

S.S. No. 1, WEST ZORRA

1869 - 1966

The first schooling the children in this section received was taught in Mr. George Walker's barn. He was a pioneer who with his wife Hannah and six children migrated from Niagara Falls, New York to Oxford County in May, 1832, and settled on Lot 5, Concession 2, of West Zorra on the farm now occupied by Mr. John Pierce. We have no official records of the former school or schools but on the 24th of September, 1850, 3220 square feet of land on the east half of Lot 5, Concession 1, about ten rods south of the present school was deeded from Mr. Walker to Township Section No. 5 as it was then known. Some of the teachers in this school were Messrs. Tom Bayne, Murray and Ross. In 1862 there was an enrollment of 60 with an average daily attendance of 29.

On the fifteenth of February, 1869, three-quarters of an acre of the east half of Lot 5, Concession 1, where the school now stands was bought from Mr. Walker and on February 25th, 1869, the 3220 square feet deeded back to him. This section was now called No. 1. Messrs. James Walker, Samuel Elliott and George Murray represented the section at this time.

On this land a new one-roomed school of white brick with an entry at the front was built and named Walker's School after Mr. George Walker. It was in November, 1869, that the teacher, Miss Mary Davidson, and the pupils transferred their possessions from the old to the new school. This school which no doubt appeared palatial and well-equipped to those early builders and which indeed was above average for those days, would seem very bare and meagrely furnished in comparison with the modern schools of today.

One teacher conducted classes from primary through to grade 8 and in the winter young men with moustaches who had to work other times of the year attended classes also. In the early days the teacher boarded around spending so much time in the various homes of the pupils, this maintenance being part of the remuneration. Fortunately for the teacher this practice was discontinued and the salary paid while meagre compared with the salaries which are paid today provided the teacher with independent maintenance.

Originally it was heated by a large iron stove, then by a box stove with two rows of pipes traversing the entire length of the school. In the early years there was no lack of good hardwood for fuel but since the fire died out completely at night, it was not until noon that the well stoked stove made much impression on the large school room in cold weather. These stoves were replaced in 1947 by a furnace and stoker and in 1964 renovated to the present oil furnace.

There was no well at the school until Mr. Edward Dolson dug one in 1871. The water was brought from the Walker farm in a pail, and a tin dipper was shared by all the children. Three wells have since been drilled with the last one (1946) furnishing a good supply of pure water. Common wash basins one for the girls and one for the boys were supplied until 1956 when a pressure system supplying water on tap for both drinking and washing was installed.

The first woodshed, a lean-to built to the back of the school, was built in 1871 by Mr. Peter Murray at a cost of forty-five dollars, and was used until 1920 when the present one was constructed for \$450. by Mr. D. McClure.

The beautiful maples which surround the school grounds were planted in 1872 by Mr. W. Murray.

On June 18, 1873 approval for holding divine services in the school was given. This formed part of the Thamesford circuit and continued for some years.

About 1880 Mr. Mervin Cody organized a Sunday School at Walker's, one of a chain of six or eight which he started in West Zorra's schools. Mr. George Walker, Mr. W. H. Sutherland, Mr. Blackman and Mr. James A. Hossack were some of the superintendents. This lasted for several years.

About 1924 Mr. Clifford Sutherland again started the Sunday School with Mr. James A. Hossack and Mr. James A. McDonald acting as superintendents.

Cement steps with an iron railing at the side were installed in 1916 by Mr. William Crellin at a cost of \$40. and a fence erected on the north and east sides with turned posts, acme wire and scantling top and bottom by Mr. Fred Bennett.

The school has been the meeting place of many groups and organizations. Senator Donald Sutherland, M.P. for Oxford for several years and a former pupil delivered his first political speech in it.

Temperance groups have met and ladies have held tea meetings.

About 1927 a Home and School Club was formed. This club donated a piano in 1927, and in 1929 installed hydro in the school.

Annual concerts were put on at Christmas when the school children entertained the community with recitations, plays, dialogues, etc.

The Good Neighbour Club was the last to meet. Music was supplied by local talent and the younger ones were taught square and round dancing. Other entertainment was also supplied.

A steel flag pole was erected in 1930 at a cost of \$40.

Additions were built on each side of the entry in 1931 and chemical closets installed at a cost of \$223. With the drilling of a new well and the installation of a pressure system in 1956 modern toilets, wash basins and a drinking fountain were installed at a cost of \$1,308.56.

Music instruction has been given since 1938 by itinerant music teachers.

Free school books were supplied to the pupils in 1941.

Manual Training and Agriculture were taught to Grades 7 and 8 from 1946-1951 by Mr. M. S. Jaques.

In the early days there were no inspectors. Superintendents who were usually old teachers visited the school in the fall. Mr. Hugh Fraser and Rev. Donald McKenzie were two of the superintendents.

The school was under the control of a board of trustees, three in number who were elected by the people of the section. This board engaged the teacher and janitor, purchased supplies and were responsible for repairs and maintenance of the school. This system continued until the section voted in favour of a larger school area which came into effect in January 1945. Five trustees elected from the township serve the entire area.

1966 will see the closing of Walker's School and the transporting of the children by bus to the new Highland Park School north of Embro.

As we celebrate this reunion there will also be a bit of sadness and many fond memories of happy days spent in this little one room school.





GLEANED FROM THE MINUTES

Dec. 21, 1871 — "the business of the evening soon brought to a close for a wonder."

Mar. 31, 1876 — "that get three dollars and thirty cents for making the fires and sweeping the school house from the thirteenth day of Jan. to the thirteenth day of April, 1876."

— "that get his pay for ten cords of wood. Twelve dollars and fifty cents."

Oct. 25, 1882 — "that we the Trustees do grant the sum of ten dollars for Books for prizes with the teacher giving five dollars."

Feb. 1, 1884 — "that the tender for wood be accepted for \$1.50 per cord for twenty cords."

Aug. 8, 1898 — "that we engage for the balance of the year at a salary of eighty dollars.

Nov. 19, 1904 — "A letter was received from the teacher stating to this effect. Owing to the very stormy winter months and the conditions of the roads the attendance was very small and that she was willing to deduct ten dollars from her salary. After some time it was decided to accept and the board expressed their thanks for same."
