Message from the Mayor

And again, we are in a completely different phase of the Coronavirus pandemic. We have a much higher vaccination rate, and Zorra has an employee vaccination policy

requiring all staff and council to be vaccinated.

Please encourage and help those not yet vaccinated to get vaccinated to protect their community. This is our path to a full return to normal.

Your Zorra Council has passed a resolution to begin consultation with relevant First Nations to develop an appropriate land acknowledgement policy for Zorra. By the time you read this I will have begun both formal and informal discussions with residents and representatives of First Nations on what they think of a possible land acknowledgement, and their relationship with Zorra.

Oxford County is currently considering changes to land use policy in the "agricultural reserve". Zorra Council, and you, will have opportunities for input. There are many changes being considered and I encourage you to search the Zorra or Oxford web pages for the draft document. None of this is finalized yet, please watch for your opportunities to get informed and give input over the coming months.

Housing is a major issue that needs to be addressed. We have rapidly gone from "housing is expensive" to "housing is unaffordable" for many people. This is a complex problem that requires all levels of government, and the private sector, to address. In Zorra and Oxford we need to do more with zoning to not only allow, but encourage, and require smaller, higher density, and more variety in, housing. We need to make spaces in our settlement areas for taller buildings to address the housing crisis, and stop sprawl into our farm fields.

Did you know Zorra is considering, but has not yet decided on, a possible new municipal office in Thamesford that could include a gym and childcare? Information is available on the Zorra website, get informed and talk to your Council.

While some refer to municipal government as the third order of government, anyone that has ever served on a council or worked within its administration will say it's the first order of government - it is the order of government closest to the people. Local Government Week was developed to celebrate the key role that Ontario local governments play in helping to define the character, priorities, amenities, and physical make-up of communities. The week is meant to educate students on the importance and operation of municipal government, engaging youth, and creating an interest in community leadership, while putting a face to local government staff and elected officials.

Local Government Week was scheduled for October 18th to October 22nd. Previously, the Township would host their Council meetings at the local schools in Zorra for Local Government Week. However, due to COVID-19 restrictions, Local Government Week went virtual again this year!

The Township switched up the format for the Local Government Week this year. In the past, the Township asked the grade 4/5 classes to present ideas to Council that they thought would make Zorra a better place to live, work, and play. This year the Township set up video calls with the Zorra public schools throughout October for a question-and-answer period with Mayor Ryan and Zorra staff. Mayor Marcus Ryan was joined by Steve Oliver, Director of Public Works, Deanna Kirwin, Fire Chief, Matt Brown, Director of Recreation and Facilities, and Alycia Wettlaufer, Legislative Coordinator/Deputy Clerk on the video calls.

REDUCED LOAD SEASON - February 15 - April 30

An early reminder to all drivers of heavy trucks and equipment that the reduced load season takes effect for the period of February 15 to April 30 inclusive each year. In accordance with By-law 21-03, signs will be posted on applicable Township roadways.

HALF LOAD SEASON RATIONALE

- · Minimize long term damage to infrastructure
- Problems caused when roads are soft often require major repairs
- Prevent additional damage to culverts and bridges
- Heavy loads do damage to road sub-base that is difficult to detect
- Changes in the size of agricultural equipment i.e. large liquid manure trailers
- Multiple aggregate producers in Township
- Infrastructure repair costs borne directly or indirectly by residents

All of the above lead to safety issues during Half Load Season.

Building and Drainage Department

SANITARY SEWAGE SYSTEMS

The Township Building Department now oversees the private sanitary sewage system (septic systems) approvals for Zorra. Historically, Southwestern Public Health managed this function, however it has been passed on to the Township to manage. If you have questions or concerns regarding these approvals contact the Building Department.

