CANADIAN LITERARY INSTITUTE.

Is located at Woodstock, and is under the control of the Regular Baptist Denomination. It has three different departments, viz: Primary, Higher and Theological, the average attendance on which consists of fully 100 students.—The Primary School is attended by pupils over eleven years of age, who study the various branches of an ordinary English education. In the Higher Department the students are prepared for the study of Theology, or for matriculation in Arts, Law, or Medicine. The fees for attendance on these departments vary from \$20 to \$28 per year. In the Theological Department, attended by about 30 students, the tuition is *gratis*. The year is divided into three terms of about thirteen weeks each, commencing the second week of January, April, and September, respectively. *Faculty of Instruction*:—Rev. R. A. Fyfe, D. D., Principal, and Professor of Theology; Rev. Wm. Stewart, B. A., Classical and Hebrew Tutor; C. B. Hankison, B. S., Mathematical Tutor; W. D. Ball, M. A., Teacher of English and French; P. S. Vining, Teacher of Painting and Drawing; Mrs. Revell, Teacher of Instrumental Music. Mrs. M. T. Cooke, Matron; Mr. S. T. Cooke, Steward.

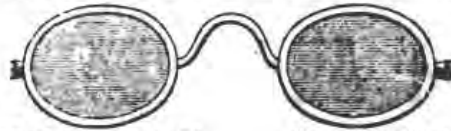

COUNTY OF OXFORD,
PROVINCE OF CANADA.

This fine and fertile county, which, prior to the year 1845, formed (for judicial purposes) what was called the "Brack District," by which name it was generally known; is of inland geographical position, and comprises, in territorial extent, an area of 710 square miles.

It is bounded as follows, viz:—On the North, by the Counties of Perth and Waterloo; on the South, by the Counties of Elgin and Norfolk; on the East, by the County of Brant; and on the West, by the County of Middlesex.

Under its denomination as the above "District," it was at one time, judicially attached to the County of Norfolk, but the requirements of Upper Canada having, for the more convenient accomplishment of its Municipal and Judicial purposes, rendered it expedient that there should be considerable alterations in the formation and constitution of the different Counties of the Province, from their original division by Proclamation of the Governor, under authority of the British Act of Parliament, XXXI George, III Cap. 31 (1792, the Act quoted in every Provincial Act before the Union, as the authority under which they were passed), as regards their respective component Townships or Municipalities, and their public functional administrations, Oxford has, in this respect, undergone various sectional changes by Proclamations under Parliamentary authority. "Districts" (as so apportioned) having, in 1849, by Act 12, Victoria, Cap. 78 (taking effect from and after 1st of January, 1850,) been abolished, and the formation of Counties declared instead, it was subsequently—by statute 14 and 15, Victoria, Cap. 5—enacted that Oxford should be formed and constituted a County, comprising the Townships therein desig-

nated. The County having thus been finally organized as one of distinct determinate jurisdiction, unattached, juridically or otherwise, to any other, the following are now the Municipalities of which it is composed, which we enumerate with the number of acres (assessed for 1862) of which each Township is comprised, viz:

Village of Embro, with a whole population, as we compile from the census returns of Canada for 1861, of forty-six thousand one hundred and eighty-five, (being twenty-three thousand eight hundred and ten males and twenty-two thousand five hundred and ninety-three females, showing an increase over the census of 1851 (which returned the population at thirty-six thousand six hundred and thirty-eight) of no less than thirteen thousand five hundred and forty-seven, or forty-one and a-half per cent. in ten years; thus developing to a remarkable degree, the very material progress of settlement in the county and its concomitant advantages, and evincing that Oxford is fully entitled to bear the palm as the Banner County of the Province, as exceeding its competitors in rapidity of growth within the last decade. On page — we give an accurate abstract statement of the result of the census of the county taken in 1861, with the comparative totals for 1851, comprehending the different nationalities in each municipality, distinguishing the sexes in number, school attendances, state of their education, with the births and deaths recorded in 1860, to which is added a carefully prepared compendium of the various religious denominations in the townships respectively. From that abstract it will be seen that the predominant nationality of the settlers is that of the Scotch, the nativity of the entire population of the county in 1861, being:—Of Canada West, twenty-four thousand six hundred and three persons; Canada East, two hundred and ninety-four; Scotland, four thousand nine hundred and twenty-two; England, four thousand five hundred and sixty-two; Ireland, two thousand one hundred and eighty-two; United States, two thousand two hundred and ninety-one; Nova Scotia, one hundred and twenty-four; New Brunswick, five hundred and twelve; Germany, nine hundred and ninety-one; and the remainder, European and other foreign countries. A considerable portion of the county is intersected by the river Thames (known in former times as *Rivière la Tenatché*), which winds its serpentine course through several of the townships; those of Nissouri, East and West Zorra, Blandford (north of which the river has its rise) North, West and East Oxford, and the North of Derham being watered by various branches of it, while Blenheim, and the East and North of Blandford are watered by the tributaries of the Ouse, or Grand River, and Derham and Norwich by the Otter Creek. The general surface land of the county is of a picturesquely rolling appearance, gently undulating in pleasing hills, fine slopes and fertile valleys. It is well

watered and timbered, being abundantly supplied with never-failing streams, adapted for mill and factory purposes; and a heavy growth of forest, abounding largely, as it does, in hardwood, beech, maple, oak, hickory, linden and white ash, with an intermixture of pine. From its high state of cultivation, with fine, open, well fenced, park-like fields and clustering groves of pine trees, interspersed here and there, upon traveling through the county, the eye, in whatever direction, in any township, it is east, is greeted with imposing landscape scenery, reminding the beholder more of an English landscape than that recovered from the dense forest but at a comparatively recent period. The soil of the county is of great depth and fertility, and is alternately of a rich, sandy loam, and clayey character intermixed with gravel; some tracts being of an alluvial nature and marlacious quality, possessing great fertilizing properties, all easily worked and yielding large crops of wheat, corn and potatoes. The quantity of wheat raised in the county of Oxford in 1860 was one million forty four thousand one hundred and thirty-six bushels, being twenty-three bushels per head of the population. The fertility of the soil of Oxford is indeed, such that in an official return made in 1830 by Acting Surveyor-General Chewett, who was appointed under authority of Parliament, to survey the "quantities of land in the Province," he reported that this county "WAS THE MOST VALUABLE LAND IN THE PROVINCE." This opinion, given by an experienced professional gentleman of known abilities, and employed by the government of the country, and being, besides, an unbiased report, cannot but be accepted as the best and most worthy testimony to the superior quality of the lands of the County of Oxford over those of any other in the Province, and an encouragement to the enterprising agriculturist, and well deserving the attention of all intending settlers in Canada. Oxford is also an excellent fruit producing county. All the varieties of fruit cultivated in the Province, thrive here in great vigor and productiveness. The apple, the peach, the pear, seem indigenous to the climate, and garden vegetables flourish well and attain a large growth. Vines of all kinds are remarkably thriving. Tomato plants grow to a good height and yield largely of fruit. Half a field may frequently be seen covered with great yellow pumpkins, the produce of the pumpkin vine, which will run its growth even over stumps and brush-heaps; and the cantaloupe vine yields pretty large crops of delicious melons.

