Corps Centenary

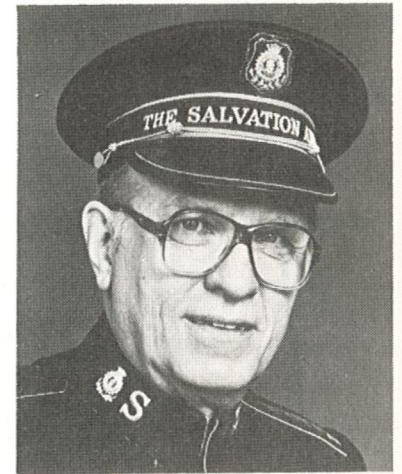

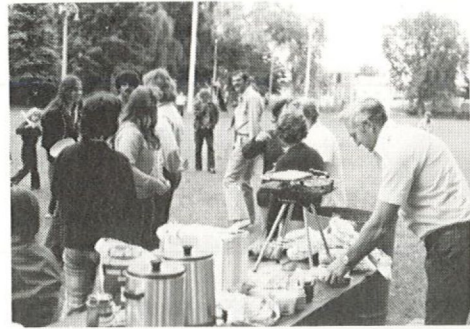

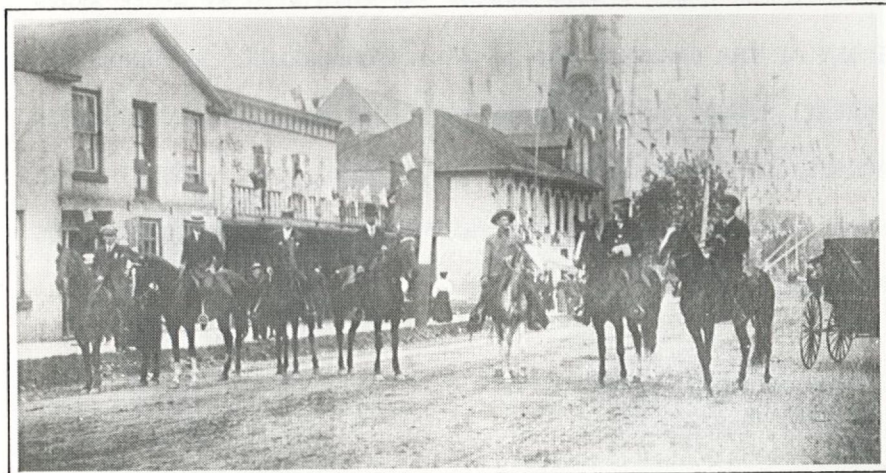

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE INGERSOLL SALVATION ARMY

INGERSOLL FOR JESUS

Air-- "The Army Going Up, Up, Up.

The Army here in Ingersoll, has gone down,
down, down,
Down where the vilest of the vile could
be found;

We wage a war on rum,
The devil hates our drum,
But we shall hear the Saviour say "well done".

Chorus:

Our Barracks here in Ingersoll are up, up, up,
The brickwork and the woodwork, they are all
now done;

And now the seats are in,
Let Mr. Devil grin.
But we shall hear the Saviour say "well done".

The Salvation Army has gone in, in, in,
Until we find five hundred have made an
end of sin,

And now these former slaves,
Have become the Saviours's braves,
And we shall hear the Saviour say "well done".

The Salvation Army means to shout, shout,
shout,
Shout until this town is turned right about:

Now the drunkards here can sing,
"We are the children of the King."
Hark, the echo of the Saviour's glad "well done".

When this song was published in the War Cry of December 27, 1883, the Salvation Army's seventh Corps was well entrenched in the Town of Ingersoll, and a report in the Ingersoll Chronicle of November 1, 1883, announced that work on the Salvation Army Barracks had commenced on Monday, October 21, 1883.

The Army held its first meeting in the Town Hall, on Market Square, commencing at 11:00 a.m. on Sunday, July 1, 1883, preceded by an open air meeting on the square at 10:30, with Captain Annie O'Leary in charge. This first meeting attracted a crowd of 200 persons, and the afternoon meeting saw the congregation increased to 300 people. This taxed the capacity of the Town Hall and plans were made to hold the next meeting in the skating rink, as the Town Hall had been booked for a band concert. However, due to flooding in the rink, it could not be used and the congregation of the Episcopal Methodist Church came to the rescue and provided the use of their building on the north side of Charles Street East for the evening meeting and for subsequent meetings, although some meetings were later held in the rink. No figures for the number in attendance at the Sunday night service were given, but it is estimated that the building was filled to capacity. Open air meetings on a daily basis were a feature of the Salvation Army in Ingersoll in those early days, and although considerable opposition was met with from numerous sources, the work prospered and immediate plans were made to construct a "barracks" on Thames Street South.

