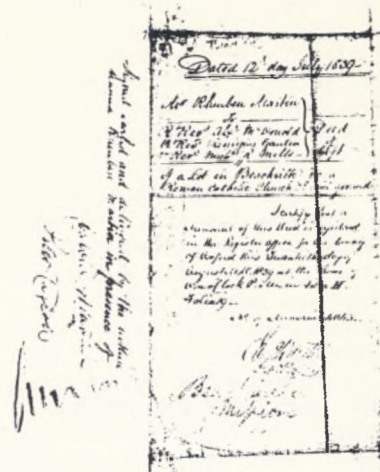

Transcription from the Property Deed of 1839

THIS INDENTURE: made the twelfth day of July in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and thirty nine BETWEEN Rheuben Martin of the village of Beachville in the Township of Oxford West in the County of Oxford in the London District and Province of Upper Canada Apoinan of the one part and the Right Reverend Alexander McDonald The Right Reverend Remigius Gaulin and the Reverend Michael Robert Mills of the other part Witnesseth, that the said Rheuben Martin for and in consideration of the sum of five shillings of lawful money of the said province to him in hand paid by the said Michael Robert Mills the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged and for divers other good causes and considerations him thereunto moving Hath given granted bargained sold aliened released conveyed and confirmed and by these presents Doth give grant bargain sell alien release convey and confirm unto the said Alexander McDonald Remigius Gaulin and Michael Robert Mills and to their Successors in Office for ever all that parcel or lot of land situate lying and being in the village of Beachville aforesaid Township County District and Province aforesaid containing one fifth of an acre more or less being composed of lot number three of the South East side of Church Street in the said Village of Beachville and commencing at the most Northerly angle of the said lot then South thirty three degrees West along Church Street one chain then South fifty seven degrees East two chains Then North thirty three degrees East one chain Then North fifty seven degrees West two chains more or less to the place of beginning Together with all and singular the rights privileges and appurtenances thereto belonging or in any wise appertaining And the Reversion and Reversions Remainder and Remainders and all the estate right title interest claims property and demand whatsoever of the said Rheuben Martin of in and to the same and every part and parcel thereof To have and to hold the same free from all manner of incumbrances unto the said Alexander McDonald Remigius Gaulin and Michael Robert Mills and their Successors in Office forever to and for the use interest and purpose following that is to say To and for the purpose of erecting thereon a Roman Catholic Church and for the purpose of a burial ground for those professing the Roman Catholic religion and being members of that Church and to and for no other use intent or purpose whatsoever IN WITNESS whereof the said parties to these presents have hereunto set their hands and seals the day and year first above written and in the third year of the reign of her Majesty Queen Victoria.

The Early Years

The three men looked up as they heard the sound of hoof-beats. Soon a rider came into view, and was promptly greeted by the three with the title of "Father". "How did you know I was a priest?" the rider inquired. Replied John Shehan, one of the group: "Did you ever see an Irishman who didn't know a priest when he saw one?"

The year was 1834; the place, Ingersoll. Shehan's two co-workers were John and Nicholas Dunn; the priest, Father Veriotte. They sat down to have a talk and the result of the conversation was, that in the following year Father Veriotte promised to return to celebrate Mass, if the others would see to providing a suitable place. He kept his word, and they kept theirs. Accordingly in the spring of 1835 Mass was celebrated for the first time in what is now Oxford County, in the O'Neil Blacksmith Shop, in Beachville. The congregation numbered seven, including two small children.

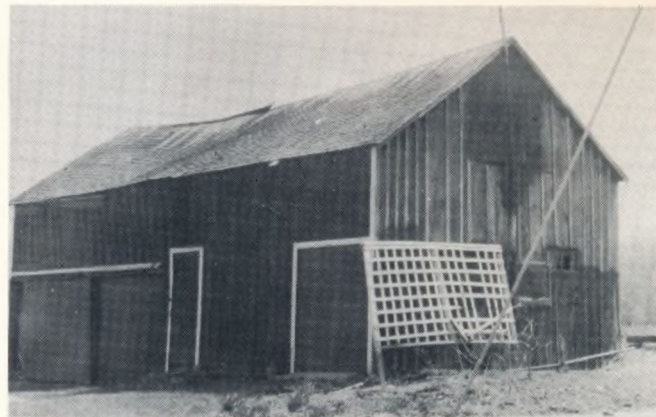
A humble beginning indeed, but how pregnant with meaning! It was the story of the acorn and the oak all over again. None of the participants in that conversation of 1834, or the Mass in 1835 could have foreseen it, but that humble beginning was, nevertheless, the birth of the Catholic Church in Oxford County.

It will be noted from the foregoing that the Catholic people of the district worshipped first at Beachville, not at Ingersoll or Woodstock. Beachville was chosen because of its abundant water power. In an age when transportation by water was vital, Beachville enjoyed easy access to the river, with high ridges rimming the valley, each putting forth a tentative toe of land upon the valley margins to form a natural approach to the river.



Father Burke, who had been attending the Catholic people of the area whenever possible, built a small Church in the settlement in 1838. Catholics from Ingersoll, Beachville and Woodstock used this place of worship for several years. The Church itself lasted until destroyed by fire in 1876.

The Second Church

With a growing population in the community of Ingersoll, it is not surprising that the Catholic people of the community should have given serious thought to the building of their own church. By 1847, Mr. Carnegie, who was not a member of the parish, had donated land for the building of a Catholic Church in Ingersoll. The land was located just north of the old Adam Oliver property (now known as the corner of John and Victoria Streets), and just west of the Rumsey property. Stone for the new Church was collected — and donated — by Nicholas, Michael and John Dunn, two of whom were in the trio that welcomed Father Veriotte a few years earlier.

From that point onward, the scene shifts to Ingersoll. That community had been experiencing a considerable growth in population, and it was only natural that the Catholic members should want a church of their own. Itinerant missionaries came and went with surprising frequency. Between 1840 and 1850 there were no fewer than four. Fathers Mills, Lees, O'Dwyer and Quinlan served the mission, a trend that was to continue for some years to come. However, even with such frequent changes in leadership, the progress that was made in the temporal well-being of the mission was incredible. It could never have taken place had it not been for the deep faith of priests and people alike. There is not other explanation. They wanted to practise their faith; they wanted the blessings which only their faith could give and no effort would be spared to bring that about.

Sacred Heart Parish Ingersoll

The first Catholic Church was erected in Ingersoll in 1848 and was named Sacred Heart Church. Father Michael Moynahan was at that time in charge of the parish. He also attended the missions of East Oxford, Woodstock and Norwich. In 1852 he was succeeded by Father Carrayon, who also served two years. During this period Churches at Norwich and East Oxford were built. Father Kerleher, who succeeded Father Carrayon in 1854, remained three years, and built the old parochial residence on John Street. It was at this time, 1856, to be exact, that the dioceses of London and Hamilton were established by the Holy See, and the parish of Ingersoll was allocated to the Diocese of London, together with all of Oxford County.

The progress continued. Father J. D. Ryan, succeeded Father Kerleher and erected a steeple on the Church and built an addition to the parish residence.

Second Church Building, 1848 - 1878



Father M. J. Lynch, who succeeded him, is credited with the building of a Catholic School in Ingersoll. When he left, in 1861, Father Louis Griffa came, and also Father O'Donovan, as assistant. It was during Father Griffa's tenure that a division of the parish was made. A priest's residence was built in Norwich and Father O'Donovan was appointed pastor of Norwich, Woodstock and East Oxford.

When Father Griffa left in June, 1864, Father R. Boubat became pastor, with Father B. Gellinai as his assistant. It was at this time that larger accommodation for the school was provided and the site of the Separate School on John Street was obtained. Father Boubat left in June, 1866 to take charge of the Church in St. Marys. His successor, Father Marshall, remained only five months, to be succeeded by Father Volkert. During his pastorate the old church on John Street was extended by thirty feet.

History of Sacred Heart Church

"Father Volkert left in 1868, being succeeded by Reverend Father Joseph Bayard. While this priest was in Ingersoll, a division of the Mission was made again. Some three or four years after its beginning a church had been erected in Woodstock in 1867; it became St. Mary's Parish in 1874, and a place of residence had been established for its pastor, Reverend Father Gahan.

"When Father Bayard was requested, in 1877, to take charge of the Mission in Sarnia, Sacred Heart Church in Ingersoll was out of debt and a substantial amount of money was in the bank.

The Present Church

"When Father Boubat was requested in 1877 to again take charge of Ingersoll, he found the parish house in a most dilapidated state, and at once had it rebuilt and refurnished.

