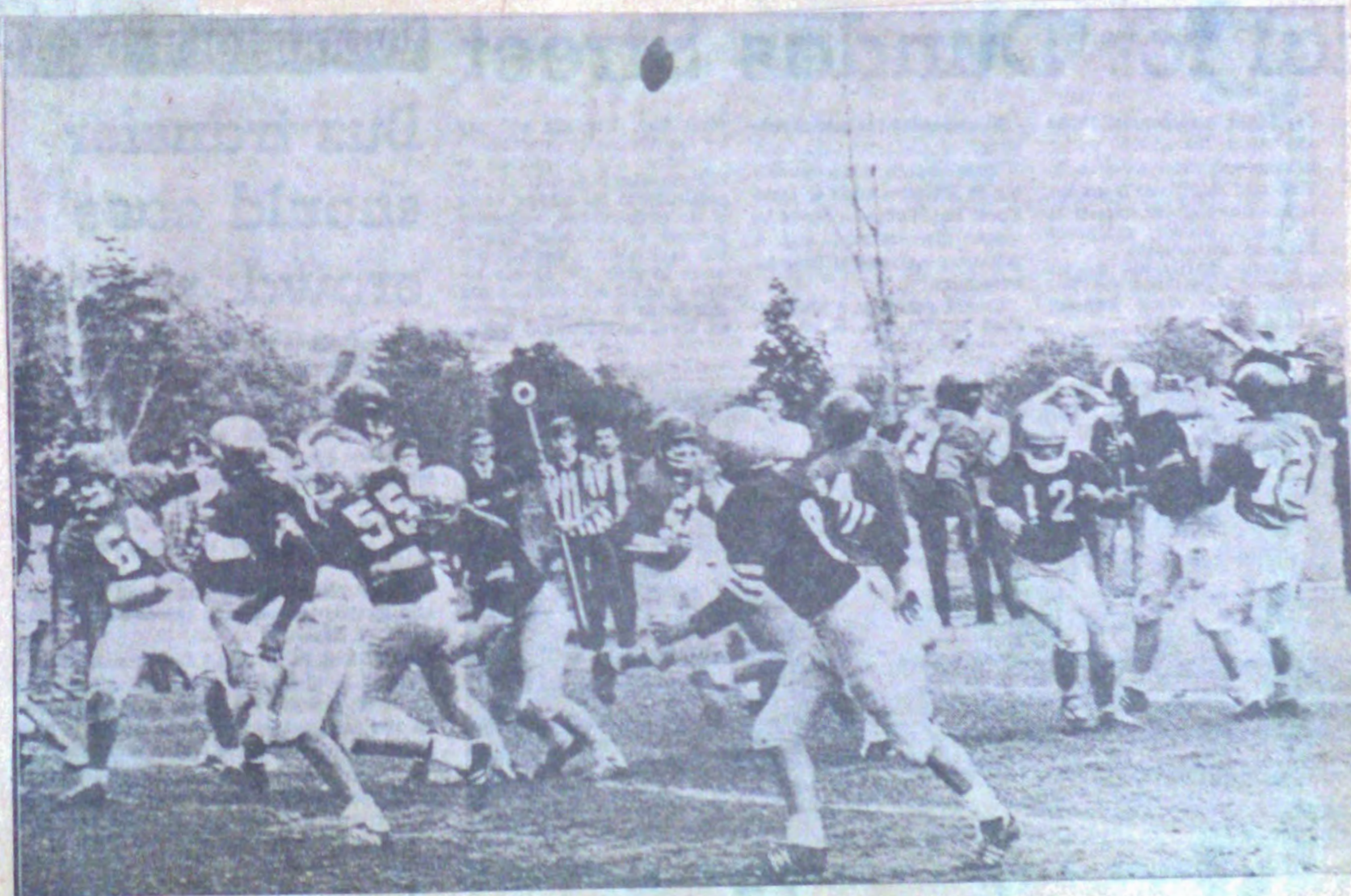

Tom Payne played well in the secondary as he batted down a couple of the few passes that Ken Oliver tried.