From the inland position of Oxford it is, of course, without those important receptacles of commerce—Ports and Harbours—and although it is eminently an agricultural county, and its industry is principally applied to agricultural pursuits, yet its manufactures are extensive, and from the numerous streams, brooks and creeks which irrigate the lands all over, there is excellent hydraulic power available for efficient propulsion of machinery for manufacturing purposes, and there is, consequently, the most ample scope for carrying on the milling and factory business, in which, as well as in the lumber trade (every township, almost containing several grist, flouring, saw and other mills and factories,) there is already a very extensive traffic realized, and the business of every branch of these could be still further greatly extended by the best directed enterprise, with not only profitable returns to the parties engaging in their active operation, but with benefit to the whole community.

From the fertility and certified value of its soil, and its well known adaptation for culture, both agriculturally and horticulturally, the favorable capabilities which it possesses for advantageously carrying on, within its limits, the several branches of industrial manufactures alluded to, and the many advantages otherwise which the county naturally affords, together with the great railroad facilities for the transportation of materials and produce, besides easy accessibility, by good roads, for the like purposes to any part of the county, Oxford is rendered, in an eminent degree, an excellent and desirable locality for settlement, equally for the agriculturalist, miller, merchant, manufacturer, mechanic and operative.

In referring to the early settlement of the county it will be sufficient for the purposes of the present work to give a brief synoptical account of it, without entering upon any lengthened or elaborate review of the general history of the Province, as being only superfluous and quite extraneous to the intended subject-matter of this publication, which was designed simply to be an abstract record of statistical and other general information, requisite for the compilation of a County Directory.

The original formation and settlement of what is now the County of Oxford commenced during the *regime* of the first Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada—Colonel John Graves Simcoe—whose term of Governorship was from 1792 to 1796. The Townships of Blandford, Blenheim and West Oxford appear to have been the first opened up and surveyed for settlement, which was in the year 1793. The others were surveyed during the successive years up to 1820, when the survey of Zorra was made. The first and pioneer settler in, and for a number of years, the Representative in Parliament, of the County, was the late Thomas Horner, Esq., M. P. P. Mr. Horner was, by birth, an American, but a colonial British subject. His advent to the Western part of Canada was under the following circumstances: In consequence of services rendered to Colonel Simcoe, during the American Revolutionary War, by a Mr. Watson, an uncle of Mr. Horner's, in remembrance of them, the Colonel, on his appointment as Governor of Upper Canada, invited Mr. Watson to come and settle in this Colony, and being at the same time anxious for the introduction of settlers into the Province from the United States, the Governor urged him not only to come himself, but "to bring all his friends and relations with him," and as an inducement and a reward for those services, he promised a whole Township for them. In virtue of this promise, Mr. Watson accordingly sent a son to Canada, who, accompanied by his cousin, Mr. Horner, arrived in Oxford in 1793, and to facilitate their speedy settlement, the Governor instantly ordered that three Concessions of the Township of Blenheim should be surveyed for them, in which, after the survey was made, a site was chosen for the erection of a mill, which was required by the Governor should be established, as one of the conditions of their absolute right to the lands granted, and as an encouragement to future settlers. After making the selection for the mill site, both the emigrants returned to the States. Horner alone came back to Canada, which he did with the view of settling in this county, bringing with him from Albany, N. Y., the materials and men to erect

the mill in question. At this time the locality of his intended settlement, and the surrounding territory were unmarked by a single feature of civilization. There was then no road communication from Niagara (then called Newark, and the seat of government) to York (now Toronto), and the usual mode of traveling and for the transportation of goods, was by boat along the Lake shore, so that the only approach to the county was by such route. Mr. Horner having conveyed his materials, &c., all the way by water from near Albany, drew in his boat to the beach of Burlington Bay, in the neighborhood of where the city of Hamilton is now situated. His cargo was thence carried to Bleinheim on sledges, roughly improvised for the occasion, and drawn by oxen. Mr. Horner's mill was the first saw mill erected in the county, but he seems to have been unfortunate in his mill speculations, for the dam of his first (the saw mill) which was in working order in 1795, broke down before it had been in operation at all, and the grist mill, which he subsequently erected, was destroyed by fire in 1809, and never rebuilt.

Mr. Horner held the first military appointment in the county, having been appointed Captain of the Oxford Militia in 1798. He was also a Deputy Lieutenant of the County, to which he was appointed in 1806.

The County of Oxford, which for Parliamentary purposes, was previous to 1820, incorporated with the County of Middlesex, became entitled to have a Representative of its own in the Legislative Assembly of the Upper Province, and the late Mr. Horner was unanimously elected for the first time to serve as its Member in the Parliament of 1821-24. At the succeeding General Election he was for the second time returned as one of its representatives, and Colonel Ingersoll, (father of the present highly esteemed Registrar of the County, James Ingersoll, Esq.,) the other,—the county having in the meantime, by the requisite number of population, attained that status which entitled it to return two Members of Parliament. Mr. Horner continued to represent Oxford in Parliament, with a short intermission, from the date of his first election till his death, in the year 1834. The career of this first settler in Oxford redounds much to the credit of his memory, worthy of emulation by present and future settlers. He was a true British loyalist, of unswerving patriotism, as evinced by his many patriotic acts, and self-denial both in a military capacity and as a civilian, the history of which is to be found in the annals of his adopted country. As a parliamentary representative, we read that his position in the House had been a very prominent and influential one; independent in the expression of his political proclivities, and doing his utmost towards opening up the resources of the county he represented (being himself identified with its interests, rise and progress), and for the benefit of his constituents and the Province at large. Such was the pioneer settler in Oxford. He found the county a vast unbroken wilderness, untrod by civilized feet, but had lived to see it steadily advance in civilization and cultivation, until it was developed a magnificent agricultural county, covered with splendid farms, and where, at the period of his entry into the county, there was no sign of human habitation other than the rude wigwam of the Mohawk Indian, he had witnessed the erection of substantial farm buildings instead;—the jungle and the forest transformed into waving corn fields and

rich, productive farming lands; and the county rapidly drawing within its boundaries an enterprising, industrious, and thrifty population; and that within but a comparatively short space of time.