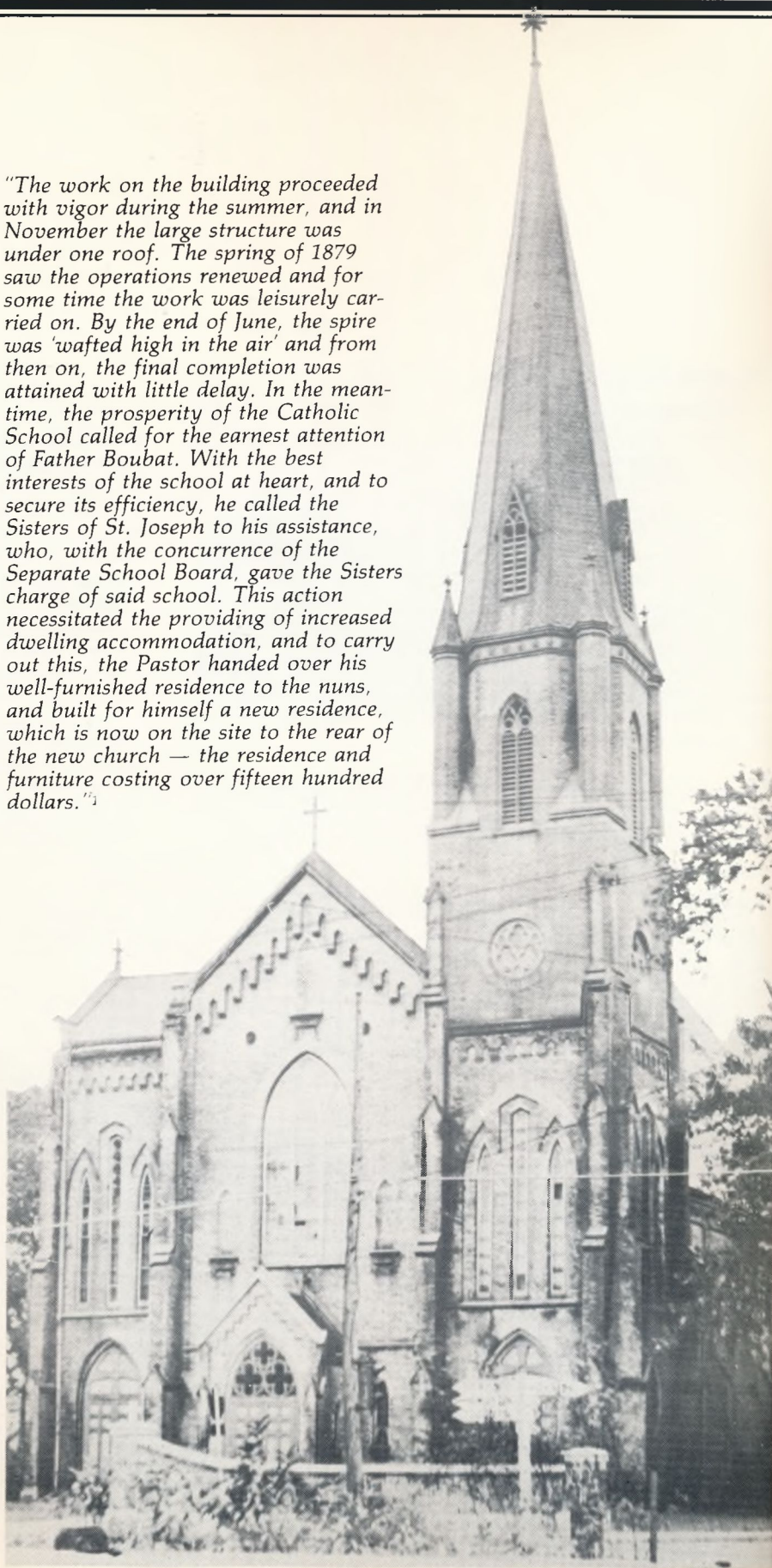
"In June of that year, His Excellency Bishop Walsh of London administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to over one hundred candidates at Sacred Heart Church, and in his remarks to the congregation at that time, impressed upon them the necessity of a new church.

"Because of this, Bishop Walsh was invited to return in October 1877, with a view to obtaining a preliminary list of subscriptions toward a new church.

"Although the Parish house was not yet completed, so great was the generosity and the enthusiasm of the congregation on the occasion of Bishop Walsh's second visit, that the sum of six thousand dollars was subscribed in a few hours, supplemented by another six thousand during the next two weeks, making a grand total of twelve thousand dollars with which to start the imposing building we have today.

"Plans and specifications were at once secured from C. F. Durand, an architect in London, Ontario and the first sod was turned on March 18, 1878. The work was proceeded with very quickly and brought to such an advanced state as to permit the laying of the cornerstone on May 19 of that same year. The regular services that day were held in the old church in the morning, and Bishop Walsh performed the ceremony of the laying of the cornerstone.

"The work on the building proceeded with vigor during the summer, and in November the large structure was under one roof. The spring of 1879 saw the operations renewed and for some time the work was leisurely carried on. By the end of June, the spire was 'wafted high in the air' and from then on, the final completion was attained with little delay. In the meantime, the prosperity of the Catholic School called for the earnest attention of Father Boubat. With the best interests of the school at heart, and to secure its efficiency, he called the Sisters of St. Joseph to his assistance, who, with the concurrence of the Separate School Board, gave the Sisters charge of said school. This action necessitated the providing of increased dwelling accommodation, and to carry out this, the Pastor handed over his well-furnished residence to the nuns, and built for himself a new residence, which is now on the site to the rear of the new church — the residence and furniture costing over fifteen hundred dollars."



The Present Church

"The Church is designed throughout in the early English gothic style, the exterior being faced with white pressed brick, all the arches being of gauged brick laid with white joints; the buttress caps, string courses and window sills being of blue-tint Ohio sandstone. The coping and the cornices are of galvanized iron and the roofs are covered with Vermont slate, having patterned courses laid in different colours. The front is subdivided into three parts by buttresses, in each of which are double entrance doors, the heads of which are filled with tracery; the centre door has gabled entrance porch with front and side entrance doors. Above this is a large three-panelled window rich with tracery on each side and over which are three niches for the reception of three appropriate statues, the top one being intended for the figure of Our Saviour; two circular terra cotta foliated patterns are introduced in gable, which, with its, stepped arches and coping is crowned by a cross six feet high. Over the side doors are long narrow triplet windows grouped together under a large arch, over which in the tower are rose windows.

"The upper portion of the tower above the rose windows is brought from the square to the octagon, having a window in each face; on the corners of the square are carried up four octagonal pinnacles with moulded cornice and slated roofs, with finials. The spire starts from the moulded and ornamented cornice, and is covered with slate, bands of different colours being occasionally introduced; four louvre windows are on the spire, and the corner rolls run to the finial under the cross at top. On the south side of the centre, the walls are carried up to a height of sixteen feet above the side walls to balance the tower, and has coped gable with finial and pinnacle; the front has a very imposing and lofty appearance. The side between the tower and transepts is subdivided by buttresses into four parts, each having large traceried two-panelled windows, each alternate window having different traceried heads. The cornice is of brick, with fascia and crown mould eavestrough. The transepts, which project five feet from the main side walls, have gabled ends with large three-panelled windows, with traced heads, and quarter-foil over; the coping being furnished with foliated finial. The side chapel walls are eighteen feet high and have roofs of their own, with cresting, giving expression to their location from the outside.

"The sanctuary which is twenty-two feet long, is the width of the nave; and the roof is the full height of the main roof. The walls are forty-two feet high, octagonal at back, in which are located eight traceried clerestory windows. Its distinctive character is emphasized by the cresting over the sanctuary being higher and of different design from that over the auditorium. On the apex of the octagon there is a cross six feet in height.

The Interior

"It is in keeping with the exterior, but it has a more cathedral-like appearance. It is like waking from a dream as one advances, and "takes in" the scene. The pure white walls, ceilings, mouldings, etc., stand out in rich relief before the highly-varied and yet soft colours of the

stained-glass windows. Entering the building at the centre door, in front, we find the narthex is formed under the choir gallery, which runs the full width of the Church and is sixteen feet wide. Fine archways at the gallery divide the narthex from the auditorium, which is seventy-six feet long by fifty-four feet wide in the main body and sixty-one feet in the transepts. The nave has a vaulted ceiling springing from moulded string courses over the nave arches, and is divided by moulding ribs over the nave columns, which spring from foliated corbels in string course; the height from the floor to the springing is thirty-two feet and to the apex forty-six feet. "The sanctuary is twenty-five feet deep from altar railing and is three steps higher than the auditorium; it has a groined ceiling; is the full width of the nave, from which it is divided by a moulded arch. The moulded ribs of the ceiling spring from the foliated capitals in the angles of the octagon, which are supported by columns resting on corbels in the ornamental foliated string course, carried around at the level of the caps of the nave columns. A moulded string course is carried around the sills of the clerestory sanctuary windows, and is ornamented by a grape-vine design with ornament.

The Plan

"The building was drawn by Mr. George F. Durand of London, Ontario; the slating by Mr. George Riddell of London; the plastering by Messrs. Nolan and Carroll of Cleveland. The main altar was designed by Father Boubat, and the work was done by Mr. T. Comiskey, under whose supervision the greatest part of the work of the Church was also done.

The Building Committee

"This comprised of the following-named gentlemen: Messrs. James Brady, F. Stewart, M. Dunn, John Henderson, John Flaherty, Peter Kennedy and Walter Hackett. (The latter gentleman was not privileged to see the Church dedicated, he having died a few days prior to the dedication.) Father Boubat was the officiating chairman.

Dedication Services

"The new Church of the Sacred Heart was dedicated to Divine Worship amid the grand and impressive ceremonies which belong to such important occasions. The day was all that could be desired — old sun shining with all its brightness, without a cloud to dim its resplendent rays. Early in the morning many strangers flocked to the town and before ten o'clock it was easy to discern that there was going to be an immense gathering at the opening service. We think we are safe in saying that at the immensity of the service there must have been two thousand people in and around the church.

The Dedication — August 22, 1880.

"At 10:30 His Lordship Bishop Walsh appeared, preceded by an altar boy carrying the cross, on either side of which were the acolytes. His Lordship, on coming to the front railing, said he was about to bless a church to be dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. He congratulated the good people of Ingersoll on the fine edifice which they had erected, and said the ceremony, which was a very imposing one, consisted of the singing of portions of the psalms, and in the sprinkling of the holy water. Water is used because it is a symbol of purity. They would hear, preached in the new edifice, from year to year, the true doctrine of the Holy Catholic Church. He said that in consecrating the church, they were following out the injunctions of Scripture. In the words of Holy Writ, "You have done a great work, you have built a house, not for man, but for God" — and he prayed that, for all, this might be a bright hour of their lives, for by the erecting of the church they had done a great work, and would not go unrewarded.

