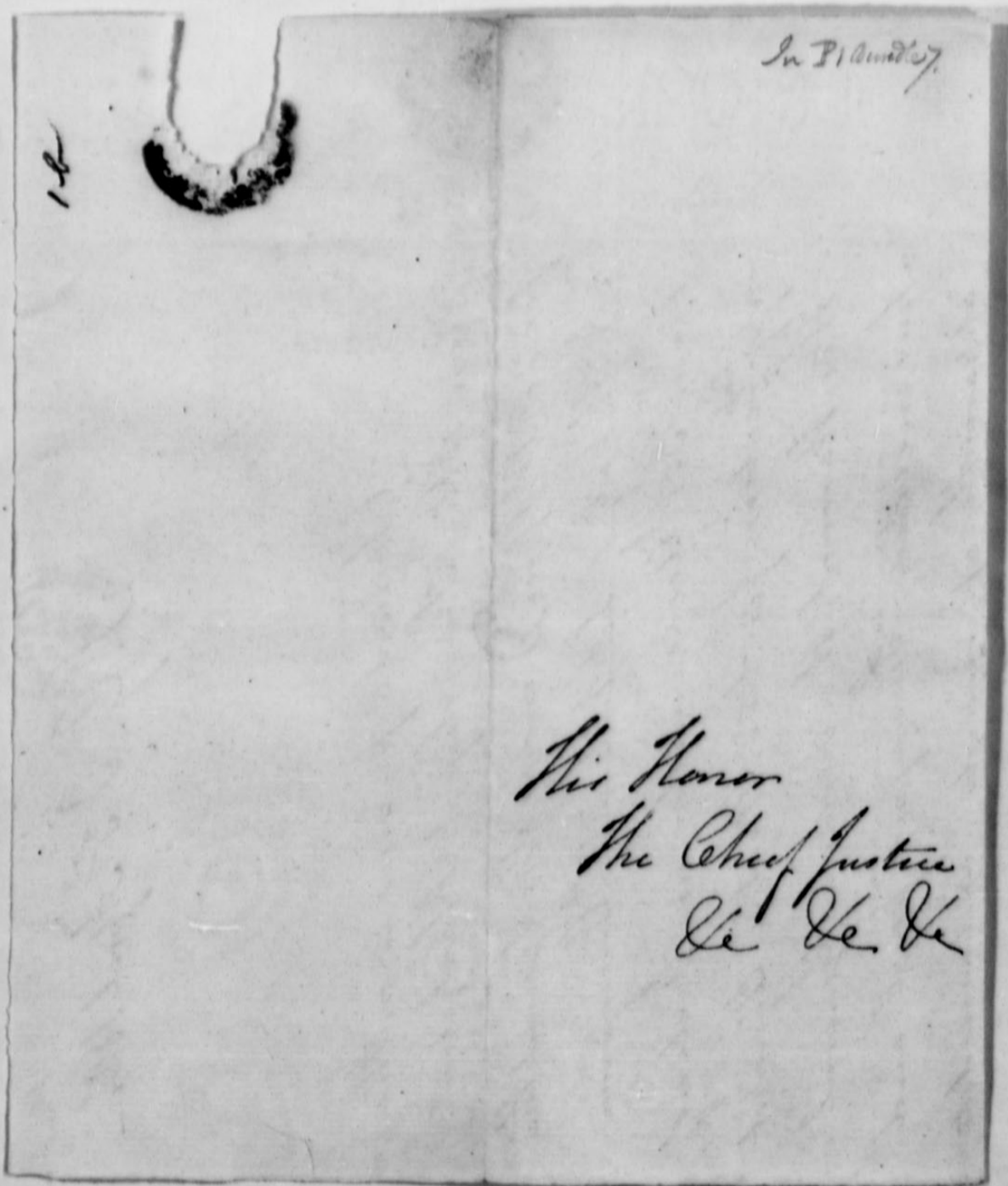

if Chaswell Parsons had made any and what
application to have his claim decided upon

of appropriation —

I am respectfully to state to your
Excellency, that on the 25th of July 1797
Chaswell Parsons lodged a warrant of Survey
(p: 1759) under an order in Council of the 8th

of July 1797, for an appropriation of 300
acres, for 2 months -; These Lands were
accordingly appropriated for him in the Township
of Blankhem, being Lot n: 17 in the 1st Concession
& the rear half of 106 - in the 13th Concession -
The Entry on the Plan appears to have been made
on the 20 June 1799 - when he engaged
to make a bona fide Settlement on the
before mentioned Lot on the first Concession

In May 1802, he appears again to have
again applied at this office respecting the
before mentioned Lands, - but there does not
seem to be any order lodged making them
an absolute grant - all which is humbly