There is one incident in the life of Mr. Horner, so unique and illustrative of the times he lived in, that we cannot forbear quoting it here, and perhaps its perusal may amuse our readers; but before doing so, we must premise that by an Act of Parliament, 33 Geo. III., cap. 5 (1793), magistrates were allowed to marry any person resident beyond 18 miles from a Church of England minister; [why this restriction to that particular denomination we have no means of knowing;] and they were required to publicly notify, in reference to those desirous of intermarrying with each other, and there being no person of the Church of England living within 18 miles of them, that any one knowing of any just impediment why they should not be joined in matrimony," was to give notice thereof to a Justice of the Peace for the district. The justice performing this Gordian-knot ceremony, was specially required to do so according to the ceremonial rites of the Church of England, but it would appear that from the impulsive nature of this matrimonial enactment as regards a strict compliance with the prescribed formula, the worthy justices of those days were rather lax in the observance of the statutory requirements. However, we find recorded of Mr. Horner, that "on one occasion, when a number of miles from home, he was applied to by a person to marry him instant. Mr. Horner calculated the number of fets there were between them and the residence of the parson of the 'Church of England,' and calculated the distance to be only 15½ miles. The bridegroom at once proposed that they should proceed in the woods a distance of 2½ miles in a direction opposite from the parson's residence, which was at once assented to by all parties, and the bride, bridegroom, justice, and friends, proceeded in the woods until they had got the required 18 miles' distance from the parson's residence. The bride and bridegroom hopped upon a log, and in a minute afterwards jumped therefrom man and wife." Brevity seems to have characterized the interesting ceremony, but the "happy couple," it is presumed, "looked before they leaped" the hymeneal jump.

The County of Oxford is at present represented in Parliament, in the Legislative Assembly, by the Hon. William McDougall, Commissioner of Crown Lands, for the North Riding, and Skellington Connor, Esquire, L.L.D. Q.C., for the South Riding. At the last general election, Mr. McDougall (who had been previously the representative) successfully contested North Oxford with Isaac Buchanan, Esquire, M.P.P. for the City of Hamilton, the then Ministerial candidate, but having become, as Commissioner of Crown Lands, a member of the present Government, (which had come into office since his election, and thereby vacated his seat for the Riding,) he was again returned as its member, by acclamation. For the Gore Electoral Division, which comprises the South Riding of Waterloo and the North Riding of Oxford, in the Legislative Council, the Hon. George Alexander, of Woodstock, is the sitting member, and the Hon. Oliver Blake, of Townsend, has been recently elected representative in the Legislative Council of the Thames Division, which comprises the South Riding of Oxford and the County of Norfolk.

E D U C A T I O N A L .

In the very important matter of Education, great progress has been effected in the County of Oxford, and she has now the advantages of a liberal and permanent provision for the general and thorough education of its rising population; enjoying to the full the privileges and benefits conferred by the present excellent School Act for Upper Canada (13th and 14th Vict., cap. 48—1850). Indeed, such a well-organized system of schools and churches has been planted amongst the settlers, as had been the blessing of their earlier days and the pride of their fathers. There are one hundred and ten common school sections and schools in the county, sixty-six of which are FREE schools, and forty partly free. (for the free system is gaining ground and becoming more appreciated,) under the tuition of highly qualified and certificated teachers, besides grammar schools and a large number of private schools and academies, where all the branches of an English and classical education are competently taught.

AGRICULTURAL.

There are several Agricultural Societies in the County, formed into districts, and all in a flourishing condition, with great beneficial results. More particular notice of them is taken in the details given under the head of the different Townships. The original Society, under the name of the "County of Oxford Agricultural Society," was established in the year 1836, and organized by Act of Parliament, 14 and 15 Vic. cap. 127, and continued as such until 1858, when the County was electorally divided into the North and South Ridings. It then also became divisible, and was formed into two Societies. Since that time, the Society known as the "Agricultural Society of the North Riding of Oxford" has been in receipt of an annual government grant of \$720 00.

The Society numbers 145 members; fee of admission as member, \$1 00. At the last exhibition of the Society there were prizes awarded to the value of \$350 00.

JUDICIARY OF THE COUNTY OF OXFORD.

COUNTY COURT.

This Court is presided over by the resident Judge in the county. Its jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed £50, and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties, or signature of the defendant to £100, and to all bail bonds and recognizances of bail given in the

County Court, to any amount; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills or actions for libel, slander, crim. cou., or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. The County Court also possesses Equity powers to the amount of £50, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

County Court Terms commence on the first Monday in January, April, July and October, and end the following Saturday.

COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.

D. S. McQueen, *Chairman*.—This Court is held four times a year for trials by Jury, in cases of larceny, misdemeanour and other offences.

COURT OF CHANCERY.

Henry B. Beard, *Master and Register*, for County of Oxford.

SURROGATE COURT.

The Jurisdiction of this Court relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of Probate of Wills and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons, having estate or effects in the county, and all matters arising out of, or connected with, the grant or revocation of Probate or Administration, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

LAW CIRCUITS.

The Circuits are held twice a year in each County, between Hillary and Easter Terms, and between Trinity and Michaelmas Terms, and the Courts of the OXFORD CIRCUIT are held in the towns of Simcoe, Brautford, Quelph, Berlin, Stratford, Woodstock and Cayuga.

CLERK OF ASSIZES.—Deputy Clerk of the Crown, *ex officio*.

DIVISION COURTS.

D. S. McQueen, *Judge*.

These Courts are held in different places in the County, for the summary disposal of cases not exceeding £25 currency, in amount so far as regards matters of debt or contract, and £10 so far as relates to injuries to personal chattles and torts. A jury is permitted in certain cases. Attachments against personal property of debtors absconding from the Province, leaving property liable to execution, or removing their goods from one County to another, or from the Province with intent to defraud, or keeping concealed to avoid service of process with intent to defraud, may be issued by the Clerk of the Division Court or by the Judge or by any Justice of the Peace. Their jurisdiction does not extend to actions for gambling debts, liquors drank in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to Land, &c., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. cou. seduction or breach of promise, or actions against a Justice of the Peace for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. The Township of Blandford is bounded on the East by the Township of Blenheim, on the North by the Township of Wilmot, (County of Waterloo,) on the South by the Township of East Oxford, the dividing line being the Governor's Road, commonly termed Dundas Street, and on the West by the Township of East Zorra. Timber, chiefly pine, with a mixture of hardwood, in the Southern portion of the Township, there are a number of small lakes or ponds from 50 to 250 acres in size. The Township is well watered and well settled. The total population of the Township according to the census returns for 1861 was 1995, (an increase of 639 during the last decade) of which there were 1060 males and 935 females. The number of children attending school were 372. Births 54, deaths 12.