"After the consecration of the church, Solemn High Mass was sung by Reverend Father Vincent of St. Michael's College, Toronto — Reverend Father Flannery of St. Thomas, acting as deacon — and Reverend Father Molphy of Strathroy, as sub-deacon. Reverend Father Feron officiated as Master of Ceremonies. Inside the communion railing, were seated Monsignor Bruyere, Dean Wagner, Dean Murphy, and Father Ferguson of Assumption College; Father Kelly of McGillvray, and Father Craven of Hamilton. His Lordship, Bishop Crinnon, after the First Gospel, delivered the sermon, taking as his text: — "The Lord hath said and he will not repent; thou art a priest forever according to the order of Melchisedech". The speaker began by a reference to the sacrifices of the old law as prefiguring the Sacrifice of Christ as the one Sacrifice which was in itself completely adequate to atone for man's sin. Reference was made to the prophecy of Malachi who spoke of the clean obla-



tion to be offered up from the rising of the sun to the going down of the same in all nations on the face of the earth, — an obvious reference to the Mass as the continuation of the Sacrifice of Calvary. The institution of the Eucharist at the Last Supper together with the institution of the priesthood brought to completion our Lord's work for the redemption of mankind. The speaker concluded by an exhortation to see in the Eucharist the great treasure of our faith. "What a consolation in this world of sorrows", said Bishop Crinnon, "Where we can unburden ourselves of the heavy load of sins at the foot of the Lord's altar. How happy the good Christian who leaves the world fortified by the sacrament of the Eucharist. May God, in His infinite mercy, give us grace to live good lives, so that when we die He will say: "Because thou has been faithful over few things, I will place thee over many; enter thou into the joy of Thy Lord".

Evening Service

"By seven o'clock the church was again filled as in the morning. Before the service commenced Father Boubat took occasion to say a few words respecting the service about to be held. "The friends", he said, "not only the Catholic people, but those of other faiths have nobly contributed to the collection;" and on behalf of the congregation and his own behalf he took the opportunity of expressing sincere thanks for such evidence of good will. "The indebtedness was yet large, but a few such open-hearted and generous offerings would, in the not too distant future, free this beautiful temple of debt".

The Sermon

"The evening sermon was delivered by Father Ferguson of Assumption College. His subject was The Sacred Heart of Jesus as a symbol of the love by which Christ our Lord wrought the work of Redemption. He hoped his hearers would realize how great was their debt to Christ our Lord for his love of mankind. The musical portion of the service was particularly worthy of special mention. The director of the choir was Father Challandard, and the organist was Miss Minnie Keating."²

Father Boubat Leaves

Father Molphy Arrives.

"Father Boubat was not left in Ingersoll too long to enjoy the fruits of his labor of love.

Reverend Father Molphy came to take his place and remained here until his death in 1904. Typically Irish, Father Molphy endeared himself to all with whom he came in contact, including members of all faiths.

Excerpt from Dr. Henderson's memoirs, as written by Mr. J. T. Fitzgerald in 1921: "Chas. L. Bailey, one of Toronto's leading business men of today, once told the writer: 'The heart of Father Molphy knew no bounds. I quite well remember meeting him with his horse, on the street. For the most part he drove a fine horse and two-wheeled gig. He would ask me numerous times to go for a ride with him. I would never know where we were going until we would stop in front of some poor person's hovel, very often Protestant and without a word the priest would take the basket from under the seat and enter the house. He would come out without the basket and I was never told what the basket contained'. Thus speaks Mr. Bailey of the beloved priest."¹

Father Molphy is buried in Sacred Heart Cemetery.

Father Northgraves was curate to Father Molphy, and the latter priest died in 1904.

Father Connolly, another native of the Emerald Isle, was to follow Father Molphy. Kind, quick-witted, with the traditional fiery Irish temper, Father was loved by all. He, himself, was especially fond of the children, although he was strict with them. He kept a switch of sorts in the vestry, and if a wrong answer was given in one of his catechism classes, the "tool" of punishment was brought into play. The recipient of such punishment knew that he or she would be rewarded with an orange, a piece of candy or even money after the class was over. When Father Connolly died, following a lengthy illness, the loss was felt — not only by the Catholic population of the town, but also by his many friends from other denominations.

Reverend Father John Hogan, who had assisted Father Connolly for a time, became Administrator. He was succeeded by Reverend Thomas Ford, who was Administrator, until Reverend Father J. N. Gnam was appointed Pastor in 1910.

Father Gnam Arrives

Reverend Father Gnam, of German descent, had a keen mind in the financial field. While he was very generous with his own money, he "shopped for a bargain" with Parish funds. To find a suitable property for a permanent Catholic School was his priority. The facilities being used were over-crowded and out-dated and something had to be done quickly to remedy the situation. Father Gnam had his eye on the Rumsey property, which abutted the almost-complete church holdings.

One thing he had not counted on, was the opposition he would meet from not only some of the parishioners, but also the owners of the house in question. They were averse to selling more of their estate to Catholics.

Father Fuerth Comes

Legend has it that the good Sisters of St. Joseph "planted" a medal of St. Joseph on said property, as a symbol of faith that the deal would be completed.

The Rumsey home was a sturdy, white brick residence and Father Gnam could visualize a fine school, with very little renovation. But, as always, opposition came from many directions. The majority preferred that a new school be built, but after many, many heated discussions, this good priest and his minority of supporters won.

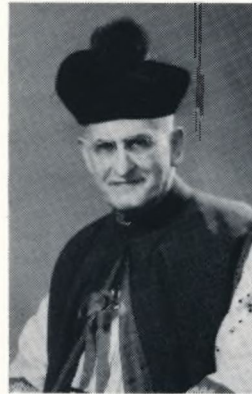
The property was acquired and with a very simple remodelling, became the new Sacred Heart School, which served its pupils well for many years. Many of the men and women in the Parish today were taught the three R's, and some their first two years of high school, in Sacred Heart School.

Father Gnam kept church property in excellent condition and the spiritual growth of the Parish flourished. When Father Gnam was appointed to Chatham in 1921, Sacred Heart Parish lost a most dedicated priest and Ingersoll lost a good friend.



History of Sacred Heart Church, Ingersoll, Ontario, 1880 -1980.

When Reverend Father Fuerth came to Ingersoll in 1921, no one knew, least of all himself, that he would remain until his retirement forty years later. Of German descent also, he set to work on his new assignment. Father Gnam had been frugal — Father Fuerth was frugal and practical. Substantial furnishings in the church and the rectory were left, so long as they performed their functions.



A love of the Blessed Sacrament and the frequent reception of Holy Communion are just two of the legacies Father Fuerth left behind.

Father was very generous and many were the free meals dispensed at the rectory, particularly during the depression years. Encouragement to higher education, particularly the priesthood and the religious life, was given at every opportunity. No one ever understood how he could help so many so often.

When Father Fuerth came to Ingersoll, money was hard to come by. There were no flowers or shrubs on the church property, the school grounds were in need of filling in and levelling off. In a short time a tennis court and a lighted bowling green came into existence. The backyard of the house was impassable in spring and fall and there was no garage. This was built up with cinders and a paved entrance to enter from two directions. A steam-heated garage for two cars was erected and four properties on John Street were purchased.

The house was substantial in structure and well-built, although far from modern by today's standards. It was insulated steel doors and windows, as well as carpeting, were provided. A walkway, glass enclosed to protect from wintry blasts, provided an entrance to the church from the house.

Most of the improvements were concentrated on the church. A new steam heating system was installed. The outside brick was first painted and some years later was cleaned. Four large turrets at the base of the tower were removed because of deterioration of the brick and certain places in the walls were rebricked, as well as pointing done.

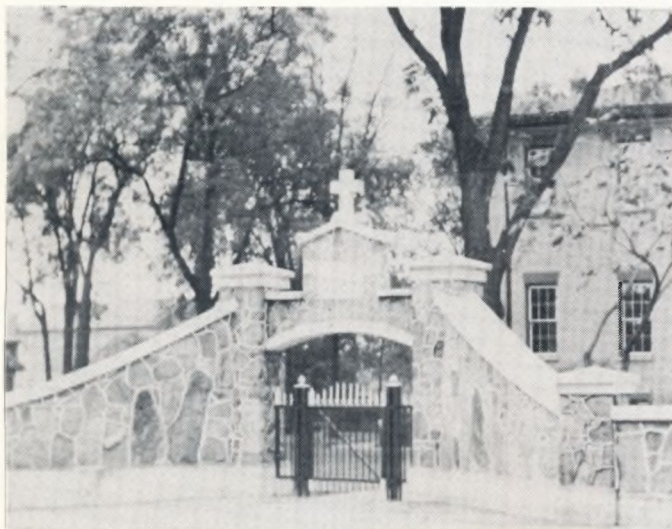
The interior of the church was decorated twice, and a terrazzo floor was laid in the body of the church. New pews were installed and the Holy Communion railing was moved forward to accommodate a larger sanctuary space and a longer railing. New quarter cut oak furniture for the sanctuary and the floor was twice covered with new carpeting.

The hallway and the vestry were given needed attention, and a proper baptistry was installed at the rear of the church. Vestments and altar equipment were kept in good condition and carrara marble was made to cover the three platforms and steps of the three altars.

The old pipe organ, hand-pump and over eighty years old, was replaced by an electric, used modern organ in 1947.