The following letter, which was published in the Ingersoll Chronicle after the initial meetings, gives some evidence of the hostility encountered by the army in its early days in Ingersoll.

"to the Editor of the News Chronicle:

Dear Sir:

There is not to be found in Canada, a more patient or fore-bearing citizen than the merchants of this town. Why they should have to submit and put up with the infernal drum beating and parades of a number of half grown men and boys every night of the week is a puzzle the merchants would like to have solved, and it is something beyond comprehension of ordinary mortals.

Last Saturday evenings' parade was particularly noticeable and offensive and was partly the cause, we believe, of the Army being refused the use of the Town Hall. On that evening, Thames Street was lined with people bent on shopping and so forth. Quite a number of teams and conveyances were tied up in front of the various stores. Near eight o'clock, the usual procession left the market and marched up and down Thames Street; the drummers putting forth their best digs, and the boys yelling a war song in such a manner as to impress one that bedlam had been let loose. The processionists, not being content with forcing ladies into close quarters of shop windows, and some into muddy gutters, while they directed their heaviest volley to restive horses, thereby causing them to prance and make great efforts to freedom, and the more the horses struggled, the harder the drummers would pound at the drums, thereby adding to the imminent danger of runaways in the crowded thoroughfare. The frightened teams, however, were kept under by strong men, who were pretty loud in their denunciation of the conduct of the noisy hoodlums. As it was, one of our prominent cheese buyers came close to having a serious runaway. A team in front of D. Whites store managed to snap the tongue of the democrat wagon to which it was attached, in their efforts to bolt, and other narrow escapes could be recorded. Lives imperiled and property endangered right under the noses of our authorities, and not a move made to suppress it. The drummers of Saturday night possess the same kind of soul as the man who would pile up an obstruction on the railway track for the purpose of demolishing a passenger train, and yet this is done for the cause of religion. No wonder the sensible, respectable portion of the community have become disgusted and their kindness and hospitality has been sadly abused. Our ministers and Church members have been insulted nightly by the Officer in Charge, whose ignorant, brutal and coarse language is such as to invite the

breaking of the peace. Not only content with villifying everybody who crosses their path, they must publicly villify the memory of the poor unfortunate man who was buried last Sunday. It is high time the mask was stripped from this charitable champion of the Great Masters' cause and the true state of affairs set forth to the world.

We are confident the quiet demeanour and even humanity which marks our merchants, under trying circumstances referred to, public opinion will soon bring about a means to wipe out the obnoxious custom in question.

Despite the misunderstandings and resistance met with in the early days, the Army in Ingersoll continued to grow and flourish, and while their unorthodox methods were a source of opposition from all walks of life, they never faltered in their devotion to the cause for which they were willing to give their very lives if necessary.

It is recorded in the War Cry of September 13, 1882, that Captain O'Leary and Lieut. E. Churchill reported a glorious week in Ingersoll, with many precious souls being brought to Jesus. They reported "We are licking the devil on every side". On the Sunday night, 21 precious souls came out for holiness and gave up all for Jesus. Captain Joe Ludgate, from Hamilton, took charge of the meetings and people flocked in the hundreds to see him with his red jacket. The close of the day saw 18 persons gloriously saved. Making a total for the week of thirty five.

As the work in Ingersoll continued to prosper and grow, an out-reach ministry was launched to the nearby communities and it was reported in the War Cry of January 17, 1884, that Captain O'Leary, Lieutenants Matty Colhoun and Mercy Little, the "Death or Glory Girls", opened fire in Tillsonbury the week before Christmas 1883.

At Beachville, their first outpost, Sgt. Ettie Elliott reported 18 souls brought out of darkness, into light.

Although Captain Annie O'Leary was the Corps Officer of Ingersoll for a space of only seven months, she probably established a record of service that will never be surpassed. She established the work in Ingersoll, and notwithstanding the opposition of the general public and criticism of the methods employed by the Army in those early days, she gave outstanding leadership, and portrayed keen insight into the future of the Army in Ingersoll.

