Larry Fuller hit Brian Procnier with a pass from there and the Griffins led 7-0 when Young converted. Glendale made 189 yards in the first half to Ingersoll's 70.

Ingersoll looked like a different team in the second half as Blair, Earl Carter and Stewart made good gains deep into Glendale territory. Blair carried for 13 yards to the one and then plunged over on the next play for the TD.

Carter converted and the score was tied 7-7.

INJURED

Paul Henderson received a head injury and was carried from the field late in the third quarter.

Barry Brady, who handled the quarterbacking for the Bombers in fine style, decided to go to the air in the final quarter and it paid off. He hit Dave Pittock for a 25-yard pass and run play and then came back with another one for 20 again to Pittock who

carried to the two. Blair then bulldozed his way into pay dirt from there and Carter converted to give Ingersoll the lead 14-7.

Ingersoll made a total of 16 first downs to Glendale's 13.

Blair was a tower of strength in the Bombers backfield while Brady tried seven passes and completed five of them; three of them to Pittock who made some great catches. John Freund and Fuller tried ten for Glendale and completed only one.

The Bombers defence which was porous in the first half tightened up in the second with Scott Brunson, Dave McQuiggen, Kevin Steels and Bob Rundle making key tackles. Alistair Campbell and Ken Phillips were outstanding in the safety positions, knocking down Glendale passes that would have been good for long gains.

Deans was the Griffins big ground gainer and Lamour also carried for a lot of yardage.

Defensively Rick Juhast, Leroy Innman, Mike Bossey and Brian Goosens stood out.

Ingersoll plays a doubleheader at College Avenue next Thursday.

Blue Bombers maul Marauders to wrap up senior grid crown

Ingersoll Blue Bomber seniors put it all together at the IDC sportsfield yesterday afternoon to clinch first place in the Oxford division of the Oxford-Elgin High School Football Conference.

The offense gained a total of 384 yards while the defence gave up only 92 as the Bombers blanked the Annandale Marauders 48-0.

The win gave the Bombers a 6-0 season and they became the first Ingersoll senior team to go through the schedule undefeated. Next Friday the Oxford championship game will be played in Ingersoll.

Bruce Blair, who was again the Bombers leading ground gainer, scored three touchdowns to bring his seasons total to 12 and he tied the school record of Paul Hominick and Alan Lockhart who scored 12 back in

the championship year of 1968. Dave Pittock, Davis Landon, Doug Collins and Greg Stewart scored the other majors as the Bombers were in command all the way.

SEVEN INTERCEPTIONS

The Ingersoll defensive unit didn't allow the Marauders past their 25 yd. line as they made seven interceptions of John Chipps passes. Doug Collins and Bob Rundle picked off two each and Collins went across for a TD on one of his. Landon, Jon Cussons and Earl Carter nailed one apiece and Landon turned his into a major score.

Barry Brady handled the team at quarter the first half and Max Lindsay the second. Brady completed two of four passes while Lindsay also hit on two of four. Each had one intercepted.

Annandale moved the sticks 10 times during the game but just

when it appeared they had some momentum going Chipps would get sacked for big losses as his line couldn't contain the Bombers rush. What yardage the Marauders made was picked up by husky Tom Anderson or Mike Barnes.

The closest Annandale came to scoring was on the first series of plays in the game. They took the kickoff and the plunging of Anderson and Barnes took them to the Bomber 28; Randy Thornton kicked the ball deep in the end zone but Earl Carter with some good broken field running carried it out to the two.

Blair carried to the 14 and then on the next play he took Brady's hand off, broke a couple of tackles, and ran in the clear for 96 yards for the score. Carters convert attempt hit the crossbar and the Bomber's led 6-0.

Before the first quarter ended

Brady hit Pittock with a pass from the 29 and he carried over for the score. Carter converted and it was 13-0.

Landon broke through the line and as he was chasing Chipps back, he passed the ball blindly right into Landon's hands and he ran 54 yards for the TD. Carter converted, and it was 20-0.

Brady completed a long pass to Stewart who was brought down on the one and Blair plunged from there to make it 27-0 as Carter split the uprights.

CLEAR FIELD

Collins got the last score of the first half when he picked off Chipps pass on the Annandale 13 and had a clear field. Carter converted and the half ended 34-0.

Midway in the third quarter Stewart broke a tackle on the Ingersoll 47 and showed Annandale defenders a clean pair of heels as he pulled away going the 63 yds. Carter converted and it was 41-0.

Rundles interception led to the last Bomber score as he nailed Chipps pass and went to the Annandale 50. Blair and Stewart moved it to the 23 and from there Blair broke three tackles before reaching pay dirt. When Carter converted it was 48-0.

Doug Collins played an outstanding game; he not only made two interceptions but he also knocked down three other passes.

Ken Phillips and Lindsay also stood out in the Bombers defensive backfield. Up front Scot Brundson, Scott Bellhouse, Jim Zegers, Landon, Dennis Glover and Rick Van Dyke stopped the Marauders in their tracks.

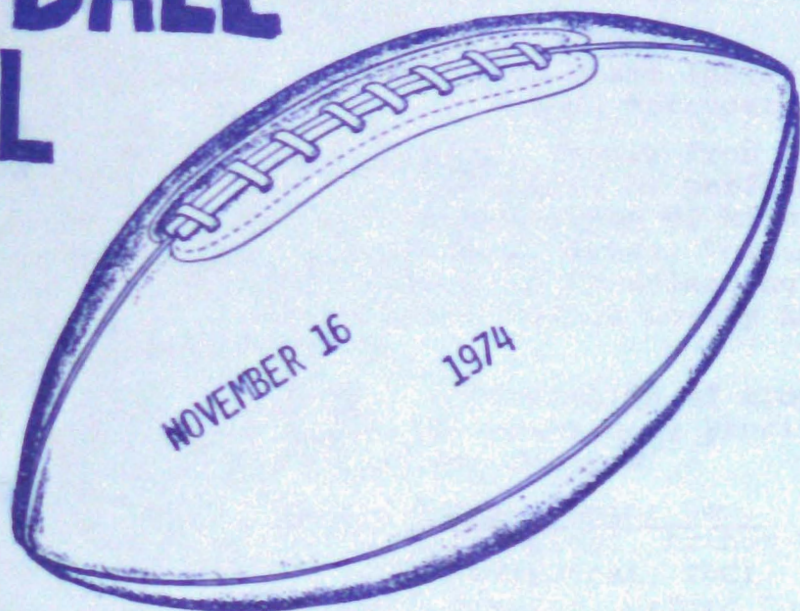
Chipps tried 19 passes and completed only four.