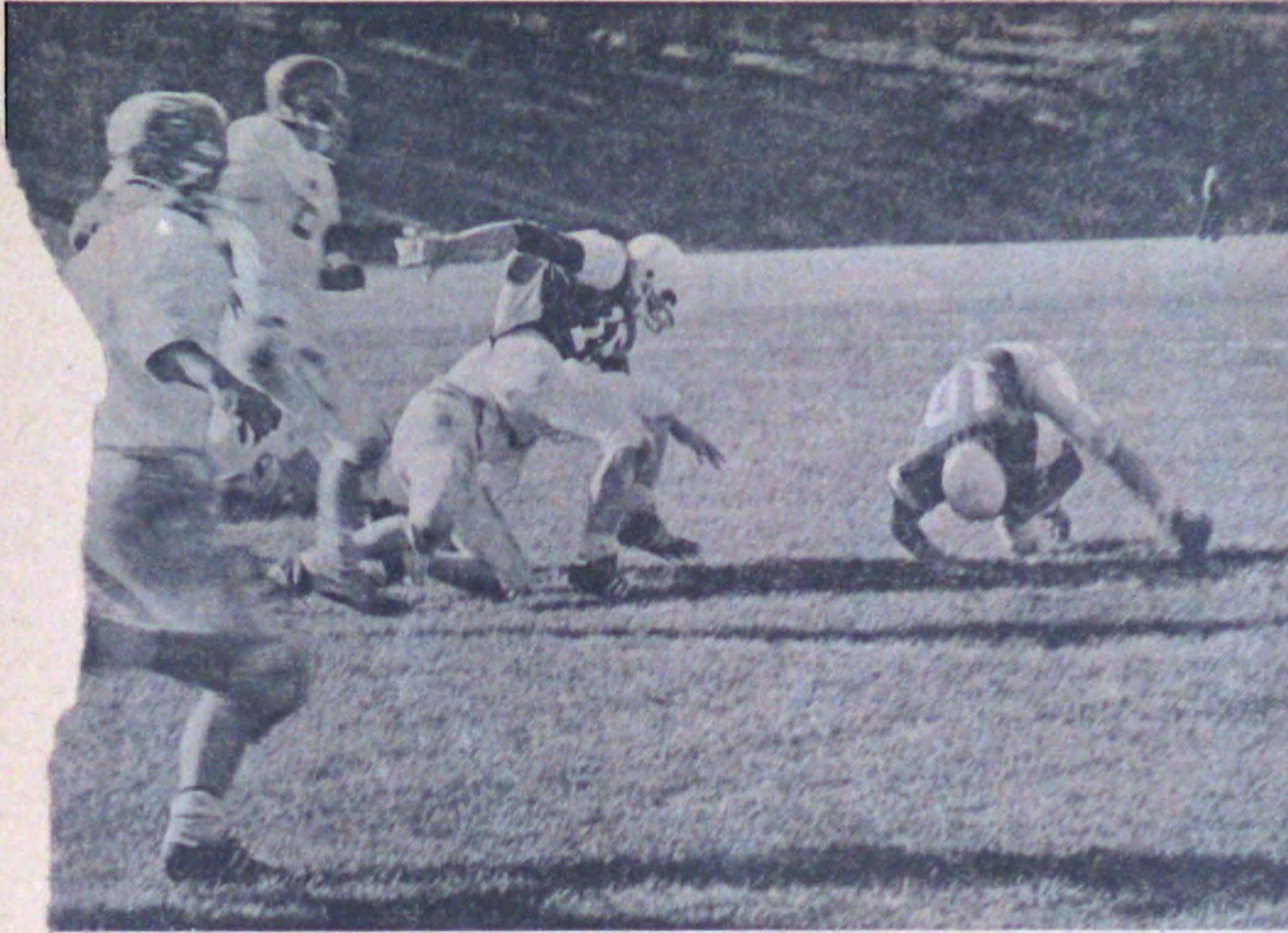
The Bombers completed two of six passes and College Avenue completed one of three.

Roy Dansman was outstanding on defence once again as he anchored the middle of the CASS defensive line.

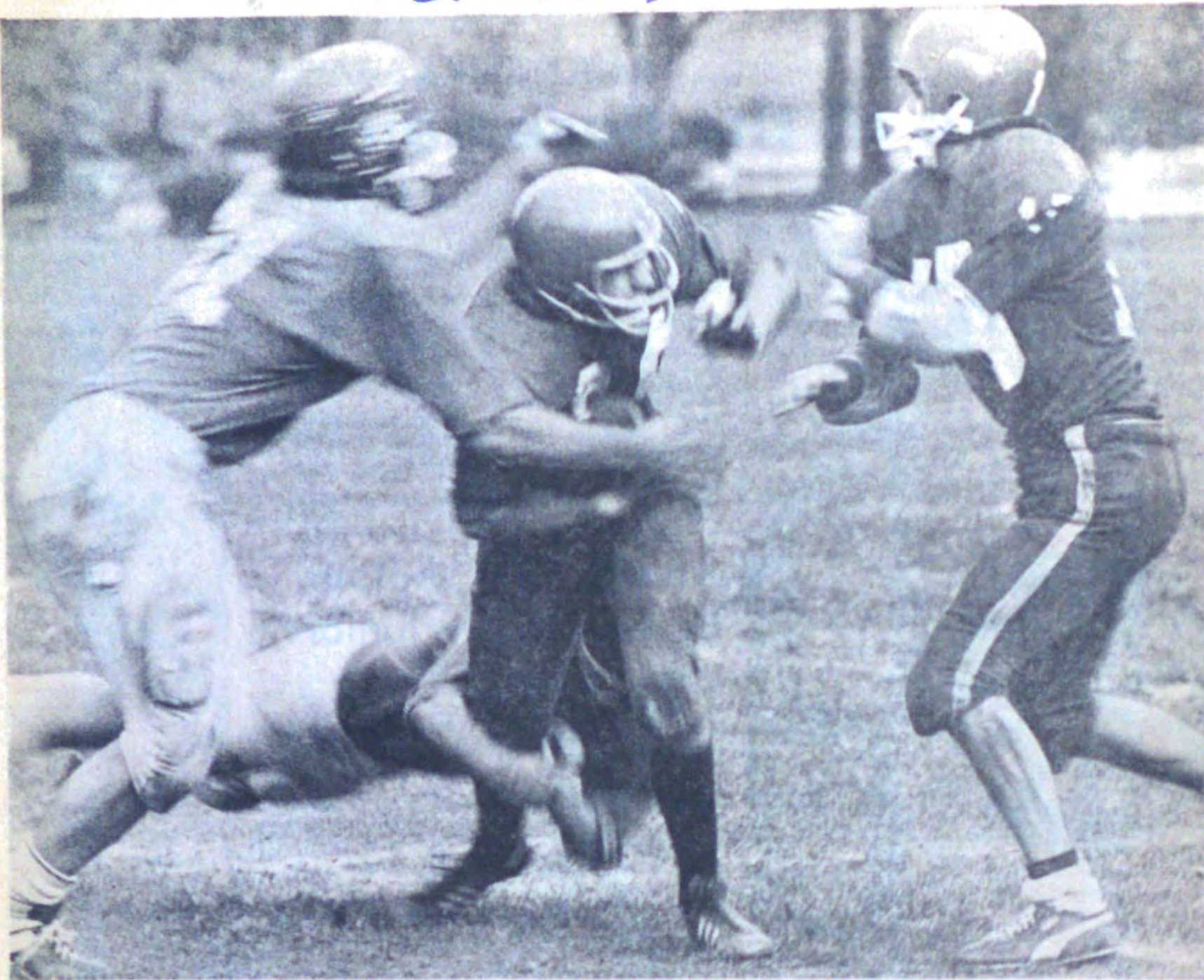
Kirby galloped for 124 yards, Blair 63, and Naisbitt 42 for the Blue Bombers.