DRAINAGE

Legal Outlets:

With the pressure of too much work and not enough time, there may be a temptation to take shortcuts. We have been hearing about some tile drainage systems being directed to questionable outlets. This is a reminder that the following are NOT legal outlets:

- Roadside Ditches: You can only use roadside ditches as an outlet if permission is granted by the road authority. If permission is granted, we recommend that you secure the permission in WRITING.
- Private Ditches: Private ditches are private infrastructure and unless permission is given, another property owner has no right to connect a newly installed tile drainage system to a private ditch that flows across a neighbouring property. Similar to using a roadside ditch as an outlet, if permission is given, make sure it is in WRITING. If work needs to be done on the neighbouring property, make sure all parties are clear on cost-sharing and also that all parties are clear on the extent of work and the potential disruption of land.
- Municipal Drains: Municipal drains have a defined watershed; the lands within that watershed have paid for the construction and management of that drain and only these lands have the right to connect to the municipal drain. If you are installing tile drainage on a property, it is possible that only a portion of that property has the legal right to connect into that drain. If you are not sure, check with the local drainage superintendent before undertaking the work. If there is a section of land that is outside the limits of the watershed, you must ask for permission to connect those lands to the drain.
- Wetland or low area: Sometimes it's tempting to outlet
 a tile drainage system into a wetland area, particularly if
 the wetland is located on your client's property. However,
 before doing so, you should examine the area to determine
 if the out letting of the tile drainage system could be any
 impact on other property owners. If there could be, don't
 do it without first acquiring permission.

If a property owner is unable to secure an outlet, that owner has the right to petition their municipality under the Drainage Act for an outlet. Although it takes longer to get the outlet using the Drainage Act, when it is done, you can have confidence that the tile drainage work you perform will not result in legal action. If you still decide to take shortcuts on legal outlets, remember that the courts consider the tile drainage contractor to be an expert. You may want to check out the liability risk of you and your business.

CONSTRUCTION DRAINS

- Construction drains are initiated by a petition that is filed by the landowner, county or even the roads of a municipality.
- Council will either accept the petition or it can be rejected.
- If Council accepts the petition then Council will appoint an Engineer to do a study and a report.
- Drainage meetings will be arranged and notifications will be mailed to the landowners within the watershed.
- It is very important that ANY notifications that a landowner receives from the Township is FULLY understood by the landowner. It is essential for all landowners to understand all of the deadlines, appeal dates and all the financial implications of the drainage work.

12 DAYS OF HOLIDAY SAFETY

Water Fresh Trees Daily

It's time to trim that Christmas tree, and if you're using a real tree, buy a fresh tree and keep the base of the trunk in water at all times. Keep your tree away from any ignition source such as the fireplace, heaters or candles.

Check All Sets of Lights Before Decorating

Before you put those lights on the tree or around the front window check the cords closely. Discard any sets that are frayed or damaged.

Make Sure you Have Working Smoke Alarms

With family and friends spending extra time at your home over the holidays, it's a great time to check your smoke alarms. Replace smoke alarms if they are over 10 years old. Remember that you need working smoke alarms on every storey of your home and outside all sleeping areas. Test your alarms to make sure they will alert you and your family if a fire occurs, giving you the precious seconds you need to safely escape.

Make Sure you Have Working Carbon Monoxide Alarms

Carbon monoxide is an invisible, odourless gas that can quickly kill you. Replace any carbon monoxide alarms over seven years old. Installing carbon monoxide alarms in your home will alert you to the presence of this deadly gas.


Use Extension Cords Wisely

People often use extension cords for that extra set of lights or the dancing Santa in the corner. Extension cords should be used only as a temporary connection. Make sure cords never go under rugs as this can cause damage to the cord and cause a fire.

Make Sure Everyone Knows How To Get Out Safely If A Fire Occurs

Develop and practice a home fire escape plan with all members of the household and make sure someone helps young children, older adults or anyone else that may need assistance to evacuate. Once outside, stay outside and call 911 from a cell phone or neighbours house.