Football fever high for bowl

Football fever is mounting as the Ingersoll District Collegiate Institute Blue Bomber seniors prepare to meet the Sir Arthur Voaden team in the Oxford-Elgin Bowl to be held in Ingersoll Saturday afternoon.

The seniors took the Oxford High School Football Conference championship Friday afternoon when they defeated the Huron Park Huskies by a score of 36-8, making this their second consecutive year as the Oxford champions.

This is the first time that Ingersoll has hosted the bowl game when the seniors have been playing in it, and according to coach Bill Martin, the players are pretty excited about the event.

"This was one of our objectives during the year," he said in an interview Monday. "This is IDCI's centennial year, and we want to get into the Bowl and have it here. The guys are pretty keen about putting on a good performance."

While it's important to the players, it's also important to the town, according to Mr. Martin. "The team has a lot of supporters in town, including ex-players and fans who follow their games all season. Saturday is going to be a big day for them too."

The Bombers, who have won all of their eight games this season, are going to be up against a tough

team, who last year defeated them in the Bowl game by a devastating score of 32-0.

But the team has had a good season so far, and according to their coaches, Mr. Martin and Neil Desborough, they're in shape for Saturday's game. Nobody is on the casualty list, and if they can keep it that way during the pre-game practices this week, there'll be a full line-up on Saturday.

Ingersoll is looking to its star fullback, Bruce Blair, to keep up his record-breaking performance. Already this year he has scored 13 touchdowns, beating

the previous all-time high of 12.

According to Mr. Martin, Barry Brady has had a fine year as quarterback, and Scott Brunson and Max Lindsay have been two of this year's star defense players.

"It's developed into a pretty well-rounded team," commented the coach, who figures "Everybody's set to go on Saturday."

The junior Blue Bombers have won two previous championships prior to last year, so for some players it will be their fourth year, either as juniors or seniors, in the Bowl game.

"It's developing into a bit of a

tradition to have most of our players in bowl games," said Mr. Martin. There are only five or six of this year's team members who haven't been in at least one bowl game.

Strong defence and offence carry Bombers' bowl hopes

Before the high school football season started there were rumors that the Ingersoll District Collegiate Blue Bomber seniors had a few chinks in their armour. Most of it was directed at the defensive unit but after winning the Oxford Conference

championship for the second year in a row with a 7-0 record this is one department of the team which has really stood out.

The defence has given up only 38 points all season and until Jeff Harper of Huron Park came in at quarter in last week's championship game and started

passing on every play from a shot gun formation, it had a third straight shutout going. Harper put his team on the scoreboard late in the game but don't bet that Arthur Voaden will repeat that tactic in the Oxford-Elgin Bowl here Saturday afternoon because defensive coach Bill Martin has got his team prepared for it.

To say the Bombers defence has been outstanding is an understatement. Actually it has been great and rates with IDCI's best of all time.

Up on the front wall Scot Brunson, Jim Zegers, Davis Landon and Kevin Steels are a solid unit.

LINEBACKERS

The linebackers, Jon Cussons, Scott Bellhouse and Rick Van Dyke, have a knack of smelling out plays and being in the right place at the right time.

Enough can't be said about the backfield which has covered the passing attack like a blanket all season. The one word to describe the cornerbacks and safety men is "speed". Back there is Max Lindsay, Alistair Campbell, Ken Phillips, Bob Rundle and Doug Kivenen. Doug Collins, who won't play because of illness and Paul Henderson who was out most of the season because of an injury, but who will play tomorrow, have been outstanding in the games they played. In the game with Annandale the backs made seven interceptions.

The defence has given up only 898 yards rushing and 152 in passing.

The offense has picked up a total of 2,463 yards and 1,937 of it was made on the ground. Bruce Blair has been the big gainer with 953 yards running and 101 with reception of passes.

Greg Stewart ran for 397 yards; Earl Carter for 372 and quarter Barry Brady ran the ball for 146. Dave Pittock has been the Bombers ace in their aerial attack; he's nailed Brady's bombs for a total of 235

yards and his fine receptions have been responsible for two of the wins. Stewart caught passes for 53 yards, Glover for 74 and Carter for 47.

OFFENSIVE LINE

One department of the team which is usually overlooked when press notices are given out is the offensive line and the Bombers have a good one. Charlie Houston has been consistent at centre, so consistent that he hasn't made a bad snap all season, and rates with Roger Henhawke, who now plays with Ottawa University, as one of Ingersoll's best.

On the ends are Dennis Glover and Paul Flynn and at tackles are Jeff Starchuck and Paul Hutcheson and the guards are Dan Porchak and Rick Hodgson. They have done a great job of making holes for the runners like Blair, Carter and Stewart. As L. A. Wendling the former great coach of the Woodstock Collegiate, who won three WOSSA championships, used to say, "Don't forget my line they made the holes for the runners".

Ingersoll's punting and place-kicking has been well looked after by Bellhouse, Carter and Stewart. As a punter Bellhouse gets a lot of distance and is consistent. Carter is a good place kicker and when Stewart has been called on he doesn't weaken the team a bit.