## Turnovers kill sustained drives

Ingersoll's senior Blue Bombers took advantage of turnovers by the Woodstock Collegiate Red Devils as they defeated the Devils 26-7 in an Oxford County senior football game Friday at Southside Park Sportsfield.

# IDCI juniors dump Parkside

ST. THOMAS — Ingersoll District Collegiate Institute and Parkside Collegiate split their exhibition football doubleheader here yesterday afternoon at the Parkside campus.

Parkside blanked the Ingersoll Blue Bomber Seniors 24-0 in the opener but the Bomber Juniors defeated Parkside 13-7 in the second game.

Actually the score of the senior game should have read Desbrowe 24 Ingersoll 0 because John Desbrowe, the big speedy back of the Stampeders, put all their points on the board as he went over for four major scores. None was converted.

Early in the first quarter after Parkside recovered an Ingersoll fumble on their own 45 yard line Desbrowe was left wide open and took a pass from quarter Dale Reek to go all the way for the first score. The pass and run covered 65 yards.

Jaro Wojciki tried to run a two point conversion but failed.

In the second quarter Desbrowe skirted the left end of the line from the Ingersoll 12 for his second TD of the game.

The convert failed when Reek's pass was knocked down.

Near the end of the quarter Grant Houstons pass hit Desbrowe and he scampered down the right side line, like a tight rope walker, for 45 yards and another major score. The convert failed and the Stampeders led 18-0 at half time.

Midway in the third quarter Desbrowe, with some good blocking, went 63 yards for his fourth T.D.

## CALLED BACK TD

In the last quarter Ingersoll got closer to pay dirt than they had at any time in the game. Norm Naisbitt who was the best runner they had went over from the 23 but it was called back for illegal motion. The Bombers got

the ball to Parkside eight but lost it on downs.

Ingersoll made four fumbles, which were costly while Parkside didn't give the ball away once.

Parkside completed six passes to Ingersoll's three and Parkside made 13 first downs to the Bombers nine. At no time could Ingersoll get a sustained drive going.

Coaches Neil Desborough and Bill Martin gave all their charges a chance. Al Costello and Jack Shewan split the quarterback job in the first half and Barry Brady took over in the second. Brady passed well and out of five attempts completed two to Pat Fortner and Dennis Glover. Max Lindsay completed the other Bomber pass from Shewan. Naisbitt gained the most yardage for the Bombers but Earl Carter, Bruce Blair and Lindsay made gains.

Defensively Paul Henderson

at safety stood out knocking down five Parkside passes.

## LONG GONE

The Junior game started out like it was going to be a rout for IDCI. On Ingersoll's second play from scrimmage speedy Alistair Campbell, with a couple of good blocks, broke away and showed a clean pair of heels to the Parkside crew as he ran 85 yards down the right sideline to score. Campbell kicked the extra point and the Bombers led 7-0.

Parkside got on the scoreboard when Peter Szaboltz punted from the Ingersoll 21 and the point was conceded.

The Bombers scored again early in the second quarter when quarterback Rob Vader pitched out to Greg Stewart and he sprung loose to run 75 yards for a TD.

Moments later Stewart again made a brilliant run after receiving a Parkside punt at midfield, he sprinted all the way across the goal line but the play was called back because of a

clipping penalty.

Ingersoll led 13-1 at half time.

Parkside outplayed Ingersoll in the second half but it wasn't until Midway in the last quarter that they scored as Mike Gilber went over from the one. The convert failed.

Outside of Campbell's and Stewart's big runs the Bombers had difficulty moving the ball as Parkside made 10 first downs to their three. Parkside completed four passes in seven attempts while the Bombers made one in two tries.

Ingersoll's defensive unit should be given a lions share of the victory. Two players stood out and they were Scott Guthrie and Doug Collins who came up with a number of key tackles.

Others who stood out defensively were Gary Wallace and Peter Kirwin. Ken Phillips was also outstanding at defensive half.