The purchase of a lot of land on Thames Street South, at a cost of \$200.00, plus the building of a handsome structure on the property, that has lasted 100 years; all in such a short space of time must stand as nothing less than miraculous.

At her farewell banquet on Thursday, January 31, 1884, the following financial statement, from the time of her arrival in Ingersoll to that date, was given:

Leaving a balance of \$414.34 towards paying for barracks.

The banquet referred to in the financial statement, which must stand as the greatest in the history of the Ingersoll Corps, was held in the rink. It is reported that 1000 persons were served, and after all present had partaken of the great feast, there was enough food left over to feed another 200 persons. In the meeting which followed the banquet, an estimated 2500 persons were present. This great weekend in Ingersoll commenced on Sunday morning when Officers from Toronto, London, Hamilton, Chatham, St. Thomas and Ingersoll, with their respective companies, formed into a battalion at the Town Hall and marched to the rink, where Major Moore of Brooklyn conducted all the meetings of the day.

On Monday afternoon, the Ingersoll members marched in a body to the railway station to meet the following officers: Capt. Wass of Toronto, Capt. Mrs. Hill, Capt. Joe Ludgate, Lt. Mrs. Willis, Capt. Jack Addie of St. Thomas, Lt. Mrs. Thomas, Lt. McCrachan "Circus Sam" and about 300 others. They formed a procession, headed by Major Moore and the Chatham Salvation Army band, and marched through the streets of Ingersoll to the banquet. Following the banquet, the members proceeded to the Town Hall, where an "all night of prayer" was held, with only soldiers and a few friends being admitted. It was announced that work on the new barracks would begin at once, and that a brick structure would be erected before the winter months, under the supervision of Captain O'Leary.

It was noted that at the banquet, Beachville residents showed their appreciation, by bringing a beautiful frosted cake, four feet in height, which was the wonder and admiration of all.

"The exact date of the opening of the new hall is not recorded in any documents available, but it was opened in 1883 and probably late in the year, and just prior to the farewell of Captain O'Leary. It had a handsome front with twin towers on either end, and was built by William Sutherland, with living quarters in the upper front. A newspaper account of the opening does not bear a date, but reports that the doors were thrown open to the public on a Sunday morning. The seating capacity was reported to be between 600 and 700, well-lighted by gas, well-heated, and adapted in every way for the holding of meetings."

The morning meeting was led by Capt. Wass and Capt. "Happy Bill" Cooper from London. The hall was filled to the doors. During the afternoon and evening meetings, the hall was literally packed. On Monday evening, Captain Addie and his wife were the centre of all eyes, as they were the first officers in the ranks, in Canada, to be married as officers. Other officers who took part in the opening meetings were: Captain Madden of Barrie, Captain Thomas of Chatham, Lt. Leidy of Toronto and Captain Joe Ludgate of Hamilton." There can be no doubt that the Ingersoll Corps was off to a great start and they have never looked back from the days when Captain Annie O'Leary and Lts. Mattie Colhoun and Mercy Little laid the foundations of the Ingersoll Salvation Army.

When the citadel was renovated, the quarters were moved to 254 Wellington Street and later to 207 Wonham Street South.² The present spacious quarters are located at 53 Princess Park Road and should prove adequate for many years.

It is regretted that the corps history books for the period up to 1930 are not in existence and if they could be located, it is certain they would record countless incidents that would challenge present day Salvationists to equal.

HIGHLIGHTS OF CORPS ACTIVITIES

APRIL 1932 Commissioner and Mrs. Hoe visited Ingersoll and gave an illustrated lecture on "India and Indian dialogues"

JULY 4, 1932 49th Anniversary celebrations were observed. Brig. and Mrs. MacDonald conducted a week of special meetings. Mrs. MacDonald was the first one to leave for training college from the Ingersoll Corps.

FEB 10, 1933 A special ten day campaign known as the "Golden Cord Campaign" was underway, under the leadership of Mrs. Brig. Green (R)

JUNE 26/27
1933 50th Anniversary celebrations were conducted by Col. Gaskins; the celebrations began with a supper on the lawn and many prominent citizens were present including Alderman Sheldon, the acting Mayor, and Brigadier & Mrs. Gilbert Best.