Other players who have done a good job when called on are Doug Chivers, Howard De Jong, Steve Fortner, Clay Hoover, Greg Johnston, Len Johnstone, Dave McQuiggan, Bill McLelland, Doug Morrison, Karl Pellow, Terry Todd and Adrian Visser.

Two players who have missed the entire season because of injuries are Norm Naisbitt and Tim Sherman.

Tomorrow the junior game between Annandale and Parkside Collegiate will start at 12:30 p.m. the Bombers and Arthur Voaden will play at 2:30 p.m.

A great day for Ingersoll



Tomorrow is Ingersoll's greatest football day!

Holding Oxford-Elgin Bowls and Tri-County Bowls is old hat for places like Woodstock and Tillsonburg but, for Ingersoll it is something new — at least for nearly 20 years.

Back in the late 50's long time fans remember a Tri-County Bowl being played in Ingersoll which they refer to as the "Mud Bowl" because it rained all day. Let's hope Ingersoll isn't cursed by the weather again tomorrow.

In the Oxford-Elgin Bowl tomorrow Ingersoll District Collegiate Blue Bomber seniors take on Arthur Voaden of St. Thomas while Annandale plays Parkside Collegiate. There is only one defeat among the four teams. Ingersoll won the Oxford championship undefeated but Arthur Voaden lost one game. Annandale and Parkside are both undefeated. The Blue Bombers will be out for revenge because Arthur Voaden, beat them badly in the senior Bowl last year played at St. Thomas.

Its only in the past few years that Ingersoll has become a power in high school, football. At one time the game hit such a low ebb that the team was entered in a six-man-team league.

As far as can be learned football or rugby as it was called then, goes back to the early 20's at the Ingersoll Collegiate. "Kip" Crellin played on the first team and he said they played teams from Woodstock and London and the team fared pretty good.

Fellows such as Roy Haycock, Max Poole, Jimmy McDermott and Don Rodgers came along later. McDermott was the first Ingersoll player to play senior football at the University of Western Ontario.

One alumnus played pro ball

McDermott was on the Mustangs championship team of 1931 and a teammate was Gordon Awde from Woodstock. Jimmy, who was a centre, played for the Hamilton Tigers after he graduated in medicine.

Back in the early 30's Ingersoll had two or three good players such as Jim Scott, Anderson Thornton, Tim Eaton and Ted Johnston.

Scott and Thornton were outstanding runners and played junior for the Woodstock Grads under that great coach L. A. Wendling. Johnston was a regular lineman on the Grads in 1936 when they won the Ontario championship. Eaton never went any farther in football after he left the Ingersoll Collegiate but he was tough and was hard to bring down.

Jack Herbert, who retired a few years ago as principal of the school, came to Ingersoll to teach in 1932 and was immediately installed as coach of the football teams. That year the school had both a senior and junior team, but the senior team usually showed up at games shorthanded and a number of the juniors would have to do iron man stunts and play for both teams. In those days players had to play 60 minutes and the only time a player left the game was when he was carried off the field.

Unlike today when the players are all dressed like professionals, some teams would appear wearing different sweaters and only a few wore helmets and some didn't even wear shoulder pads.

As Jack Herbert laughs and says, "The first one to get to the uniform bin was the best dressed." Ingersoll had a second string quarterback who liked to look real smart in his uniform but he never liked to play.

Oh how he loved to have his picture taken in various poses by the girls with their Brownie cameras, when the game was going on. One day in Norwich Ingersoll's regular quarterback got hurt and coach Jack was looking all over for this guy to put him in the game. He finally located him hiding under a bench. That was the last time the guy was ever dressed for a game.

Number on teams was low

In those days there was probably only 250 students attending the Collegiate and half of them would be girls as lots of boys never went to high school in those days. It was tough to get a good football team and when they did there would maybe be only around 16 or 17 players on a team. Even those three great Woodstock teams which won the Western Ontario Secondary Schools Junior championship in consecutive years, had only a few spare players.

L. A. Wendling, who coached all three champions, told me they used to play sometimes 16 games in a season. In the WOSSA playdowns they would play home and home games, total points on the round. WCI Red Devils used to play off with places such as Kitchener, Sarnia and Windsor. The Red Devils lost only one game in three years and that was to Windsor-Walkerville Tech in Windsor.

Football was at such a low ebb in those day in Ingersoll that Ingersoll fans used to go to Woodstock to watch the Red Devils play instead of watching their own team. One former WCI player told me "when we used to play Ingersoll it wasn't even a good practice."

In those days Ingersoll Collegiate used to play and practice at Victoria Park and the players used to walk from the school to the park. There were no buses to transport them and students didn't drive cars in those days.

Football at the Ingersoll Collegiate hit its lowest point back in the mid 40's when one year they scored only one point all season. They scored it in the last game of the season against St. Marys.

One point better than nothing

With a minute to play they had the ball inside the St. Marys' 10 yard line. Rather than be blanked for the entire season they decided to kick for a single point. I think it was "Butch" Kurtzman who made the kick.

Even after the new school was built sports didn't pick up right away. While the trophy cases didn't hold many sport trophies; year after year the school won a lot of pewter ware with the Cadet Corps and shooting competition. Some of the students used to call it a "Military Academy".

I give teachers like Jack Herbert, Currie Wilson and others a lot of credit for keeping sports going in those days at the old school when the only sports facility was an old rat infested gymnasium that had all the appearances of a drive shed.

When these men watch tomorrows festivities no doubt their minds will go back to those days.

Today the school has approximately 1,400 students and its got one of the finest sports complex anywhere. Since 1966 the school has won three Bowl championships and six divisional titles. A number of its players have gone on to play college ball. Alan Lockhart played on the Western Mustangs when they won the Canadian Intercollegiate championship in 1971. This year his brother Bill was a centre with the University of Guelph; Rodger Henhawke was a centre with Ottawa University. Paul Hominick played for the University of Guelph a few years ago.