# Last minute confusion as seniors lose 17-15

**TILLSONBURG**—It would be a toss up as to who was in the worst state of confusion in the last minute of play in the Ingersoll Collegiate-Glendale Oxford-Elgin Senior Conference football game, here yesterday afternoon—the officials, the timekeeper, the players or the fans.

The final score went in the records as 17-15 for Glendale as Paul Gyulveszi kicked a field goal from the Ingersoll 10 yard line either before or after time ran out.

One Ingersoll fan timed the minute flag as being up for six minutes. It should be explained that in the Oxford-Elgin Conference the home team does the timekeeping. Ingersoll was also penalized 135 yards to only 30 for the Griffins.

Glendale held a 13-0 lead early in the second quarter as the Ingersoll defense were letting them go for big gains early in the game. John Bothwell who came up with two big plays on defense, recovered a Glendale fumble on the Griffins five yd. line from where Max Kirby went over for a touchdown late in the second quarter to put the Blue Bombers back in the game. It was Bothwell's second big play of the game which also led to the Bombers other major score when he blocked Rod Carle's punt and Ingersoll recovered on their 43. From there in 11 plays Kirby scored his second T.D. to tie the score at 14-14.

Bob Horvath who scored both of the Griffins touchdowns put them in front midway in the first quarter when he ran around left end from the 20. Gyulveszi converted and the Griffins led 7-0.

Glendale had dominated the play as they moved the sticks four times before Ingersoll made a first down. A Costello to Kirby pass good for 28 yds. was the only good gain the Bombers made in the first quarter. An Ingersoll fumble recovered by

Glendale on the Bombers 35 led to their second T.D. A series of plays took them to the Bomber 18 and Horvath fought his way from there to put the Griffins up 13-0 as the convert failed.

Paul Henderson came up with a key play when he intercepted a Randy Belore pass and ran it back to the Ingersoll 18. Barry Brady then completed the longest pass of the game when he hit Max Lindsay who took the ball to the Glendale 18. Glendale took over the ball when Ingersoll was stopped on a fourth down.

They fumbled on their 5 and Bothwell recovered and Kirby plunged over from there as Costello converted and the half ended 13-7 for Glendale.

The second half opened with the Griffins tearing off yardage just like they did early in the game. Carle punted from the Ingersoll 30, with the wind in his back, and the ball rolled all the way to the deadline to give Glendale a 14-7 lead.

## BLOCKED KICK

That was when Bothwell blocked the kick that led to the Bombers second T.D. by Kirby. Costello made no mistake on the convert and the score was tied at 14 all.

The Bombers got a bad break in the fourth quarter when Lindsay's 40 yd. run to the Glendale 20 was called back for a holding penalty. Costello punted from the Glendale 35 and the ball was knocked into touch by Horvath for a single point to put the Bombers in front for the first time in the game.

With only three minutes left, that is when all the confusion started and Ingersoll never got their hands on the ball again. Twice when they stopped Glendale on fourth downs they were called for penalties and the Griffins kept possession.

## GIFT SCORE

The play which caused all the mixup was when Glendale had the ball on the Ingersoll eight and on fourth down tried a field goal by Gyulveszi but his kick

was wide and Lindsay returned to kick to the Ingersoll 50 from where it looked like Rick Travis had failed to give yards. But no! The ball was marched back to the Ingersoll eight yd. line as the officials claimed the Bombers were offside at the line of scrimmage and marched off five yards to the three. That was when Gyulveszi scored his gift field goal to win the game.

Kirby, who has been out with a sore knee, played a terrific game being Ingersoll's biggest ground gainer. Norm Naisbitt and Lindsay also gained a lot of ground as Ingersoll made 13 first downs to Glendale's eleven.

Belore, Mike Bossey and Horvath were the Griffins best ball carriers. Ingersoll tried 12 passes and completed five; Glendale tried nine and completed three.

Two Ingersoll players who stood out on defense besides John Bothwell were Geoff Wallace and Paul Bartram who made a number of good stops at critical times.

But the big edge Glendale had was 135 yds. were marched off against the Blue Bombers as against only 30 for them.

### COMPLACENT

The early lead appeared to make the Bombers complacent and Dymont, who was the Knights big ground gainer in the game, started to rip the Ingersoll defence to shreds. They moved the sticks four times to the Ingersoll 2 and Dymont plunged across from there. Clifford nailed a pass from Sprague for a two point conversion and the Knights were back in the ball game 13-8.

The second quarter was all Norwich. Dan Stewart of the Knights picked off an Ingersoll pass and ran to the Bomber 30. Big Dymont and Sprague moved the markers again to the Bomber three. Charley Long broke through to nail Clifford for a six yard loss back to the nine but on the next play Clifford completed a pass to Crittenden. Ed Van Bommell converted and Norwich led 15-13.

Just before the end of the half Costello kicked a single point from the Norwich 40 to make the score 15-14 for Norwich at the gun.

It was a fired up Ingersoll team to start the last half. Carter started things going running back a punt for 70 yards to the Norwich 40, Max Kirby who couldn't get untracked in the first ground out yardage to the four and then plunged over from that point to put the Bombers ahead 21-15 to stay as Costello converted.

Norwich tried nine passes and completed five, Ingersoll intercepted one. The Bombers stayed strictly to the ground after the first half when Costello tried two and had one intercepted.

Ingersoll made a total of 12 first downs to the Knights 11. Norwich lost three fumbles to the Bombers one.