Give Space Heaters Space

If you are using space heaters to help take the chill off, remember to keep them at least one metre (3 feet) away from anything that can burn such as curtains, upholstery, or holiday decorations.

When You Go Out, Blow Out!

Candles can set the perfect mood for a holiday celebration, but remember to always blow out candles before leaving the room or going to bed. Keep lit candles safely away from children and pets and anything that can burn, such as curtains, upholstery, or holiday decorations. Be candle safe!

Keep Matches And Lighters Out Of The Sight And Reach Of Children

People often keep matches and lighters handy to light holiday candles. But matches and lighters can be deadly in the hands of children. If you smoke, have only one lighter or book of matches and keep them with you at all times.

Watch What You Heat!

The holiday season is one of the busiest times of the year, which means it's easy to get distracted from what we are doing. Cooking fires most commonly occur when cooking is left unattended. Always stay in the kitchen when cooking; especially if using oil or high temperatures. If a pot catches fire, carefully slide a tight-fitting lid over the pot to smother the flames and then turn off the heat.

1 Encourage Smokers To Smoke Outside

Careless smoking is the leading cause of fatal fires. If you do allow smoking indoors use large, deep ashtrays that can't be knocked over and make sure cigarette butts are properly extinguished

Please be advised that the winter parking restrictions will be enforced starting November 15, 2021 and remain in place until March 31, 2022.

Parking is not permitted on any road or street from 1:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. 7 days a week during this period. Any vehicle owner found in violation of this by-law could be fined or have their vehicle removed/ towed at owners' expense. The fine for this violation is set at \$50.

RECREATION VEHICLES

Notice to all RV/boat owners. The Zoning By-law allows front yard driveway storage of RVs and boats from May 1 – October 31. After October 31, front driveway storage of these vehicles shall be removed and stored elsewhere. The vehicles may be stored on your side lot or rear lot provided that they meet the 5ft setback.

LEAVES AND SNOW:

Did you know that it is a By-law infraction to push your leaves and snow onto the roadway or neighbouring properties? Depositing your leaves on the road or private property is considered dumping and is may result in a significant fine of \$700. Also depositing snow or ice onto public or private property carries a fine of \$200 and up to \$700! If you wish to review the Clean and Clear By-law it can be found on our website at www.zorra.ca

PRE-AUTHORIZED PAYMENT PLAN FOR YOUR TAXES

Sign up now for the quarterly, 10 or 12-month Pre-Authorized Payment Plan for 2022.

If you are interested in enrolling in this payment plan for 2021, you can find an authorization form on our website at www.zorra.ca or call Kelly at 519-485-2490 ext 7222. Applications need to be submitted as soon as possible to ensure enrolment for 2021.

If you are currently enrolled in the pre-authorized payment plan, you DO NOT have to re-apply each year, only if there is a change with the account.

ON-LINE OR TELEPHONE BANKING

Online or telephone banking is available for making monthly, arrears, or regular instalments. All banks accept Zorra as a client and the account number required is your ROLL NUMBER from your tax bill, starting after 3227. For example, 012-010-13100-0000, you would enter this as 01201013100, if an error occurs, please add the extra four zeros at the end and try again.

ETRANSFER PAYMENTS

eTransfer is now available, by using accountsreceivable@zorra. ca. In the message field, please indicate what you are paying or purchasing from Zorra.

2022 AND 2023 PROPERTY ASSESSMENT

Property Taxes for the 2022 and 2023 taxation years will continue to be based on the January 1, 2016 valuation date. Property assessments will remain the same as they were for the 2021 tax year, unless there has been changes to your property.

WHEN WILL MY 2022 TAX BILL BE MAILED?

Tax bills will be mailed the first week of February, with due dates of February 28 and May 31, 2022. Unfortunately, legislation states that the municipality are only allowed to bill half of the previous year's taxes, therefore an increase/decrease in taxes for ratepayers will not be until the Final 2022 Tax Bill which are processed in July 2022.