TOWNSHIP OF BLENHEIM.

This township is bounded on the east by the township of Dunfries; (County of Waterloo,) on the west by the township of Blandford; on the south by the township of Burford, (County of Brant,) and on the north by the township of Wilmot, (County of Waterloo). The township is divided into North and South Blenheim. The land in this township is good, and well watered and timbered—it is drained chiefly by Horner's and Smith's creeks. The township is highly improved. It is the most populous township in the county, and contains a population of 6,993, (an increase over the census of 1851 of 1998), of which there are 3,604 males and 3,389 females. Children attending school, 1,427; births in 1860, 283; deaths, 57. There are eight Post Offices in the township, viz: Canning, Chesterfield, Drumbo, Plattsville, Princeton, Richwood, Washington, and Wolveter.

TOWNSHIP OF DEREHAM.

This township, which was constituted a part of the County of Oxford, by Act of Parliament in 1798, is of large territorial extent, and is bounded on the North by the township of West Oxford, on the South by the township of Bayham (County of Norfolk,) on the East by the township of Norwich, and on the West by the township of South Dorchester, (County of Middlesex). Its settlement, which commenced in 1799, has been very rapid, and by the census taken for 1861, its population has been returned at 5477, (being 2846 Males and 2631 Females,) and an increase over its population in 1851 of 1833. Children attending School 1127; births in 1860, 202; deaths 28. Its soil is of a good quality and very productive; it is abundantly supplied with water power for mill purposes: and is also heavily timbered, with principally a mixture of pine and hardwood. A very extensive trade in lumber is carried on in this township, in consequence of the great facilities of transportation afforded by the Otter Creek which flows through it. A large number of Saw Mills are in active operation within its limits, besides Grist, Flouring, and Felling Mills. The township is traversed by the Logersoll and Port Burwell Plank and Gravel Roads. There are five Post Offices within its bounds, viz: Brownsville, Culloden, Dereham, (Tilsonburg), Mount Elgin, and Salford.

TOWNSHIP OF EAST NISSOURI.

This township, which is situated in the North-western part of the County, and fourteen miles from Woodstock, is bounded on the north by the townships of Blanchard and Downie, (County of Perth); on the south by the township of North Oxford; on the west by the township of West Nissouri, (Middlesex County); and on the east by the township of West Zorra. The original township of Nissouri became divided into two townships, as those of East and West Nissouri, and in 1851, the eastern portion, under the township name of Nissouri (East), was declared to form part of the County of Oxford, while Nissouri West remained attached to the East Riding of Middlesex. The township only commenced settling in 1819, and is now very well settled with a population, as returned by the census taken in 1861, of three thousand four hundred and eighty-four, (being 1854 males and 1630 females) shewing an increase over the census returns for 1851, of one thousand three hundred and sixty-six. There were 844 children attending school; births in 1860, one hundred and twenty-eight; deaths in same year twenty-seven. The soil of the township is of a very fertile quality, and excellently adapted for agricultural and horticultural cultivation. It is well supplied with mill streams, and is watered by the middle branch of the Thames, which flows through the southern portion of the Township.

The Thamesford and East Nissouri Gravel Road runs through the Township.

There are four Post Offices within the township, viz:—Lakeside, Kintore, (17th lot 11th concession), Thamesford, and Nissouri P.O.

An Agricultural Association composed of the Farmers of the Township, under the name of the "East Nissouri Agricultural Society," was organized on 11th February, 1857, and is successfully carried on, and meets at Grave's School House. The following are the

TOWNSHIPS OF NORWICH--NORTH & SOUTH.

These Townships under the original name of the Township of Norwich, formed a part of the County of Norfolk, but by Act of Parliament in 1798, that Township was detached therefrom and declared to be one of the Townships forming the County of Oxford. The boundaries of the original Township are as follows—On the North by the Township of East Oxford; on the South by the Township of Middleton (in Norfolk); on the East by the Township of Windham (in Norfolk); and on the West by the Township of Dereham. It became for Municipal purposes, divided into North and South Norwich. Their general aspect is that of a pleasant rolling country, having land of a rich description, and productive qualities for general cultivation, as evinced by the many splendid farms which they contain. Each Township has an immense growth of timber,—oak, elm, beech, maple, ridges of pine, &c., and beside well watered by the Otter Creek which runs through them. Both are also abundantly supplied throughout with water power sufficient for the driving of numerous mills,—grist, flouring, and saw, which are in operation in the Townships, where a very extensive business is carried on in the lumber trade. By the census taken for 1861, the population of North Norwich was returned at three thousand three hundred and thirty-four, (1718 Males and 1716 Females) and of South Norwich,—two thousand nine hundred and forty-eight, (1617 Males, and 1431 Females,) being in the aggregate, six thousand three hundred and thirty-two, an increase over the population of 1851, (which was returned at 5239) of one thousand one hundred and forty-three. Children attending school, in North Norwich 761, births in 1860, 96; deaths in the same year, 27,—in South Norwich 649; births in 1860, 94; deaths 26. These Townships are traversed by the following roads, viz: Brantford and Norwich Plank Road, Woodstock and Otterville Plank and Gravel Road, and the Otterville and Port Dover Plank and Gravel Road. There are four Post Offices in the Townships, viz: Burgessville, Newark, Norwich and Otterville. There is a flourishing Farmers' Association in the Townships jointly, under the name of the "Norwich Agricultural Society."

TOWNSHIP OF EAST OXFORD.

The townships of North, East, and West Oxford, although separately known by their distinct names, were originally combined for municipal purposes under the designation of the Township of Oxford, or Oxford Upon The Thames, but each having attained that status provided for by the Act of Parliament 33 Geo. III., cap. 3, (1793,) which entitled a township to a municipal government of its own, they became divided into separate municipalities accordingly. The present township of East Oxford is bounded on the north by the township of Blandford; on the south by that of North Norwich; on the east by the township of Burford, (County of Brant); and on the west by that of West Oxford. It is considered one of the best cultivated townships in the County; is watered by tributaries of the Thames, having also an abundant supply of water from streams and brooks for mill purposes. It affords excellent mill sites, and contains several large mills driven by water power, besides saw mills by powerful steam engines. It has likewise a heavy growth of timber, principally of hardwood. The population of the township was, by the last census, (1861) returned at two thousand seven hundred and twenty-nine: 1381 males and 1348 females, being an increase of five hundred and nineteen over its population in 1851. Children attending school in 1861, five hundred and eighty-two; births recorded in 1860, one hundred and thirteen, and deaths fourteen. The "Woodstock and Otterville Plank and Gravel Road" runs through the Township, as also the Great Western Railway, which has a station (Eastwood) within it. Eastwood and Oxford Centre are the Post Offices situated in the Township.