Ingersoll drew 60 yards in penalties to Norwich's 35.

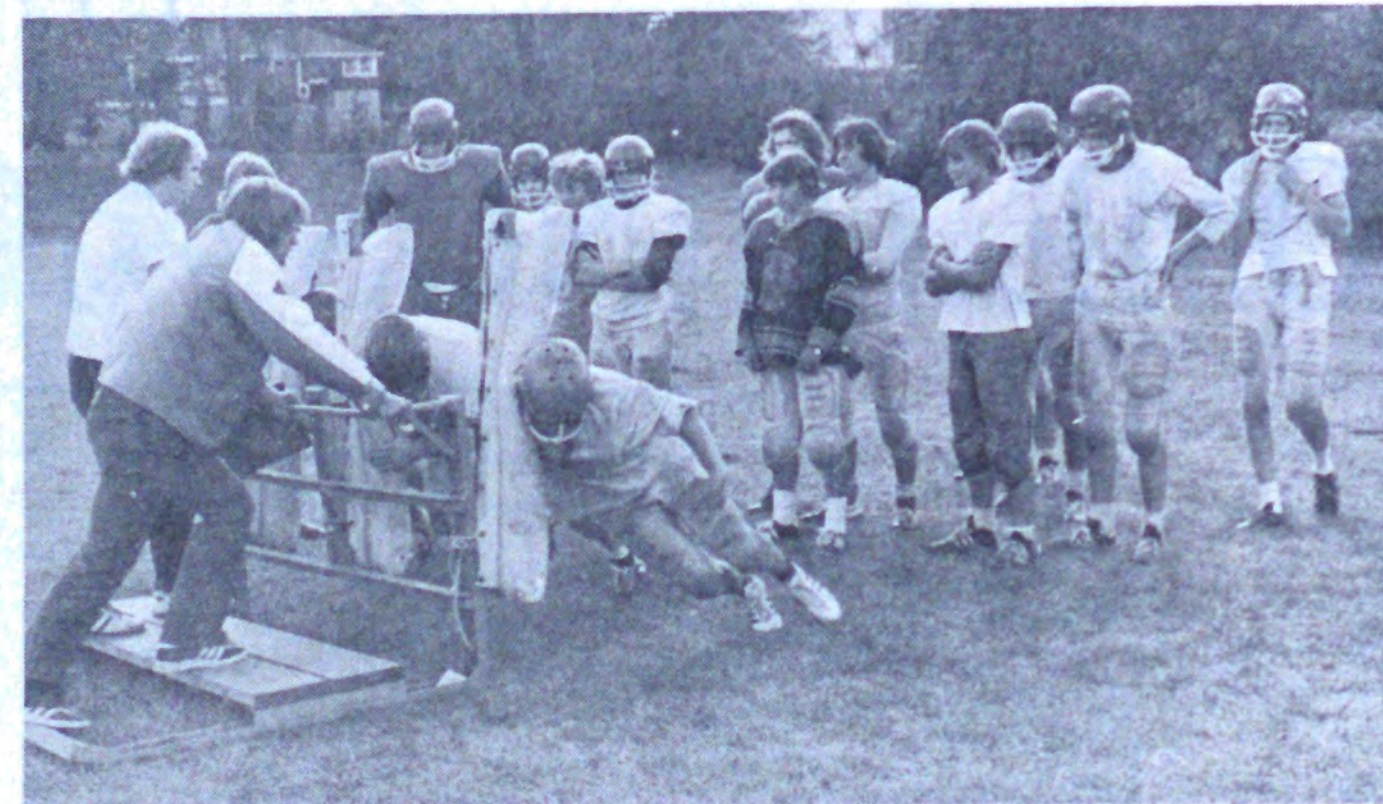

# Seniors massacre Marauders

Ingersoll Blue Bomber seniors played their best football game of the season at Tillsonburg yesterday afternoon as they blanked the Annandale Black Marauders 29-0. The win puts them in the divisional final of the Oxford-Elgin Conference against Huron Park Huskies.

This is the first time since 1968 when the Bombers won the championship that an Ingersoll Sr. team has reached the finals.

Coaches Neil Desborough and Bill Martin were happy the way their boys performed as everyone executed his job perfectly.

The Ingersoll defence was great as it stopped Annandale five times on fourth downs and short yardage. The defensive backs made two interceptions with Tom Bradley grabbing off a pass from Mike Barnes in the second quarter which led to the Bombers first score and Charley Long nailing another in the last to also set up a score.

## KIRBY STARS

Max Kirby scored two touchdowns. Earl Carter and Bruce Blair the others. Alan Costello kicked a field goal and two converts to complete the Bombers' scoring. Annandales' offence sputtered throughout the game as they didn't get past the Bombers 35 at any time.

The first quarter was scoreless but the Bombers started moving the ball early in the second. Kirby went over for what everyone thought was a touchdown from the Annandale eight but it was called back for holding. This was the eighth TD Ingersoll has had called back this season for infractions. The Marauders held but Costello put the Bombers on the board with an 18 yd field goal.

Bradley intercepted on the Annandale 38 and at that point

Barry Brady and his rifle arm entered the game. On his very first play he hit his favourite receiver, Earl Carter, who received the ball on the five and had clear sailing over the goal line. Costello converted and Ingersoll led 10-0.