Ken Fleming, who played for the Brantford Bisons Junior team a few years ago, along with Henhawke and Hominick was also slated to go to Loyola College and play but changed his mind. Right now there are a couple of the senior Blue Bombers who could make any college team in the country.

I'll never forget that afternoon in 1968 coming out of Pinafore Park in St. Thomas on the bus after the Blue Bombers won the senior championship. Coaches Neil Desborough and Bill Martin were standing up in the front. Desborough was holding the pennant and Martin the trophy. Neil said, "Fellows we came from the bottom to the top."

Vikings beat Bombers in fight-shortened final

INGERSOLL — St. Thomas Arthur Voaden Vikings continued their domination over Oxford-Elgin Conference senior football opponents here Saturday when they defeated Ingersoll Blue Bombers 19-13 in a game which was shortened by fighting in the stands.

It was the third straight Oxford-Elgin Bowl championship for the Vikings and second in a row over the Bombers.

Tillsonburg Annandale Marauders won the junior championship 26-16 over St. Thomas Parkside Colts.

Last year the Vikings defeated Ingersoll 32-0 and that game was also marred by fighting among spectators.

Saturday's game was halted with nine minutes remaining by fighting. Captains from both teams appealed to spectators with the warning the game would be called off if order was not restored.

The game resumed until wholesale fighting again broke out with one minute, 10 seconds remaining and at that time it was called off.

Both clubs scored the first

time they had the ball. The Bombers took the opening kickoff and marched in to score on Bruce Blair's three-yard run.

The Vikings came right back to score on Rob De La Penotiere's 60-yard touchdown run.

The Vikings added two more touchdowns on short runs by Rob Watson in the second and fourth quarters along with a convert by Dave Frank for a 19-6 lead.

Blair then scored from six yards out and Earl Carter converted for the Bombers fi-

nal score after 5:30 had been played in the final quarter.

Annandale fell behind 16-6 late in the third quarter of the junior final then rallied on three consecutive touchdowns by Marty Legein.

Ken Campbell passed to Brad Sergeant 45 yards for the other Annandale touchdown and Campbell passed to Doug Hevenor for a two-point convert.

Matt Labord and Bob McDonald scored Parkside's touchdowns. Mike Lebeau kicked a 15-yard field goal and Gary Hughson kicked a convert for the Colts.

Ingersoll declared bowl co-champions

Ingersoll District Collegiate Institute did not protest the outcome of the Oxford-Elgin Bowl held in Ingersoll Nov. 16. But coaches and physical education department heads from both counties did.

In a meeting of the Oxford-Elgin coaches association held last Thursday, members voted to declare the senior championship game "no contest" and declared both teams, the IDCI Bombers and the Arthur Voaden Vikings of St. Thomas, co-champions.

No sooner was the co-championship announced however than the Elgin County principals association got together to challenge the coaches' action as unconstitutional.

In a telephone interview Monday, Arthur Voaden High School principal Ray St. John said that the five secondary school principals in Elgin do not feel that the coaches association has the authority to declare the game no contest and to declare both schools co-champions.

"We do not accept their decision," he said, pointing out that there is no provision in the Oxford-Elgin constitution to accommodate the kind of problem that occurred at the Bowl game. He said that he had contacted officials of the Canadian inter-

collegiate football union, and had been advised that according to their interpretation of the rules, Arthur Voaden rightfully won the game.

He said that, according to the officials contacted, it is the home team that bears the responsibility for crowd control, and that since the Vikings were ahead when the game was called, the trophy and pennant was the right one.

The coaches association, he said, is an advisory body and exists to make recommendations. "Their decision came not as a recommendation but as a judgment. Their action came as quite a surprise."

He praised Ingersoll for the way in which they had organized the day, stating that "they couldn't have done better."

"It was tragic that problems with the crowd had to erupt with only 70 seconds left in the game. But we feel that the decision made then to award the trophy and the pennant in the field was the right one."

IDCI officials were not aware because a section of the crowd had become unmanageable, the difference in points separating the two teams was less than a

Vikings named Elgin champs

ST. THOMAS (CP) — The Elgin County Headmasters' Association has declared Arthur Voaden Secondary School Vikings Senior Bowl champions even though the Oxford-Elgin Conference Coaches Association ruled that Voaden and Ingersoll District Collegiate Institute Blue Bombers should be co-champions.

The coaches' association declared the Senior Bowl game, played Nov. 16 at Ingersoll, no-contest because police stopped the match with 70 seconds left to play when fighting broke out among fans. A no-contest ruling means that the scores are thrown out and both teams named co-champions.

The Vikings were leading 19-13 when the game was halted.

The headmasters' group said the coaches' association did not have the constitutional authority to make a ruling or take any kind of action since it is only an advisory body.

Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union rules say that if a game is called because of unruly fans, the game is awarded to the visiting team.

converted touchdown, he noted. "If more points had been separating the teams, it would have been a different thing."

According to IDCI coach Neil Desborough, it is the heads of the physical education departments, referred to as the coaches association, who look after the conduct of athletic affairs.

Without any request from Ingersoll, he said, coaches in both Oxford and Elgin felt that they should look into the events leading to the early termination of the Bowl game, and decided to declare the game "no contest."

"The coaches were strong in their endorsement of the final decision," he said. "It seems to be the solution."

Coaches who were not even involved felt strongly, he noted, and believed that the game had not actually been concluded, in that no one in a position of authority officially terminated it. The referees merely gave a "time out" signal and left the field.

"Psychologically, I felt that the game was concluded," said Mr. Desborough. "but as the coaches talked, I could see their feeling." Both he and the Arthur Voaden coach abstained from voting on the resolution to declare a co-championship. Six of the seven coaches who voted approved the resolution, with the dissenting vote being cast by an Elgin county coach, Mr. Finlay advised.

Asked how his team felt about being declared co-champions, Mr. Desborough said that the players were not particularly

elated.