There is an excellent Agricultural Association in the township, named the "East Oxford Agricultural Society." It was organized in 1851, for the advancement of agricultural interests, and is successfully carried on. Under its auspices there is an annual exhibition of, and prizes given for, neat cattle, horses, sheep, swine, farm produce, field roots, and dairy produce. Residents in the township are admissible as members of the Society, on payment of an annual subscription of one dollar. The following members compose its present

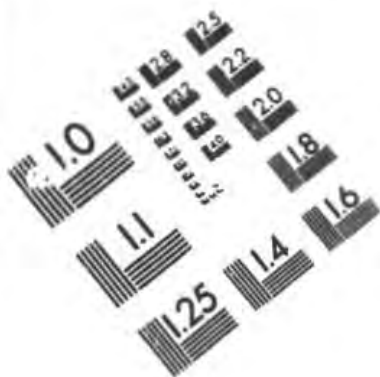

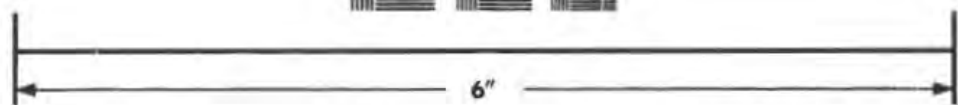

TOWNSHIP OF NORTH OXFORD.

As stated of East Oxford, the above township, though known by its district name of North Oxford, was united with the former and West Oxford, under the designation of "Oxford Upon The Thames," for municipal purposes, until they respectively acquired the requisite number of freehold and household residents to entitle them to separate municipal governments. Having so acquired this status, North Oxford was municipally detached from its adjacent neighbors, and became, in the year 1822, a separate township accordingly. It is divided from West Oxford by the river Thames, and is bounded as follows: On the north by portions of the three townships of East and West Zorra and Nissouri; on the south-east by the township of West Oxford; and on the west by the township of North Dorchester, (in Middlesex.) The township, in territorial extent, is the least in the County; it commenced its settlement in 1799, and its population in 1861 was, by the census returns for that year, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-one, (943 males and 828 females) shewing an increase over the population return for 1851, of three hundred and ninety-three. Children attending school in 1861, three hundred and ninety-seven; births in 1860, fifty-seven, deaths in same year, twelve. The soil of the township is generally very fertile, and well adapted for cultivation, and it contains a number of first-class farms; it is supplied with ample water throughout for the purposes of mills and factories, several of which of different kinds are in full operation in the township, where other excellent mill sites can be had. It is likewise heavily timbered, with hardwood principally. The "Ingersoll, North Oxford, East Nissouri, and West Zorra Gravel Road," and the "North Oxford and West Zorra Gravel Road" pass through this township, and the Great Western Railway runs through it.

The Agricultural Association with which the township is connected, is the the "Ingersoll and West and North Oxford Agricultural Society," of which the following gentlemen form the present

TOWNSHIP OF WEST OXFORD

Is bounded on the north-west by the township of North Oxford; on the south by the township of Dereham; and on the east by the township of East Oxford. As already mentioned in reference to North and East Oxford, this township, conjointly with them, formed for municipal purposes the original township of "Oxford Upon The Thames," until it became a separate municipality, with a municipal government of its own, which was in 1842. It is divided from North Oxford by the Thames, by branches of which it is watered, as well as by numerous streams within its area. There has been for a considerable time a number of saw mills in the township, and more recently several grist and other mills have been erected and in operation, while at present there are two or three more in course of erection. The soil is very good, and well adapted for agricultural and horticultural cultivation, as shewn by the highly cultivated farms which the township contains. It is also well timbered with oak, ash, elm, beech, maple, &c. Its population in 1861, according to the census returns for that year, numbered two thousand seven hundred and thirty-seven: (1422 males, and 1315 females), being an increase over the population in 1851 of eight hundred and forty-three. Children attending school in 1861, five hundred and twenty-nine; births in 1860, one hundred and thirteen; deaths in same year, fourteen. The township is traversed by the "London and Hamilton Road," and the "Ingersoll and Brantford Plank Road," and the Great Western Railway has two stations (Ingersoll and Beachville) on its north-western boundaries. The Post Offices within the township are those of Ingersoll, Beachville, and Sweaborg. The agricultural association with which this township is also connected, is the "Ingersoll and West and North Oxford Society," referred to under the head of the "Township of North Oxford."

TOWNSHIP OF EAST ZORRA.

The present Townships of East and West Zorra, were originally united for Municipal purposes, under the name of the "Township of Zorra." East Zorra became a separate and distinct Municipality in the year 1845; it is bounded on the North by the township of Wilmot, (County of Waterloo,) on the South by portions of the Townships of Blandford and North Oxford; on the East by Blandford, and on the West by the Township of West Zorra. It is watered by tributaries of the River Thames which forms part of its eastern boundary, and is well supplied with water power for mill purposes. There are, grist, flouring, oatmeal, saw, carding and fulling mills in the Township. It is excellent land throughout, and contains a number of superior farms. Its settlement commenced about the year 1820, and it has now a population, according to the census returns for 1861, of four thousand five hundred and ten, (2345 Males, and 2165 Females,) being an increase over the population in 1851, (which was 3200) of one thousand three hundred and ten. Children attending school in 1861, nine hundred and one, births recorded in 1860, one hundred and sixty-eight, deaths in same year, forty-six. There are three post offices in the Township, viz: Braemar, Innerkip, and South Zorra. It is traversed by the Woodstock and Huron Gravel Road. The Township has a farmers Association named the "East Zorra Agricultural Society," of which the following gentlemen compose its Board of Directors and Officers:

TOWNSHIP OF WEST ZORRA.

This township became a separate and distinct municipality in 1845, on the division of the original township of Zorra, for municipal purposes. It is bounded on the north by portions of the townships of Downie and Easthope, (County of Perth); on the south by the township of North Oxford; on the east by that of East Zorra; and on the west by the township of East Nissouri. It may be termed a Scotch settlement, for the pre-boninating nationality of its settlers is that of Scotland, and principally Highland. Its population, by the census of 1861, numbered three thousand six hundred and ninety-one, (being 1952 males and 1739 females), and an increase over that of 1851, of three hundred and eighty-nine. Children attending school in 1861, eight hundred and two; births recorded in 1860, one hundred and thirteen; deaths in same year, nineteen. This township is also watered by tributaries of the Thames, and streams and brooks supply ample water power for mill purposes. There are saw, flour, and barley, oat, and carding and fulling mills in the township. Its general aspect is rolling, and the soil rich and fertile, producing excellent crops of grain and fruit, for both of which the township is well adapted, and it contains many highly cultivated farms. It is traversed by the "Ingersoll, North Oxford, East Nissouri, and West Zorra Gravel Road," and the "North Oxford and West Zorra Gravel Road."