NOV 12, 1933 Colonel Dalziel, Chief Secretary conducted the evening service with many prominent citizens in attendance.

AUG 7/8
1937 West Toronto Band visited Ingersoll and a civic committee helped with the program. A very successful time.

SEPT 18, 1937 Commissioner and Mrs. Carpenter visited the Corps., supported by Commissioner Hoe and Colonel Peacock, Brigadier and Mrs. Bunton, and Brigadier Spooner. A civic welcome was extended in the Citadel by Mayor A. Buchanan. The Woodstock Band and songsters gave their support in music and song.

FEB 1938 The "YOU NEED CHRIST" Campaign was launched and a very successful ten days ensued.

SEPT 24, 1939 Adjutant Cooper conducted farewill services for Candidate Alex Turnbull. Among those taking part were Corps Secretary Robt. Garland, Bandmaster Joseph Underwood and Treasurer Alex Edmonds.

OCT 21, 1939 Major and Mrs. Charles Godden conducted the Sunday services.

OCT 25, 1939 The Corps Officers Adjt. and Mrs. Cooper attended the Congress gatherings in Toronto, which were under the leadership of Commissioner Benjamin Orames.

NOV 19, 1939 The Divisional Commander Brig. Bunton, conducted the week-end services.

DEC 2/3
1939 Lieut. Colonel E. Sims of Toronto conducted the meetings. A feature of the Sunday meetings was an afternoon meeting in the Citadel of the Handford Bible Class of Trinity United Church and two Bible Classes from the Baptist Church.

FEB 4, 1940 Colonel and Mrs. Ham conducted the services, supported by Brigadier and Mrs. Bunton.

JUNE 1/2
1940 The Stratford Citadel Band visited Ingersoll.

JAN 12, 1941 Divisional Commander and Mrs. F. Riches visited the Corps. They were stationed in Ingersoll in 1912.

JUNE 28/29
1941 The Brantford Citadel Band led by Bandmaster James Bailey visited Ingersoll. Accompanying the band were Brig. Little and Major G. Mundy.

SEPT 11, 1941 The "Won by One" Campaign was launched by Major and Mrs. Squarebriggs of Toronto, assisted by the Woodstock Band.

MARCH 19, 1941 Brigadier Bertie Morris of Windsor Men's Social, a returned missionary from China, spoke to the Home League about her experiences in China.

APRIL 3/4/5/6
1942 Six Cadets from the Steadfast session conducted the Easter week-end service. They were Cadets Rosser from Hamilton, Gratto from Truro, N.S. Metzger of Melford, Sask. Thomas of Regina, and Marquartsen of Winnipeg.

JULY 14, 1945 Major Jordan suffered a heart attack that led to his early retirement as an officer on October 16th.

FEB 15, 1946 "CHRIST IS THE ANSWER" Campaign was launched with a corps supper, to which 75 were in attendance.

JUNE 23, 1946 63rd Anniversary meetings were held, featuring the Brantford Band.

DEC 8, 1946 Brigadier and Mrs. T. Mundy conducted rededication services for the newly renovated citadel.

JAN 5, 1947 Lt. Col. L. Ursaki, Divisional Commander, conducted week-end meetings.

FEB 25, 1947 "FIGHTING FAITH" Campaign launched by Major and Mrs. Tom Murray.

JUNE 1, 1947 The Odd Fellows Lodge attended the evening service on their annual Divine Service Parade.

DEC 21, 1947 Brigadier Reg. Bamsey conducted special Christmas services.

JUNE 28, 1949 The 66th Anniversary Celebration was conducted by Major Bell of Hamilton, assisted by the Male Voice Party from Guelph. The morning service was broadcast on Radio Station CKOX.

OCT 10, 1949 The Guelph Citadel Band, led by Bandmaster S. Crossland, visited Ingersoll.

MAY 28, 1950 The 67th Anniversary Celebrations were conducted by Major and Mrs. B. Dumerton.

OCT 18, 1953 The Divisional Commander, Lt. Col. F. Merrett, conducted the services.

MARCH 10, 1954 Mrs. John Noe, oldest soldier in the corps, was promoted to glory.

JAN 24, 1955 The "WIN ONE" Campaign was underway, with services by Capt. A. Robinson of Windsor.