"But I think they're pleased and feel that it was a better decision than what happened before. This seems to have restored their faith to some extent."

He commented that the boys had been very upset for quite a while after the game. "It was a bad experience for them... a particularly frustrating one because they couldn't attach blame anywhere."

They were just getting over their frustration when the decision came down, he said. "It didn't have a great impact."

Mr. Desborough said that he hoped the Elgin principals would drop their action to reverse the decision. "I think IDCI was generous in not protesting earlier. Now I think Elgin should be generous in letting it go," he said.

Other recommendations coming out of the coaches meeting call for the bowl game as it has been conducted to be discontinued, eliminating the double header, the parade and the cheerleaders contest, and arranging for the junior game to be played in one county and the senior game in the other.

Asked if the principals association approved the recommendations, Mr. St. John stated that the group would be taking them under consideration.

It was estimated there was close to 3,000 in the bleachers and surrounding the field, and it was the crowd which terminated the game with one minute and 10 seconds left to

play with Arthur Voaden leading 18-13 and the Blue Bombers having a determined drive going.

The game was called by police after repeated fights in the crowd but at no time did the fans interfere with the game.

Don Watson and Rob de la Penotiere did the damage for the Vikings. They not only scored all the St. Thomas teams touchdowns but they also gained

just all the real estate that their team made all afternoon. Watson scored two majors and de la Penotiere got the other.

Bruce Blair went over for the Ingersoll majors. They were his 14 and 15th TDs of the season.

While Ingersoll was supposed to be superior in the air, it didn't turn out that way as Barry Brady completed only one of five passes. On the other hand Dave Knight hit on four of five

and three of them were on fourth down situations one a long 75 yarder to de la Penotiere for the last play of the first half.

Greg Stewart ran the opening kick off 20 yards to the Bomber 48 and then Blair Stewart and Earl Carter moved the sticks three times as the Vikings defence was helpless. The home town crowd started figuring the Bombers were going to have an easy victory when Blair plunged

across the goal line from the two. Carters convert attempt was good but the point was wiped out as the Bombers jumped the gun for an offside.

The Vikings tied it up when de la Penotiere caught the Ingersoll defence by surprise with a reverse and galloped in the clear from the Bomber 40 for the score.

Knight tried a pass for a two point convert but it was grounded. At this stage the game was unnecessarily held up several times because of fights in the crowd.

Midway in the second quarter Arthur Voaden went ahead to stay. de la Penotiere and Watson went for big gains on their favorite reverses as they had the Bomber defence buffaloed. Watson scored from the Ingersoll two and again Knights failed on a two point convert try as the Vikings led 12-6. Knight hit de la Penotiere with a long 75



yarder to the Bomber 10 on the last play of the quarter.

Arthur Voaden started the second half just the way they finished the first on the attack but the Bomber defence stopped them on a fourth situation on their 40. However the Bombers couldn't take advantage to move the ball and Scott Bellhouse was forced to kick. Rick Hinz ran the ball back 20.

de la Penotiere and Watson went into action again and Knight connected with Wayne Rapelje for a 20 yard gain to the Bomber eight. The Vikings fumbled and Charlie Houston recovered but again Ingersoll couldn't move the ball and Arthur Voaden took over. The game was again held up as fights broke out in the crowd.

A long Knight to de la Penotiere pass took the play deep into Bomber territory and John Waldie carried to the three. Watson plunged in for the score. Dave Frank converted and the Vikings led 18-6.

Gary Baldwin of Arthur Voaden was injured and the ambulance was pressed into service again. Alistair Campbell made a 35 yard run back of a punt and Carter made a great run on a left end sweep to the Arthur Voaden four. Brady handed off to Blair and he battered his way over for the score.

The ball was snapped bad for the convert but Arthur Voaden was offside and Carter converted on the replay to cut the margin to 18-13 with still nearly five minutes left to play.

It appeared Ingersoll had the Vikings stopped on the Bomber 30 but on a big fourth down gamble Knight passed to Waldie who ran to the Bomber 10.

Ingersoll blocked Frank's attempted field goal and took the ball over. Blair and Stewart went for good gains to the Ingersoll 45 and the Bombers appeared to be on the move. At this point the officials blew their whistles and waved their arms signaling the game had been terminated and it was later found the police had called it because of continued fighting in the crowd.

But why was the trophy presented to Arthur Voaden when the game was never finished?

Fights among fans disrupt Oxford-Elgin championship

INGERSOLL — Violence broke out at the Oxford-Elgin Bowl championships Saturday and forced the senior game to end with more than a minute remaining.

The referee made the decision to call the game with a minute and 10 seconds left to play after repeated appeals to stop the fighting in the crowd failed to produce the desired effect.

The game between Arthur Voaden secondary school of St. Thomas and the Ingersoll District collegiate institute Blue Bombers was halted briefly in the second quarter while officials conferred with the eight policemen called to the field. Members of the bowl organizing committee, Mayor Gordon Henry and IDCI principal John Finlay went over to the stands

and order was restored, until the final quarter.

Officials blamed the trouble on drunken youths who fought, pushed and shoved in the stands, causing the snow fence surrounding the field to go down and forcing a pack of screaming cheerleaders in the area to flee to safer grounds.

Mayor Henry instructed police to fetch the Riot Act and the threat was conveyed to the crowd but it failed to stop the outbreak.

Ingersoll police chief Ronald James said this morning he thought there had been enough said about the disturbances at the game.

The chief explained that the decision to cancel the game had been made by the referees and one of the Ontario Provincial Police constables on duty for the afternoon.

The actual decision could be made only by the officials he said, adding the measure was probably taken on the advice of the OPP officer.

There were eight policemen on duty at the game, five members of the Ingersoll force and three OPP officers.

STATEMENT

Principal Finlay read a statement to his staff and students this morning congratulating them on the fine job they had done in organizing the bowl events.