This township has also a farmers association, styled "The West Zorra Agricultural Society," under whose auspices an annual exhibition is held of, and prizes given for, horses, cattle, sheep, swine, dairy produce, grain, vegetables, domestic manufactures, farming implements, and other mechanical works, fruit and field roots.

BEACHVILLE.

This Village is prettily situated on the banks of the River Thames, about five miles west of Woodstock, and on the line of the Great Western Railway, of which it is a station. It is in the midst of a rich Agricultural district, being surrounded by splendid cultivated farms. There is ample water power in its vicinity, for mills and factory purposes. The London and Hamilton Macadamized Road passes through the Village. It has a daily mail, and contains two Churches—Episcopal and Presbyterian, other denominations use the School House. It also contains a flouring and grist mill, two saw mills, foundry and machine shop, two blacksmith shops, a wagon and carriage factory, fanning mill factory, vinegar factory and tannery, four hotels, five general stores, tin shop, and cabinet shop beside other representations of the various mechanical trades. During the last summer this village suffered a serious loss in the destruction by fire, of a large and extensive barrel factory, where a number of operatives were kept employed. The proprietors design its re-erection. Population 400.

Mail tri-weekly, received Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays, at 3 p. m., and despatched at 12 noon, to Lakeside. The village is distant from Woodstock, 20 miles; from St. Mary's, 6 miles; from Stratford, 16 miles, and from London, 32 miles. Population about one hundred.

WEST ZORRA.

INGERSOLL.

This very flourishing village, formed of parts of the townships of West and North Oxford, is situated on a rising eminence on the banks of the eastern branch of the river Thames, in the midst of some of the finest rural scenery in the County, and surrounded by rich farming lands. It is distant 10 miles west from Woodstock, from Hamilton 60 miles, from London 20 miles, from Windsor 129 miles, and from Port Burwell, on Lake Erie, 32 miles. The village was incorporated by Act of Parliament 12th Victoria, cap. 81, and Proclamation of 12th September, 1851, (date of Incorporation, 1st January, 1852), with the following corporate limits:—

“Commencing on the southerly bank of the river Thames, in the boundary line between lots numbers 17 and 18, in the broken front concession of the township of West Oxford; thence along the said boundary line between lots 17 and 18, in the broken front concession, and the boundary line between lots 17 and 18 in the first concession south-easterly to the middle of the depth of the said first concession; thence along the middle of the depth of the said first concession, south-westerly, to the boundary line between lots numbers 22 and 23; thence along the said boundary line between lots numbers 22 and 23, north-westerly to the south-easterly bank of the river Thames; thence along the south-easterly bank of the said river, with the stream, to a point in prolongation of the boundary line between lots numbers 8 and 9, in the said concession, and the prolongation thereof northerly, to the northerly limit of the allowance for road between the 3rd and 4th concessions of the township of North Oxford; thence along the northerly limit of the allowance for road between the 3rd and 4th concessions, easterly to the easterly limits of the allowance for road between lots numbers 12 and 13 southerly, to the north-westerly bank of the said river Thames, up the stream, to a point in prolongation of the aforesaid boundary line between lots numbers 17 and 18, in the broken front of the township of West Oxford; thence across the said river to the place of beginning.”

During the last decade the progressive advancement of the village has been remarkable, equally as regards population, commercial importance, and the extension of its occupied area. By the census returns for 1861, it is shown that it has *outnumbered double* its population in 1851 by about two hundred,—having increased from eleven hundred and ninety in the latter year to two thousand seven hundred and fifty-six, in the return for 1861. Its general aspect has greatly improved in the same period by the erection of a very superior class of public and private buildings, and other improvements which have been steadily going on within the municipal boundaries; consequently its growth and prosperity in the various branches of industry and commerce has been considerably enhanced. Ingersoll has now a handsome and commodious Town Hall and Market House, (surmounted by a neat belfry and spire), substantially built of brick. There are also several fine large blocks of two and three story brick edifices for business purposes, on the principal streets, which would be a credit to places of greater pretensions, with large first-class Hotels.

The law and medical professions are well represented in the village. There is a weekly newspaper, (the oldest in the County), published in it,—principles, Reform—and issued on Tuesdays, of which Mr J. S. Gurnett is the editor,

proprietor, and publisher. The London and Hamilton road passes through the village, and it is reached in all directions by other good plank and gravel roads. It has an excellent market for the sale of produce, &c. &c., which is largely attended. From its eligible situation, its easy accessibility both by rail and road, and the facilities thereby afforded for the transportation of goods, &c., Ingersoll bids fair to become the most important mart of business and commerce in the County.

The staple business and industrial trade of the village and neighborhood is in wheat and sawn lumber. It is well supplied with manufacturing facilities,—having unlimited water power in its immediate vicinity, which at present gives power to two grist and two flouring mills, (one of each belonging to I. H. Carroll and J. R. Benson, by whom an extensive business is done in the manufacture of flour for the Montreal and export markets, and an oatmeal mill named the "North Star Mill," carried on by Mr. J. Stewart. Besides these there is a large flouring mill impelled by steam, belonging to the Oxford Steam Flour Company." It also contains a steam saw mill, fanning mill manufactory, sash, door, and blind factory, with two planing and one flooring machine, belonging to Adam Oliver, Esq., who carries on a large general business as builder, lumber merchant, mill and factory owner, employing 24 men, and having a 30-horse power engine in operation. Ingersoll has also another sash, door and blind factory, with two planing and one flooring machine, of which Messrs. John Christopher and Brothers are proprietors, who have also a very extensive business as builders and lumber dealers, with 14 men in their employment, working a 16-horse power engine. It likewise contains 2 large foundries, one carried on by W. Eastwood, in which he manufactures threshing, reaping and mowing machines, agricultural implements, &c., having 30 hands in his employment, and a 12-horse power engine in active operation. Mr. Eastwood's establishment turns out work to the annual value of twenty-five thousand dollars; the other foundry is that of J. & S. Noxon, who do a large business as founders and machinists, and manufacture all kinds of machinery in iron and wood work—grain separators, reapers and mowers, to the extent in value of twelve thousand dollars yearly. There are also several carriage and wagon factories, furniture, pail and tub steam factories, an extensive tannery, (carried on by Mr. Thomas Brown), blacksmith, carpenter, cabinet maker, and painters' shops, and a brewery. Besides these it has numerous excellent stores, comprising dry goods, grocery, hardware, crockery, drug, stationery, and boot and shoe stores. There are two banks, viz: agencies of the Commercial Bank of Canada, and the Niagara District Bank, with several insurance agencies. The village also contains eight churches, viz: one Church of England, two Presbyterian, one Roman Catholic, two Methodist, and two Baptist. Two mails daily from the West, and three from the East. Present population about three thousand, and increasing rapidly. Its municipal government is administered by a Village Council, presided over by a Reeve. The fifth Division Courts are held in the Town Hall.