ZORRA COMMUNITY POLICING COMMITTEE

The Zorra Community Policing Committee (ZCPC) advises Zorra Council on all aspects of the provisions of police related matters in the Township of Zorra and promotes and maintains communication with the public on such matters.

ZCPC meetings are held on a quarterly basis on the third Tuesday of the quarter at 6:00 p.m. at the Township Office.

ZORRA RECREATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Zorra Recreation Advisory Committee (ZRAC) is the Township of Zorra's longest standing advisory committee.

The purpose of the Zorra Recreation Advisory Committee (ZRAC) is to make recommendations to Council on all aspects relating to the provision of leisure, recreation, parks, trails, arts and culture services in the Township of Zorra whilst adhering to the visions put forward in the Township of Zorra's Strategic Plan and the Recreation, Arts and Culture Master Plan.

ZRAC meetings are held on the fourth Tuesday of the month, excluding the months of July, August, and December when no ZRAC meetings are held. The 2022 ZRAC meeting schedule will be posted on the Township website in December.

ZORRA MULTI-USE COURTS COMMITTEE

The Zorra Multi-Use Courts Committee advises Council on the potential multi-use courts being constructed in Zorra Township at the Thamesford District Recreation Centre and the Embro-Zorra Community Centre. The committee recently submitted their project proposal to Council in October. You can view the proposal on our Township website!

ZMCC meetings are held on the second Tuesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in the Beaty Room at the Thamesford library. The next ZMCC meeting is January 27, 2022.



ZORRA SPLASH COMMITTEE

The Zorra Splash Committee was formed by Township Council and held their first meeting on May 9, 2019. A core objective of the Committee was to enable the construction of an Embro splash pad by encouraging community support of the project and lead community fundraising efforts. Since their first meeting, the Committee has work tirelessly toward their fundraising goal. Despite setbacks and difficulties caused by the COVID-19 pandemic the ZSC has held regular meetings and public events. They have cooked meals, organized car washes, bottle drives and paint nights. The Committee's effort and strong community support has been rewarded and they have now completed their fundraising goal. As of October 6, 2021, the Committee has raised \$183,234.40 in donations from families, community organizations, local businesses, and grants. Township Council has previously supported \$75,000 in Zorra funds in the 2022 Capital Budget. The current fundraised and Township capital total is \$258,234.40, surpassing the initial \$250,000 project budget. At this time, the Zorra Splash Committee will pause active fundraising efforts. Donations will continue to be accepted until the project costs are finalized. Recreations staff will work with the committee on design criteria and publish a request for proposal in November. Final project costs will then be available for Township Council's approval in December. This will allow the Embro Splash Pad project to begin construction in spring 2022 and open for the hot summer months ahead. A huge congratulations to everyone involved!!

Oxford 4-H Club

4-H had many learn to do by doing opportunities this year. Youth were able to engage in various 4-H projects in Oxford and across the province through the virtual clubs that were available. Youth were also able to participate in the in-person projects available in Oxford.

Beef, dairy and fancy feather 4-H projects started their clubs with virtual meetings and then moved to in-person meetings. They each had an Achievement program to showcase what they had learned with their respective animals. In late October, Jack McKinlay's pullet (a female chicken less than a year old) was shown at the Ontario Poultry Breeders Show. This is a chicken that he hatched this year from his 4-H chickens he was given last year. He has Black Rose Comb Bantams. His pullet won her variety and won out of all the rose comb clean leg. His chicken was awarded Champion for the Junior division(Jack's age group).