Brady then hit Carter again with a 35 yd pass and run play and Carter was brought down on the Annandale three. Kirby plunged over from that point and Costello split the uprights and the quarter ended Ingersoll 17 Annandale 0.

Late in the third quarter Kirby, carrying a tackler or two on his back, bulled his way to the two just as time ran out.

On the first play of the last frame Costello handed off to Kirby and he ran off tackle to go over. The convert was blocked and the Bombers were in front 23-0.

Blair ran the ball 22 yds to the Marauders three and they ran Blair on the next play and he hit pay dirt for the final score—

Bombers 29 Marauders 0.

## DECISIVE EDGE

Ingersoll made 16 first downs to Annandales 7. They lost the ball on fumbles twice. Annandale were assessed 80 yards in penalties to Ingersoll's 60. The Bombers were superior in the air completing six passes in nine attempts. The Marauders tried six and completed one with two intercepted.

One Ingersoll player who didn't figure in the scoring but who played an outstanding game making good yardage from scrimmage and also running back punts was North Naisbitt.

On defence, while the whole unit stood out, Roger Thornton, Rick Van Dyke, John Bothwell, Paul Bartram, Gord Smith, Wade Rutherford and Rick Travis came up with key stops.

Max Lindsay made one of the Bombers longest gainers on the ground for 33 yds.

For Tillsonburg the only players who could move the ball were Tom Anderson, Bob Hevenor and on option plays, Barnes.

# Huskies bow to snow and Blue Bombers

**LATE DRIVES FAIL**

It's hard to ignore a two-inch blanket of snow on the ground, especially if you're trying to play a championship football game on it.

Ingersoll and District Collegiate Institute Blue Bombers conquered the weather and the Huron Park Secondary School Huskies, shutting out the Huskies 7-0 to win the Oxford County senior championship Friday afternoon.

Snow obliterated the yard lines, side lines and hash marks on Southside Park playing field, forcing the game officials to rely on judgment and instinct. There were no calls for a measure, because there was nothing on the field to measure from.

While both normally explosive offensive teams struggled with precarious footing and snowflurries, the defensive teams came into their own.

**THE BIG PLAY**  
Strong defenses and the impossible field made "the big play" a deciding factor. The Blue Bombers came up with the game's biggest plays and emerged the victors.

The first big Ingersoll play

came after a Blue Bomber drive stalled on the Huron Park 28-yard line. Alan Costello punted into the end zone, where it was taken by Ken Yeoman about six yards deep. Poor traction and the excellent downfield pursuit of the Blue Bombers combined to trap Yeoman for a game-winning single.

The Ingersoll offence put together its big play of the game in the second quarter, taking advantage of miscues in the Huskies' defensive backfield.

Tom Bradley recovered a Huron Park fumble on their 54 yard line. On the first play from scrimmage, Barry Brady found Earl Carter 20 yards downfield in a clearing between four Huron Park defenders.

Carter took the pass, slipped between the two deep backs, and was gone for the touchdown. The convert attempt was blocked.

**NOTHING FANCY**  
There was nothing fancy about Carter's pass pattern. He simply took off downfield from the right end and took advantage of loose coverage on the pass.

The Blue Bomber defense came up with the big plays of the second half, forcing turnovers on each of the Huskies' three

touchdown-threatening drives. Yeoman fumbled twice in the line and once on the ten yard almost-certain touchdown pass. The usually glue-fingered Ken last quarter, once on the 20 yard line. And Jeff Harper saw his picked off on the goal line under



the shadow of the minute flag. Harper rolled out to the right just outside the Ingersoll ten yard line. He looked downfield and saw a receiver wide open on the goal line, about five yards from the right sideline. Harper didn't see a blue jersey along the sideline against the multi-coloured background of the crowd.

**RICK'S TRICK**  
Harper's touchdown toss was grabbed by Rick Van Dyk, an Ingersoll defensive back, ending the Huskies' last chance for a comeback. Quarterback Alan Costello smothered the ball on the next play to end the game.

Field Judge Bryce Cowie, who had his share of problems with the field conditions, gave this analysis of the Ingersoll win:

"The snow had the same effect on both teams. They both played extremely well, considering the snow. But the team that adjusted best to the conditions was the team that won the game."

Ingersoll and Huron Park were evenly matched in almost every statistic but one — turnovers. IDCI gave up the ball only once on a fumble and their conservative passing game yielded no interceptions. Huron Park quarterback Jeff Harper threw two interceptions and the Huskies gave the ball away three times on fumbles.

"The slippery footing hurt the

offense more than the defense," said Ingersoll defensive coach Bill Martin.

He pointed out four deciding factors in the game, the Ingersoll front four of Rick Travis, Geoff Wallace, Gary Brunson and Paul Bartram. Huron Park coach Eric McIlveen experienced the feeling of losing in the playoffs for the third consecutive year.

"We were controlling the ball near the end," he said, "but we ran out of time."

"We moved the ball into their end, but we just couldn't make it pay off," he said.

It was a game of "what if

What if Huron Park's punter (and offensive end and defensive half) John MacRobbie, who averaged 30.5 yards on two punts, hadn't been injured early in the second quarter?

And what if running back Ken Yeoman, who removed the gloves he used for most of the game just prior to his two final-quarter fumbles, had kept his gloves on?

The officials had their own brand of "what if's."

What if there had been a crucial sideline pass in the last minute of play? With no sidelines visible, it would have been a tough call to make.

