HISTORY of S.S. No. 5, WEST ZORRA
Codys' Corners' School
$++++++++++++++++++++++$
The focal point of elementary education and sommunity activities in S.S. No. 5, West Zorra was Jodys' Corners' School.

The school and neighbourhood got its name from the pioneers "The Cody Family", who had developed most of the land around these corners. The family name has been and is still associated with events, circumstances as well as prosperity in West Zorra and Embro from the date of the early settlement even to this day.

The first school was a log building situated on the north-east corner of the farm owned by the late Elijah Cody. It was about forty rods from the corner. Mr. Adam McDonald, a teacher from the 8 th line taught in this school in 1848-49.

When the school became too small for the number attending, a frame school was built on the south-west corner, after a number of years it was used as a dwelling, later as a driving shed and finally remodelled and now on the farm of Mrs. Alvin MacKay.

In 1870 the ratepayers purchased land on the north-west corner where the present school stands. It was a brick building with a gallery at the back of the classroom. This gallery was used as an auxiliary teaching area and was frequently used by the older pupils to supervise and coach the younger children in their studies.

During the winter of 1899, a devastating fire swept through the school and only the strong brick walls were left. But with the dauntless spirit of the pioneers and the strong will along with hard work, this school was rebuilt and ready for occupancy in less than three weeks. A wonderful achievement by these hardy pioneers.

The original well at this school was dug by hand and replaced in 1914 by a new one. Neither of these proved satisfactory. In 1932 a new well was drilled and is still in use today.

The Superintendent or Inspector of the school in those days was Rev. Donald McKenzie of Knox Presbyterian Church, Embro.

In 1914, for the sum of $\$ 30$., one eighth of an acre of land was purchased from the late Dexter Day, when agriculture had become part of the school curriculum and this ground was used for the school garden, planted and cared for by the pupils.

The box stove was the original heating system kept full of wood by the pupils. In 1912, at the cost of \$130., the box stove was replaced by a modern school heating system, a Waterbury-Watterman furnace. It was later replaced by a stoker furnace and in 1963 it was renovated to the present oil burner. Hydro was installed in 1928, a great improvement in the school.

In 1919, two maple trees were planted on the school grounds in memory of two former pupils, Osborne McKenzie and Rowland (Rolly) Featherstone who gave their lives in world War 1.

This school was used as a meeting place by the Methodists and Baptists. These services were held each Sunday. Father Beardsall, a Baptist minister deserves mention. A man of strong personality devoted to his chosen work. He commuted from his home south of Ingersoll every week by a horse drawn vehicle. He carried on this work in the community for twenty years, his only reward was of doing his duty, seeing the Lord's blessing upon his work. Sunday School was carried on through the summer months until the early thirties.

A pupil was asked by the new teacher "Is there a parents club at this school?" In reply the punil said "I don't know, I never saw one, but there's a strap in the teacher's drawer." This was in 1922 and next year a Home School Association was formed and

Ontario in 1924. This was a vital organization that enabled and enlightened the community to be aware of the needs and trend of the times.

Through their efforts, hot lunches were made available for the pupils, a piano, movie projector, library books and a number of useful articles for use in the school.

The talents of the community were seen in the holding of Christmas concerts, community entertainment, as well as a number of well staged plays by the young people. One play worthy of mention was "The Path Accross the Hills", which was staged nine times.

One of the highlights of this organization was the holding of a community banquet following a real lively contest. There was an attendance of over 125 who crowded into the school for this memorable evening.

The boys of the community were honoured and presented with gifts on their return from the army following World War 2.

Following many years of useful work this Home and School Association disbanded. A Euchre Club was organized. They met weekly through the winter months and were quite active for a few years and they too closed.

In 1944, the old system of three trustees elected from the school section was replaced by five trustees elected from the township, who acted for the new school area. With the erection of the new school, known as Highland Park School situated on the 4 th line north of Embro, grades 7 \& 8 have been transported by bus to this new school. With the overcrowding at Cody's school, grades 5 \& 6 pupils have also been taken by bus to Walkers S.S. No. 1 and Baynes S.S. No. 2, West Zorra.

Taxes for school purposes in 1877 were 1.72 mills and increased in 1917 to 2.65 mills. In 1965, the mill rate had reached an all high of 12.5 mills.



There has also been a oreat change in teacher's salaries. In 1904, the teacher received \$425. and in 1965 they advanced to \$3350.

At the end of June this year all the schools in west Zorra will be closed and replaced by the larger school area.

As we celebrate this reunion, July $30 \& 31$, 1966 the doors of Codys' Corners' little red school will close with a bit of sadness, especially by the older folk and many fond memories of happy days spent here will be locked in the hearts of the former pupils of S.S. No. 5!