JUNE 12, 1955 The Loyal Orange Association held their Divine Service, under leadership of Lt. Col. F. Merrett. The hall was filled to capacity.

APRIL 8, 1956 Canadian Legion paraded to the hall for their Divine Service.

APRIL 14, 1956 Lt. Col. C. Warrander, the Divisional Commander, led the meetings.

NOV 7, 1957 Special Citadel re-opening services were held under Captain Len Knight. The ceiling had been lowered, exterior refaced and interior re-decorated.

MAY 24, 1957 Mt Denis Corps Cadet Brigade, conducted the meetings. Twenty-four Cadets in attendance.

MARCH 1961 Lt. Col. John C. Habkirk and Major John Nelson conducted a musical meeting.

MARCH 5, 1965 Ingersoll Corps was host Church for Women's Day of Prayer.

APRIL 11, 1965 London East Band visited Ingersoll.

JUNE 26, 1965 Una Mills and John Daniels were married by Lt. D. Gass.

OCT 8, 1965 Mrs. Eli Neaves was promoted to Glory. Her husband followed her a week later on October 18, 1965.

DEC 18, 1965 Lt. Colonel and Mrs. Alfred Keith conducted the Holiness meeting.

JAN 1966 The old furnace in the hall was replaced by two gas furnaces.

JULY 21, 1966 Cadet Ellen Becker came to Ingersoll from the Training College, to assist while Corps Officer was on furlough.

AUG 28, 1966 Brother and Sister, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Uncer celebrated their 50th Wedding Anniversary.

DEC 17, 1967 Captain Leo Porter was Chairman of the Christmas Program.

NOV 12, 1967 Captain Ken Holbrook conducted the services.

DEC 25, 1967 Lt. Colonel Gennery conducted the morning service.

NOV 2, 1968 Sarnia Citadel Band conducted a great band week-end in Ingersoll. Envoy Nelson Pedlar was Guest Speaker.

JAN 5, 1969 Ingersoll Band visited the Harbour Light Corps in Toronto, as guests of Brigadier Joshua Monk and the staff.

FEB 22, 1969 Retirement services were held for Brother Robert Garland. Special Guests included Col. Carl Hiltz and Major and Mrs. Eric Kitchen.

APRIL 1969 On Easter Sunday, Bro. Percy Groom was honoured for half a century of service in the Ingersoll band.

NOV 7, 1971 Major John Morrison and Cadets Mr. and Mrs. Fred Oliver, led the meetings all day. Many re-dedications and commitments were made.

DEC 12, 1971 Lt. Colonel Douglas Sharp, Divisional Commander, led the meetings.

DEC 31, 1971 Watchnight Service held, preceded by a smorgasboard luncheon.

MARCH 1971 Renovations under way in the Citadel; platform closed in and wooden panels installed and new aisle carpet laid there and on the platform.

JULY 1, 1972 Band visited Gravenhurst, accompanied by the Corps Officers, Lt. and Mrs. Cooper.

OCT 19, 1972 Brigadier and Mrs. George Oystryk led services and showed slides of their work in Japan.

MAY 12/13 1973 Special retirement ceremonies were held for Bandsman Percy Groom, celebrating more than fifty years of service. 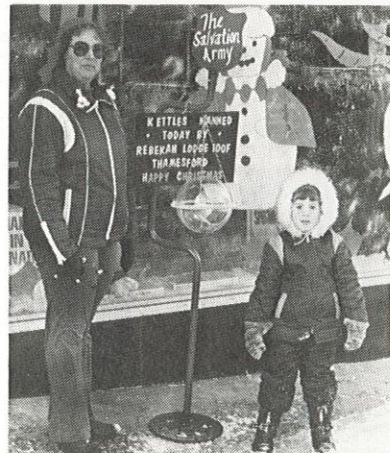