Four bells, hydro-controlled, and from Holland, were installed in the tower and these also take care of the Angelus. The bells were the personal gift of Monsignor Fuerth.

All the buildings, except the church, were connected with the town's sewer system, and four hundred and thirty-three feet of natural stone fence, including two archways, were built along Thames Street. This wall has been referred to as the 'great wall of Ingersoll'.



The practice of remembering deceased relatives and friends by having High Masses offered for the repose of their souls was encouraged by Father Fuerth. So much so, that today (1980) all High Masses requested cannot be said at Sacred Heart Church.

When Ingersoll and district was created a Deanery in 1956, Father Fuerth became the first Dean of Ingersoll.

In 1959, Dean Fuerth was elevated to the rank of Monsignor.

A pipe with the stub of a lighted cigar in it was Monsignor's constant companion.

Repairing old clocks was his hobby. The mantel in his office held a conglomeration of time pieces — every size, every vintage, some ticking, but with no co-ordination as to time, some silent.

Another article, synonymous with Monsignor Fuerth, was "Mr. Armor", a life-size suit of armor. Just how many children, as well grown-ups, were 'spied' on by this figure, as they entered the office for counselling, reprimanding or just a friendly chat, could not be counted.

When it was announced, suddenly, in 1961 that Monsignor Fuerth was being retired, the news was received with mixed feelings. He had become a legend in Sacred Heart Parish. Although he never had enjoyed really good health, he shouldered the burdens of looking after Parish needs, leaving only the most minor duties to the young, energetic and most willing assistants who were with him during his forty year tenure.

Father J. E. Brisson

Reverend Father J. E. Brisson had been Assistant in Woodstock — to Reverend Father Phelan. At the age of 39, when appointed Pastor of Ingersoll, Father Brisson had not been born when Monsignor Fuerth came to Ingersoll as Pastor.

Father Brisson was energetic, innovative and thrived on challenge. Sacred Heart Parish in Ingersoll provided just the challenge that he most enjoyed. The church property had been kept in repair, but was out-dated and very much in need of a face-lift.

VATICAN II was in progress, and many changes in the liturgy and the role of the people were being recommended.

The year was 1961, and Reverend Father J. N. Bagatto, who had been Assistant under Monsignor Fuerth, remained with the new Pastor. These two priests, dedicated first and foremost to the salvation of souls, were often referred to as a "good team". Each knew his duty and carried it out in a most amicable manner.

Bulldozers were the order of the day on part of the church property. An old shed, built before the turn of the century and which had served its purpose well, was the first to go. The back yard of the church and the rectory was a conglomeration of weeds, small clumps of perennials, bushes and grass here and there, extending through to John Street. Before many weeks went by, it was all levelled and prepared for a badly-needed church parking lot. When seen today, paved, with a median of green grass and beds of flowers, it is difficult to visualize what it was once. A beautiful statue of Our Blessed Mother stands guard in the parking lot and it is lighted at night. Truly, a most inspiring sight!

The front lawn of the house was cleaned up; the fish pond was filled in; shrubs and sprigs of trees and bushes removed; parts of the lawn sodded and re-seeded. Soon a fresh, green carpet graced the approach to the rectory. When Father Brisson felt he had won the confidence of the parishioners, he introduced the system of tithing. This caught on very quickly and soon Sunday collections began to climb.

The inside of the church, while magnificent in structure, was dark and dingy — dark pews, dark altar furniture and over-sized frames on the Stations of The Cross. While the grounds were being put in order, the inside was getting its face-lift. The church walls and the ceiling were painted; the pews were sanded and finished in a light shade; the frames were removed from the Stations of The Cross and the pictures of The Stations repainted, the arches on either side of the main altar were removed, thus leaving the centre part as a back drop. The old altar was replaced by a new Italian marble altar, the gift of James Henderson, one of the oldest parishioners and this altar faced the congregation. A new pulpit replaced the high-rise one; the altar railing was shortened and replaced by a marble one. Green carpet was installed in the sanctuary, complemented by gold drapes on the back drop.

Then to the sacristy. New cupboard replaced the out-dated ones; wardrobes were built for the altar boys' cassocks and surplices and new wash basins were installed.

A new heating system was installed in the church and new wrought-iron gates to the baptistry. The old vestibule at the front of the church was replaced by glass doors, as well as glass doors at the other two front entrances. The old confessionals at the back of the church gave way to two new ones, situated at the front of the church.

While all these material benefits were being taken care of, the spiritual life of the Parish was by no means forgotten. Excellent, thought-provoking sermons; Forty Hours Devotion yearly; Missions and special speakers as well as loving care of the sick, the shut-ins and those with terminal illnesses were all part of the ministry.

As the tired, old rectory looked on, it was as if it was saying "What about me?" Eventually, its turn came for the wrecker's hammer. The house was demolished and on the same site, the present lovely new rectory was built. Electrically-heated, with electronic garage doors, it is attached to the church. Many generous donations were forthcoming for this project. The three offices, the dining room, the appliances for the convenience of the house-keeper, were all donated by families and

individuals. A special apartment for the house-keeper was built in the new rectory. Open House was held to mark the formal opening and various couples from the Parish were asked to act as guides and hosts and hostesses in the well-furnished rooms.

In 1965, Reverend Father Bagatto was appointed Pastor of one of the London churches, and Reverend Father Joseph Mariani became Associate Pastor of Sacred Heart. Father Mariani was a most learned man, having five languages at his command, but most of all, he was a humble, dedicated priest, with his prime concern — the salvation of souls. He was unselfishly active, visiting the sick and the shut-ins, parishioners' homes and the schools. He brought much comfort to the terminally ill and to the bereaved and grieving families. Father Mariani left Ingersoll in 1970, having been appointed

Associate Pastor at St. Mary's Parish in Simcoe. Five short months later, he died in Chicago, where he was spending a short holiday.

By 1965, Sacred Heart included a church with a new look inside; a parking lot; a new rectory, plus three enlarged schools in the Parish. The next item on the agenda was the hall, which was badly in need of attention. Father Brisson had formed a Parish Council, made up primarily of the heads of the various organizations of the Parish, plus a few experienced men of the congregation. The purpose of this Council was to act as an Advisory Board, in matters pertaining to church property and its upkeep.

After much discussion, it was deemed advisable to demolish the old hall and erect a new one on the same site. The wrecking crew moved in, and in short order the ground was levelled. The sparkling new hall began

to take shape — with its large auditorium, stage, a special meeting room and a deluxe kitchen, plus washrooms and cloak room. To say that this new hall is used is the understatement of the year. The formal opening of Henderson Hall took place in 1969 with a Parish dinner, to which interested citizens of the town were invited.

During Father Brisson's tenure here, the houses on the east side of John Street (which were already owned by Sacred Heart Parish) were demolished, to make way for a larger playground area for the school and more parking space.

The task for which Father Brisson had been appointed was now for all intents and purposes completed, and in July, 1970, he was appointed Pastor of St. Mary's Church in Tillsonburg."

When Msgr. Grespan was appointed Pastor of Sacred Heart Church, Ingersoll, succeeding Father Brisson, he had already given quite a few years of service to the Diocese of London. Following his ordination in 1941, he had taken post-graduate studies in the Angelicum in Rome, obtaining a doctorate in Canon Law. For a brief period he had served as secretary to the then Apostolic Delegate in Ottawa, and afterwards moved to the Chancery Office of the Diocese of London, as Vice Chancellor and Chancellor "in spiritualibus" under Bishop Cody and Bishop Carter. It was while there that he was honored by Pope Paul who named him a Prelate of Honor.

After 16 years in the Chancery Office Msgr. Grespan, in 1968, was appointed Pastor of St. Mary's Church, London. He accepted this challenge eagerly and enjoyed his two years of service there.

Bishop Carter then appointed Msgr. Grespan to Sacred Heart Parish in 1970. Seen, over the past decade, as a firm, but fair disciplinarian with a marvellous sense of humour, his dedication to the Church and its people has gained the respect of the entire community.

Within the parish, he shares his impressive theological knowledge with people of all ages and provides comfort and counsel when needed as well as joining them in happy times.

Within the town itself he is respected for his leadership qualities and appreciated for his friendliness and warm smile.

"Monsignor Grespan had inherited a sizeable debt on the new Hall, but with his well-known expertise, this debt was soon liquidated. When the Sisters of St. Joseph left Ingersoll in 1968, the Convent was rented as a private home and was later sold. The proceeds from this sale were credited to the Hall debt.

"The church roof repairs were carried out and the building was insulated. The green carpet and the gold back drop of the sanctuary were replaced with red broadloom and red back drop. The same red broadloom was installed on the stairway leading to the choir loft. The bricks on the outside of the church were cleaned."³

A new muted red carpet was installed in the sacristy and in the hallway leading to the Church. This project was carried out with financial assistance from the Catholic Women's League. This same organization also contributed substantially to the new look in the Church and the liquidation of the debt on the Hall.

The windows in the nave of the Church which had been donated by late parishioners, were badly in need of renovation or replacement. After much discussion,

thought and estimates, it was found to be more economical to have them replaced. Shortly after this decision was announced, all eight windows were donated. They were installed in early 1972. The triple windows in the transepts beside the confessionals needed attention. They were found to be in fair condition, and could be cleaned and reinforced at one-third the cost of

new ones. Accordingly this work was carried out in 1978, and was paid for by donations from ten interested parishioners.

For some years, a new or renovated pipe organ had been a priority with Monsignor Grespan. As the centenary of Sacred Heart Parish drew nearer, enthusiasm accelerated and this became a main project. Again with much financial assistance from the Catholic Women's League and several private donations from parishioners, a new organ was within sight. Early in 1979, dismantling of the old organ was begun and soon the new organ graced the choir-loft. Strains from the new organ were first heard on Easter Sunday, April 15, 1979.