The Community 4-H Club continued for the 15th year to participate in the Relay for Life, done virtually in June. The club met over zoom with the meeting theme of 'What's your plan' covering the topics of financial matters, food, health, community and careers. They were able to have a bank consultant presenter, step-by-step cooking of fettuccine alfredo & cheesecake, guest panel of young adults to talk about careers, played Kahoot games, guest panel of community organizations to learn about volunteering. Through the fundraising efforts of the club, \$10,286 was raised for 2021 with a 15-year total of \$152,684 to help support those battling Cancer and find a cure. The Community 4-H Club fundraise throughout the year—currently have grape jelly & rhubarb jam for sale, both made with Oxford County fruit. They also collect pop cans, returnable bottles & cans and

Brooksdale 4-H Club did a project on pollinators this summer. Youth learned about different kinds of pollinators. The youth and club volunteers planted &cared for gardens in Harrington and Embro as part of the project. Each member made a word search or crossword as part of their achievement program.

Mt Elgin 4-H Club youth learned about caring for canine this fall. During the summer months, 'My Plate and the Planet' project was done. Youth learned about world hunger, food waste, food loss, local family fruit & vegetable farms and grew vegetables in their own gardens to make a salad.

There were youth who learned to do needlepoint on plastic canvas. There were two groups, 11 in-person and 10 virtually. 
Over the past few months, museum staff has been trying to catch up on offers of donations. We recently took in artifacts from families in Embro and Beachville that relate to Beachville's quarries



Tree Planting around Zorra!

Trees help to clean the air and fight against global climate change, they also impact aesthetic, social, economic and health benefits.

Environmental needs are becoming increasingly important across our globe and every tree helps!!

Throughout the Township of Zorra there are various tree planting programs available for residents. Available programs are as follows:



the 43rd Line, North of Road 68

Township of Zorra Memorial Tree Program

Memorial Trees can be purchased, in memory of loved ones, at the Township Office for \$40.00 through the Upper Thames River Conservation Authority (UTRCA). Individuals may also have their loved ones name added to a memorial tree sign when they purchase a tree for an additional fee. Signs are located at Grace Patterson Park in Thamesford, Embro Conservation Area and Harrington Conservation Area. The trees are planted in various locations throughout Zorra on Township or UTRCA property at a pre-determined location. Approximately 162 trees, usually 6'-8' sugar maples, have been planted throughout the Township since the start of this program in 1995. Fill out the Memorial Tree Request Form on the Zorra website www.zorra.ca or contact the Township Office.

Township of Zorra Replacement Tree Program

Currently when the Township of Zorra Public Works staff take down a tree along a road side or near private property, they offer the land owner two trees to replace the one that was removed. The two trees are for planting on their private property. In 2021, 250 6'-8' sugar maple trees were planted through this program. Fill out the Tree Replacement Form on the Zorra website www.zorra.ca or contact the Township Office.

UTRCA Private Lands Program

Landowners who reside in the Upper Thames River watershed and own a minimum of 2.5 acres of property are eligible to participate in the UTRCA's Tree Planting on Private Lands program. The program offers large stock trees and seedlings. For further details visit the UTRCA website at www.thamesriver.on.ca.

Township of Zorra Memorial Tree Forest

In 2015, Zorra Township partnered with Brock and Visser Funeral Home - Thamesford Chapel and UTRCA to have trees planted in memory of those individuals whose funeral arrangements have been conducted through Brock and Visser Funeral Home. The Memorial Tree Forest is located on the 43rd Line, North of Road 68 on land owned by UTRCA. The trees are purchased by Brock and Visser Funeral Home. The trees that are being planted are native species, 6'-8' in size. Since 2015, 350 trees have been planted in the forest. Contact Brock and Visser for more details at 519-285-2427.





The Upper Thames River Conservation Authority has trees & grants available. Landowners who reside in the Upper Thames River watershed and own a minimum of 1 hectare (2.5 acres) are eligible to participate in the UTRCA's Tree **Planting on Private Lands program.**

The program offers:

- Large stock trees (coniferous and deciduous)
- **Seedlings** (coniferous and deciduous species, as well as wildlife shrubs)

Trees purchased through this program may be planted by the landowner or through the UTRCA's full planting service.