In part the statement read, "... we were all disgusted at the uncontrollable, brutish inconsiderate behaviour of a group of St. Thomas and Ingersoll louts who in trying to ape adult behavior proved their total inadequacy and spoiled the end of the day for the 1200 to 1400 other people."

Arthur Voaden won the senior game by a 19-13 margin. Ingersoll had possession of the ball on their own 45-yard line when the game was called. The win was the third straight bowl crown for Arthur Voaden.

The Annandale High School Black Marauders won the junior bowl title, defeating Parkside Collegiate of St. Thomas 26-16. This is the fourth straight year the junior championship has remained in Oxford County.

St. Thomas Arthur Voaden game warmed before that he was going to call it off if the fighting continued. Ingersoll had a drive going, and after blocking an attempted field goal on their 10 yard line, had moved the ball to their 45 on two plays. An Arthur Voaden coach asked the official timer how much time remained and was told 1:10. Then the officials blew their whistles and waved their arms. Ingersoll players threw their helmets to the ground in a rage and a state of confusion existed among the fans had been called off. Arthur Voaden players jumped with joy as their fans swarmed on the field to congratulate them.

When the trophy was presented to the Vikings a man and woman from St. Thomas who were wearing the red and white ribbons of Arthur Voaden said their team shouldn't have been given the trophy because the game hadn't been finished. A lot of the fans had the wrong idea, that it was the officials who called the game. But this was not true. I asked the officials on the field who called the game and they said "the police". After the game I met them at another place and got more details.

They said it was an Ontario Provincial Police officer who called the game and they also said that they hadn't awarded the game to anybody. They made it clear that they had had no trouble with the players on the field at any time during the game.

Sometimes when fights break out in the crowd it rubs off on the players, but at no time did this happen on Saturday in either the junior or senior game. The fighting in the first game between Parkside Collegiate and Annandale and broke out at intervals during the rest of the afternoon.

However, at no time did any fans interfere with the actual playing of the game. The games were repeatedly held up and this is something I couldn't figure out why.

They weren't out on the gridiron and they weren't throwing things on the field. Ingersoll and they weren't Desborough and Bill Martin went across the field to try and quiet the crowd down and even Mayor Gordon Henry made a trip across but they just hooted at him.

All the fighting took place on the west side of the field and most of it occurred between the 50 yd. lines which makes you think that a number of what an Ingersoll game committee worker called "rowdies", made it a point to gather in one place and cause trouble.

One thing for sure, all the schools were involved in the Ingersoll Im after the game told me "Arthur Voaden started all the trouble during the senior game". Well it takes two to make a fight and you can bet it wasn't Ingersoll fans fighting another or Arthur Voaden fighting each other. I asked a game committee worker how many police were on the scene and he said "six Ingersoll and three OPPs".

What I would like to know if the situation was as bad as some people made out then why wasn't the whole show called long before it was? Why wait until 1:10 of the senior game remaining?

With darkness closing in fast the senior game was held up for a quarter at a time late in the OPP who called the game.

PLAYERS BITTER
Ingersoll players were bitter as most of them congregated outside their dressing room. Coaches Desborough and Martin they didn't protest in any way. I'll always think Ingersoll would have pulled the game out of the fire if they had been allowed to finish it. They had the momentum going and the time down by 12 points with less than five minutes to play.

For a number of them it was the last football game they will ever play and they got a rotten deal. After the game in the parking lot west of the school a couple of mud and standing in a pose with fists raised like John L. Sullivan and Charlie Mitchell back in the bare knuckle days of boxing, called each other every name there is while a large group egged them on.

But not a punch was thrown. In my opinion the whole thing was blown up out of proportion. No matter how it ended it was a good season for IDCI and the officiating was the best since I've been covering the games the past nine years.

INGERSOLL — Violence erupted in a crowd of about 2,000 spectators here Saturday forcing officials, at the request of police, to stop the Oxford-Elgin Bowl senior final football game.

The game was stopped with 1:10 left on the clock and Arthur Voaden Secondary school of St. Thomas clinging to a 19-13 lead over Ingersoll District Collegiate. Ingersoll

had possession of the ball on their own 45-yard line.
The trouble, blamed by officials on a group of drunken youths, started early in the contest, the second half of a junior-senior doubleheader.
In the first game, Annandale Marauders of Tillsonburg defeated Parkside Colts of St. Thomas, 26-16.
"By the time the senior game rolled around, a lot of booze had been consumed," Arthur Voaden coach Ed Williamson said on Sunday.

Fights, pushing and shoving and a general melee broke out in the stands almost from the outset of the game.
In the second quarter, with the score tied at 6-6, officials stopped the game and conferred with police. They decided that if the unruly conduct didn't abate, the game would be halted at that point. There were nine police officers at the game.
When some semblance of order was restored, the game continued.
"There were some hoodlums from St. Thomas and some hoodlums from Ingersoll

and they made it disgraceful," Ingersoll Mayor Gord Henry said Sunday.

The mayor was a spectator at the game. He said that at one point he told police to get him a copy of the Riot Act.

"I told them I'd read it if it gets out of hand," he said.

"I still have faith in the youth of both our communities," he said, "but a group of goons made it difficult."

He said two carloads of provincial police were a short distance from the field standing by in case they were needed. They were not called.

"If you start to arrest people you just add to the confusion," the mayor said.

He said a lot of people were getting pushed around and knocked onto a muddy track surrounding the field.

The game was called when a section of snow fence surrounding the field was knocked down. At no time did the crowd spill on to the playing surface.

Mayor Henry said the majority of the crowd kept chanting "we want football" but "the goons that got into the strong drink made it impossible for the others."

"It will never happen again because a game like that won't be allowed again," he said.

He said he would strongly recommend that games "of that nature" be held in the future during school hours and "never on a Saturday."