From 1832 to 1850, when the Parish was a Mission, the following priests were in charge: Reverend Fathers Veriotte, Burke, Mills, Lees, O'Dwyer, Quinlan.

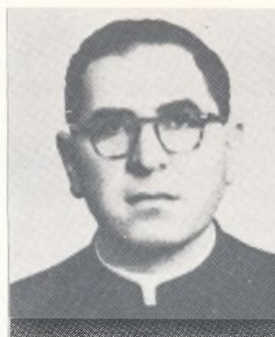
Associate Pastors — 1970-80

Quite a number of Associate Pastors have been with Monsignor Grespan during the years, moving on after gaining valuable experience with him.

Father Joseph Mariani had left in 1970, to become Associate Pastor of St. Mary's in Simcoe. In the same year Monsignor Morrison, a native son of the Parish, came to Sacred Heart, after a long and distinguished career in the Diocese of London; but failing health forced him to give up within a year.

In 1971, Monsignor Grespan invited Father J. Klezjeck, a Dominican, who had been stationed at Holy Cross Mission in Woodstock, to come to Sacred Heart.

However, Father Klezjeck remained in the Parish only nine months, and Monsignor Grespan carried on alone. Father Josef Denys assisted on weekends, and Father

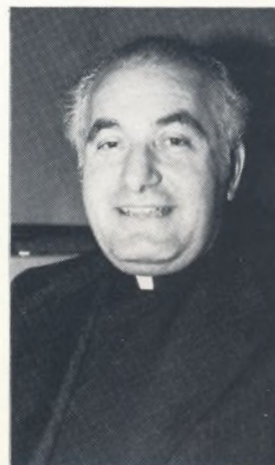

Mike Dalton of Sacred Heart Villa in Courtland, came to Sacred Heart Parish whenever his duties at the Villa permitted. In 1974, Father James Blonde was named Associate Pastor in Ingersoll, where he remained for two years. In 1976, he was appointed Pastor of Our Lady of Mercy Parish in Sarnia. Father Denys returned in 1976, as Associate Pastor, and stayed for a year before being assigned to St. Boniface's at Zurich.

Father Robert Morrissey was named Associate Pastor in the Fall of 1977. Monsignor Grespan and Father Morrissey together look after the spiritual and temporal needs of the Parish.

Coming to Sacred Heart in 1977, Father Morrissey brought, and still brings, to the Parish a youthfulness, a joie-de-vivre which has given to the Parish, especially to the young people, tremendous enthusiasm and gratitude for his work on their behalf. His main concern and responsibilities are with the youth, but he enjoys a good relationship with all members of the Parish.

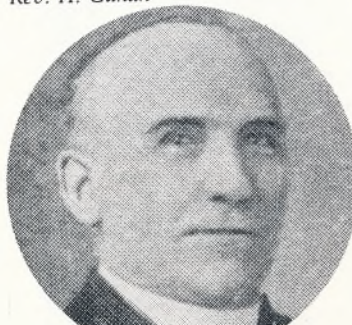

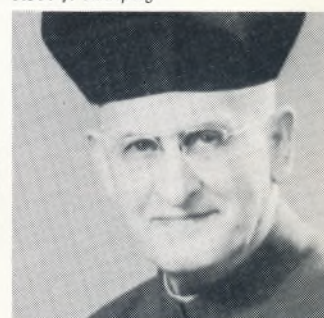

The People of Sacred Heart

The seeds of Catholic faith were planted deeply in this area by the Irish, stalwart and sturdy men and women, who appreciated their Catholic faith. These good people had many hardships before them, as they sought their fortune in the New Land.

There were only plank roads and very primitive homes made from logs, laboriously hewn from the surrounding forests. Oxen were the mode of transportation and over-sized lumber wagons were not the most comfortable accommodation. Many Ingersoll forefathers were carried lovingly by their parents who, on foot, brought their children, to the fountain of spiritual life. Then came the arduous journey home to their log cabins. There, they learned the meaning of love and service to God, and the true meaning of the Catholic Faith.

In those early years and a great many years thereafter, the Missionary priests who visited the area from time to time, instilled in the hearts of these good children a deep love of God, His church and His Blessed Mother. Very, very slowly, conditions improved and over the years, the children grew, matured and married. With families of their own, a new settlement was born. So much so, that around the turn of the century, the first and second concessions of Dereham Township were called affectionately 'Tipperary'.

The Irish were predominant until around 1920, when people from Italy began to arrive and settle in Beachville. The Italians brought with them their precious Catholic faith, with a special devotion to St. Anthony. When they first came, they lived in homes owned by the Cyanamid, where most of the men worked. However, before too many years went by, they began building their own beautiful homes, with gardens to complement the surroundings.

These good people also brought with their families, their own special cultures which have added much to the church and the community. Friendliness and hospitality are among their many virtues. Over the next few years, persons from France, Hungary, Poland, Lithuania and other parts of Europe immigrated to this region of Ontario. Each of these ethnic groups has added its own cultures and talents to the Parish. Around 1945, after the Second World War, many families from Holland came to Canada and settled in this district. They bought farms, improved them and today some of the finest farms in the Parish are owned and operated by families of Dutch origin. Just as the Italians and other ethnic groups have fitted in very well so far as the spiritual life of the Parish is concerned, the people from Holland are leaving their mark on Parish and community life.

Schools of the Parish

Sacred Heart School

Reverend Father M. J. Lynch is to be given credit for establishing the first Catholic School in Ingersoll in 1858. A small frame building on Carnegie Street was the scene, some distance from the church.

However, in 1860, a new school was built on church property on John Street. There is little information available on this particular school. It was of frame construction and shortly after it was built, it was doubled in size.

This building was used until 1873 when the Parish purchased additional property on John Street, extending through to Bell Street. In that year, a red brick school was erected, and the old school was disposed of, for the sum of \$45.00. The old school was divided and now forms the front sections of the homes at 42 and 46 Bell Street. The new school was built at a cost of \$1,875.15. In the Fall of 1878, Father Boubat invited the Sisters of St. Joseph to come to Ingersoll as teachers. Father Boubat gave up his home to the Sisters and had another home built for himself. For reasons not recorded the Sisters left Ingersoll in February 1883, and the teaching was taken over by lay teachers.

At the request of Father Molphy in 1889, four sisters of St. Joseph returned to Ingersoll to take charge of the school. The attendance was fifty-four in one room and seventy in the other. From then on, enrolment fluctuated from year to year. In 1915 there were seventy-five pupils, but in 1919, the school was so overcrowded that some of the pupils attended on a part-time basis. Mrs. James Brady was engaged as a part-time teacher and her class was in a make-shift room in the basement of the school. Because of severe over-crowding and the state of the school, the Inspector condemned it in 1919. It thus became imperative that something had to be done about a building more suitable for school purposes. The Pastor, Father Gnam, had had his eye on the Rumsey house, which was situated just south of the church. Father Gnam, as mentioned earlier, won over the opposition and the property was bought. Renovations were carried out and by January 1921, one room was ready. By September of that year, three rooms were in prime condition.

Since then, Sacred Heart School has never looked back. Three additions have been built around the old school.

In 1925, a continuation school was begun and eventually, the pupils were able to take two years of secondary school at Sacred Heart. Tremendous co-operation was given by the teachers and the parishioners.

The school now boasts ten rooms, a gymnasium, a library, and offices, as well as kitchen facilities. Sacred Heart Parish can be justly proud of the achievements of pupils from their school over the years.

Unfortunately, in 1968 the convent was closed for economical reasons, and the Sisters of St. Joseph left Ingersoll. For the following two years, two Sisters came from the convent in Woodstock to teach, but then the convent in that city was closed. The teaching staff in Ingersoll is comprised entirely of lay teachers at this time.

St. Anthony's School, Beachville

For some years, the people of Beachville wanted a school of their own in that village. After many arguments they finally won and their champion was the late Father Hollerhead, Assistant Priest at Sacred Heart.

Property, just off the main highway, was acquired. The first sod was turned on November 16, 1958 by Monsignor Fuerth, assisted by Father Hollerhead. A one-room brick school would serve the newly-established Separate School section, constituting North and West Oxford and the village of Beachville, with an estimated attendance of thirty-five. The school was built in 1959 and was named St. Anthony's, for the Patron Saint of the Italian community. The school was enlarged in 1961.