Fortunately for the officials, there were few such difficult calls to make during the game.

It turned out that VanDyk was hidden right at the edge of the goal stripe near the right sidelines. He made a little cut in and advanced to about the two while the ball was in there. He casually moved in front of the astonished Husky receiver and grabbed the ball, and with it the hopes of Huskies breaking the playoff jinx that first started two years ago.

Harper, who was in on the plays most of those last few minutes, said he felt a touchdown coming when he saw Ken Yeoman drive down the ball the winning portions of the game. Yeoman had led the charge to the opponents' end zone several times before during the season and this late surge against Blue Bombers seemed to be a replay of the past.

Husky coach Eric McIlveen said the play Harper used for the potential touchdown pass was one that required good timing and quickness. Both ingredients were there but VanDyk turned out to be quicker.

In the late drives by Huron Park, usually glue-fingered Ken Yeoman fumbled the ball twice, one of them recovered by Huron Park but another boggled up by a host of blue shirts.

McIlveen was quick to defend Yeoman as he noted that Huskies wouldn't have had those last-ditch scoring drives had it not been for Yeoman's prolific running.

"If anyone moved this team it was Yeoman," McIlveen said. "He had a very outstanding game and season."

The coach also made it clear that Huskies' chances of even making the playoff game would have been dimmer without the running prowess of Yeoman.



## Huskies would have kicked

When Huskies were driving down the field in the last few minutes of the game Friday, one nervous player was Dave Langille, the Huron Park extra point kicker.

If Huskies would have scored, it would have been up to Langille's foot to tie the score.

"We would have gone for the single point," Husky coach Eric McIlveen said. "Langille asked me after the game and I said we would kick."

If the score had been tied at the end of regulation play, an overtime period would have been played.

## Snow posed problems to weathered officials

The thick snow on the Southside Park field during yesterday's Oxford County senior championship game could have been a nightmare for the five game officials.

If the crisis dreaded by the officials had materialized, a well-fought football game could have turned into a heated dispute.

With no sidelines, yard lines or hash marks visible on the snow-covered field, first-down measurements and ball placement were largely a matter of judgment and estimate on the officials' part.

Both teams accepted the officials' verdicts in these matters.

Field Judge Bryce Cowie said the officials were afraid of four things that might happen on the snowy field — a close call at the sidelines, a close first-down measure on a play from scrimmage, a penalty-filled game and overtime.

# Uphill battle for Bombers on way to senior grid title

All roads will lead out of Ingersoll to St. Thomas on Saturday morning. For the first time in the long history of the Ingersoll District Collegiate Institute it has both its football teams in the finals for the championship.

The Blue Bomber seniors and juniors both won the Oxford division of the Oxford-Elgin High School Conference and they meet the Elgin champions in the "Bowl Games" at Parkside Collegiate in St. Thomas.

The Juniors will play Parkside at 12:30 and the senior game against Arthur Voaden will follow probably starting around 3 o'clock.

Winning the Oxford championship for the Juniors was fairly easy but for the seniors it was something else.

After winning the opening game here against Huron Park 13-8 they lost a controversial game at Glendale 17-15. This put them strictly behind the eight ball as they had to win all their remaining games to make the playoff.

Their next game was with Norwich here and after taking a 13-0 lead early in the first quarter they became complacent and the defence turned

to jelly and when the gun sounded to end the half Norwich was leading 15-14. Coaches Neil Desborough and Bill Martin gave the boys a talking to and they must have got the message because in the second half they could do no wrong as they piled up 33 points to win 47-15.

## TURNING POINT

That lecture by Desborough and Martin was the turning point in the season as they've never looked back since. They defeated College Avenue 36-7 and then they had two big ones to face against Woodstock Collegiate, last year's Oxford champions, and Annandale, both away from home. They took WCI 26-7 and that was the last score they have had against them. The next week they blanked Annandale 29-0 and qualified to play Huron Park for the division crown.

They again came up with a superb defensive display on a snow covered grid and beat the Huskies 7-0 and the right to go to the Bowl.

Last season the Bombers had a 4-2 season and just missed the playoffs and when practice started in September Desborough and Martin had a few spots to fill through graduations. They had a number

of the Junior champions from the previous year to pick from such as Jack Shewan, Barry Brady, Charlie Houston, Ed Zylstra, Max Lindsay, Dan Porchak, Rick Van Dyke, Paul Henderson and Rob McLean. All these boys have come through in great style.

They have blended in well with the holdovers or we might say the veterans like quarter Alan Costello and running backs Bruce Blair, Max Kirby, Norm Naisbitt, Earl Carter and flanker Danny Anstee, offensive linemen Pat Fortner, Jeff Starchuk, Dennis Glover, Dave Brown and centre Ralph Wheeler and with defensive linemen Geoff Wallace, Rick Travis, Gary Brunson and Paul Bartram. Brady moved in to share the quarterback duties with Costello and he's done a great job. He was the best passer in the division specializing in the long bomb with Earl Carter being on the receiving end of most of them.

Shewan last year was the best Junior quarterback in the Conference but with Costello and Brady available he's been used at cornerback and he's done an outstanding job. Lindsay who is used as a running back occasionally has been used as a safety as well as running back punts and he has been a real asset to the team.