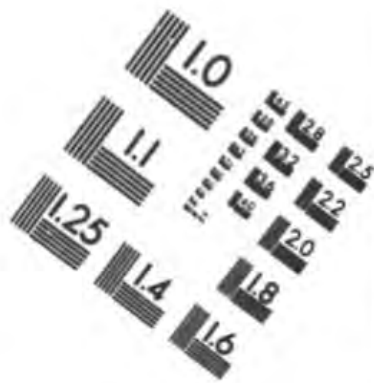
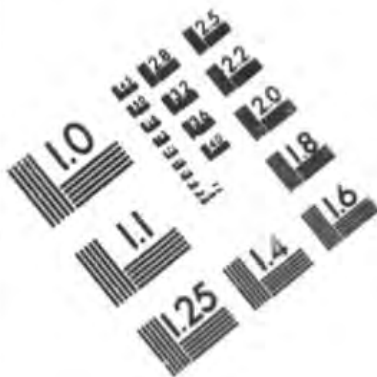

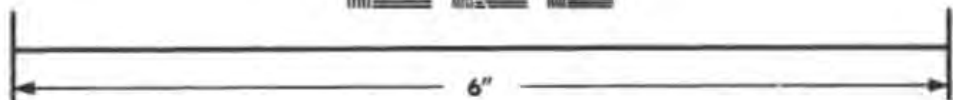

The German Lutheran Church, a frame structure, was erected in 1860, at a cost of five hundred dollars, and is seated for two hundred and fifty persons. There is a very good common school (sec. number 24) numbering 126 pupils, with an average attendance of 75 pupils, under the charge of Mr. Levi Master. Plattsville contains a very extensive woollen factory, owned by Warnock, Farrand & Co. They employ 40 operatives, have an engine of 40-horse power, three spinners, three sets of carding machines, twelve looms, six falling mills, two raising gigs, one shearing machine, one napper, and have a capacity of finishing and turning out twelve hundred yards per week. It contains a very extensive cabinet, chair, and pail factory, the machinery being driven by a twenty-horse power engine, and employing about 15 hands. The factory is owned by N. Fried & Co. It has also a large foundry, owned by A. McArthur & Co., who employ a number of men, and manufacture mowing and reaping machines, and all kinds of agricultural implements. Beside these, it contains two flouring and grist mills—one of four, and the other two run of stones—a large tannery, saw and planing mills, wagon and carriage factories, blacksmith shops, boot and shoe shops, and numerous other workshops, two hotels, daily mail, two temperance lodges, and eight stores of various kinds.—Population 500.

WOODSTOCK.

Is the County Town and Judicial seat of the County of Oxford. It was incorporated as a town by Act of Parliament 19 and 20 Victoria, cap. 98 (date of incorporation, 1st January, 1857,) with the following corporate limits, viz:

"Commencing on the northerly limit of Dundas street, at a point where a post has been planted at the south-west angle of lot number 18, in the 1st concession of the township of Blandford; thence in a northerly direction along the western boundary of the said lot, to the allowance for road between the first and second concessions of the said township of Blandford; thence continuing the same course to the northerly limit of the said road allowance; thence westerly along the said northerly limit to the river Thames; thence in continuation of the last mentioned course, across the said river to the water's edge, on the westerly bank thereof, to a point opposite the southerly bank of Cedar creek; thence along the water's edge of Cedar creek, on the southern side thereof, to the eastern limit of the allowance for road between lot number 21 in the first concession of the township of East Oxford, and the Gore between East and West Oxford; thence southerly along the said eastern limit to the southern limit of the allowance for road between the first and second concessions of the said township of East Oxford; thence easterly along the said southern limit to a point opposite to the centre of lot number 18 in the first concession of the said township; thence on a line equi-distant from the eastern and western side lines of the said lot number 18, on a course about north 15° 40m. west, to Dundas street; thence continuing the same course to the northern limit of Dundas street; and thence westerly along the northern limit of Dundas street to the place of beginning."

This town is one of the municipalities of the North Riding of Oxford, of which it also forms electorally a part. It is situated on an elevated land contiguous to and parallel with the Great Western Railway, and on the borders of the river Thames and Cedar creek, distant from Hamilton 48 miles, from Niagara Suspension Bridge 91 miles, from Paris 19 miles, and from London, C. W., 29 miles. It has a fine healthy location, and is the centre of a rich agricultural country, unsurpassed for beauty of landscape and fertility of soil, being surrounded by well stocked farms, tilled in a superior style, with farm buildings of the most improved description, while the villa-like residences of the respective owners betoken wealth and refined taste. It has increased in population during the last ten years by one thousand two hundred and fifteen, its number according to the census returns of 1861 being three thousand three hundred and twenty-seven, (one thousand six hundred and forty-three males, and one thousand six hundred and eighty-four females), and that of 1851, two thousand one hundred and twenty-one.

Manufactures of various kinds and general commerce,—but more particularly the buying, selling, and forwarding of wheat,—form the principal business of the place. Its general business comprises numerous stores—wholesale and retail—workshops of the various branches of mechanical industry. Especial mention may be made of the "Woodstock Iron Works," established in 1842, and owned and carried on by H. P. Brown, where stoves, threshing machines, plows, cultivators, mill gearing, tin and sheet iron ware, are manufactured, and material turned out of the annual value of \$30,000. In this establishment there is a 10-horse power engine in operation, and 18 men