St. Joseph's School, Thamesford

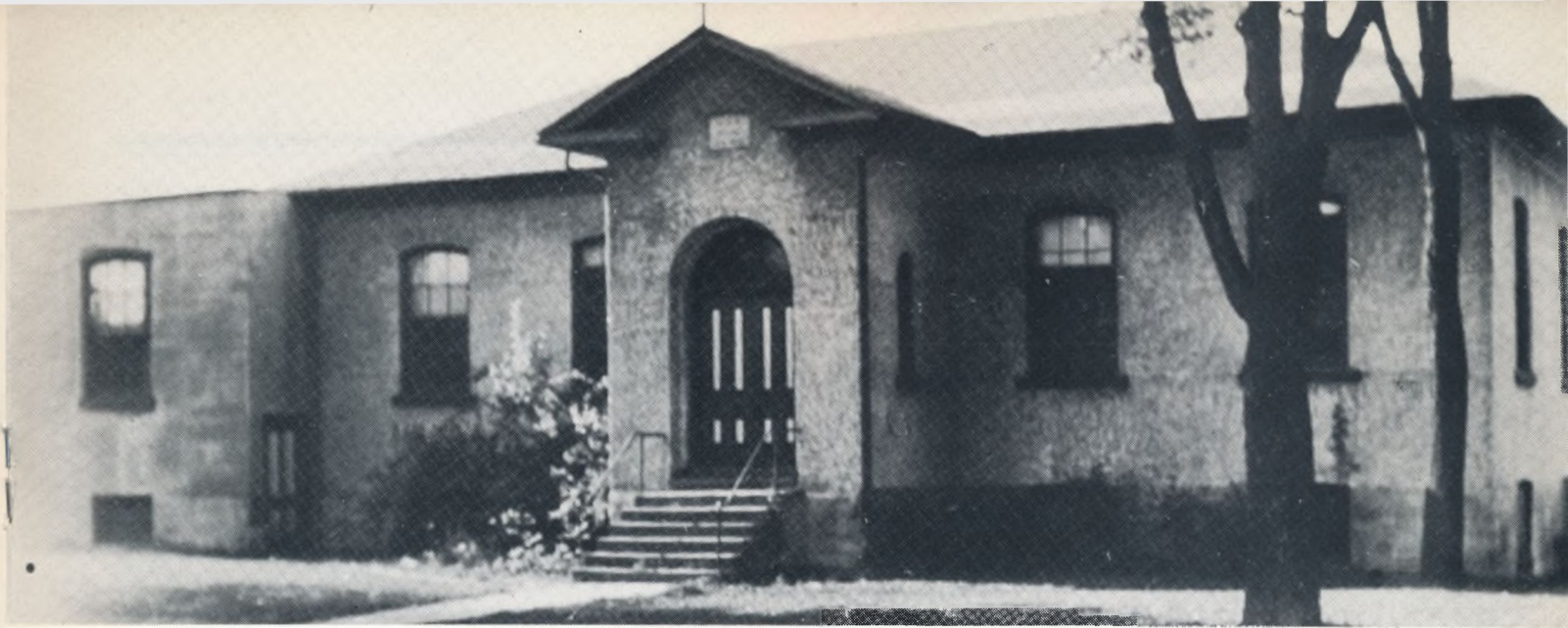
St. Joseph's School in Thamesford was built in 1964, to take care of the increasing number of pupils in that area of the Parish. It was blessed on the Feast of St. Joseph, March 19. Like St. Anthony's, it is located just off the highway, but readily visible from that well-travelled road.

Pupils from St. Joseph's have won many awards in the past fifteen years including public speaking and music. Some of these children comprise one of the church choirs at Sacred Heart.

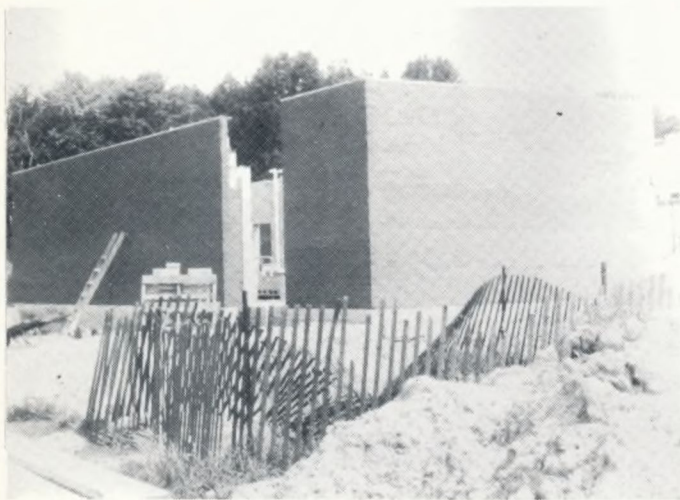
When it was announced in 1976, that St. Anthony's was to be closed because of declining enrolment, vehement protests came from the parents of the pupils involved. They had waited many years to have their own school and they were not about to give up without a fight. However, after many meetings and arguments, St. Anthony's was closed in 1977. The pupils were assimilated into Sacred Heart and St. Jude's schools.

St. Jude's School, Ingersoll

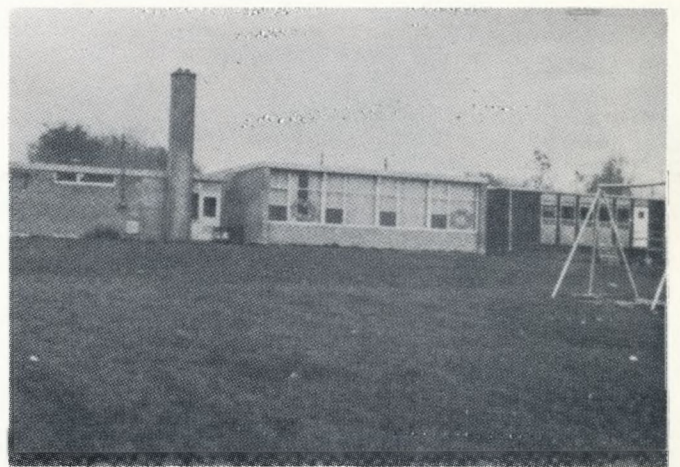
St. Jude's School, situated in the south-east section of Ingersoll, was built in 1974, and was officially opened on February 2, 1975. St. Jude's is a subsidiary of Sacred Heart School, and accommodates Grades 1 to 3, after which the pupils attend Sacred Heart School.

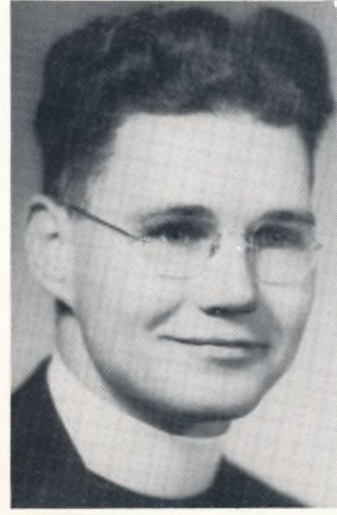

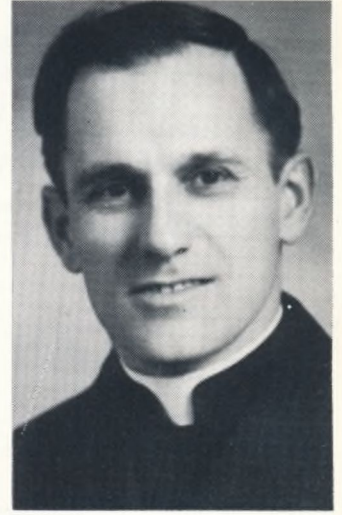

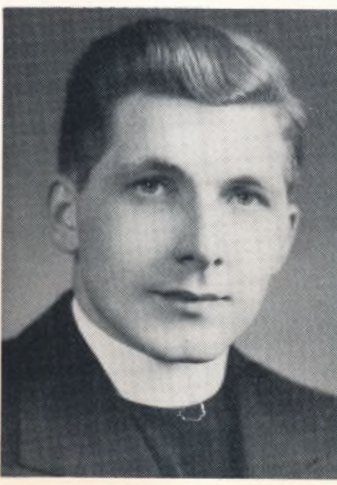

Quinlan, Burns, Delaney, Drake, Curran, Kennedy, O'Neill, Dunegan, Duffy, Davis, Hasket, Allen, Horan, Fahey, Sherman, Dunn, Egan, Kelly, Carlin McNamara, McCauley, O'Kane.

This record of baptisms, marriages and interments makes no pretense of recording the first of these in the mission. Undoubtedly these sacraments were administered prior to the dates indicated; but they are not found in the archives of the Diocese of London. Prior to 1856 the mission was attended by missionaries from other areas. So one can find in the records of St. Basil's, Brantford, records for the 1840's, but no record is given concerning the place where these sacraments were administered.

First Baptismal Record

Carolina Green was baptized (August 15, 1850) by the Reverend Father Monahan. Carolina, aged five months, of the lawful Marriage of William Green and Ann O'Halloran.

Parish Societies and Organizations

Over the years, many organizations and societies have been active in the Parish.

The Altar Guild

A group of ladies who looked after the linens, repair of surplices and soutanes, and other necessities pertinent to the beauty of the Celebration of Mass.

The Young Ladies' Sodality

First begun in the 1880's — given up later because of lack of membership — and then revived in the early 1920's. This Society flourished and grew in membership until the 1950's when it was disbanded.

The League of the Sacred Heart

This was begun around 1910 and in 1964 was cancelled.

The Holy Name Society

This was in existence from around 1900 until the 1950's — and few men in the Parish did not belong.

The T.C. Club (Tea cup)

This was begun in the 1920's and composed of a group of young women — sewing for the orphans at Mt. St. Joseph Orphanage in London. These ladies met each week to sew many needed garments and to have a social evening. Each one paid 5c per week and from their combined fees, they remained self-sustaining. Enduring and solid friendships were made among the members, and many children less fortunate than some were warmly clothed. The group gave up their good work around 1950.

The Knights of Columbus

It received its Charter in Ingersoll in 1919 and its Chaplain was Reverend Father Gnam. A few years later, it was named the MONSIGNOR FUERTH COUNCIL. The first Grand Knight was the late A. H. McDermott, and the present Grand Knight is John Van Sprousen. Total number of Fourth Degree Knights is six. Among the many commitments they have is a substantial contribution to the education of student priests. They are also deeply involved in the Development and Peace Fund movement. When the new hospital was opened in Ingersoll in 1950, the Knights of Columbus furnished one of the rooms.