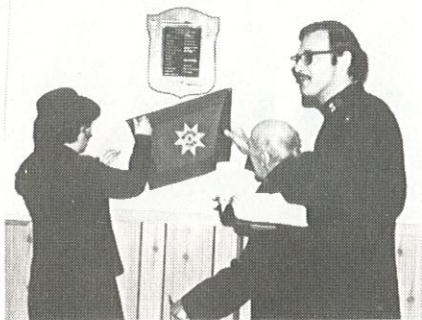

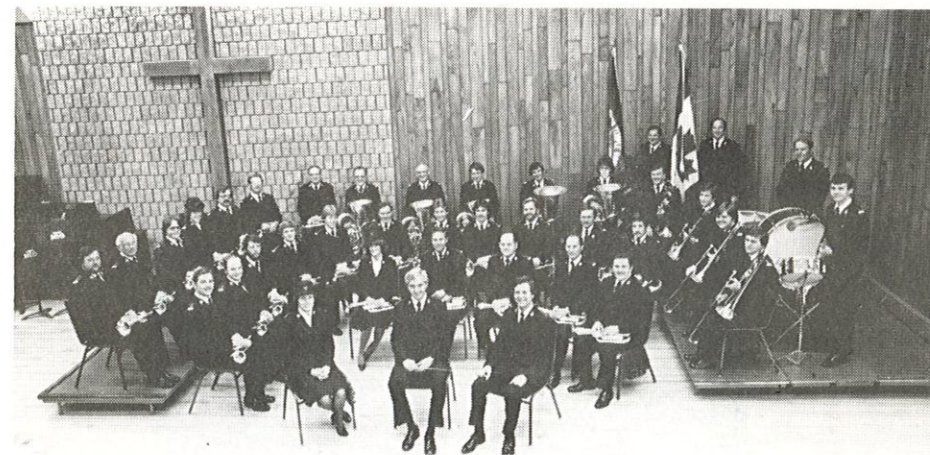

HOME OF THE INGERSOLL CHEESE FESTIVAL

A NEWS CLIPPING FROM THE INCERSOLL CHRONICLE
DATED JULY 5th 1983.

THE SALVATION ARMY HOLDING FORTH TO LARGE CROWDS IN INCERSOLL.

"On Sunday last a detachment of the much talked of Salvation Army made its initiatory appearance in our streets. The band consisting of six persons in uniform, two females being in the number. At 1030 A.M. the customary out door meeting was held on Market Square. Many persons being attracted thither by the novel innovation and by the singing of the band, with its tambourine accompaniments. At 1100 O'Clock the band held its regular meeting in the Town Hall, which was attended by nearly 200 persons. Of the evening services we do not intend to speak, only that they are said to be similar to the meetings of the early methodists or "Ranters" of the old country. How true that is we cannot vouch, but leave the matter to our readers to investigate if they feel so disposed. At the afternoon service some 300 persons gathered, but the evening meeting was the crowning service of all, the Town Hall was filled it being difficult at times to get nearer than the front doors. At all services the best of order was observed. At each meeting copies of The War Cry and the "soldiers Song Books" are being offered for sale and from the large number disposed of last Sunday considerable means must have been added to the treasury wherewith to meet expenses which are not very light. On Monday evening the Army again held forth in the Market Square, closing up the evening with a service in the Charles Street Methodist Episcopal Church which was kindly lent to the army, the Town Hall being engaged for a Band Concert. Since Monday large meetings have been held in the same church, the usual out door meetings being conducted on the Market Square commencing each evening at 7:30.

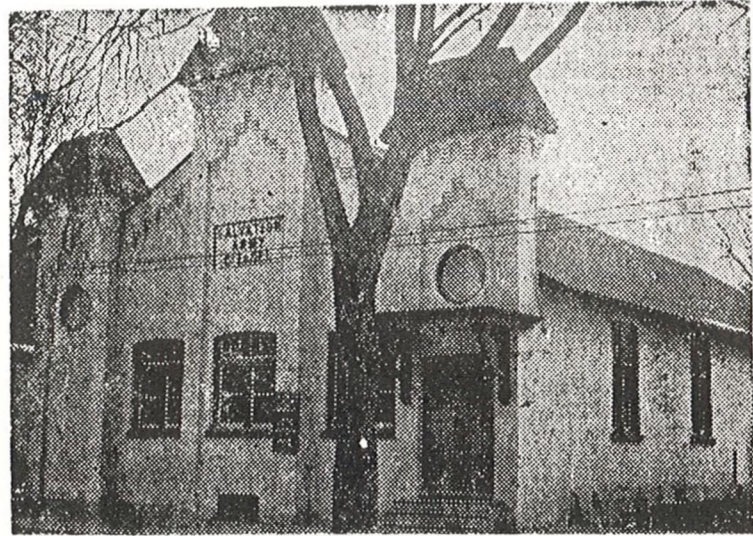