John Finlay, principal of the Ingersoll school, called the melee the "complete irresponsibility of a few idiots who came not to see the game but to make a spectacle of themselves."

He and others said the trouble makers were not students at either school but outsiders and in some cases, former students.

Both Mr. Finlay and Doug Harris, a teacher at the school who organized the bowl games, feel that future games, if held in Ingersoll, would be played during school hours.

Mr. Finlay said the game was held on Saturday to allow parents to attend. He said, in some cases, parents were seeing their first game of the season.

"Ingersoll will not put the student body through such an ordeal again," Mr. Finlay said. "The games are played for the benefit of the students and if outsiders cannot behave themselves they will be barred."

"I'm sorry it ended that way," St. Thomas coach Williamson said.

Mr. Williamson said his team marched to the Ingersoll seven-yard line late in the fourth quarter and an attempt to kick a field goal to put the game out of reach was blocked.

He said Ingersoll recovered on about their own five yard line and had marched to their 45 when the game was called.

"They're an excellent football team and certainly could have won the game," he said. It was an excellent football game and the outcome left a sour taste in my mouth.

"I can appreciate how the Ingersoll team would feel. They're a very good team at making the big play. In no way did I feel we had the game in the bag."

He said he was impressed with the way the Ingersoll team members conducted themselves after the game.

He said the trouble in the crowd seemed to start from insignificant incidents such as grabbing at pennants. It started with a small number but in the end "I guess you could say it wound up as a substantial number."

He, too, anticipates a move to change the format for the bowl.

Any changes would have to be discussed by the physical education directors of the 13

schools (11 have football teams) in the conference and recommendations made to the headmasters' (principals') association.

He said some principals are already on record as opposing the game and added there had been hints of trouble over the past two years.

He said Ingersoll officials did a tremendous organizational job . . . "they did their best."

He said because of injuries to players during both games the senior game was running late and when the final trouble erupted it was about 5:30 p.m. and nearing darkness.

It was the third successive championship for the Arthur Voaden team.

Ron Watson scored two touchdowns for the winners and Rob de la Penotiere scored one.

Bruce Blair scored both touchdowns for Ingersoll. The game was a rematch of last year's championship which also came close to being halted when fighting broke out in the stands. The game, won by St. Thomas 32-0, was played in St. Thomas.

A punt by Jim Chwieniuk deep into the Ingersoll end zone which was conceded for a point, with six minutes left to play gave Huron Park Huskies a 14-13 win over Ingersoll District Collegiate Blue Bombers and the Oxford County High School Conference senior championship.

The way the game started out it looked like Ingersoll might win in a romp as the Bombers held a 13-0 lead mid way in the second quarter but the Huskies came on strong as their defence tightened up and runners Jim Wilhelm, Brian Thompson and Roger Hall started to grind out yardage with quarterback Tom Popma, who handled the team in fine style, hitting on some big passes. At half time they had the Bombers lead cut to 13-7.

Oxford rivalry resumes

Bomber fumbles lift Huskies

WOODSTOCK — Huron Park Huskies are hoping history doesn't repeat.

The Huskies and Ingersoll Blue Bombers resumed their Oxford Conference high school senior football rivalry Tuesday afternoon at Huron Park with the Huskies coming out on top, 13-13.

Last season the Blue Bombers were one-point winners when the two clubs tangled during the regular schedule. But when it came to the Oxford Conference championship game, the Huskies turned the tables and edged the Blue Bombers by a single point.

The Huskies are hoping that the roles aren't reversed this year, should the two teams meet in the championship game.

Huron Park, which defeated College Avenue 46-0 last week, got on the scoreboard first in Tuesday's game.

The Huskies took over the ball on the Ingersoll 40-yard line after the Bombers were forced to punt early in the first quarter.

Quarterback Doug Chambers then guided the Huskies to a touchdown, with fullback Terry Illingworth going in for the TD from the one with 5:30 elapsed in the opening quarter. Brian Jackson's convert attempt was wide.

Ingersoll tied the game with 45 seconds left in the first half when Mike Thompson capped a 61-yard drive with a 12-yard touchdown. A two-point conversion failed and the teams were tied 6-6 at halftime.

Early in the third quarter Huron Park's Rob Legate recovered a Blue Bomber fumble on the Ingersoll 34-yard line and the Huskies went in for a touchdown with halfback Bob Julian covering the final seven yards. Jackson's convert attempt was blocked.

Ingersoll came back after the kickoff and marched 76 yards for a touchdown. Thompson finished the drive off with a six-yard run. Scott Beam's convert put the Blue Bombers ahead 13-12.

However, the Huskies came roaring right back and put together a 54-yard drive of their own which culminated with Ill-

ingworth's two-yard touchdown. A two-point convert attempt was unsuccessful.

Turnovers proved the downfall of the Blue Bombers. In the first half they lost fumbles on Huron Park's 30-yard line and then on the Huskies' seven.

In the second half they again lost two fumbles, the first on their own 34-yard line which led to Huron Park's second touchdown and the other on the Huron Park 33 late in the final quarter.

Huron Park coaches Eric McIlveen and Bill Carrothers were pleased with the Huskies' performance in the second half.

The Huron Park offence moved the ball well in the final half "and we didn't do anything fancy," said offensive co-ordinator McIlveen.

"We didn't put any passing together. In the third quarter the wind was against us and we didn't want to do anything fancy.

"Ingersoll really closed the outside stuff off so we went inside most of the second half."

Ingersoll enjoyed its offensive success by running outside on the Huskies' defence.

"We were worried for a while about that option — they (the Blue Bombers) were do-

ing it well," said defensive coach Carrothers.

"We made some adjustments at halftime and we closed it off pretty well in the second half."

The Huskies now have to prepare for a game against Woodstock Collegiate Friday which prompted McIlveen to comment: "The schedule isn't in our favor. We're playing a team Friday (Woodstock) which has played today so it's the same for both teams."