The "Vulcan Iron Foundry" of which Copp and Brother are proprietors, (who have also a large wholesale and retail stove and tin establishment in Hamilton), is another very extensive establishment, with a 13-horse power engine, employing 24 men, and melting about 300 tons of iron per annum. This firm manufactures stoves, agricultural implements, tin and sheet-iron ware.— There is also a magnificent brick-built steam grist and flouring mill, five stories in height, erected at a cost of \$40,000, and carried on by Eaton & Wood. It was set in operation in 1856, and is celebrated in the New York market for its superior brand of flour; it is capable of manufacturing 250 barrels of flour per day. Henry Frizello owns and carries on a steam grist and flouring mill, situated on Dundas street, East Woodstock, where he manufactures 100 barrels a day. Another mill, by Clarke & Co., turns out 50 barrels a day. There is likewise an extensive barrel and stave factory, owned by Thomas J. Clark. In the manufacture of leather, Brown & Wilson have a very extensive tannery, situated near Cedar creek on Mill street; this firm have been doing business over twenty years. Lately they suffered a very heavy loss by the destruction of their premises by fire. New buildings are, however, now erected. Another tannery is carried on by Wm. Wilson, on Burtch street, East Woodstock, who is doing a large business. There is also a Patent Medicine factory, of which Robert Stark, chemist and druggist, is proprietor, where \$50,000 worth of medicine is annually manufactured. Also a large wholesale and retail book and paper warehouse, and extensive blank book manufactory and general book-binding on Dundas street, West End, and another bindery establishment on Graham street. In the immediate neighborhood of the town, and on the London and Hamilton road, there is the best oil refinery in the Province, owned and carried on by the following gentlemen as a firm: Jordan Charles, James Kintrea, and William Spencer, turning out 400 barrels of refined oil per week. There is also an extensive brewery carried on by S. Collins. The principal buildings of the town are of brick. It possesses an excellent Town Hall with Market House underneath, and surmounted by a belfry and weather gauge.

The Courts of Law are held in a large and commodious building situated on Hunter street, and the offices of the County Clerk, County Court, and Deputy Clerk of the Crown, and Division Court Clerk are in the same building. Close to the Court House, and located on the corner of Light and Hunter streets, is the Registry office for the County and County Treasurer's office, built at an expense of \$3,200. In rear of the Court House is the new jail erected in 1854-5, at a cost of \$26,000; during the last year an additional expenditure of \$6,000 was made toward its improvement and more comfortable accommodation. The town also contains seven churches, viz: one Church of England, one Presbyterian, in connection with the established church of Scotland, three Presbyterian, formed of the union of the Free Church of Scotland and original United Presbyterian, one Wesleyan Methodist, one Regular Baptist, and a Roman Catholic Church, whose services are conducted in the Town Hall, pending the erection of their new church.

The Canadian Literary Institute is located at the east end of the town, and has a very pleasant site on a rising ground, commanding splendid scenic views.

It is a noble structure, (reflecting great credit on its architect, David White,) of three wings or compartments, surmounted by a handsome dome, having five large entrance doors, spacious halls and school rooms, with comfortable and well ventilated dormitories for the resident pupils, together with ample play grounds and all the "means and appliances to boot," for their healthy recreation and amusement. With the great advantages which it possesses, coupled with the efficiency of its staff of Professors and Teachers, this educational establishment is rendered one of the best scholastic institutions in the western part of the Province. The present structure has been but recently built, and on the site of the original one, which was erected at a cost of about \$30,000, but which was destroyed by a disastrous fire in January, 1861. The Institute is under the control of the Regular Baptist denomination. It has three different departments, viz; Primary, Higher, and Theological, the average attendance on which, consists of fully 100 students. The Primary school is attended by pupils over eleven years of age, who study the various branches of an ordinary English education. In the Higher Department the students are prepared for the study of Theology, or for matriculation in Arts, Law, or Medicine.—The fees for attendance in these departments vary from \$20 to \$28 per year. In the Theological Department, attended by about 30 students, the tuition is *gratis*.

Woodstock is a chief Station of the Great Western Railway. Stages run from the Town, north, south, east and west.

Hard solder.—Copper 2 parts, zinc 1 part—used with powdered borax.

Pewterer's solder.—Tin 2 parts, antimony 1 part.

Plumber's " .—1 part each, lead and tin.

Tinman's " .—Tin 1 part, lead 2 parts; or, pewter 4 parts, tin 1, and bismuth 1. Resin is used with the last three.

Solder for Iron.—Tough brass—used with borax.

ALLOYS AND COMPOSITIONS.

Yellow brass.—Copper 3 parts, zinc 1 part.

Spelter.—Copper 2 parts, zinc 1 part.

For Lathe bushes.—Copper 16 parts, tin 4 parts, zinc 1 part.

" " " harder.—Copper 16 parts, tin 4 parts, zinc 2 parts.

Improved Babbit metal.—This composition, for the lining of boxes, shaft

bearings, etc., which, from the satisfaction it has thus far given, bids fair to come into general use, is composed of tin 12 parts, antimony 3 parts, and copper 2 parts. The original recipe for this alloy was, tin 6 parts, antimony regulus 2 parts, and copper 1 part, as its primo equivalents, to which, when about to be remelted for use, two parts of copper to one of the composition were added.

For Pulley Blocks.—Copper 7 parts, tin 1 part.

For Wheels, Boxes and Cocks.—Copper 8 parts, tin 1 part.

Bronze.—Governament gun-metal.—2 parts copper, 1 part tin. The specific gravity of this composition is greater than the mean of its constituents.

For Valves.—10 parts copper, 1 part tin.

Bell Metal.—36 parts copper, 11 parts tin.

Gong Metal.—40 parts copper, 5 tin, 2.8 zinc, 2.15 lead.

Both Metal.—32 parts brass, 9 parts zinc.

Blanched Copper.—16 parts copper, 1 part arsenic.

Brittania Metal.—1 part each—brass, tin, bismuth, antimony.

Petong, or Chinese white Copper.—20.2 parts copper, 15.8 nickel, 12.7 zinc, and 1.3 iron.

German silver.—2 parts copper, 1 nickel, 1 zinc. When this composition is intended to be rolled into plates, it is composed of 60 parts copper, 25 parts nickel, 20 of zinc and 3 of lead.

Manheim Gold.—3 parts copper, 1 of zinc, and a small quantity of tin.

Mock Gold.—16 parts copper, 7 parts platinum, 1 part zinc.

Mock Platinum.—8 parts brass, 5 parts zinc.

Speculum Metal.—7 parts copper, 3 zinc, 4 tin; or, 6 parts copper, 2 of tin, and 1 of arsenic.

Tombac or Gilding Metal.—9 parts copper, and 1 part zinc.

Mock Iron—expanding alloy.—Lead 9 parts, antimony 2 parts, bismuth 1 part. This composition expands in cooling, and is used in filling small defects in iron castings.

Ring, or Jeweler's Gold.—150 parts pure gold, 30 parts copper, 22 parts pure silver.

Queen's Metal.—Tin 9 parts, antimony 1, lead 1, bismuth 1.

Pewter, common.—Tin 4 parts, lead 1.

Pewter, best.—Tin 100 parts, antimony 17.

Steel, alloyed with 1-500th part of platinum, or to the same extent with silver, is rendered harder, more malleable, and better adapted for every kind of cutting instrument.

In making an alloy the rule should be observed to melt that metal which fuses the least readily first, and to add the others in order successfully, until all are added, when the whole should be thoroughly incorporated and poured without delay, taking care that the mass be not too hot.