Rick Van Dyke is another "rookie" who had played well at cornerback. He made the play of the season last Fri. when with 20 seconds to play he intercepted a Jeff Harper pass on the goal line and stopped the Huskies from scoring. Henderson has been used as cornerback and has come up with a couple of key interceptions.

Houston and Zylstra made regular offensive guard positions and have played well. McLean and Porchak have played on the defensive line and do a good job when sent in.

The Junior grads have done a lot to put the team in the final. The Bombers have scored 173

points with 54 against. They have gone over 24 touchdowns with Kirby hitting pay dirt eight times; Blair seven; Carter five and Brunson, Naisbitt, Fortner and Lindsay once each. ### Danger: Big game ahead



The stage has been set.  
The time has been set.  
The only question is, are the two teams set?

The Oxford County football championship is at stake, so for the fans' sake, the two teams had better be prepared. And that snow that we awoke with this morning better be missing from the Southside Park gridiron.

It would be a shame to see the championship between these two good teams decided on a patch of white.

But, perhaps that's what we get for trying to play football in November in this climate.

It is expected that the football rivalry between Huron Park Secondary School and Ingersoll and District Collegiate Institute will reach an enormously high pitch by Friday, perhaps even matching the fan intensity that was displayed last year when HPSS met the Devils at Woodstock Collegiate.

One thing is for certain. The stands at Southside will be overflowing, which, in itself, is a further argument for the expansion of the seating capacity of Southside. Another aspect of that argument was very much in evidence in the summer when the Woodstock Warriors of the Ontario Football League played to good crowds all through the season and numerous stellar attractions drew capacity crowds.

But, come Friday, once again the crowds will be overflowing, and dollars will be lost because of the lack of seats to be found.

As it turned out with Monday's flip if the coin in Ingersoll, IDCI loses anyway, because it will not get any portion of the gate receipts.

Before the flip was enacted, Huron Park coach Eric McIlveen had propositioned the Ingersoll people to have the game played on neutral field, and McIlveen's definition of a neutral field was Southside.

Now the veteran coach of HPSS isn't so naive that he actually thinks as Southside as neutral but he offered the medicine to IDCI with a bit of sugar: A 50-50 split with the gate receipts, which seems to be more than generous.

But, IDCI was more interested in getting every playing advantage possible and no additional revenue. So the flip was made and Huron Park won and McIlveen announced that the game would be played at Southside anyway, making his previous declaration of the field as "neutral" seem a little less unbelievable.

There was one big difference with the selection of Southside after the flip though. This time IDCI does not get any share of the gate. Their ledger will only have costs while HPSS may near the break-even point.

Actually, McIlveen has good arguments in naming Southside a neutral field, regardless of whether he won the flip or not. There will be enough rooters bused from Ingersoll to completely neutralize the "home crowd". In fact, since visiting fans are usually prone to be more enthusiastic because of the some heretofore unexplained biological chemistry, the IDCI rooting force may indeed be louder than the Husky section.

Also considering the time of year and the elements that may be present (wind, rain, hail, snow, mud, sleet, or any combination thereof), Southside is just about the best field in the

county to put up with such matters.

And, even though the capacity of Southside should be increased considering its wide use by athletic teams, there are more seats at Southside than at any other football field around.

And then there are the floodlights if the sky suddenly becomes to dark for reasonable play.

Southside has been particularly kind to McIlveen and his charges this year so that may be another reason for the Huskies obvious leaning toward the field. The crucial game of the season for Huron Park came at Southside last month when it met Woodstock Collegiate.

Huskies' defence put on one of its best shows of the year in limiting Devils to but one touchdown, a touchdown which probably wouldn't have been scored had it not been for dubious chain-gang workmanship and the questionable wind judging by the officials.

McIlveen is particularly upset when anyone scores on the Huskies, mainly because few teams have done so. Huron Park displays statistically the best defence in the league with only 26 points given up in six games. On the other hand, come Friday, that defence will be up against an offence which has scored more points than any other team this year. That contest within the contest will more than likely be the most interesting one to watch Friday afternoon.

The last time the two teams met, Ingersoll beat HPSS on the Ingersoll field. It appeared to be the game which put the Blue Bombers' confidence at a high mark for the rest of the season. On the other hand, the loss wasn't exactly the mark of things to come for Huskies.

As the season got longer the Huskies got better. The defence has been improved with a key few changes but the offence was the real winning ingredient. It's an experimenting offence, and Huskies are still trying out new things. That's one reason Huskies' scores against lesser opponents haven't been as astronomical as those between teams such as IDCI and WCI against the same opponents have been.

If quarterbacks Jeff Harper and Tom Popma had merely handed off to running stalwarts Brian Beatty and Ken Yeoman in those drives, two more touchdowns more than likely would have been scored.

Instead, the passing attack was given some additional exposure. The look was ahead to this week's game against Bombers.

As the last few games suggest, Huskies no longer rely solely on Yeoman and Beatty for yards. Bombers can key on those two if they want but now they have others to contend with, namely Al Robinson, Brian Small and Marlon Graham on the receiving end of passes.

Yes, that's Marlon Graham and not Neil Graham as previously reported. Chalk that faux pas as an error in roster interpretation. There should be a law against players on one team having the same last name and having numbers that start with the same digit. It's just not fair.

Must have a minimum of (10) years of active service in the field of sports within the Town of Ingersoll. Will be considered on the basis of integrity, sportsmanship, character, his/her years of service and performance record.