The Catholic Women's League

This was organized in Ingersoll in 1921. Reverend Father Fuerth was its first Chaplain and Mrs. James Brady, the first President. The Catholic Women's League is primarily a spiritual society, working under the motto "FOR GOD AND CANADA". As it is a national

organization, there are certain obligations that must be met. However, after meeting all these obligations, the Catholic Women's League has made substantial contributions toward the renovation and re-decoration of the church, the building of the hall, the Diocese of London, the needy, the Missions and orphans. Last, but by no means least, is a very generous contribution toward the new organ in the church. Also, when the new hospital was built, one room was furnished in the name of the Catholic Women's League.

The ladies from Beachville, about 1945, formed a Committee, known as St. Anthony's Committee. These ladies, all members of the Catholic Women's League, worked on their own, holding their own meetings in the homes of the various members. Beautiful sewing and handwork for which these good people are famous, was turned out for the missions. This Committee, after much hesitation, was phased out in the early 1950's.

The Catholic Youth Organization

(CYO) was organized in the 1940's to meet the needs of the youth of the Parish, and was very successful. It has now become the Youth Club, and many more meaningful activities have been added to those first incorporated. Meetings, social get-togethers and participations with other Youth Groups in neighboring Catholic centres are but a few of their activities. Sports and study of the liturgy make this a stepping-stone for the youthful members to integrate in to older member societies.

The Christian Family Movement

A more recently organized group, focuses attention on the preservation of the family. At their monthly meetings, family problems are discussed, relationships within the family are probed and individual questions are answered by those who have experienced similar problems. This group is being further strengthened by involvement in Marriage and Family Life Encounters.

The Parish Council

This came into being in 1966. Their function is to advise and consult with the Parish priests on major decisions involving the Parish as a unit. It is an elected body, representing all sections of the Parish.

Prayer Groups

There are two active Prayer Groups in the Parish at the present time. The members meet each week to pray, read Scripture, visit the sick — and help those in need of consolation. It is hoped that more of these groups will be formed in the not-too-distant future.

The Choirs at Sacred Heart

At present, there are three choirs at Sacred Heart Church. This church has been noted for its outstanding calibre of singers, even before the turn of the century. Early in 1940, there was a crisis, which resulted in the choir almost being eliminated. Eventually, after a few years, the choir was reorganized and slowly built to what it is today. The adult choir also participates in inter-denominational services held in the town.

The Youth Choir which sings at the Saturday-Sunday Mass is an enthusiastic group of young people. Accompanied by guitar and flute, they bring a new meaning to present-day church music.

The third choir, composed of elementary school boys and girls, from St. Joseph's School at Thamesford, provide excellent renditions of hymns at the noon Mass on Sundays. The choir is accompanied by a guitar.

The New Pipe Organ

"The two manual and pedal organ in the rear gallery of the Church was first used on Easter Sunday, April 15th, 1979. It was completed later that month. Two fifths of the present pipework was originally part of the earlier organ. The funds to purchase the organ, built by Principal Pipe Organ Company, Woodstock, Ontario, was provided by the Catholic Women's League catering committee and several private benefactors. It is the memorial of the church's centenary."

The Altar Boys

The altar boys of Sacred Heart Parish have always been groups of boys — well-trained and polite and intent upon their carrying out the duty of assisting the celebrant of the Mass, as candle bearers, and generally waiting on the priest.

Many of the altar boys have gone on to be priests themselves, while others have followed professions. At present (1979) there are forty altar boys.

It is an unwritten rule that altar boys leave the serving of Mass when they enter High School, in order to make room for the new boys who are being readied to take their places.

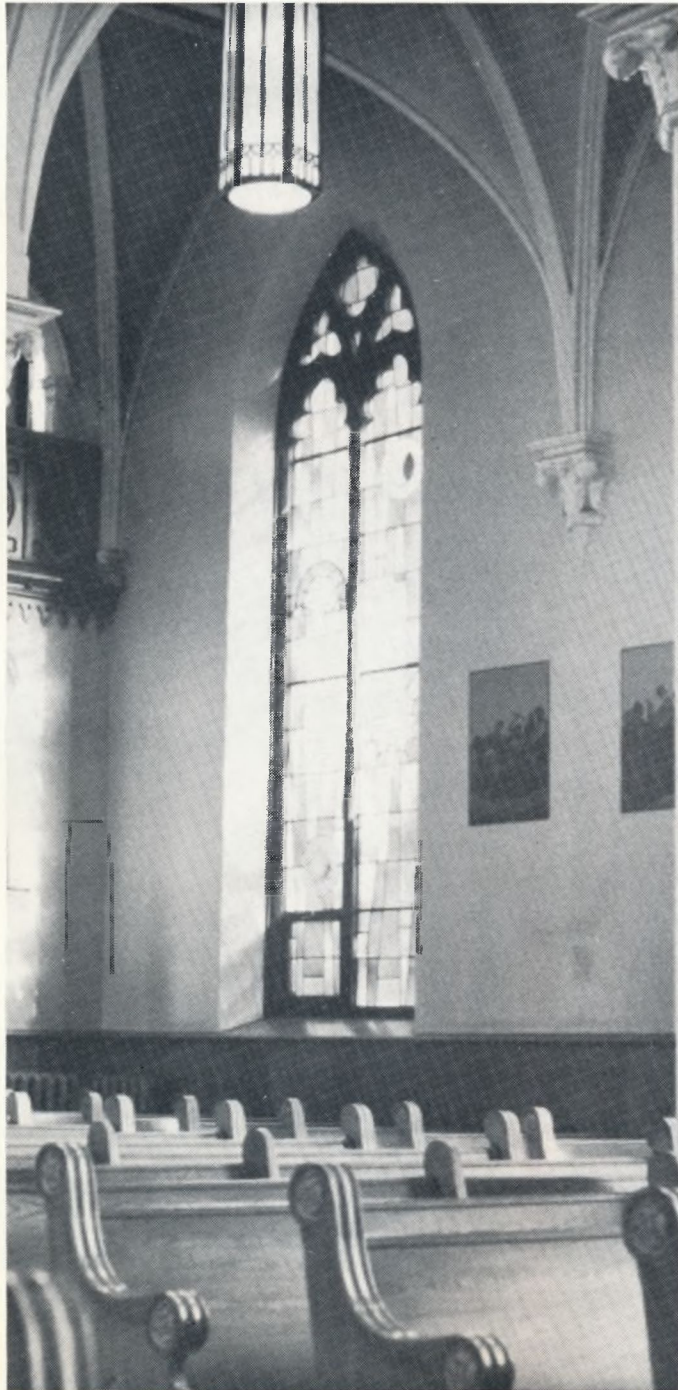

The Windows of Sacred Heart Church



The description of the windows of Sacred Heart Church which follows was kindly supplied by the designer and craftsman, Mr. Christopher Wallis, of London, Ontario.

Symbols

Window No. 1 — Flowers, Plants and Trees

1. VIOLETS symbol of Humility
2. ORANGE The Orange tree regarded as a symbol of Purity, Chastity and Generosity.
3. ILEX (Holly) The Ilex or Holly Oak, because of its thorny leaves is regarded as a symbol of Christ's Crown of Thorns. Therefore it is symbolic of the Passion of Christ.
4. ROSE The Red Rose is a symbol of Martyrdom. The rose also alludes to the Virgin Mary and the Nativity.

Window No. 2 — Religious objects using the five senses of man.

1. CHALICE taste
2. AMPULLA feel
3. BELLS hearing
4. CENSER sight and smell

Window No. 3 — Animals, Birds and Insects

1. DOLPHIN resurrection and salvation
2. PELICAN symbolizes Christ's sacrifice on the Cross
3. COCK repentance — one of the symbols of the Passion
4. DOVE purity and peace

Window No. 4 — Eucharistic symbolism

1. BAPTISM
2. HOLY EUCHARIST
3. HOLY SPIRIT
4. HAND OF GOD

Significance of symbols for windows 5, 6, 7 and 8

5. Celestial symbols.

- a. Rainbow — symbol of union and as it appeared after the flood, it is also the symbol of pardon and the reconciliation given to the human race by God.
- b. and c. Sun and Moon — the sun alone represents Christ — based on the prophecy of Malachi 4:2. Combined, they represent the Virgin Mary — taken from Revelations 12:1. Can also represent Our Lord's crucifixion.
- d. Star — Divine guidance and favour.

6. Old Testament.

- a. Star of David — the Star represents the power of Jahwah — God the Father, which reaches all corners of the earth.
- b. Fall of man — the Serpent and the Apple.
- c. The Ten Commandments.
- d. Seven branched candlesticks — old testament worship.

Centennial Celebration

7. Our Lord's Passion.

- a. Chalice and Cross — Gethsemane.
- b. Empty bag and thirty pieces of silver — betrayal
- c. Pillar and scourges — the trial and condemnation of Jesus Christ.
- d. Crown of Thorns.

8. Symbols of the Virgin Mary.

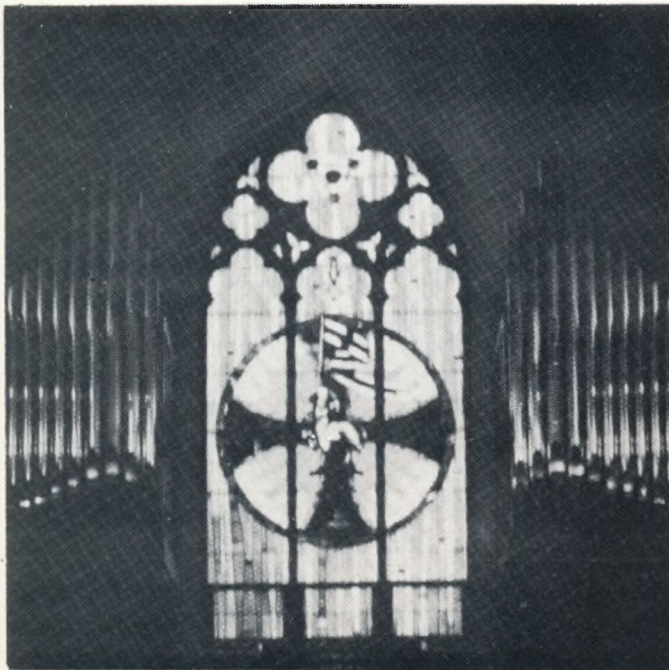
- a. The Lily — Virginité and Purity
- b. The Rosary
- c. Starry Crown — Queen of Heaven.
- d. The Virgin's Monogram — MARIA.