"I think the kids lose out in not having time to correct their mistakes," Carrothers said.

Ingersoll, which shut out Woodstock 13-0 last week, saw its record drop to 1-1 with Tuesday's loss.

In other Oxford Conference senior games Tuesday, Woodstock Collegiate Red Devils defeated Woodstock College Ave. Knights 15-0 and Tillsonburg Glendale Griffins defeated Norwich Knights 15-6.

In junior action, Huron Park defeated Ingersoll 25-6, Norwich beat Glendale 22-8 and Woodstock Collegiate beat College Ave. 12-6.

Tim Matheson scored the first senior Red Devils' major on a two-yard run which capped a 35-yard drive and Kevin Robinson converted. The Devils added a safety touch in the second quarter and a 35-yard touchdown pass from Robinson to Jim Downing in the fourth quarter.

Bill Pearson was hero for the junior Devils. He scored on a 15-yard reverse in the first quarter and added the other touchdown on a 25-yard reverse in the last minute of play. The Devils started their winning march with about two minutes left. Stewart Campbell scored the College Ave. major on a six-yard run in the second quarter.

Mark Holbrook, Doug Reeves and Ron Wells scored the junior Norwich touchdowns while Steve Horvath had the junior Griffins' touchdown.

Fumbles key as Huskies dump Ingersoll

Huron Park Huskies recovered two key fumbles, and pulled their defence together in the second half Tuesday, downing Ingersoll Blue Bombers 18-13 in a senior high school football game.

Linebacker Pete Poole dropped on an Ingersoll fumble at his own eight-yard line to stop a second quarter drive. In the third quarter, Rob Legate recovered Doug Kivinin's fumble on a punt. The Huskies marched 39 yards in five plays with Bob Julian going over the right side on a six-yard scoring plunge. It gave the Huskies a 12-6 lead.

In all Huron Park recovered four fumbles — twice stunning Bomber scoring chances — and that proved the difference in the game.

"I thought we were awfully lucky to be where we were (tied 6-6 after the first half)," Huskies coach Bill Carrothers said.

"I don't know why but they (the defence) always come up with the big play," he said.

Ingersoll did manage to battle back for a 13-12 lead early in the fourth quarter. But, on the next series quarterback Doug Chambers marched his team 55 yards for the winning major.

Ingersoll picked up 169 yards and 12 first downs against the defending Oxford-Elgin champions. Much of it came in the first half as the Bombers made effective use of the option. However, in the second half, and especially the fourth quarter the Huron Park defence got outside to stop quarterback Ken Phillips and fullback Mike Thompson before they got around the corner.

"We were worried about the option," Carrothers said. "They ran it well and they ran it often."

He had expected the Bombers to use the option, which made it even more upsetting when the defence didn't react, he said.

"I was very upset in the first half," Carrothers confided.

BOMBED CASS

Despite the 46-0 shellacking Huron Park gave College

Avenue last week, Carrothers expected a close game against the Bombers.

"Sure, our guys have experience but we still have some green guys... I did think it would be a close game). We had such a great rivalry during the last year and they're very we-

coached."

Huron Park opened scoring the first time they had the ball, taking possession on the Ingersoll 40 after a short punt. The Huskies stayed on the ground with fullback Terry Illingworth plowing into the end zone from the two-yard line. The drive covered 40 yards in eight plays with Illingworth carrying five times.

Ingersoll moved the ball to the Huron Park 31-yard-line before defensive tackle Jim Chwieniuk broke up the drive by falling on the ball after a mix-up on the snap from centre.

The Huskies returned to midfield before Kivinin picked off a Chambers' pass—one of four he threw in the game.

Ingersoll moved within scoring range as Jim O'Bright's penalty for unnecessary roughing gave them the ball at the eight-yard-line. Phillips had trouble with the snap and again lost the ball — Pete Poole came up with the turnover.

BOMBERS SCORE

Ingersoll finally did manage

to score late in the half as they took the ball at their own 50. Phillips hit John Thompson near the 35 for a 19-yard gain on a third-down pass to keep the drive alive. They gambled again on fourth down and five yards to go at the 21-yard-line. Mike Thompson took the pitch-out and went to the 12 for a first down.

With less than a minute remaining in the half Thompson took a pitch and raced around the right side for the tying touchdown.

The Huskies got a big break in the second half when Legate recovered Kivinin's fumble at the Ingersoll 39 on a punt. The Huskies moved to the seven before Julian slipped three tackles to go in for the touchdown.

Ingersoll came right back with the longest touchdown drive, going 80 yards to pay dirt.

Phillips converted on three third down situations. The big play was a 20-yard pass completion to Pete Tucker at midfield. They moved to the six

before Mike Thompson raced around the left side for his second touchdown. Scott Bean hit the convert and Ingersoll suddenly led 13-12 early in the fourth quarter.

Huron Park took the lead for good with 4:46 left as Illingworth capped a 55-yard drive by slamming through the line from the two. The key play came when Julian took a pitch around the right side, cut inside, and rambled 28 yards to the 17-yard-line.

ANOTHER MISCUE

Ingersoll tried to come back, but again fumbles spoiled their chances. They had the ball at the Huron Park 33-yard-line with three minutes to play when Mike Thompson couldn't handle the pitch on the option. Larry Hargreaves pounced on the loose ball for Huron Park.

The Bombers got another chance when the defence forced the Huskies to punt with less than two minutes to play.

The Bombers were stopped on the option twice and had a pass

knocked away putting them in a fourth-and-13 situation with 1:09 on the clock. Phillips went for the bomb but Hargreaves tipped the pass away to end Ingersoll's hopes. The Huskies ran out the clock to collect their second win in two starts.

Ingersoll is 1-1 this season. The Huskies churned up 251 yards in offence to 169 for Ingersoll. Julian was the leading rusher with 99 yards — 84 in the second half. Illingsworth had 91 yards and Hall had 45.