East Window centred on the Choir Loft

The design represents God's Love through the symbol of the Risen Christ Church—the Banner of Victory.

The Red Cross represents His supreme sacrifice, the golden rays, His Divinity within a circle, symbolising His Eternity or never-ending Existence.

The Twelve Stars allude Mary, Queen of Heaven. The Holy spirit offering Seven Sacraments and the Holy Trinity complete the symbolism.



September 9, 1979, was the date set by Msgr. Grespan, in consultation with the Parish Council, for the celebration of the Centennial of Sacred Heart Church.

The Centennial Mass of Thanksgiving was celebrated at 5 p.m. Principal Celebrant was the Most Reverend J. M. Sherlock, Bishop of London. Eighteen priests concelebrated with him: Msgr. Grespan, Father Morrissey; Fathers J. Mockler, J. Hennessey, J. Brisson, J. McCormick, W. Dewan, C.S.P., J. Williams, J. Maurice, S.F.M., W. Maurice, S.J., R. Glavin, M. Dalton, R. Warden, M. Grootsholten, S.C.J., W. Morris, J. Bagatto, J. Denys, S. J. McDonald.

Three choirs of the Parish, with good participation by the congregation at various points throughout the Mass, contributed an outstanding musical program. They were: the Adult choir, Randy Mills, Director and Organist; Youth Folk Choir, Mary Cooper, Director; and St. Joseph's School Folk Choir, Betty DeGraaf, Director.

Appropriately the Gift Bearers were Sisters who were native daughters of the Parish: Sisters Mary Catherine, Innocentia, Mary James and Jolita.

A delightful interlude took place during the Mass when Bishop Sherlock presented the Bene Merenti Medal to Miss Anna McSherry, organist for many years, and secretary and housekeeper at Sacred Heart Rectory for an incredible forty-five years. Never was such a Papal Honor more richly deserved!

In an inspiring homily, Bishop Sherlock took as his main theme the mystery of the Incarnation.

Following the Mass a dinner was held at the Ingersoll District Memorial Centre at 7:30 p.m. Toastmaster was Mr. Jack Warden. In addition to Bishop Sherlock, greetings were brought from the Federal Government by Dr. Bruce Halliday, M.P.; and from the Provincial Government also by Dr. Halliday, speaking on behalf of Dr. Harry Parrot, M.P.P.; from Oxford County by Mr. Ken Webster, Warden; from the Town of Ingersoll by His Worship Mayor Douglas Harris. Father Joseph Hennessey, a native son of the Parish, spoke for the native clergy and sisters; Father Joseph Brisson, only living former pastor, for former parish clergy and sisters; Reverend W. C. Veenstra brought greetings from the Ingersoll Ministerial Association; and Msgr. Grespan extended his sincere thanks to all present, and to all who co-operated in making the day so memorable. Sister Mary Leo Kirwin, a native daughter of the parish, gave the closing prayer.

On Sunday, November 4, the Canadian Legion paraded to Sacred Heart Church for the 10:00 a.m. Mass. By their participation in the Mass they emphasized the need to be reminded of the sacrifice made by those who lost their lives in war in defense of freedom.

On Sunday, November 11, Remembrance Day, the new organ was dedicated as a War Memorial.

Epilogue

Within the context of two thousand years of Christian civilization, a mere 140 years in the life of a small Catholic community situated in the vast North American Continent may seem rather irrelevant and negligible. And yet, historically it is precisely from the humble origins, steady growth and continued development of such communities as Sacred Heart Parish, Ingersoll, Ontario that the 'Good News' of the Risen Savior of humankind began to glow and spread and finally transform our whole Western world. It is a point of note, therefore, that the history of a mere parish can portray in miniature the story of Christianity itself.

Looking over the past ten years as the pastor of Sacred Heart I feel there is responsibility to the past, the present and the future. To begin with we must pay our reverent respect to those who have gone before us. We have indeed inherited great blessings and traditions from them. We have a "gold mine" in the past history of our parish in the example of individual lives, of strong faith, of dedicated priestly service, of devoted family life and of people totally loyal to God and to their parish.

The past fifteen years of social tension and unrest and even of liturgical and disciplinary changes within the Church itself, brought about by the needs of our time and spearheaded by the II Vatican Council, may have confused and perhaps even alienated some of our tradition-minded people; but, thanks to a new springtime of spiritual renewal evidenced by such movements as prayer and Bible study groups, Cor, Cursillos marriage encounters and weekend retreats have, thank God, strengthened and even deepened the faith of the majority of our people and rendered it more meaningful in their lives.

No one knows what tomorrow will bring, yet despite the turmoil, the troubles and the tensions of the 70's our legacy to the future is not inconsequential. Our record service to the community, the diocese and the Church Universal gives us every reason to hope that we have something to offer to the next decade and indeed the next century.

Besides Father Simon McDonald our friend and historian, our sincerest gratitude is expressed at this point to Mrs. Carman Mott of Ingersoll, the distinguished Editor of this booklet and to Ray Van Mierlo of our parish. Without their professional skill, artistic taste and tremendous generosity, this publication would not have been possible.

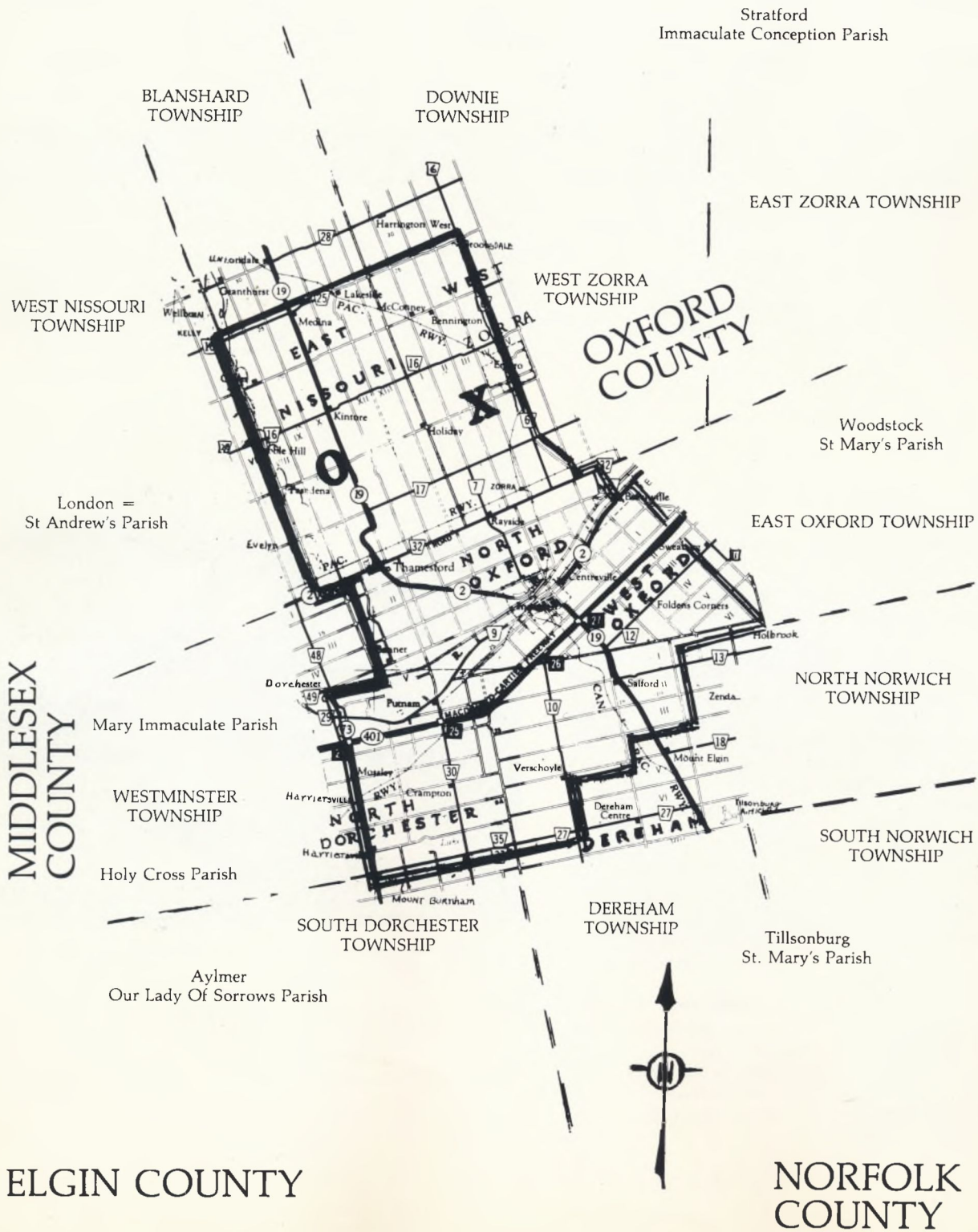
